The advertising firm of McKim Ltd. has just issued a booklet which it calls "The Force that Makes Ideas Live." The booklet is very interesting although it deals with the work of the publishers and is somewhat in the nature of a house organ. To quote from it:-

"Great industrial organizations of the future will be known, not simply as successful business institutions, but as definite contributors to human progress. Propaganda advertising will be the medium.

Governments will only be democratic governments when ********* they have been elected on a sane, logical and convincing presen- * tation of their policies to all the people, and when they keep those people constantly informed of the progress made in putting their policies into effect. The means will be furnished by propaganda advertising.

Agency for Moulding Public Opinion.

The press is the greatest agency for moulding public opinion, says the booklet. Yesterday that opinion was influenced through the news and editorial columns, today the advertising columns take precedence, commanding instant attention, so that the story can be presented uniformly when and wherever desired, all over the country.

Yesterday leaders and organizations that had some farreaching policy or idea for which they desired public approval, felt general editorial endorsement was vital to success; today men know from experience gained in association with great propaganda campaigns of the past few years that the attention of the reading public can best be reached through the advertising columns.

A sane, logical, convincing presentation of facts and policies in the advertising columns receives more attention, has greater prestige, and is very much more effective than the same message clothed as a news item or editorial and claiming attention on that basis.

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to Pre-emption now confined to sur-

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres. before receiving Crown Grant Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent rest dence may be issued, provided appli cant makes improvements to extent o \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required. Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his

farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
