Cannerymen Give Out Fish Prices

JAPANESE JIGGED THEIR NATURALIZATION PAPERS SAYS COLONEL CY. PECK

Prices Are Set for Salmon to be Paid Fishermen of B.C.

B.C. Canners Association makes Official Announcement; Sockeyes Higher, but Inferior Fish are Lower than Last Year

VANCOUVER, June 2.—The B. C. Canners' Association officially announced yesterday afternoon that the prices had been fixed for raw salmon purchases until August 20. There is a difference of price when caught with cannery gear over that paid for fish caught with private gear. The first price is for cannery gear, the second for private:

Sockeyes and cohoes, 37c, and 55c, per fish.

Red springs caught in the sockeye nets, 3c. and 8c. a pound.

White springs caught in sockeye nets, 25c. and 35c. per fish.

White springs caught with spring nets, 2c. per pound.

Pinks, 4c. and 5c. per fish.

Chums, 2c. and 3c. per fish.

Prices for seine caught fish shall be left to the individual canners but is not to exceed the prices paid for gill-net caught fish.

Compared with last year the prices to be paid for sockeyes is higher, but the price of pinks is lower. The reason for this is that there is a persistent demand for sockeye salmon, whereas the pinks have been a drug on the market and some of the canners have expressed their intention not to can them this year.

BUCKLEY BAY LOGGERS OUT

Strike in Sympathy With Mill Men Who are Demanding Minimum Wage of \$5.50 per Eight-Hour Day.

The announcement comes from J. H. Burrough, general secretary of the Central Labor Council, O. B. U., that all the men in the logging camps of the Massett Timber Co. have come out in support of the demands of the men in the Buckley Bay Mill for an 8-hour day with a minimum wage of \$5.50. The present scale being paid by the company is computed on a 10-hour basis. F. L. Buckley, manager of the company, has been at Buckley Bay attempting to make negotiations with the strike committee, but, so far, these have been unsuccessful.

While the mill strike only affected 120 men, the loggers' strike takes out 500 men. Seventy-five men arrived from Buckley Bay this morning on their way south. The most of them are strikers and are now on their way to Vancouver, to which place their fare is being paid by the Loggers' Union.

TRADING OFFICE FOR BOLSHEVIKS

We Have Central Organization in London Immediately.

LONDON, June 2.—The first results of the meeting here of Gregory Gassin, Russian Bolshevik minister of trades with Lloyd George and his cabinet, is that the Soviet Government has been granted permission to open immediately a central trading office here.

Linking up with Drydock Power.

It looks like a good proposition for the city to link up with the power plant of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. It should be a good thing for the city and the company. It will insure the city a constant supply of power to tide them over until they can get a hydro-electric plant going or arrange with a private company for a supply. It will also insure the company a sale for their surplus product. While we do not know much about electric plants or the supply of power, the general scheme on the face of it looks good.

Supply of Cars

For Fish Business.

It was good news which arrived yesterday to the effect that thirty new cars were to be built at once for the fish business here. It began to look as if the Government was deliberately trying to starve us out at this point, but possibly it was a lack of realization of the importance of supplying this port with the essentials of life. The fish business is vital to the life of Prince Rupert, but it has been badly checked by failure to supply proper transportation. Thirty cars will be a good commencement toward putting the rolling stock in shape for handling the traffic, but it will not fill the need as the business grows.

Colonel Peck is endeavoring to arouse interest in the fisheries among the people in the east. That is all right, but nothing will arouse the proper interest to such an extent as providing the needed cars and other equipment to handle the business efficiently.

Provincial Government
And Aid to Fishing.

A despatch from Vancouver yesterday intimated that the Provincial Government, through the Industrial Advisory Council, was prepared to lend aid to returned soldier fishermen if the Dominion Government failed to do so. That is good news. There has been a general feeling that the Dominion in trying to put soldiers on the land and taking no interest in the possibilities of fishing were not doing the right thing. There was no objection to settling the land. That was good. What was needed was a corresponding interest in the fishing industry.

Possibly the commission at Ottawa, which is investigating the general question of reconstruction, and of which Colonel Peck is a member, may make some recommendation which will have weight with the Dominion Government and as a result something may yet be done. At any rate it seems to be a matter rather for the Dominion than the province in view of the fact that the fisheries are controlled by the Dominion and that the Federal Government has taken a great interest in settling returned men on the land.

Japan Ready to Continue Treaty.

A question that is being discussed in official circles and which will also be discussed by the people at large is whether the treaty between Great Britain and Japan should be renewed. There are many who object to the treaty because it tends to give the Japanese a standing which they might not otherwise possess, and especially in view of the objection often expressed against Oriental fishermen on this coast. The objection is largely economic. It is a matter of work and wages. The farmers have generally asked for Oriental labor, whereas the workingmen of the province have been dead against it. In looking at a question of this kind we have to get away from the local aspect. We have to view it in its broadest light and consider its effect on world progress and particularly as it affects the British Empire.

FISHERMEN AT
BELLA COOLA
HOLD MEETINGHear Address Explaining Regula-
tions and Pass Resolution of
Confidence in Inspector.

BELLA COOLA, June 2.—At the request of the Fishermen's Union of Bella Coola, a public meeting was held at the town hall on the 26th of May, at which J. T. G. Williams, inspector of fisheries, was present and gave an explanatory address dealing with the new fishery regulations and the open fishing policy recently adopted by the Dominion Fisheries Department. The inspector also explained how the weekly close seasons would be affected by the number of salmon gill-net licences issued, also the close season for seines; he outlined the proposed methods for conservation, the removal of obstructions in streams, and touched on other interesting subjects.

The meeting was largely attended by returned soldier fishermen, returned soldiers, white fishermen, the Indian agent, canners and others interested in the fisheries of Bella Coola. At the close of the meeting the following resolution was submitted by A. Christianson and carried unanimously:

The Resolution.

"That this meeting, representing returned soldier fishermen, white fishermen, Indians, canners, and settlers interested in the fisheries of Bella Coola, record their thanks to the inspector for his address on the salmon fisheries tributary to this district and we also express our entire approval and appreciation of his administration of the fisheries in the past, and have every confidence that the salmon fisheries of this district will be conserved and protected, and judiciously administered, so long as he remains inspector of fisheries."

Mr. J. Jorgenson of Bella Coola ably presided over the meeting.

B.C. PACKERS PAID
6 PER CENT DIVIDENDOfficers for Present Year Include
Well Known Names.

According to its annual report the British Columbia Packers Association owns 214 salmon canneries, one cold storage plant, a mild-curing establishment and a sawmill in British Columbia, and the stock of the George & Barker Salmon Packing Company at Point Roberts, Wash. Dividends to the amount of \$234,881 were paid last year to the shareholders, and on August 24 the dividend was raised from 5 to 6 per cent. The report also showed that the association had a considerable supply of the lower grades of salmon on hand.

Mr. Barker, who has been occupying the positions of both president and general manager, has resigned the latter, and J. M. Whitehead is the new general manager.

SUMMARY OF NEW BUDGET

In order that Daily News readers may clearly understand the new budget the following summary is given:

Definitely renouncing national borrowing, Sir Henry Dugayton, Minister of Finance, expects to make up the difference between present revenue and expected expenditure by the following taxes:

1. One per cent. tax on all manufacturers, wholesalers or importers sales, except on coal and food for man and beast.

2. Excise taxes running from 10 to 50 per cent. of the selling price of goods, particularly textiles, ranging above certain specified prices, and upon luxury articles made of gold and silver, or for adornment or recreation, whether imported or manufactured in Canada.

3. Heavy excise taxes on all spirituous liquors, from 30 cents a gallon on ale, beer, porter, stout, to \$2 a gallon on rum, whiskey, brandy, gin, etc., and \$3 a gallon on champagne and sparkling wines.

4. Increase of 5 per cent. in all taxation on incomes of \$5,000 and upwards, taxes to be paid in part or in whole when making returns, and heavy penalties provided for errors or failure in making returns.

5. Stamp taxes of two cents on premissory notes and bills of exchange for every \$100 for which drawn.

6. Stamp tax of two cents on every share of stock transferred.

7. Twenty-five to fifty cents on every pack of playing cards sold.

8. A license fee of \$2 on every business man dealing in various luxury articles mentioned.

The only reductions in taxation are: First, the removal of the extra customs war tax of 7½ per cent., which brought \$30,000,000 last year, mainly drawn from articles on which the still higher excise taxes are now levied. Second, the repeal of the duty on moving picture films. Third, the retention of the business profits tax, but increasing the exemption on profits from 7 to 10 per cent., and decreasing from 25 to 20 per cent. the tax on profits above 10 and less than 15 per cent. on all businesses having a capitalization of not less than \$25,000 and not more than \$50,000, except where more than 20 per cent. of the profits were gained in 1917 or 1918 from munitions industries.

Fourth, some minor tariff reductions, letting typewriters, books and other articles for the blind in free.



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

SEMI-DEISEL ENGINE FOR MARINE BOAT

To Be Built at Victoria for Rupert Agency by Returned Soldiers

The boat which is to be built at the Point Hope yards at Victoria for the marine department here is to be equipped with oil engine of the semi-deisel type.

PLEBISCITE ON LIQUOR IN ALBERTA

Vote on Inter-Provincial Trade to Take Place in October.

EDMONTON, June 2.—From information brought back by Premier Stewart the trans-Canada plebiscite on inter-provincial shipments of liquor will be held about October 25th. In this conference with the Ottawa authorities the premier ascertained that this date was suggested as the most satisfactory to the federal government since various elements enter into the question and make it next to impossible for an earlier vote to be arranged.

Some of the other provinces have already signified their willingness to have the plebiscite the last of October and the 25th has been practically decided upon as the date. Therefore, the balloting in Alberta will doubtless be on this date. It will be recalled that this province was almost the first to formally petition by unanimous consent of the legislature to have the inter-provincial shipment of liquor decided by the federally authorized plebiscite and it was at one time thought the vote would be held about the last of June.

It appears, however, that the new national election act will be placed in action for this plebiscite, and the bill will not be disposed of in parliament for some time yet. This is said to be one of the principal reasons why the provincial voting cannot take place until October.
