Seamen and Firemen Back to Work

SPEEDING UP WORK AT SHIPYARDS AS SOON AS NEW DERRICKS COMPLETE

Strikers Accept Companies' Terms and Return to Work

Are given Advance of Ten Dollars a Month and right of having Union Representatives present during Future Negotiations

VANCOUVER, May 29.—The strike is over. The strikers almost unanimously accepted the terms offered by the company and go back to work. All boats that have been tied up or delayed will get away on schedule immediately.

The basis of settlement of the strike is an advance of \$10 a month all round to the men and recognition by the companies of the union men in their own crews. An arrangement is made with the men as a concession to the union, that in future negotiations to adjust difficulties union representatives shall be present.

The steamer Prince Rupert leaves tonight for Victoria and Seattle on her usual run and will return here Monday morning, leaving for Prince Rupert and Stewart Monday night.

The Chelohsin left last night for the north and is due to arrive at Prince Rupert Sunday night.

The Prince John is scheduled to sail for Prince Rupert and Queen Charlottes with freight and passengers on Friday next. The Princess Mary will get away for Prince Rupert and Stagway just as soon as she can discharge and reload freight.

There is a general feeling of relief in Prince Rupert at the settlement. While there has been no great disturbance of business, the effects of the partial tieup were beginning to be felt as there was a feeling of uncertainty as to when the boats would arrive or leave. Now it is expected that business will proceed as before.

PRINCE JOHN IS REPAIRED

Work was Finished on Time by Wallace Yards and Vessel Sails Next Week.

Word was received this morning by Superintendent Beaumont that the repair work on the Prince John had been completed and the vessel delivered to the company yesterday within the time limit of 29 days, stated in the tender. A large amount of work had to be done on her following the collision in Skidegate Narrows.

The Prince John is scheduled to sail for Prince Rupert by way of Southern Queen Charlotte Island points, on Friday of next week.

FURS LOWER AT ST. LOUIS

Sum of \$23,000,000 Paid at Seventeen Days' Sale Just Concluded.

ST. LOUIS, May 29.—A seven-day auction sale at the International Fur Exchange was concluded yesterday, the total sales amounting to \$23,000,000.

Prices paid were considerably less than at the February sales.

PREMIER DRURY ON DEMOCRACY

Farmer Leader Says no System of Government Better Than the Present.

"The political fountain can rise no higher than its source, and as a general rule it will be found that the men in authority will pretty accurately reflect the electorate, the people who placed them there." In an address on "The New Democracy," before the Young Men's Canadian Club, Premier Drury thus expressed himself.

In his opening remarks, the Premier traced the development of the democratic spirit in Canada and Great Britain from the days of serfdom to the present time. That a new era had opened was the opinion expressed by the speaker, and the only way that he saw in which to avoid the perils that lay ahead was to secure a keener appreciation of the duties and privileges of democracy among the people.

The present was no time, the Premier thought, for any government to hide its politics, but honesty and frankness were the best safeguards of the politician. Honesty, in the opinion of Mr. Drury, was the best politics. There could be no system of government more democratic than the present one, he said, and there was not, nor could ever be, the slightest excuse for violence of any kind.

TRAINS STOPPED, POLICE BURNED TO DEATH IN IRELAND

LIMERICK, May 29.—Trains were stopped here and the tracks torn up by Sinn Feiners in many places. Two policemen were burned to death in a police barracks near Dublin.

FOREST FIRES IN THE EAST

Much Destruction in Quebec and New Brunswick—One Beyond Control.

QUEBEC, May 29.—Fires destroyed fifteen square miles of forest near St. Marcell in Rimouski county. There are also a number of fires in the Matapedia valley.

FREDERICKTON, May 29.—Forest fires of a very serious nature are raging in hazen and Grimmer settlements in Restigouche county.

A fire near Glennie in Sudbury county is beyond control.

U.S. DESTROYERS TO VISIT ALASKA

Admiral Rodman May Accompany Them to Inspect Naval Facilities.

SEATTLE, May 29.—Admiral Rodman, commander of the United States Pacific Fleet, who has just arrived from Washington, says that six American destroyers will visit Alaska waters this summer and he will probably go too to inspect the harbors and other naval facilities.

SUGAR MAGNATE WAS NOT UNUSUALLY RICH

Left Little Over Quarter of a Million Dollars to Widow.

VANCOUVER, May 29.—The will of the late B. D. Rogers has been filed for probate. It shows that the sugar magnate left the sum of \$296,273, from which has to be deducted \$20,000 Dominion tax.

The young widow is the chief legatee.

"ALICE" SAILS NORTH JUNE 11

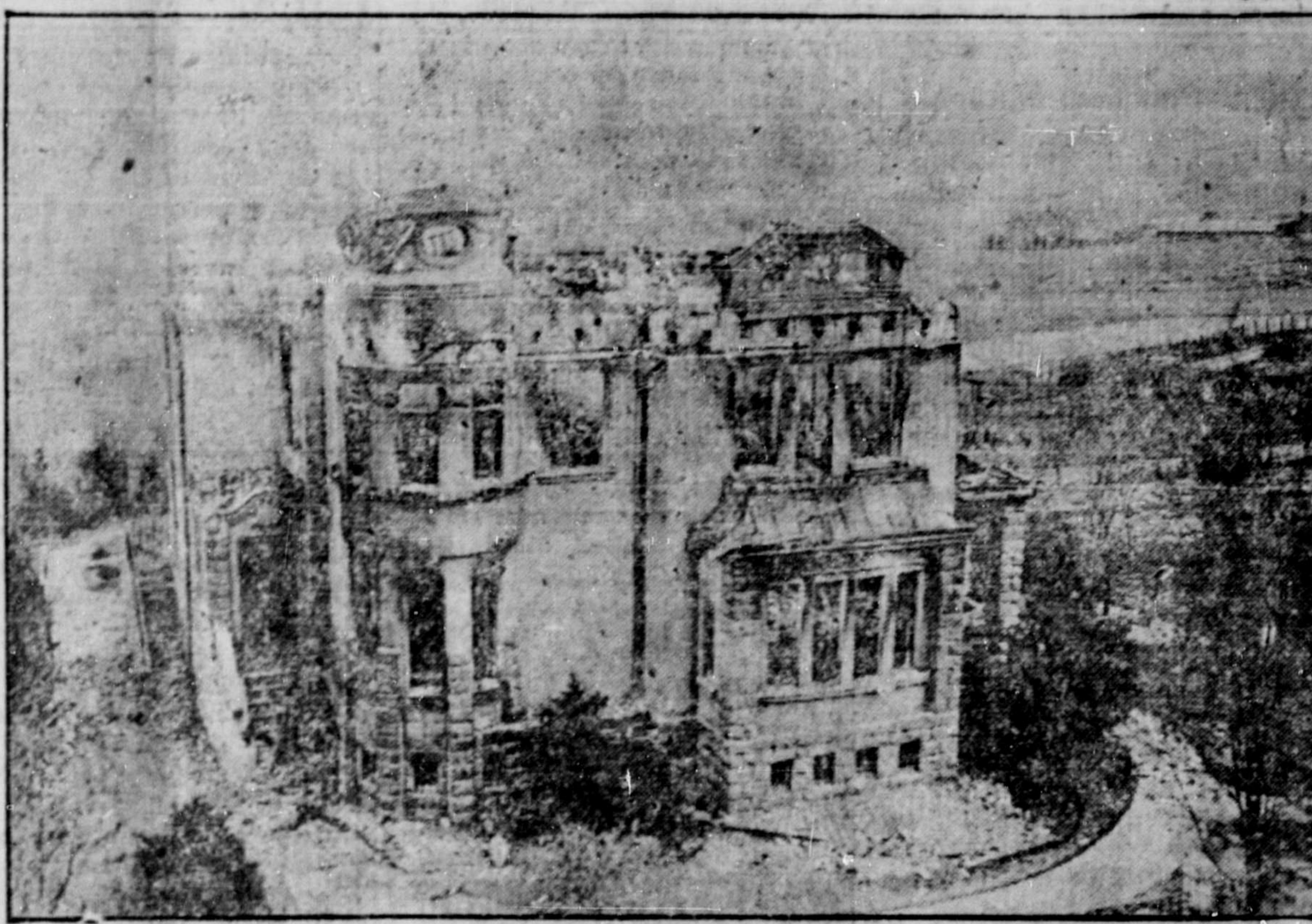
Regular Weekly Summer Service to This Port and Skagway in Two Weeks.

VICTORIA, May 29.—The C. P. R. steamer Princess Alice will sail from Victoria for the first trip of the season to Skagway on May 11, inaugurating the regular weekly summer service to Prince Rupert and Skagway. It is understood that she will alternate with the Princess Mary.

The Princess Alice is at present operated on the triangular run between Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle, but she will overhaul before going north, the Princess Royal taking her place here.

The trawler G. E. Foster was docked yesterday by the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. at their repair shops and her overhaul, probably will be completed today.

CASTLE RANSACKED AND BURNED BY THE RIOTING WORKERS.



Falkenstein, in Lower Saxony, was the scene recently of a violent outbreak on the part of the workers which resulted in much bloodshed. Falkenstein is a little town tucked away in a pretty valley fifteen miles from Plauen.

PROSPECTING PARTY LEAVES FOR UNUK RIVER

Will Try to Beat Americans Sitting on Snow Waiting for Country to Open.

COMPANY MADE UP OF RETURNED MEN

VANCOUVER, May 29.—F. E. Mitchell, a mining engineer and veteran, left here on Tuesday at the head of a prospecting party in an effort to be the first to enter the mineralized area between Portland Canal and Atlin. He will be followed in the near future by T. F. Harper Reed, geologist. They are representing the Lode Prospecting Co., an organization made up of none but returned men.

The company expects to start work at the headquarters of the Unuk River in Canadian territory about half way between Stewart and the Stikine River. They will try to beat the stampede of Americans now sitting on the snow waiting for good weather.

First Piles Here for Salmon Wharf

Tenders are to be in Winnipeg on May 31; Local Opinion Work will proceed This Year

Tenders for the construction of the new G. T. P. salmon and ocean wharf extension are to be opened at the end of the month at Winnipeg when all bids are to be in. This is taken by local officials as an indication of the erection of the wharf this year and it is thought that work may commence in the near future.

The first creosoted piles arrived at the lumber wharf yesterday when the Vancouver Towing and Barge Company's tug Clayburn arrived with one scowload for the new wharf. Materials will now be coming in steadily and will be unloaded at the lumber wharf. The piles are coming from the Vancouver creosoting plant at North Vancouver.

The Clayburn also brought north a scowload of piles for the new Stewart wharf. On her arrival here she at once left again for Alert Bay where two more barge loads of piles will be picked up for the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. On her return the Stewart piles will be taken on north.

Double Shifts at Shipyards Soon

Good Progress being made with Work; Derrick Towers just Complete and as soon as Derricks are swung Speed will Increase

Good progress is being made at the shipyards, and very soon a double shift will be put on in order to expedite the work. Two derrick towers have been erected forty feet high and the derricks will be swung on top of these and will be capable of handling anything that is used in the construction of the ships.

In order to do certain work that cannot be done when the regular crews are on the job, overtime shifts are being put on, and just as soon as the derricks are in working order two shifts will be arranged for at the yards.

The expediting of the work looks like business and it will be good news to the people here that everything is going forward in a businesslike manner.

SIX CHARGES PROFITEERING

Clothing Firm Fined \$31,000 for Overcharging at Syracuse.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., May 29.—Much interest has been taken here in a case of profiteering which has been before the courts. Weed's Incorporated, a big clothing firm, has been found guilty on six charges of making too large a profit. The total fines for the six convictions amount to \$31,000.

UNITED STATES STILL AT WAR

House of Representatives Fails to Over-ride President's Veto on Peace

DEADLOCK EXISTS AND MAY LAST YEAR

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Lacking 29 votes of the two-thirds majority necessary in such cases, the House of Representatives yesterday failed to pass the Knox resolution and end the war with Germany and Austria unconditional. The House and the Senate both passed the resolution by a majority vote, but this was vetoed by the President. It then became necessary to secure a two-thirds majority to pass it over the President's veto.

As a result of the deadlock, the United States is still officially at war with Germany and Austria and unless Congress accepts the treaty there will be no official peace until next spring, when the new president takes office. It is always possible too that Wilson may be re-elected.

LAUNCH FOR PLEASURE

River Craft Recently Purchased by A. Swanson Being Converted; Other Boats Overhauled.

The Seal Cove Marine Ways are very busy these days with a dozen men working. The long river boat formerly known as "The Bald Faced Horse," which was recently purchased by A. Swanson of the Prince Rupert Bathhouse is being rebuilt in order to fit her as a pleasure launch. She is having many changes to her upper works, including the rebuilding of the pilot house and additions to the keel, thus fitting her for deep sea business. This boat will be a valuable addition to the local fleet.

The mill launch, Seal Cove, is having a general overhaul, including new skag and sharplock. Mr. Miller is having a new pilot house built on his 32-foot launch and other repairs.

Two fishing boats have just left the ways, the Ingrid H., owned by John Dybhavn, and the Agi owned by Brandy Newall & Co.

A Comprehensive Church, Suggests Archbishop.

If an institution is a means to an end rather than an end in itself it must be adapted to the work it has been organized to perform.

If the Church of Christ is to perform the work for which it was commissioned and inspire with the Spirit of Christ all classes, races and nations in the world, it must be a truly catholic church, not only in name but in the variety of the structural and functional elements which it comprehends. Only a comprehensive church can reach the whole community.

While the essential truth to be proclaimed may be the same, the way of putting it must differ with every race of people and every type of character. While the object of worship may be the same, the method of worship which best appeals to one type of mind will differ from that which best appeals to another type of mind among the members of the same race or even the members of the same family. Never was there a greater psychological blunder than to try and force a uniform style of religious service upon all classes in the community. Absolute uniformity is a human impossibility.

As we survey the mixture of races in our land, as well as think of the variety of classes among our people, the truth is borne in upon us with irresistible force that only a comprehensive church can reach the whole community.

Need of Union Felt in Country.

It is in the sparsely settled districts that the need of church union is most acutely felt. Often a community of about three hundred people has three or four churches while another community not fifty miles away is entirely destitute of religious services. This cannot be in accordance with the Spirit of Christ.

In British Columbia the Anglican Provincial Synod and the Presbyterian Provincial Synod have recently approved in general terms the report of a joint-committee favoring a measure of co-operation in new and sparsely settled districts. All the Anglican bishops of the province are members of this committee. Each communion reserves the right to send a clergyman from time to time into such districts to administer the sacraments to its own people. In cases of sparsely settled districts where missionaries of both communions are already at work it is recommended that services be held either on different Sundays, or at different hours on the same Sunday so as to avoid apparent conflict. Already in the northern part of the province this plan is working well.

Various Needs for Different People.

We need every style of public worship from that of an informal cottage meeting to that of a stately cathedral service.

There is no valid reason why there should not be in the same village church, at 8 a. m. on Sunday the Holy Communion according to the rite of the Anglican Church, at 11 a. m. a service according to the custom of the Presbyterian Church, and at 7 p. m. another service according to the style of the Methodist Church.

The different methods of presenting the same Truth, and the different modes of worshipping the same God, which prevail in the different Protestant Communions have their necessary function to perform, but this should be, not in competition one with another, but in co-operation and co-ordination one with another. In other words, the different members should function as one Comprehensive Church. "We being many are one Body in Christ."

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

Mining News

Soldier Prospectors.

Many applications are being received by the Provincial Government from returned men who are desirous of taking advantage of the scheme inaugurated recently to send out returned men as prospectors. It is the intention to place the parties in the field by June 1, according to William M. Bigsaw, government mining engineer at Victoria, who is in charge of getting the men out. There were over 100 applications in Victoria at the first of last week.

Telegraph Creek Rich.

E. F. Williams returned to Seattle last week with the latest information regarding the placer strike on Telegraph Creek in the old Cassiar district. He declared that the Sid Barrington crowd would clean up over \$150,000 from ground opened during the winter where pay ran as high as \$3 on bedrock. Last week at Wrangell he met a late arrival from Telegraph Creek familiar with the Barrington ground. He was informed that during the winter considerable gold had been washed out by hand panning, and that a large dump is now being sluiced. The usual winter method of thawing is being used. Barrington is a former Yukon River pilot now operating a steamboat on the Stikine River. His home is in Seattle.

Analyzing Coal.

The Government of Alberta is considering the question of utilizing the different government power plants throughout the province for the purpose of showing which classes of coal are most suitable for certain purposes. A great deal of consideration is also being given to the problem of obtaining a furnace suitable to Alberta coal. Both the Government and the University of Alberta are carrying out a good deal of research work on the mineral resources of the province generally. The principal problems are the utilization of tar sands, classification of coals, quantitative and qualitative determination of the mining resources of the province and the development of clay deposits.

Boom Atlin District.

There seems to be every likelihood of a boom at Atlin this season. As announced before a concentrator is to be installed at the Malloy Group. It is more than probable that the Stewart and Alice Arm districts will be overcrowded this summer and the overflow would do well to go further north to Atlin as it is a splendid district. The Engineer mine gives promise to become one of the biggest gold mines in the province.

Dowdney Trail.

The Hope Prospectors' Association has taken up with the provincial engineer for the district the matter of reopening the Hope-Princeton-Dowdney trail with the result that the Hon. Dr. King has promised that the trail will be surveyed this summer. This will be good news to prospectors as it will open up to travel a considerable mining area that, owing to its inaccessibility, has been neglected. It is claimed that this will make one of the best routings for a trans-provincial highway.

David Jay, teller in the Bank of Montreal, is out again after his second operation in the general hospital and on Monday will leave by the Prince George to spend a two months' leave of absence at his home in Vancouver.

St. G. Lee, manager of the local Bank of Montreal, returns from the south this afternoon. Mr. Pritchard, who has been relieving him, will then return to Rossland accompanied by his sister.

Complaints have been made to the police of boys swinging on the awning rods in different parts of the city. The rods bend and become a nuisance to pedestrians. The police, it is understood, will in future take action against any boys guilty of this offense.

Pending word being received from Vancouver in regard to the details of the increase in salary given to teachers in that city, the local schedule has not been drawn up. It provides for a 15 per cent higher scale than that prevailing in the south. Several resignations are expected from the local teaching staff before the end of this month but, as yet, Secretary Vance has received none.

WILL EXAMINE LIMONITE ORE AT WHITEWATER

Department of Mines Sends F. J. Crossland to Make Report on Iron Deposit.

F. J. Crossland, mining engineer of Vancouver, has been commissioned by the Department of Mines to make a survey of the hematite and limonite iron deposits in the Whitewater River district in the Cariboo section, property in which J. H. Hawthornthwaite, Socialist member for Newcastle, is interested, says the Victoria Colonist. The property was located last year. Judging by the lengthy and optimistic statement issued yesterday from the office of the minister of mines and furnished to the press, it has interested the minister of mines to the extent of sending in experts to size up its real value as a commercial proposition. Already the property has been passed upon by a Government mining engineer, William M. Brewster, who made an examination last year, and reported that there was a possible 50,000,000,000-ton deposit of limonite of good quality suitable for fluxing with the magnetite ores of the coast in the production of pig iron by blast furnace. But the question of transportation was not dealt with in that expert's report, a problem which the investigation under Mr. Crossland is expected to make clear.

The minister of mines, under authority created at the last session of the Legislature by an amendment to the Mineral Act, has created a reserve on the drainage area of the Taseko Lake, Chilko Lake, Tsuniah Lake and Big Creek sections in the Clinton mining district, a reserve which will take effect from June 1 next.

IMMENSE ISSUE OF DOMINION NOTES

On March 31 Last It Amounted to \$311,932,791, Against \$100,286,066 in Gold.

In his budget speech a few days ago, details of which are now to hand, Sir Henry Drayton said:—There undoubtedly is in Canada as everywhere else inflation in the price of commodities, inflation in currency, and inflation in credits. Our total issue of Dominion notes on March 31, 1914, was \$117,795,718. It reached a peak of \$337,819,309 in November, 1918, and on the 31st March last it amounted to \$311,932,791. Of this amount \$128,366,666 is issued against gold. The amount of gold required under the Dominion Notes Act, as amended, to secure an issue of this amount is \$90,866,066. Gold to the extent of \$100,286,280 is available. \$26,000,000 of the remainder of the currency was issued for national purposes under the authority of the Dominion Notes Act, 1915, and secured as therein provided. \$50,000,000 was issued for the purpose of making advances to the Imperial Treasury and is secured by the pledge of approved securities, and \$107,566,725 was issued to the banks secured by approved securities largely consisting of Imperial Treasury bills and our own Treasury bills. As a result there has been an increase since March 31, 1914, in the circulation issued by the Dominion of \$194,137,073.

ENGLISH THEATRES RAISE THEIR PRICES

LONDON, May 28.—Prices have been raised at several theatres where popular entertainments are presented. The increase works out at 2s. for the stalls, 1s. 6d. for the dress circle, and 1s. for the upper circle. At the Gaiety the price of the gallery is 2s., instead of 1s. 3d. (including tax). The playgoers' position is now this: he pays extra for a show which includes music as a prominent part of its attraction, while to an ordinary play he can go more cheaply. Whether he is actually paying for the music and other expensive features of the lighter theatre or for the high rent of the building is hard to say.

WEST COAST IS ALL JAPANESE

So Says Port Alberni News in an Editorial Article.

"Japanese fishermen have become so numerous on the west coast of Vancouver Island that the place now scarcely shows any sign of being a white man's country," says an editorial article in the Port Alberni News.

"There are in the neighborhood of five hundred launches owned and operated by Japs, and the majority of these give to the harbors of Ucluelet and Clayoquot most astounding evidence of Oriental supremacy in the main industry of the district.

"Not content with usurping the fishing business, they are branching into various commercial lines and capturing the trade of the general storekeepers. They keep their stores afloat in large boats and cater to buyers in port and out of port.

"Some of them trade, on the side, in moonshine liquor of their own manufactured or special import and, owing to the inadequate police service, are able to carry on this traffic with a large degree of impunity.

"They have become so arrogant in their feeling of security that many white settlers are reaching the limit of tolerance. Reckless shooting of ducks, with high power rifles, carried on the pretence of sea lion hunting, and with no respect for season is one complaint against the Japanese on the west coast. Pit lamping deer is another.

"This is not a fanciful description of conditions. The editor of this newspaper was up the coast last week and saw and heard for himself. The situation is truly alarming.

"There is not a nook or corner of the west coast of this Island that the Japanese fishermen is not familiar with, and he boldly appropriates the best harbors to himself, being able, by force of numbers, to crowd the white man out.

"The Indian is the only real competitor the Japs now have in the West Coast fishing business and he is gradually being forced to give ground to the wily and excessively industrious invader from the Orient."

Carpentier vs. Levinsky

Announcement was made in New York at the first of the week by Jack Curley, manager of Georges Carpentier, that the European champion has signed articles to box Batting Levinsky not later than July 26. The bout will be twelve or fifteen rounds, with or without a decision, in New York City or New Jersey, according to Curley, who will promote the scrap. The men will weigh 175 pounds at the ringside. "If Carpentier loses he will go back to France," said Curley. "He wants to disprove the American insinuations that he is afraid of American boxers. He will try to sign up for a fight with Dempsey as soon as the American champion gets clear of his draft evasion troubles."

Hoisted Pennant

Last Saturday afternoon, before the opening of a four game series with the Boston Braves, the world's baseball championship pennant, won by them last fall from the Chicago White Sox, was hoisted at Redland Field, home of the Cincinnati Reds. The Reds are forging ahead in the National League this year and may possibly repeat. They are second in the race, with Pittsburgh in the lead, but not so very far ahead.

Resolute Mast Snaps

NO CRITICISM FROM CIVIL SERVANTS, SAYS PREMIER JOHN OLIVER

A stinging rebuke has been sent by Premier Oliver to Agent-General F. C. Wade consequent upon the latter's recent letter to the local press criticising J. S. Cowper, M. P. P. for statements made by the latter at the recent session of the Legislature when the vote for the maintenance and upkeep of British Columbia House, the London headquarters of the Agent-General, was under consideration and Mr. Cowper urged steps should be taken to do away with the expensive premises owned by the Government there.

Mr. Wade took umbrage at Mr. Cowper's statement that the latter, when in London last year, had seen no one in British Columbia House in the morning and in the afternoon there was one man reading a newspaper. Mr. Wade's letter to the local press criticized Mr. Cowper for his statements, claiming the latter was seeking to make it appear there was little work in the London office, asserting that good work is being done and concluding with the statement: "If the visitor had been anyone but Mr. Cowper, even a charitable person might suggest that he was engaged in that edifying and delectable pursuit commonly called eavesdropping."

When the matter was brought to the attention of the Premier he promptly sat down and dictated a sharp letter to the Agent-General, pointing out that the Government would not permit civil servants to criticize members of the Legislature.

"I have written to Mr. Wade, making it clear that I thoroughly disapprove of officials of the Government criticizing members," stated Premier Oliver. "What kind of conditions are we going to have if every civil servant adopts such a course. I consider this a glaring case and I won't stand for it," asserted the Premier, with emphasis.

DISCOURTESIES TO THE ROYAL FAMILY

Irish People Take This Method of Protecting Against Imprisonment Without Trial

LONDON, May 29.—The Sinn Feiners apparently are developing plans similar to those followed by suffragettes in pre-war days—giving annoyance to the Royal family. Recently when Queen Mary attended a charity concert, two Irish women on the Reception Committee appointed to receive refrained from courtesying upon her Majesty's arrival. The Queen took no notice, assuming that the discourtesy was unintentional and due to a lack of knowledge of court etiquette. Subsequently one woman wrote to the Queen that she had deliberately refused to courtesy as a protest against the retention in jail of untried Irish prisoners.

A similar incident occurred on Saturday when King George took afternoon tea at the Naval Military Club. An Irish officer did not rise when the King entered the room. This was so noticeable that the King's equerry interrogated the Captain, who said it was a protest against the keeping in jail of untried Irish prisoners. Upon learning the reason, His Majesty had the officer informed that he had nothing to do with the action of the Executive Government, nor was he able to interfere. The Captain thereupon rose and apologized.

Such incidents have been of frequent occurrence lately, and extra precautions are being taken to prevent similar demonstrations at forthcoming court functions.

TRieste MAY BE FREE TO ALL WORLD

AMSTERDAM, May 29.—It is reported here that Italy has agreed to make Trieste a free port, open on equal terms to all nations of the world. This, it is thought, will be a great thing for Trieste.

ATTACKS TRAIN

Lord Dewar told big game hunting stories to a delighted audience of boys at the County Secondary School, Purley. He said he had just returned from Africa, where he was a farmer in Uganda. A rhinoceros charged a train and nearly derailed it. On another occasion the train was stopped to release a large giraffe entangled in the telegraph wires. Nairobi, with its motor-cars, electric light and telephone service, surprised the visitor, but it was situated in a huge zoological garden, and it was not safe for any domestic animal to be at large at night.

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
