# Grand Forks Police Officer Shot Dead

Provincial Constable George Stanfield Murdered in his own House; Crime Laid to Door of Bootleggers

GRAND FORKS, June 10 .- George Stanfield, local provincial olice constable, was murdered at 12:20 this morning by an unknown man believed to be a bootlegger who either hid in the onstable's house or followed him home. The wife, who was n bed, heard the report and found her husband lying on the loor shot through the head.

Stanfield had been active in nabbing bootleggers crossing the boundary line near here and had several convictions to his credit. It was only recently that he arrested a band of eighteen men.

The blacksmith shop of William Lydicoat, police commissioner, was recently burned down and it is believed that this happening is closely connected with the Stanfield murder. Provincial and mounted police reinforcements have been called in.

The deceased was an army veteran and had seen service in India, Soudan and Africa. He was aged 41 and leaves besides his wife a daughter of eighteen years. He was stationed at Grand Forks five years and came from Phoenix.



### Lloyd George Again Big Man of World.

Lloyd George has again shown himself to be the world's greatest man. He has taken the lead in bringing Rassia and the rest of the world together again. It was a big task, for the prejudices against the Bolsheviks of Russia are very strong, but not much stronger than were the prejudices of a certain class of British people against Lloyd George not many years ago. The overcoming of prejudices, the breaking down of class distinctions and the courage to do rather than to drift, are some of the characteristics of the "Little Welshman" who rules Great Britain.

### Russians No Longer Really Bolshevists.

. The Russian people seem to be settling down and evolving a new condition of things. They set out with certain ideals, which have been sadly shattered. They had ideals which were somewhat communal, but they have to a large extent become individualists. They have found by experience that their ideals were unworkable. While it is difficult to get reliable information in regard to actual conditions, the Socialists on one sale giving out one-sided propaganda literature and the other side with equally untrue propaganda, there is no doubt but that the leaders have come to a realization that it is impossible to secure ideal conditions with an ignorant populace. They have found that workingmen are just as human as any other kind of men, if there are any, and that selfishness pervades the race. Until this is eradicated no ideal democratic government can be formed.

Russia has formed a militaristic bureaucracy based on a desire for better government and more equal conditions. The leaders have found that conditions that have developed there have prevented the spread of Bolshevism into many other countries. The failure of Bolshevism came with the success of the Bolshevists.

9. That a stainp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on each share of stock transferred. 10. That the provisions of the said Act relating to stamp duties, on bottles and packages containing a proprietary or patent medicine or perfumery requiring that an adhesive stamp be affixed to such articles by the person selling the same, or by the importer, the manufacturer or producer, be amended to provide that the said provisions shall remain in force as regards the stock of such articles in retail stores remaining unstamped on the 31st day of July, 1920, and such stock may be sold in accordance with such provisions until the 31st day of December, 1920, but on and after such last mentioned date every such article must be stamped before being exhibited or offered for sale. The stamps shall be affixed to all such articles on or after 1st August, 1920, by the manufacturer or importer thereof, or by such person as the Minister may

# VIOLET RAY

Manitoba Government Using System at Brandon Hospital for Insane.

BRANDON, June 9 .- By means f one of the latest electrical devices the use of the ultra violet ray for sterilizing water, the provincial government is ensuring that the water supply for the Brandon hospital for the insane shall be as pure as is humanly possible.

Recent inventions in the electrical world have made it possible to utilize the powerful ray for: this purpose, and the effect is said to be to kill all the living organisms in the water. Water from the Assiniboine river, tested after passing through the process has been found to be absolutely

The device used is much the same as the mercuty lamp used in printing establishments. At Brandon the water is pumped from the river into settling basins and is then filtered. It is pumped through pipes to the hospital and the Cooper-Hewit lamp, which | generates the ray, is placed inside the pipe. The lamp is contained in a glass cylinder. It is much shorter than the mercury lamp commonly used and results in the intensification of the ultra violet ray, which passes through the glass covering and into the water. In order that the water passing through may be thoroughly treated, three of the lamps are nstalled at successive points in he pipe.

The hospital is situated some tr distance from the city, which necessitated a separate sterilizing apparatus.

This, it is stated, is one of the first installations of this kind in Canada, and there are only one or two others on the American continent. The device is more commonly used in Europe, however.
