FISHERY EXPERTS ON CONSERVATION AND PROPAGATION, AT CONVENTION

Advocates Close Season in Halibut Fishing Industry

A. L. Hagar makes Suggestions at Fisheries Convention regarding Prince Rupert's Premier Industry

Hatcheries are Useless Says Washington Authority

System of Keeping Young Fish and Feeding Them for Six Months is Plan Approved; Alaska Example of Failure

VANCOUVER, June 5.—At Friday morning's session of the Fisheries Convention, L. H. Darwin, fish commissioner for the state of Washington, strongly advocated an international commission to deal with the principles of the industry, its special aim being conservation. He said it would take years to rehabilitate the depleted sockeye run.

A. L. Hager advocated a close season of three months in the halibut industry and the closing of all ports receiving halibut during such seasons. An international agreement should provide penalties against unscrupulous fishermen bringing in, say, 100,000,000 lbs. of halibut with only a few hundred pounds of other varieties of fish. Regulations should also prohibit other than Canadian and American registered vessels from fishing during the close season.

Hatcheries Useless.

At Friday evening's session of the convention, R. E. Clanton, master fish warden of Oregon, said the present system of salmon propagation on the Pacific was useless. He suggested keeping the young fish until they were six months old and feeding them over the season. This plan had proved effective in the Columbia River, where the sockeye run which had been practically extinct had been revived with young fish from Alaska eggs.

Professor John R. Cobb of the University of Washington said that of the hundreds of millions of fish liberated annually in Alaskan waters under the present system of maintaining the hatcheries, there had not been a single beneficial result. In the Behring Sea, on the other hand, where the biggest runs continued, there had never been a hatchery.

Executive Secretary of Northwest Association, Winnipeg, Wants to Meet Local Business Men.

The Board of Trade have received a wire from Herbert Cuthbert, executive secretary of the Pacific Northwest Tourist Association, Winnipeg, telling that he would arrive in this city on Tuesday night and that he wishes to meet business men in the city. Mr. Cuthbert is on a tour of personal observation for his association with a view to ascertaining tourist attractions and resources of the country.

The Association represented by Mr. Cuthbert is an important organization and is a large factor in the planning of tourist routes for Eastern travellers. His visit to Prince Rupert may mean the passing of many more tourists through this port. He will remain here from his arrival on Tuesday until the Prince Rupert sails for Victoria on Thursday night.




CONSERVATION OF FISHERIES

Suggestions Made at Convention Regarding Means of Preventing Exhaustion

VANCOUVER, June 4.—An address delivered by Dr. A. G. Huntsman, Canadian biological expert, said that the Pacific fisheries were not boundless and that the point of exhaustion was coming unless a co-operative effort was made to conserve. He strongly urged an international commission as the only way to get beneficial measures on a large scale.

J. H. Conlon urged co-operative advertising to increase the sales of fish that were unfamiliar to the public.

Henry Boyle, vice-president of the Northern B.C. Fisheries traced the history of canning and urged that under an international treaty the best and most experienced men be engaged to oversee the re-establishment of the salmon runs and to provide for artificial propagation on the rivers that are being fished out.

GASOLINE BOAT REGULATIONS

Port Committee of Board of Trade Urges Care in Recommending Any Changes.

A report from the Port Committee of the Board of Trade was received at last night's meeting of the board and was laid over for consideration until the next regular meeting. The report tells of the disparity between U. S. gas boat regulations and those of Canada and is the result of inquiry made by Captain Freeman at the last meeting.

In the United States a motor boat under 65 feet is neither compelled to have a certified captain or a life boat but the operator is given a license by the local board of inspectors and, apparently, does not have expert qualifications. Except for these two points the regulations in both countries are about the same. The report urges careful consideration before recommending changes in the present laws so that safety and efficiency, of which the government has always been so jealous, be not lessened.

Husband Was Drunk at Inquest on Death of Wife

Revolting Conduct of man during the Inquiry caused Order for his Arrest; Developments are Expected

VANCOUVER, June 5.—G. R. Gross, the husband of Madame Melita Allen, who died as a result of gas poisoning, was arrested by order of the coroner for being drunk and disorderly at the inquest.

The evidence given by J. J. Hutton at the inquest was to the effect that deceased often said she wished her husband dead.

The husband admitted that he was drunk when called to the death chamber of his wife.

It is thought here that startling developments in connection with the case are possible.

The verdict brought in by the jury was "death by gas suffocation at the hands of some person or persons unknown."

The coroner then ordered the continued detention of the husband pending investigation.

**Steamship Route
To Japan.**

The news despatches yesterday told of a speech made by the Canadian Trade Commissioner in Vancouver dealing with a desirability of a fast mail steamship line between Prince Rupert and Japanese ports. He says that the run may be made in eight days, which is considerably quicker than it takes to make the voyage from Vancouver. It is significant that again this matter is mooted at a Vancouver gathering.

We are familiar with the arguments in favor of a steamship service from this port, but not so the people of other parts of the country. That the people of Vancouver are being educated to the facilities we offer and that from an outside source, is an indication of the possibilities.

**Convention Regarding
Fisheries of Country.**

The big fisheries convention at Vancouver, which is attended by Messrs. Nickerson and Dybhavn, is a convention of those interested in fisheries from the employers' standpoint. It is made up largely of canners and fish dealers and owners of boats. While all questions affecting the preservation of the fish and methods of fishing and increasing the supply, are of interest to all engaged in fishing, the average fisherman is not much interested in the general questions that will come up for discussion. He should, however, take an intelligent interest in all the fishery problems, for the business is either directly or indirectly of vital interest to him.

A good many fishermen do not look much farther ahead than the prospects for the next catch, and the price they are to get. Naturally these are the big questions. Bread and butter is the one thing that interests us all. There are other things, however, that must be considered. We must think of the possibilities of bread and butter in the future for years to come, and that is where conservation comes in.

**Dismantle
Triangle Light.**

Some years ago the marine department erected a lighthouse on Triangle Island. It is on the top of a rocky island close to a wireless station. A railway had to be built to the top and an immense lot of money was spent in building the house and operating it. Then, when all was finished, it was found that the light was in the clouds most of the time and of no practical value to mariners, especially in view of the fact that few steamships pass that way. Now it is being dismantled and moved elsewhere. In order to pay for this sort of thing the people have to pay a luxury tax on clothes and boots and other things that we should all do without.

**Personality and
Journalism.**

In discussing "What People Read" before the Society of Women Journalists in London, the editor of John O'London's Weekly said that the new journalism introduced by the Northcliffe paper introduced personality into description. Any idiot could do a verbatim, but only a vital journalist could make a report of a meeting which, while presenting essentials, escaped dullness by giving atmosphere.

Lord Northcliffe had discovered that no one read reports of the old school, with columns of verbatim, but that they would read reports of meetings if they were vitalized by the personality of the man who did them and could establish a contact between the audience at the meeting and the reader next morning at his breakfast table. When personality is strong it can create a demand for a particular form of journalistic wares. There was tragedy and comedy in every house and every room, in the city and the country, if one had the eyes to see it and the news sense to grasp it and the manner to express it. While there was a crowded market and a great shortage of paper, there was still a great demand for articles which got at the soul of their subject.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

MARKET AND NEW TAXES

Exceptions to 1 per cent Grocery Tax—Ten per cent on Candies and Chewing Gum.

The new sales tax imposed by the Dominion Government is to have considerable effect on market prices and all groceries except bare necessities will come under its reach. These taxes are now being added to the retailers' invoices from the wholesalers. Groceries, with the following exceptions, are charged the one per cent sales tax: Meats, fresh salted or pickled; butter, cheese, oleomargarine, margarine, butterine; lard, eggs, vegetables, fruits, grains and seeds, buckwheat meal or flour; pot, pearl, rolled, roasted or ground barley; cornmeal, oatmeal, rolled oats, rye flour, wheat flour, coffee, tea, salt, cattle foods, hay and straw, nursery stock, fish, sugar, molasses. There is a 10 per cent tax on candies and chewing gum.

UNIONISTS ADVISE IRISH TO RETURN

LONDON, June 5.—British Trade Unionists advise the Irish strikers to resume work. They had gone out because they refused to handle munitions which might be shipped to Ireland.

VANDERHOOF

Harry Bave, who worked in Prince Rupert during the early clearing days on the townsite, is now ranching here and recently completed seeding. Harry is a veteran of many wars, but has resolved to settle down and will invite a life partner from England.

Two more settlers arrived from the prairies by the time freight on Wednesday bringing their effects along in box cars. One man has already located his ranch and will take his stock out there immediately, but the other has still to determine in just what part of the country he would like to stay.

A serious forest fire sprung up to the south of the townsite on Wednesday and seemed to assume large proportions. The fire warden was not long in getting to the spot with his red buzz wagon and by evening the conflagration had subsided considerably.

A most interesting demonstration was made here on Tuesday afternoon when a tractor with a specially adapted cutting trailer proved its efficiency for land clearing. The sharp blade on the implement which is dragged along will cut down trees to the thickness of six inches. Many interested parties gathered for the exhibition.

GRIMSBY TRAWLERS LOSING MONEY AT PRESENT THEY SAY

GRIMSBY, June 4.—Trawler owners in Grimsby flatly contradict an official declaration that the fishing industry is in a vastly improved position from what it was last year. It is true that more boats are landing catches, that the harvest of the sea is bountiful, that there is fish in abundance at the ports, but the serious fact remains that, while the public is paying high retail prices, the trawlers are working at a loss. So long as fish is too dear in the shops and too cheap on the quays, the situation cannot be regarded as satisfactory.

In one sense the trawler owners are now paying the penalty of a war-time period of prosperity. They seem to have lacked a Joseph to warn them that a cycle of fat years might be followed by a long lean time. The excess profits duly encouraged them to make all they could while prices ruled high, and gross profits in the years 1916 to 1918 and during the first six months of 1919 could reasonably be termed handsome. A natural corollary of large profits, however, is rising risk, and the real trouble of the owners today is that costs remain abnormal while prices have severely slumped. Gear, coal, ice, oil, and repairs are all at a high figure, and there are people who say that a further rise of 12s 6d a ton in the cost of coal would come near to stopping fishing. Labor charges, too, have advanced to an almost incredible extent. The cost of getting out the fish from a trawler after an Iceland voyage in 1912 was from £8 to £10. Today the cost is over £60.
