## Steamers Operating; Men Still Out

### BOLT FROM DOMINION GOVERNMENT RANKS OVER THE BUDGET PROPOSALS

#### Longshoremen Refuse to Join Striking Firemen and Seamen

Employers say practically all the Vessels are being Operated; Prince Albert Sailed Last Night and George Tonight

VANCOUVER, May 27.—The International Longshoremen's mediation committee will today make strenuous efforts to make peace between the steamship companies and the strikers. A second meeting has been arranged with the steamship heads following negative results yesterday when the representatives of the companies said there was nothing on which they could negotiate, as practically all the boats from which the strikers quit are now sailing.

It is expected that the Chelohsin will sail tomorrow night for Prince Rupert and Alert Bay.

The S. S. Prince Albert sailed last night with freight and passengers for the north and will call at southern Queen Charlotte Islands with food for the camps.

The Prince George arrived yesterday and sails again tonight for Prince Rupert and Stewart.

VANCOUVER, May 27.—(Noon).—The latest indication here is that there is further weakening of the strikers. This morning the longshoremen voted against coming out in support of the firemen and deckhands.

The mediation meeting which it was expected would have been held this morning did not take place.

#### Fisheries Engineer Will Let Contract at Digby and Arrange Fishway on Naas

VANCOUVER, May 27.—John McHugh, resident engineer under the Dominion Fisheries, left last night for the north to make preliminary arrangements for the construction of a fishway for salmon on the upper waters of the Naas River. While in the north he will inspect the new hatchery which is being constructed at Lakelse Lake.

Mr. McHugh expects to let the contract, while in Prince Rupert, for the construction of a large storehouse at Digby Island.

It is reported here that log jams and other obstructions at Bella Coola in the River Atanako have been removed, giving a clear passage for sockeye from the river mouth to the Lonesome Lake spawning grounds. Most of the clearing will take place between Bella Coola and Stillwater. Three camps will be established, each with 24 veterans employed. The cost of the work will be \$6,000 and it is to be completed in time to allow the salmon to pass up the river next year.

#### COMMISSION ON SHELL CONTRACT

Brought by J. Wesley Allison Against Remington Cartridge Company.

NEW YORK, May 27.—J. Wesley Allison of Morrisburg, who figured in the famous fuse inquiry at Ottawa in 1916, is now appearing as plaintiff in a suit here for \$100,000 based upon a British munitions contract against H. M. Dodge, director of the Remington Cartridge Co. He claims commission on a contract for over \$2,000,000 shells.

Dodge refuses to pay the claim or divulge the number of shells the firm manufactured for the Allies.

#### ASK CLEMENCY FOR FINDLAY

Has Already Served a Year in the Penitentiary for Theft of Whiskey.

VANCOUVER, May 27.—An application has been made for clemency for W. C. Findlay, former prohibition commissioner, who a year ago was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for theft of 74 cases of government whiskey. An application asking for his release has been sent to Ottawa and is now under consideration by the Department of Justice. It is believed the application was made on behalf of the Findlay family.

Findlay had been previously fined \$1,000 for importing whiskey illegally, and the fine was paid.

#### STATES EATS BILLION DOLLARS OF CANDY

NEW YORK, May 27.—The American people are eating candy at the rate of a billion dollars a year, yet they complain of sugar shortage, Secretary of the Treasury Houston declared today.

#### IRISH TROUBLE IS CONTINUING

Property Being Burned—Ancient Castle Destroyed by Fire in County Cork.

DUBLIN, May 27.—Burning of property in Ireland is continuing. On Tuesday evening Kilbrittain Castle in County Cork, an ancient landmark, was destroyed, the estimated damage being £100,000. Fortunately the building was unoccupied.

Damage estimated at £40,000 was caused by a fire at the Aire Farm, the property of Major Pollock Gaveen of Ballinastioe. The family was in the building at the time of the fire and they had a narrow escape for their lives.

#### CAN ABSORB MORE LABOR

Superintendent of Employment Service Says Can Take 1,000 Laborers Weekly.

VANCOUVER, May 27.—The superintendent of the provincial employment service, Colonel Bruce Bowley, says that British Columbia can absorb 1,000 laborers weekly in the lumber camps and mills, in railroad construction and on the farms.

In the latest reports from divisional points is one from Prince Rupert showing applications 43, placements 33.

#### BIG CONTRACTOR PASSES AWAY

Timothy Foley, Who Built G.T.P., Dies at St. Paul, 82 Years of Age.

VANCOUVER, May 27.—Word has been received here of the death on Tuesday at St. Paul, Minn., of Timothy Foley, head of the big contracting firm, Foley Brothers. He was 82 years of age.

The late Mr. Foley was head of the firm of Foley, Welch & Stewart which had the contract for construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway from Saskatoon to Prince Rupert. The same firm built the Canadian Northern Railway, now the Canadian National, from Port Arthur eastward, and the principal portions of the P. G. E., besides a long section of the C. P. R. They undertook the immense work of constructing the Rogers Pass tunnel on the main line of the C. P. R.

Mr. Foley was born in Canada at Lanark County, Ontario. He leaves a widow but no children.

#### DOUKHOBOR LADY BURNED TO DEATH, CHILDREN SAVED

NELSON, May 27.—Mrs. William Leverenkoff, a Doukhobor, died here from burns received when fire destroyed her home at Castlegar yesterday. The sum of \$400 in bank notes was burned. The lives of three children were saved by an older brother, eighteen years of age.

#### Wants Trawlers for Returned Soldiers

Provincial Government, through the Industrial Commissioner, trying to Secure Trawlers at Halifax for Coast Fisheries

VICTORIA, May 27.—Efforts are being made by the Provincial industrial commissioner, Major Martyn, to forestall the sale of the forty trawlers now at Halifax to British interests for use in the North Sea. He has sent several wires to Premier Borden and the cabinet asking that a number of the vessels be made available for purchase by fishing companies of returned men ready to enter the trawling game in British Columbia waters.

It is understood that if the vessels are secured some of them will make their headquarters at Prince Rupert, as the most convenient point for the distribution of fish caught on the British Columbia banks. No definite announcement will be made, however, until it is learned that the vessels can be secured for the purpose. There is a very strong feeling in Vancouver against allowing these vessels to be used to develop the fisheries of the North Sea when there are the fisheries on this coast so badly needing development.

#### American Railways Still Hold Refrigerator Cars

Impossible to Arrange for Express Service to that Country with Fish, says Colonel Peck; Trying to Solve Problem

According to telegrams received from Ottawa this morning by S. E. Parker, president of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, it would appear that both the member for the district and the minister of railways are working energetically towards coping with the refrigerator car shortage at this place.

The railway department is taking steps to ascertain what cars are necessary for the fish business between here and the prairie provinces and Eastern Canada, but little hope is held out for remedying the bonded business to the United States. Col. Peck states in a wire that it will be impossible to arrange for cars to the States now as the American railways are holding the cars in that country after their arrival.

#### Break in Support of the Government

Battleford Farmer and the Member for Lethbridge both oppose Budget and Promise to Vote with Opposition

OTTAWA, May 27.—The first break in the ranks of the Government supporters on the budget took place last night when H. O. Wright, a battleford farmer, in a concise and positive speech announced he would break with the Government and support the opposition amendment. The announcement was received with applause from the Liberal opposition as well as the farmers.

W. A. Buchan, the member for Lethbridge, declared that he had come to the conclusion that the proposed tariff revision meant only protection and he would also support the amendment. Again there was opposition applause. Mr. Buchan said he could not agree with anything which meant taxing the implements of production, thus making the cost of living higher.

#### Close on Two Billions Is Canada's Bill Against Germany Account of War

OTTAWA, May 27.—Canada's claim against Germany as reparation for the losses sustained by this country and individual citizens as a result of the war, has been forwarded to England. The bill totals \$1,874,000,000 made as follows:—

Cost of war and demobilization, \$1,115,000,000.  
Separation allowances, \$95,500,000.  
Halifax losses, \$30,000,000.  
Army of occupation, \$8,000,000.  
Illegal warfare, \$31,500,000.  
Halifax losses means the damage sustained as a result of the explosion of the munitions ship Montblanc in Halifax harbor in 1917.

#### BOLSHEVIKI AND PERSIA

Contradictory Reports as to Condition in that Country.

LONDON, May 27.—The Persian legation reports the situation in Persia improving. The Bolsheviki are withdrawing. In British official quarters there is no confirmation of the report of the second landing in Persia compelling British retirement.

LONDON, May 26.—Bolsheviki forces continue to pour into Persia. They entered Reshet where the British retired toward Teheran.

#### DELEGATES TO MOSCOW

PARIS, May 27.—The Armenians have accepted an invitation of the Russian Bolsheviki to send delegates to Moscow.

#### AGED ARMY OFFICER DIED AT VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, May 27.—The death occurred on Wednesday of Captain Horace Ayliffe, an ex-army officer 74 years of age, a brother-in-law of F. W. Peters of this city. When war broke out, despite his age, Capt. Langford served at the Vernon internment camp.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

BOUND NORTH FOR SIBERIA

Schooner Chukotsk Leaves Seattle For Kolyma River in the Arctic.

Bound for the Kolyma River, Arctic Siberia, 3,400 miles from Seattle, on one of the most daring voyages in the history of navigation, the 92-foot power schooner Chukotsk, second of the Hibbard-Swenson Co.'s Far North traders to leave port, sailed from Seattle a few days ago amid the shouted farewells of a crowd on the wharf.

The Chukotsk will go by the inside passage to Cape Spencer, thence across the stormy Gulf of Alaska through the pass into the Bering Sea and then straight to East Cape in the Arctic. From East Cape she will return to Nome to prepare for her great venture to the Kolyma River. No trader has been in the Kolyma for three years and it is said the people there have run out of everything, even matches. By the route she will follow, the little schooner's northward voyage will exceed 4,000 miles.

The romance of the sea, of perilous voyages to strange places, held the crowd rooted to the wharf until the staunch little vessel disappeared in the afternoon haze off Magnolia Bluff.

Shout "Good Luck" "Goodbye, good luck, look out for yourselves first," were the last words from the shore to reach the steady-nerved mariners on the decks of the schooner. They were shouted by Henry C. Hibbard, of the Hibbard-Swenson Company, to Captain H. Weeding, master of the gallant little ship. Captain Weeding waved his arm in reply. His face was wreathed in smiles. So were the faces of his men. They had the bearing of those who hear the call of great adventures and set forth with light hearts to match their skill and cunning against the perils of remote waters and the treacheries of the ice fields.

The Kolyma River flows into the Arctic 1,000 miles to the northwest of Nome, Alaska. When the mariner sights East Cape in the Arctic, he is only getting started on the way to the Kolyma. When he sees the gaunt slopes of remote North Cape looming on the southern horizon, he is only half way from Bering Strait to the Kolyma. And when he drops anchor at the mouth of the Kolyma civilization has become a fading memory.

First to Make Trip Aside from the Russian government steamships, the Chukotsk is the first vessel to attempt the feat of making the Kolyma River and returning to Seattle in the same season. Once past East Cape she will have a long wrestling match with the ice, but her master and sailors are confident that the can fight their way to Kolyma. There's a strong chance that they may be frozen in for the winter, but they are outfitted and provisioned against such a contingency.

While the little power schooner is wrestling with the icefields a \$200 phonograph will make the Arctic atmosphere vibrate to the notes of the latest jazz or the oldest grand opera, the records running the gamut of musical achievement.

The Chukotsk is the former halibut schooner Tyee. She is equipped with a 140-horsepower gas engine that gives a speed of eight knots. She is known as a fine sailor, handling well under canvas. For the Arctic venture she was sheathed in ironbark.

INTERNATIONAL LOAN TO HELP GERMANY IN RE-ESTABLISHING

LONDON, May 27.—An international loan is to be raised in order to mobilize Germany's indemnity under international control.

The loan, already adopted in principle, will be floated, it is understood, with the participation of Britain, France, Italy, Belgium and the United States. It is probable it will be aided by Holland, Denmark and other neutrals, plus such help as Germany, Austria and Turkey will be able to give.

The amount has not been fixed, but a leading banker said that \$2,500,000,000 would be adequate help in starting Germany's productive activities.

ADAIR CARSS' ANNUAL BALL

Was One of Season's Prettiest Affairs—Decorations and Refreshments Were Splendid.

Gaily decorated with various artistic shade effects and the windows barred with green strips of crepe paper giving a lattice effect, the St. Andrew's hall presented a pretty and novel appearance at the first annual spring ball of the Adair Carss Chapter, Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire held last night. Indeed the decorative scheme was the most striking seen in the St. Andrew's Hall for many months. The ball was quite successful both from a financial and social standpoint although the attendance was not very large, there being about 70 couples in attendance. It was a very enjoyable affair, however, and the success attained reflects much credit on the conveners and their committees.

The floor was in exceptionally good condition and Gray's Orchestra supplied the usual high standard of music, much to the delight of all. The refreshments served were both dainty and appetizing and, also, were different from the usual order. A previous conviction of the accused in the police court for vagrancy was referred to by the judge.

In delivering sentence, Judge Young handed down some strong advice to the lad, not in a harsh manner, but more in the form of fatherly counsel. He drew attention to the suffering and pain it must bring to the boy's parents and urged that when he is released from prison that he endeavor to lead an honest and decent life and forget evil ways. The prisoner stated that he would try to reform.

LAMBETH CONFERENCE

Anglican Bishops Will Gather in England Early in July.

LONDON, May 27.—The sixth Lambeth Conference of Bishops of the Anglican Church is to be held here early in July with Dr. Davidson, Archbishop of Canterbury presiding. Already a number of Bishops from overseas are on their way to attend it.

The Conference has met at ten-year intervals since 1867. Owing to the war, however, it has not been held for 12 years. Dr. Davidson will be the first Archbishop to be twice President of the Conference, with which, in several capacities, he has been associated for over 40 years. The expectation is that some 279 bishops will attend the coming gathering, 100 of them from the British Isles, 107 from overseas, and 72 from America.

# Telkwa is Fast Becoming a Very Important Centre

### Ranchers are Coming In and Taking Up Land, while Coal Deposits are attracting much attention and Sawmills Working

TELKWA, May 27.—In common with many other places along the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, the town of Telkwa is experiencing a great influx of new settlers and at present newcomers are satisfied to live in tents on the townsite or in other temporary quarters. People are coming from all parts of Canada to the Bulkley and Telkwa valleys. The following are most recent arrivals:

R. L. Lamb from Saskatchewan has started ranching in the Canyon Creek district; A. F. Luke of Winnipeg, J. Keller of Indian Head, and J. Cuthbert of Alberta have just come in and are busy on their properties. The district has welcomed the arrival of J. Kennedy, vice-president of the United Grain Growers Association, who has started operations personally on his acreage just to the east of Round Lake and has taken in two car loads of settlers' effects; J. Conn of Alberta has taken over the old Bulkley Ranch, while Capt. G. L. Murray, formerly with the Soldier Settlement Board, has purchased John Norris' ranch. W. Elliott is opening up a new tract of land near Tye Lake and many others are going into the same neighborhood.

The sawmill business is now assuming quite an important place in the town development. The completion of Mr. Van Horn's sawmill about four miles to the east of the townsite will mark the second recent advance along these lines. Svenson & Chapman Co. have erected a first class carpenter shop and planing mill and other woodworking machines.

#### New Buildings.

In keeping with the recent progress, there has been marked building activity. Amongst the new residences springing up on the townsite are those of J. J. Gillespie, J. J. McNeill, H. H. Phillips, A. Burritt, and J. Hunsberger. Recently houses along the bank of the river were moved back to allow a street being made there.

The summer road work of the provincial government will commence soon. Improvements are being hoped for in the direction of the coal deposits. The Telkwa coal has been proved, and there remains only the matter of transportation to make this natural asset of the district a tremendous influence in interesting capital in other mines. The return of Mr. Jefferson will greatly aid in the mining development of the district. New properties are receiving great attention and the copper occurrences found along with the coal have been estimated to be very rich.

The roads in the district are now in fairly good condition and soon, with a few more culverts, it will be possible to motor from Hazelton to Prince George and thence by an already established trunk road to Vancouver.

## DIPPER'S NEST WITH YOUNG WAS FOUND AT KLOYAH RIVER FALLS

One of the most familiar sights to fishermen who frequent the small streams in search of trout is the little slaty-brown water ouzel that bobs and bows on the rocks along the banks right at the margin of the water. The bird is known as the dipper because of its constant dipping or bobbing up and down.

On the recent holiday a dipper's nest was found at the foot of the fall on the Kloyah River. It was about three feet from the ground and built of moss, covered like a wren's nest only much larger. It measures about twelve inches across.

The nest contained young birds about a week old, naked little things that nearly filled the mossy home. The dippers always nest near a waterfall or close to a running stream and usually the nest is so placed that the spray from the fall keeps it wet all the time. The bird is an expert diver and seems to delight in the water.

**NO ELECTIONS FOR TWO OR THREE YEARS**

So Declares Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Government Setting House in Order First.

OTTAWA, May 27.—Hon. C. C. Ballantyne declared a few days ago that the Government would not go to the people until the autumn of 1922 or the early part of '23. He made it clear that he was speaking for the Government.

Similar expressions have been heard before, but in view of the recent return of Premier Borden and following consultations with him the declaration has a good deal of significance.

It is understood that the Government feels that it is able to carry on and secure money to carry the country over the reconstruction period. While it is announced that there will not be another popular loan this year, it is possible that financial institutions will be called upon to take up the Government's securities, for it is well known that they must have money. Already last year's loan is spent.

**Better Financial Basis.**

The Government is making great efforts to place the country on a more solid financial basis. Money has been spent with reckless prodigality, but intimations have been given that if this is to continue no money will be available to do but go to the country. In order to stave off the evil day, the Government is trying to set its house in order. It is in the hands of the financiers and has to do their bidding. The budget is the result. The people must pay, not only for the legitimate expenditures of war-time, but for the reckless expenditures of the past few years.

**ALBERTA GRAIN LOOKING WELL**

CALGARY, May 27.—Wheat and oats are practically all sown in Alberta and the seeding of only a small acreage of barley remains to be completed. Already most of the wheat is shown above the surface and in many places is several inches high.

The crop this year has been put in under very favorable conditions, plenty of moisture and good growing weather; although there is an indication that rain will be needed within the next two or three weeks.

The acreage to wheat will not be decreased to the extent as at first thought, probably about 5 per cent., owing to the fact that the farmers made an extra effort to hurry in the grain. Barley and oats acreage will be somewhat less than in previous years, while flax seed not being available in some districts, there will also be a slight decrease in acreage in that grain. Germination in almost every case has been uniform, especially on summerfallow land where the percentage of the stand is in almost every case practically 100 per cent. Pasture is in fine shape and the cattle are picking up wonderfully well.

**ABOLISH SUNDAY FISHING AND HUNTING**  
That is Desire of Methodist Conference as Expressed by Resolution.

At the recent Methodist Conference a resolution was passed asking that the game laws be amended in order to make Sunday a close season for fishing and hunting. The resolution will be sent to the Government at Victoria but beyond that no active steps will be taken to secure legislation, except with the co-operation of other denominations.

That the resolution censoring Sunday fishing and hunting was a blow at the very best friends of the church, was the opinion expressed to the Vancouver Sun by C. J. White, secretary of the Vancouver Angling & Game Association, who stated that the members of the association were unanimous in protesting against any proposal to stop fishing and hunting on Sundays.

"Anglers as a class have the deepest respect for the Almighty," said Mr. White, who held that a Sunday spent in the great outdoors was of decided spiritual benefit.

"To the man who works all week in a busy office a Sunday's recreation in the open is a physical necessity," said Mr. White, "and by keeping up his vitality by spending Sunday out of doors he will probably live longer to attend church than if he stayed home."

Mr. White stated that he believed the average minister would be only too willing to go motoring on a Sunday, which, in Mr. White's opinion, should be considered as a far greater crime than fishing on the Sabbath.

**Synopsis of Land Act Amendments**

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$10 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence make improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mills, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Stipulate one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The title within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees and taxes on soldiers pre-emptions.

Interest on assessments to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired prior to the outbreak, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.**

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchaser do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

**GRAZING.**

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may direct owners of range management Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
