# Smokers and Drinkers to Pay More to Revenue

Motor Cars to Contribute Ten to Fifreen per cent; even Chewing Cum and Gramophones to Pay

OTTAWA, May 19 .- Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, made his first budget speech yesterday afternoon. Among the proposals he introduced was a buyers' luxury tax amounting to ten per cent on the total purchase price of the more expensive articles of clothing. The tax is to be imposed on all boots and shoes retailing at more than \$9 a pair, on men's and boys' suits selling at anything over \$45, on fur coats offered to customers at anything over \$100, on women's dresses over \$45 and women's suits over \$60.

GTTAWA, May 19 .- In his budget speech yesterday, Sir Henry Drayton, Minister of Finance, said that at the end of the financial year the national debt would reach a gross amount of \$3,014,-481,774.12. This included investments amounting to \$1,078,596,461.27, leaving a net national debt of \$1,935,-946,312.85.

# Prince Rupert Ten Years Old Today

One Decade Makes Great Changes in City; Short Review of Work Done since Incorporation of City

Today is the tenth anniversary of the first municipal election in this city. Ten years ago today Prince Rupert chose its first municipal officers and took on the rights and powers of a selfgoverning, corporate body. On May 19, 1910, Alfred Stork was elected first mayor and a policy of progress was instituted that has been kept up with varying degrees of success up to the present day. ### Watch Carefully Fisheries Convention.

It is very important that Prince Rupert should be well represented at the fisheries convention in Vancouver next month. The despatches yesterday announced that the proposal would be made to form a local fisheries board to handle the fisheries on this coast instead of referring everything to Ottawa.

On the face of it this proposal looks innocent enough. Local administration should be better than administration at a distance. An attempt will undoubtedly be made, however, to centre the control in Vancouver and to many people that would be worse than Ottawa. If there is to be a local control it should be in Prince Rupert, the centre of the industry in this province.

### Encourage Industry Much as Possible.

The other proposal that will come before the convention to the effect that the Fisheries Department of the Dominion should protect the salmon in the small streams as well as the larger ones and should try to increase the production in those streams is one worthy of every consideration. Anything that will benefit the fishing industry should benefit us. In order that we may voice approval of those things we wish to support and protest against anything that would tend to injure us, we should have a good live representation at the convention.

### Parliament or The Cabinet?

There have been complaints from time to time that the Dominion cabinet was taking on itself too much power and leaving little for Parliament. The same complaint has been made at High, 2:14 a.m., 22.9 feet. various times in local legislatures.

When it was announced that the Government would appoint an ambassador to Washington, Hon. W. S. Fielding took exception, not to making the appointment, but to the method of doing High, 3:03 a.m., 22 feet. it without consulting Parliament. He moved a resolution asking that it come before Parliament before the vote was taken, and Low, 9:48 a.m., 1.2 feet. the Government was sustained by a majority of only five, showing that even Government supporters did not like the way things High, 3:57 a.m., 20.7 feet. were going.

Doubtless the Government will take note of the feeling of Low, 10:39 a.m., 2.3 feet. the House and there will be no repetition of that sort of thing. The members of Parliament represent the people and on any large question they should be consulted.

New York, May 19 .- Women will be able to buy their coats, suits, dresses and waists cheaper Thursdays ...... next fall than they have been this Saturdays ufacturers and retailers are now Sundays working mature. Two elements, outside of any reduction in labor or raw material costs, that nay lensue between now and July, when the fall manufacturing season will begin, are of prime importance in the plan. These are overhead expense and profits. Many manufacturers are preparing to cut down both of these elements and several larger ones have broached the subject to pro-minent retailers who are in accord with them,

Apparel manufacturers admit that during the last three or four Livears of unprecedented prosperlity in the business many items of overhead expense have been needlessly added. Elaborate showgooms, more office help than is necessary and frequent introduction of new models are a few of the many incidentals that have een tacked on to the cost of dobusiness, according to the nanufacturers. Large cuts are now being made in these expendi- For Massett, Port Clements and tures by several manufacturing establishments.

### High Prices Kill Trade

Concerning the slicing of profits, a prominent manufacturer o dresses declared that while in the past he has figured his prices to yield a five per cent. net returi on his total volume of business, during the coming fall season he will content himself with a return of three per cent. "That will be sufficient," he said, "to keep me going until conditions change. If the majority of manufacturers are to weather the storm through which we are now passing a gene-

ral decline is necessary." The majority of women, according to garment manufacturers. have not yet tegun purchasing spring clothes and yet retailers have made radical price cuts. The weather has been an important contributing factor in this movement and sunshine and warmer temperature undoubtedly will bring forth a greater demand. the manufacturers believe. However, they admit the season has progressed to a point where a last minute rush of business will not make up for what has already been lost. Resistance to high prices also is growing stronger, say some of the garment producers, and retailers lost much early business that might have been gained had they not marked their merchandise so high. They assert that many retailers have signified their intention of reducing the margin of difference between wholesale and retail prices at the
