# Dom. Liberals Prepare for Election

## PROPOSAL TO SOLVE POWER PROBLEM BY LINKING UP WITH DRYDOCK PLANT

### Federal Election Possible; Liberal Council is Called

In Anticipation of Appeal to Country before Next Spring,  
Mackenzie King has sent out Call for Meeting  
of Followers at Ottawa

VANCOUVER, June 1.—There may be an election before next spring. That is the opinion expressed by G. E. Campbell, provincial secretary of the Liberal organization for British Columbia. In anticipation of a possible federal election the National Liberal Council has been summoned to meet at Ottawa from June 8 to 10 in the rooms of the leader of the opposition, W. L. Mackenzie King.

There are seven representatives of the National Council in British Columbia, Premier John Oliver, Henry Hall, M. P. P. of Victoria, M. A. Macdonald, M. P. P., and G. E. Campbell of Vancouver; F. G. Dawson of Prince Rupert, Mr. McNab of Cranbrook, and Mr. McRae of Revelstoke. Of these Premier Oliver and Henry Hall are unable to go, but it is expected several of the others will be present.

The chief reason given for the impression that there is likely to be an election is the general dissatisfaction of the people with the budget, following the reckless extravagance which preceded it. There have been already a number of defections from the Unionist party and others are said to be getting restive.

Mr. Dawson was this morning asked if he intended to be at the meeting of the National Council, and he replied that he expected to leave tomorrow for the national capital to be at the gathering. Doubtless on his return he will be in a position to throw further light on the political situation.

### Provincial Government May Back Fishing Plan For Returned Soldiers

VANCOUVER, June 1.—It is announced that if Colonel Peck's appeal to the Federal Government for assistance to returned soldier fishermen on this coast is refused, the Provincial Government, through the Industrial Advisory Council, will likely take the matter up and make a grant for the purpose.

The whole matter of assistance to returned soldier fishermen has been under discussion between the Provincial and Dominion Governments with a view to a settlement. The Provincial Government, it is understood, has moved in the matter from time

to time, but so far the Borden Government has hung back and refused to take any definite action. Now Colonel Peck is bringing the matter before the committee on pensions and reconstruction with a view to a recommendation for aid.

#### Fifteen Trawlers.

The original proposal was that fifteen trawlers, used by the Dominion Government during the war, should be brought to this coast and operated from different points. Five were to ply out of Prince Rupert, five from Vancouver and the others from Victoria and Nanaimo, or such other suitable points as were found desirable.

A grant has already been made by the Provincial Government to a company composed of veterans to fish for mud-sharks, using the skins for leather purposes. This concern has three power boats, with headquarters on Montague Island north of Plumber's Pass, between Vancouver and Victoria. This was done on the recommendation of the Industrial Advisory Council.

A noticeable feature of the arrivals this season and due no doubt to the car shortage, is the fact that the large schooners have deserted the port and are now taking their catches to Vancouver and Seattle. ### NEWSPAPER SUIT HERE

Change of Venue from Prince George to Prince Rupert;  
Well Known Case.

The Herbert J. Vanderhoof vs. W. J. Rimes Publishing Co. case has been transferred to the Prince Rupert assize civil list and will be before Chief Justice Hunter at the assizes in two weeks' time. The case is now well known in the north. The plaintiff claims that the defendant usurped the plant of the Vanderhoof Herald at Vanderhoof, changed the name of the paper to the Nechako Chronicle, and is now publishing illegally on a plant that does not belong to him.

There are many claims in connection with the case. The main ones are the claim of the plaintiff for a 51 per cent interest in the W. J. Rimes Co., damages for \$10,000 on account of fraud, \$5,000 breach of contract and an injunction against the publishing of the Nechako Chronicle.

The plaintiff is represented by the law firm of Ellis & Brown of Vancouver, and it is expected that Mr. Brown will be in Rupert to handle the case.

The defendant lawyers are Osgston & Young of Prince George. The assizes commence on June 16 and after the Duff criminal case it is expected this civil action will come up.

### SHAKEN LIKE RAT BY BEAR

Nelson Hunter Had Leg Chewed  
by Grizzly and is Now  
in Hospital.

NELSON, June 1.—Thomas Powell, who is credited with having killed 44 grizzlies, had a close shave yesterday from being killed by one near Ymir. He was shaken by the bear, just as a terrier shakes a rat, and his leg was badly chewed before his companion, Harry Jones, shot the big animal.

Powell is in the hospital here getting treatment for his injuries.

### GASTON WINS AUTO RACE

Driver of Chevrolet Came in First  
in 5 Hours and 40 Minutes  
in 500-Mile Spin.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 1.—Gaston, driving a Chevrolet, won the 500-mile auto race yesterday here before a crowd of 425,000 people. De Palma, the favorite, was leading at 467 miles, when his car caught fire and he had to drop out. The official time for the 500 miles was 5 hours, 40 minutes, 15 seconds, and the total winnings amounted to \$30,000.

### Relief for Power Problem in Sight

Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Company have Submitted  
Agreement to City---Laid  
Over Two Weeks

A draft of an agreement between the city of Prince Rupert and the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co. prepared by the company was last night submitted to the city council and laid over for a couple of weeks so that the matter may be gone into carefully. In the meantime the local dry dock management is submitting the proposed agreement to Newman Erb and the other directors of the company for their approval.

Alderman Perry, in moving that the agreement be laid over, stated that the Utilities Committee had gone carefully into the question and negotiations had been pending a long time. At last a desirable basis of settlement has been nearly reached.

In answer to Alderman Rochester's queries as to the comparison of costs, the effectiveness of the three-year term, and the cost of installation, Alderman Perry stated that the connecting up and installation with the dry dock would cost \$14,000 and the rates would compare favorably with those existing now.

The mayor stated that the cost of installation would not be lost to the city as the same machinery could be used in connection with the dry dock when the city had its hydro-electric plant and the dry dock would be buying electricity from the city. The mayor was in favor of the connection in the meantime, for the city could not yet consider the installation of a hydro-electric plant. The connection with the dry dock would supply the needs of smaller industrial consumers and would clear the power problem for a few years at least.

**The Proposed Agreement.**

The outline of the agreement is as follows:

- The maximum supply from the dry dock will be 900 k. v. a.
- Rates, up to 100 k. w. h. per month, 3.5c, 100-124 k. w. h. 3.5c, 125-154 k. w. h. 3c, 154-197 k. w. h. 2.5c, over 197 k. w. h. 2c.
- The above rates shall apply

### ADVOCATES INSPECTION OF ALL FISH

President of Canadian Fisheries Association Arrives in Vancouver for Big Convention.

VANCOUVER, June 1.—A. H. Brittain, president of the Canadian Fisheries Association, is here from the east to attend the big convention, which commences on Thursday of this week and continues until Saturday.

Mrs. Brittain advocates the government inspection of fish, and says that the temporary losses of fishermen would be more than replaced in ultimate gains, as happened in the fruit industry, where the inspection is very rigid in regard to apple grading.

### WOMAN KEPT SOLDIERS BACK

Held Them at Bay at Point of Revolver.

WINDSOR, June 1.—Five hundred veterans raided the police station in order to force the liberation of a veteran arrested on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. The wife of the constable who made the arrest kept the crowd out of her home at the point of a revolver.

### JAPAN WOULD RENEW TREATY

Decides to Open Negotiations with View to Continuing Integrity of Nations in Far East.

TOKYO, June 1.—The Japanese cabinet has decided to open negotiations for a renewal of the Anglo-Japanese alliance with such modifications as to bring it in harmony with the provisions of the League of Nations.

Japan wishes to maintain the same principles which are to safeguard the peace of Eastern Asia and to preserve the integrity of China and India. In view of the special interests of Japan and Great Britain in the Far East it is considered very desirable here that the present relations should be continued.

### Refrigerator Cars Are Ordered by Railway for Use in Fish Business

The general superintendent of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway here has been notified that thirty additional express refrigerator cars have been ordered for immediate delivery. These will be used in the fish business out of Prince Rupert and will to some extent fill the immediate need.

The G. T. P. owns 62 cars in all and for a long time past these have been insufficient. Officials of the railway have been anxious to have the shortage filled but they have been unable to secure appropriations for the purpose. The Minister of Railways has been the receiver for the road and all special appropriations have had to pass him.

Recently the local Board of Trade has become very insistent that something be done and has taken the matter up with the local member and with the railway officials. The result seems to have been a happy one, if the cars are rushed, as promised.

## DELEGATES AT CONVENTION

Alderman Dybhavn and G. W. Nickerson Will Represent Prince Rupert.

### PARTY EXPECTED IN THE CITY NEXT WEEK

Two delegates left last night to represent Prince Rupert at the convention of the National Fisheries Association at Vancouver. Ald. John Dybhavn represents the city and G. W. Nickerson represents the Board of Trade. Both of these men are aggressive and well informed on the subject and should voice the views of Prince Rupert with some effect before the big organization.

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. will be represented by the Vancouver manager of the concern, Mr. St. Denis.

While nothing definite has been received in regard to the plans of the delegates, it is understood that a large party will visit Prince Rupert after the convention. Possibly they will leave Vancouver on Monday, arriving here on Wednesday of next week. They will be entertained by the Board of Trade, co-operating with the officials of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., and other fishery interests in the city, but just what form the entertainment will take outside of showing the visitors the fishery facilities of the city, is not yet known.

VICTORIA, June 1.—The C. P. R. announces that their double service to Skagway calling at Alert Bay, Prince Rupert, Ketchikan and Juneau will commence on June 12. The Princess Alice and Princess Mary will alternate on the run, leaving here every Friday night and Vancouver Saturday night.

## Wonderful Possibilities of Fort Fraser District

Rich Land is very Productive and Ranchers are flocking into Country; Good Timber and Fish and Game in Abundance

FORT FRASER, June 1.—The history of the now flourishing town of Fort Fraser has been a very interesting one indeed and its founder, the late Simon Fraser, would hardly recognize the small trading centre of a few years ago. Later it became an important Hudson's Bay trading post and even today marks the frontier point for the Government Telegraph lines, as here the line passes off into the north and links up with Fort St. James and thence into the extreme north.

In recent years the district has been estimated very highly as a farming country and the production per acre proves its value as a cereal producing centre. Barley averages about 80 bushels per

acre, whilst oats run from 75 to 80 and wheat reaches around the 85 mark in favorable seasons. The fall wheat crop gives the best satisfaction and a recent experiment in connection with the planting of oats in the fall points to just as good results. The green shoots of oats were about two or three inches above the ground when the snow came last autumn, yet it did not spoil with the frost and came along splendidly in the spring.

### Stock Country

With the opening of the country farther back a natural tendency will be towards large stock raising tracts being supervised. Already cattle and sheep thrive excellently and winter very easily, but the lack of good roads for the present prevents any great new enterprises. The district has only been recently discovered as a most valuable mixed farming area and as a result this year there is a great influx of new settlers. Only a few days ago a family arrived and were later followed by their effects in a box car and yet they have not yet picked out their spot for location. However, they are quite confident of the country and intend to stay.

### Land Seekers Coming

In a few weeks time, following the seeding time in the prairie provinces, a general influx of land seekers is anticipated and from general records kept at least about two-thirds of them return to take up permanent homesteads. As at many other points along the line the season is rather backward. However, the farmers are not worrying as a crop has never failed them and they are just holding off for a day or two before planting, the rest of their garden truck. Very few people indeed have not heard of the Nechoao Valley potatoes, but how many of them have realized that the growers get about 10 tons to the acre.

### Fish and Game

The fur market here is an important one for Fort Fraser forms the connection with a great sweep of game regions. Muskrat, mink and marten run high in the local catches, whilst otter, bear, fox and coyote are of very frequent occurrence. During the winter months the farmers find it very profitable to engage in trapping, and if otherwise inclined can cut trees or catch fish from the river and the lake for the eastern market. The fish not only abound in sufficient quantity to merit commercial operations, but it is a real fisherman's paradise for gamey fish. The Nechoao, teaming with sturgeon, trout and white fish, offers many advantages for the man who wants a real day's angling with something to show for his efforts.

### Plenty of Timber

With the commencement of operations by the sawmill, which has a capacity of 20,000 feet per day and 60,000 laths per day, another valuable industry will have made its entry in the activities of the lively little centre. On the mountains to the north there is plenty of valuable and good-sized timber which is very easily reached by water transportation. Pulp wood is in abundance, and it is only recently that cruisers of a large Pacific coast firm were through the district and made estimates of available resources. Splendid water power can be controlled at the canyon, which is just a few miles from the townsite. Here the mighty river narrows down to a few hundred yards and drops in a series of three steps.

### Small Fruits

Small fruits have grown extremely well in the neighborhood and in a few weeks the first crop of wild strawberries will appear. Raspberries, strawberries, gooseberries, saskatoons, red and black currants all flourish and readily
