Justice Hughes Seems Dark Horse

BOOTLEGGERS SUSPECTED OF POLICEMAN'S MURDER IN BOUNDARY COUNTRY

Split is Feared at end of Republican Convention; Nomination Conjectures

Compromise framed by Root for Acceptance of League of Nations; Busy Time trying to Unite Opposing Factions

CHICAGO, June 10.—Fears are entertained here of a split in Republican contention at the very end of the proceedings. Mr. Root has framed a compromise basis for the acceptance of the League of Nations, and has planted Senator Smoot, of Utah, the peacemaker between the two opposing factions. Both Root and Smoot have spent a very busy night.

The condition of affairs at the present moment is summed up as a problem of arithmetic: "Add Lowden, Johnson, Butler and Smoot and subtract Wood. Then add Lowden, Butler and Johnson and subtract Johnson. After this subtract Lowden minus Johnson and you have the presidential nominee in Spruole."

CHICAGO, June 10.—Charles E. Hughes has come to be regarded in authoritative circles here to be the "dark horse" should a split between the factions in the Republican convention over the League of Nations plank become wider.

ODDFELLOWS HOLD SESSION AT NELSON, B. C.

Sixth Annual Meeting of Oddfellows Elects Officers; Proposal for Oddfellows' Home Considered.

NELSON, B. C., June 10.—The sixth annual session of the British Columbia Independent Order of Oddfellows received favorably a proposal from the Saskatchewan and Alberta lodges for the establishment of an Oddfellows home jointly by the three provinces.

The officers elected are as follows: Grand Master, H. Fooks, Nelson; Deputy Grand Master, J. Swanson, Kamloops; Grand Secretary, M. Phillips, New Westminster; Grand Treasurer, Fred Taylor, Victoria, who was elected for the thirty-seventh term; Grand Treasurer, D. H. Proudfoot, Nelson; Grand Representative, H. White, P. G. M., Cranbrook.

CHARTER THE PRINCE RUPERT

Public Shriners from Northern Part of Three Western Provinces to Pass Through this City En Route to Portland for Big Convention

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 10.—The G.T.P. steamer Prince Rupert has been chartered by the Mystic Shrine of the Bank Nationale in Montreal to Seattle where they are to arrive on June 30. The steamer will number 300 and will come from the northern portions of British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan en route to Portland for their convention.

SIX SMALL BOYS CHASE HOLDUP MAN

VANCOUVER, June 10.—Six small boys here chased a bandit for several blocks after a holdup and robbery. The fugitive was afterwards captured by the police, who obtained a confession.

SERIOUS ILLNESS OF HIS HOLINESS THE POPE

PARIS, June 10.—Reports received here indicate that the illness of the Pope has taken a more serious turn and that His Holiness is quite unable to perform the duties of the Vatican. The first announcement of his indisposition said that he was attacked by rheumatism.

VANCOUVER MAN NEW DEPUTY MINES MINISTER

VANCOUVER, June 10.—Chas. E. Camsell of this city, head of the Dominion Geological Bureau for British Columbia, has received the appointment as deputy minister of mines for Canada.

Mr. Camsell had charge of mineral surveys in British Columbia fifteen years ago and is regarded as an expert. His knowledge and experience extends beyond the mineral limits and as a general engineer having knowledge of the geography of Canada has been accepted as an authority by the highest officials. Hon. Arthur Meighen, minister of the interior, recently quoted him in an article appearing in the Canadian Magazine on Canada's Natural Resources.

Mr. Camsell is the son of a former Hudson's Bay Company's factor at Fort Liard in the Mackenzie River district. During the war he was engaged with the Imperial Munitions Board. Mr. Camsell leaves Vancouver for Ottawa on Sunday.

DO NOT FAVOR NEW OUTPORTS

Board of Trade Opposes and Protests Opening of Customs Offices at Swanson Bay and Port Alice.

The following telegram was sent to the Minister of Customs at Ottawa by the local Board of Trade yesterday:

"The Prince Rupert Board of Trade at a meeting yesterday went on record as opposing and protesting against the establishment of Swanson Bay and Port Alice as customs outports, thereby facilitating the movement of traffic by American ships to the detriment of British and Canadian vessels, believing that this is not a time to aid them in capturing our legitimate business, when American legislation is being enacted to further restrict the movement of American goods by Canadian bottoms."

PLAYERS INJURED AT ATHLETIC PARK

Cinders do Grievous Bodily Injury to Some of Men on the Football Team.

Bert Wearmouth is going around with his arm in a sling and a number of other football players are injured about the knees and arms as a result of playing yesterday on the cinders at Acropolis Hill athletic grounds. The result is that an agitation is being started to either haul earth on to the grounds and make them safe for football players, or to level off a new grounds near McClymont Park on the flat, where it is said there would be ground that would be safe to play on.

The general opinion around town among sportsmen is that something must be done if the game is to continue, as players will not risk damage to their person such as that received at the game last night.

LADY MINE REACHED PORT FROM STEWART

Next Trip May be to the Queen Charlottes or Stewart Again; Might Go Fishing.

After a nineteen-hour passage from Stewart, bucking a head wind almost all the way south, the Lady Mine reached port yesterday afternoon at 3:45. On her trip north the schooner called at Port Simpson, Naas Harbor, Mill Bay, Arrandale and Stewart, having cargo for each of these points. It has not been decided by Capt. Smith where his next trip will be and he will remain in port for a few days awaiting a cargo for Stewart or the Queen Charlotte Islands. It is possible that the vessel may be fitted for the halibut fishing trade.

AN ANTI-DRY VICAR



A vigorous protest against prohibition was made by the Vicar of the Hamstead Garden suburb in England, the Rev. B. G. Bouchier, who said:—"I want to offer on behalf of St. Jude's and myself a most emphatic protest against the whole trend of thought that this Garden suburb stands as a community which is out to enforce prohibition upon the nation. If any resolutions were passed we should forthwith hold a meeting to counter it."

Changes in Luxury Tax; Essential Clothing to be Taxed in Excess Only

OTTAWA, June 10.—Important changes in the incidence of the new luxury taxes are said to be impending. Boots and other essential articles of clothing are to be taxed fifteen per cent on all amounts in excess of the sum already specified, instead of ten per cent of the total selling price. Expensive furniture, walking sticks, expensive china is to be taxed, while the exemption limit is to be increased on furs, fur coats, caps, muffs, neckpieces, robes and rugs.

Important modifications in the tax on sporting goods, velvets, velveteens, lace, braid, ribbons and carpets are also expected.

NEW HOSPITAL AT FRANCOIS LAKE

Work is Making Good Progress on Attractive Site.

FRANCOIS LAKE, June 10.—Very rapidly now the three-roomed hospital on the shore of the lake is being completed. The residents are particularly pleased with the prospect of medical aid equipment being near at hand. The new hospital will be under the supervision of the medical missions of the Presbyterian Church and Mr. Gray will be in charge. Nurses will be provided and it promises to be a live institution. EDUCATIONAL PROPAGANDA TURNED DOWN

American Federation of Labor at Its Convention in Montreal Rejects Resolution.

MONTREAL, June 10.—The American Federation of Labor Convention has rejected the resolution proposing that a department of educational propaganda be created for political campaigns. On account of the number of school children now in Hyder, the United States Government will be called upon to establish a school there this fall. Some of the Hyder children now attend the Canadian school at Stewart.

Grand Forks Police Officer Shot Dead

Provincial Constable George Stanfield Murdered in his own House; Crime Laid to Door of Bootleggers

GRAND FORKS, June 10.—George Stanfield, local provincial police constable, was murdered at 12:20 this morning by an unknown man believed to be a bootlegger who either hid in the constable's house or followed him home. The wife, who was in bed, heard the report and found her husband lying on the floor shot through the head.

Stanfield had been active in nabbing bootleggers crossing the boundary line near here and had several convictions to his credit. It was only recently that he arrested a band of eighteen men.

The blacksmith shop of William Lydicat, police commissioner, was recently burned down and it is believed that this happening is closely connected with the Stanfield murder. Provincial and mounted police reinforcements have been called in.

The deceased was an army veteran and had seen service in India, Soudan and Africa. He was aged 41 and leaves besides his wife a daughter of eighteen years. He was stationed at Grand Forks five years and came from Phoenix.

SIX CENT STREET CAR FARE STILL IN VANCOUVER CITY

OTTAWA, June 10.—The six cent street car fare will remain in effect in the city of Vancouver until the Provincial Utilities Commission hears further arguments on the matter. On account of the increasing costs of operation, the British Columbia Electric Railway Company has been endeavoring to obtain permission to further advance the fares. The six cent rate went into effect about two years ago.

AMERICAN LIGHTHOUSE TENDER IN DRY DOCK

Fern Went on Pontoons Today for Cleaning and Change of Propeller.

The United States lighthouse tender Fern reached this port last evening and went up on the dry dock this afternoon for cleaning. Her propeller will also be changed and the vessel will be in the water again by tomorrow morning. Fifty of the new men who arrived from Vancouver by the Prince Rupert yesterday morning started work at the shipyards today.

BROKE INTO BANK

Masked Men Enter Country Bank and Get Safe Opened at Revolver's Point.

OTTAWA, June 10.—Two masked men broke into the living rooms of the Bank Nationale in Bourget village near here. They held up Mrs. Napoleon Longtin and her daughters at the point of their revolvers and compelled them to open the safe, from which they took \$8,000. The two men thereupon decamped and made good their escape.

REQUESTS RESIGNATION OF BURNABY'S CHIEF

EMBARGO ON FREIGHT FOR PRINCE RUPERT

Longshoremen's Strike at this Port Causes Steamship Companies to Refuse Freight

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 10.—The C.P.R. and the Union Steamship Companies have decided to place practically a full embargo on all freight offering for shipment from Vancouver and Victoria for Prince Rupert, due to the longshoremen's strike at the latter port and the inability of the steamship companies to have their steamers discharged. The only commodities which will be handled will be those which can be dumped on the dock, such as coal, etc.

CHINESE FINED FOR POSSESSION OPIUM

Police Made Round-up on Second Avenue Last Night.

Lee Jew, Jip Sam and Ki Wing, Chinese, appeared in the police court this morning, pleaded guilty to the charge of having opium unlawfully in their possession and were fined \$50 each. They were taken in a raid on 817-823 Second Avenue West last night by Sergt. Adams and Constables Macdonald and Leek where all the appliances for the smoking of the drug were found. The exhibits in the court before Magistrate McMullin this morning included pipes, lamps, opium, yenshee and various other objects necessary to the "pipe dream" business.

Lloyd George Again Big Man of World.

Lloyd George has again shown himself to be the world's greatest man. He has taken the lead in bringing Russia and the rest of the world together again. It was a big task, for the prejudices against the Bolsheviks of Russia are very strong, but not much stronger than were the prejudices of a certain class of British people against Lloyd George not many years ago. The overcoming of prejudices, the breaking down of class distinctions and the courage to do rather than to drift, are some of the characteristics of the "Little Welshman" who rules Great Britain.

Russians No Longer Really Bolsheviks.

The Russian people seem to be settling down and evolving a new condition of things. They set out with certain ideals, which have been sadly shattered. They had ideals which were somewhat communal, but they have to a large extent become individualists. They have found by experience that their ideals were unworkable. While it is difficult to get reliable information in regard to actual conditions, the Socialists on one side giving out one-sided propaganda literature and the other side with equally untrue propaganda, there is no doubt but that the leaders have come to a realization that it is impossible to secure ideal conditions with an ignorant populace. They have found that workmen are just as human as any other kind of men, if there are any, and that selfishness pervades the race. Until this is eradicated no ideal democratic government can be formed. Russia has formed a militaristic bureaucracy based on a desire for better government and more equal conditions. The leaders have found that conditions that have developed there have prevented the spread of Bolshevism into many other countries. The failure of Bolshevism came with the success of the Bolsheviks.

Condition Recognized By British Premier.

The British Premier recognizes the fact that the only way to keep the populace informed of the conditions in Russia is by way of trade. Trade is the great civilizer. It is the old story repeated. He has courageously opposed the will of many of his supporters and made a trade pact with Lenin through his representative in London. He has made a treaty with the former Bolsheviks but not with Bolshevism. In a few years we shall see the wisdom of the action of the big little man. Lloyd George is cursed alternately by the capitalists and by the workers. He is big enough to be unduly influenced by either. There have been times when he has been forced to compromise, when he has failed, through stress of circumstances to carry out promises, when he has shifted his ground. There was where he showed his wisdom. He recognized a new condition when it arose and adjusted himself to meet it. At the same time no one can ever say he lacks courage. He passed the lie to any such suggestion as much when he went contrary to a large body of public opinion yesterday in treating with the Russians as when he had to jump out of a window to escape from an angry crowd at the time of the Boer trouble.

We may not like everything Lloyd George does, but we must admit he is the one man in the Empire who has really done things that count, and who has had the courage and ability to carry through his policies.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Port Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince-Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

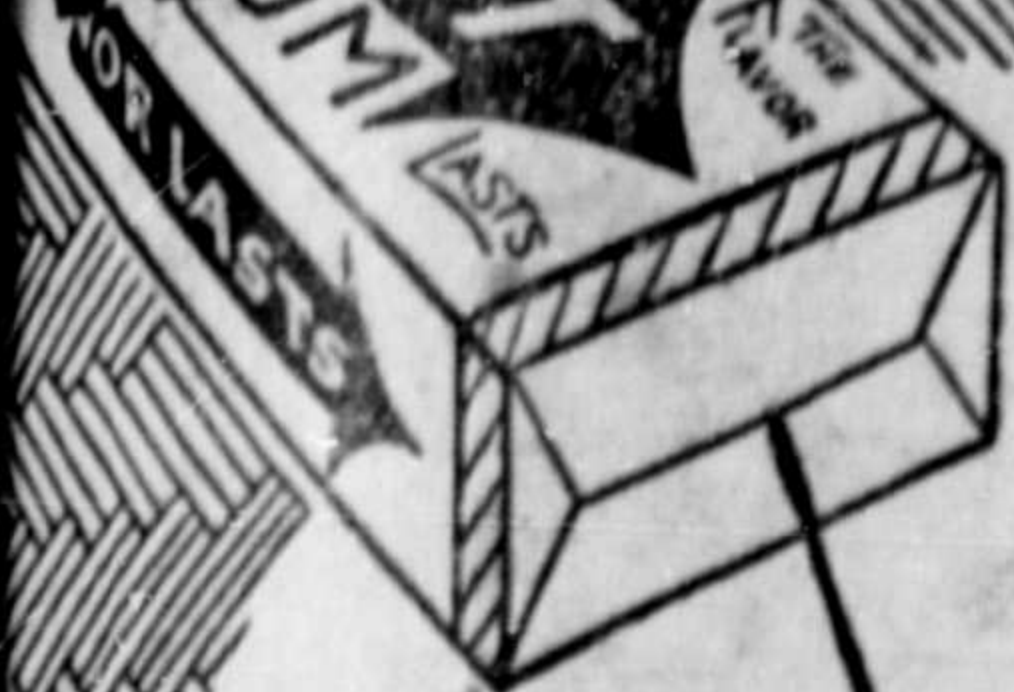

BAPTISTS MAKE GOOD PROGRESS

Paying Off Debts Incurred in Dark Days; Mortgage Being Reduced

A report in regard to the financial condition of the local Baptist Church was given at a recent meeting of the finance committee. This shows that the church has assumed as a debt of honor all local debts, although not incurred by the present church. Of the money collected for the Forward Movement two-thirds will be used in liquidating these debts incurred during the dark days.

In view of the denominational census for 1920 the church roll has been so revised that the membership is now probably the smallest in the history of the institution having only forty-five members. This has increased the church's efficiency. The services are better attended and in the quarter beginning the last week of March these few members, apart from the Board's contribution to the mortgage of \$1,500, will have disbursed locally, \$1,255. The finance committee is of opinion that if the church can maintain its courage, toil and generous giving, it will be in the happy position of being free from debt within a year.

The executive board of the Western Convention has very generously and courageously become responsible for the mortgage of \$7,000 on the local church. It has done this because it believes in the future of Prince Rupert and in the permanent work of the church. A few days ago it contributed \$500 and hopes to send another for the immediate reduction of the mortgage.

LUXURY TAX FULLY EXPLAINED TODAY

Instructions Respecting Reports and Collections.

In this issue of the "News" appears an official advertisement dealing with the Sales and Luxury Taxation Resolutions now in force throughout the Dominion. As the matter is one which affects practically all lines of merchandising and manufacturing, all merchants and manufacturers would do well to clip this advertisement and file it for reference.

Appended to the official memorandum has been outlined in brief form paragraphs dealing with the practical application of the taxation resolutions and the duties of merchants and manufacturers in connection with the matter in so far as reports and collections are to be made under the resolutions.

In the Letter Box

To the Editor.—Dear Sir—Almost everyone on this coast has a desire to own a motor boat of his own. Our peculiar position, with our inland waterways, dotted with beautiful islands, and the fact that every farm, logging camp, mining camp or village is isolated from every other except by water, lends itself to the very natural desire.

Now let us consider it from a business point of view. The average man does not use a boat more than one day in a month. Take a launch that will cost \$5,000, and the interest will amount to \$400 per annum at 8 per cent. The insurance will amount to \$400 more and the cost of upkeep will average \$1,825 more, making a total cost of \$2,625, without the cost of operation.

It is much cheaper for you to hire a launch at the prevailing rates. You do not have to pay the cost of upkeep alone, for the reason that many other people are dividing up that cost with you. The launches for hire are generally in much better condition than you can afford to keep one of your own in.

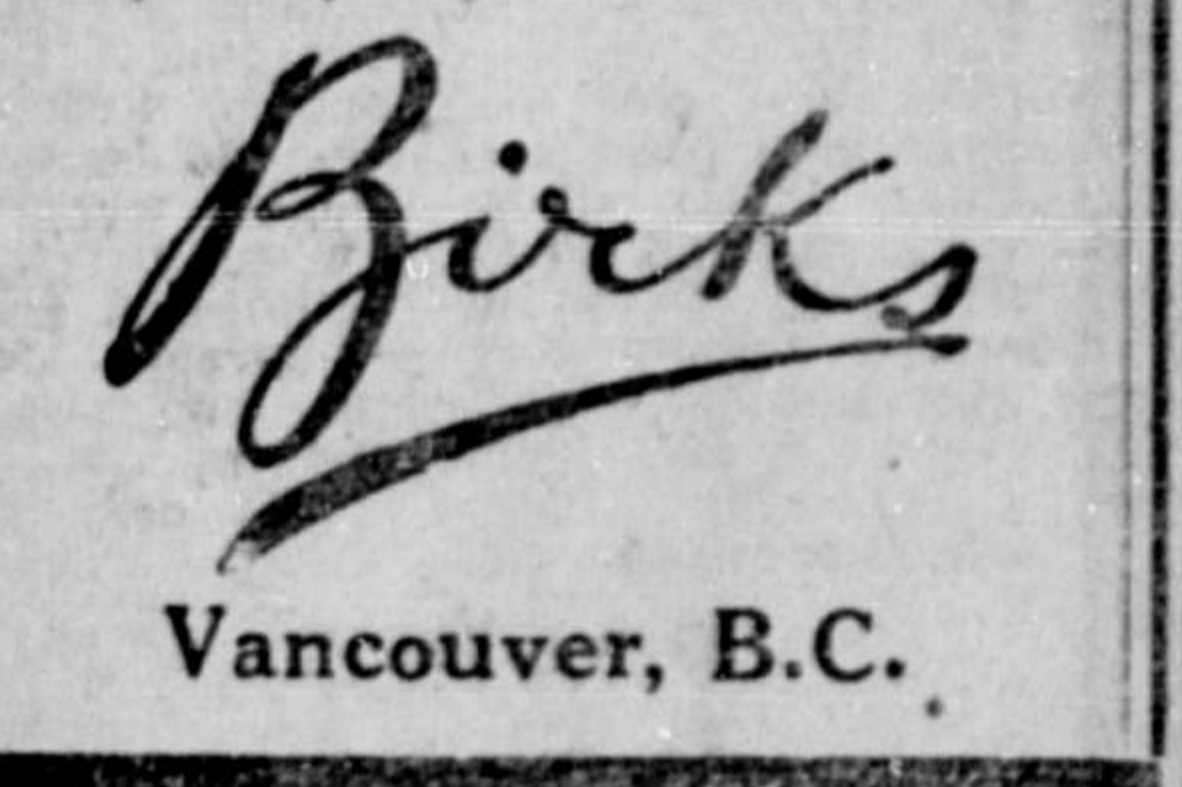

ELKS' FIRST SOCIAL NIGHT

Enjoyable Banquet Spread by Recently Formed Lodge; Music and Addresses.

The Elks are here. That was evident last night in the K. of P. hall, when the newly formed lodge held their first social night. It was a great time, not only on account of the good eats that were placed before the guests or of the music and speeches, but because of the note of good fellowship that was struck, by the welcome they extended and by the general tone of "forget your troubles and we'll forget ours" which pervaded the gathering.

Exalted Ruler Cash presided and with him at the head of the table were the speakers, American Consul Wakefield, Dr. Grant, Fred Stork and Principal Brady. The Westholme Orchestra provided the music and the vocalists were George Waddell and Eddie Cragg, while instrumental selections were given by Will Edmunds and Will Balagno.

Mr. Cash in his opening address spoke of the work of the Order of Elks and of the spirit of fraternalism which they exemplified. Their activities were never confined to members of the order, but they aimed to be a public-spirited body of men always ready to take up any good cause. They proposed having a clubhouse in Prince Rupert, probably building one for themselves. In this would be a gymnasium. He welcomed the guests in the name of the order.

Problems of Day.
 Consul Wakefield spoke of some of the problems of the day and emphasized the need of just such an organization as the Elks which would have a good social effect on the community. Anything which would bring people together and help them to know each other was of benefit at a time like this when there was a tendency toward social upheaval. He strongly advised "not to rock the boat."

Dr. Grant followed somewhat along the same line. He urged that there should be a better understanding between the different sections of the community and that such organizations as the Elks might be a strong factor in tiding the country over a difficult time. He also urged that nothing be done which might affect the good relations existing between the United States and Canada. There were influences at work trying to cause a disruption but he looked to the good sense of the people to prevent any such thing happening.

Fred Stork complimented the order on the excellent entertainment they had put up and also falling into the mold of the gathering in discussing the need of adjustment in a time of danger like the present when everything was in a state of unrest.

Principal Brady made a few preliminary remarks and then recited in excellent manner Kipling's poem "Gunga Din."

DOLLY VARDEN SHIPPING ORE

Bunkers will be Ready Soon and Work of Replacing Light Rails with Heavy Proceeds.

T. J. Shenton, mine inspector, arrived yesterday from Alice Arm on the steamer Chelohsin. He says that the Dolly Varden mine is shipping ore regularly and that the new bunkers being erected are well advanced and will be ready for use soon.

The light 35 lb. rails are being replaced by 50-lb. steel, an evidence that the work is considered by the owners to be of a permanent nature.

In view of the developments in this place buildings are going up and many people are living in tents on the townsite. There is every evidence that the camp is to be a permanent and prosperous one.

Sport Briefs

Batting Spree

"Babe" Ruth was swinging two of his tiny clubs the other day waiting for another one when Bob Meusel hit a homer into the right field bleachers. "Babe," it's stealing your stuff," a fan yelled at the swatter. "He ain't the only one," the Babe replied. The desire to steal Ruth's stuff has become an obsession in the American League. They have been on a three-weeks' slugging spree in a drive that promises unheard of records. Connie Mack's ball-yard seems to be the most popular for murdering the ball, when 19 homers were knocked out in 11 days, but that became almost insignificant last Sunday when the New York Polo Grounds started taking in candidates. In six days the pill has been hit for the full circuit twenty-one times. The Yanks are leading the league with 29 circuit baggers, which is more than they hit in the entire season of 1918.

India at Olympic

India will have at least six athletes entered at the Antwerp Olympic Games, three of them being Marathon runners, one a gymnast and two wrestlers, according to an announcement made by the British Olympic Association. The Indian Olympic Association is bringing the team to England, where it will complete training.

Vancouver Man Chosen

The eight men that will represent Canada in the trap-shooting tournament at the Olympic Games at Antwerp have been selected. They are J. H. Black, Winnipeg; O. J. Kilham, St. John; W. M. Hamilton, High River; Ben McLaren, Calgary; True Oliver, Vancouver; H. J. Montgomery, Bensenville, Ontario, and George Beattie, Hamilton. In case any of the foregoing cannot make the trip, J. M. Claughin, of Halifax, is the next man on the list. Six men, with two reserves, will comprise the team at Antwerp, while five men can shoot in the individual with two reserves. These have not been selected from the eight names mentioned. The team will sail from Quebec on July 5 and will compete in the English championship on July 1 and 16. From there they will go to Antwerp.

Target for Pitcher.

A new wrinkle in baseball pitcher's aids was disclosed when the University of California team played Fordham University in New York last week. Upon the face of his chest protector the visiting catcher had painted a huge bulls-eye, so that his mate might have something to shoot at when the plate got dusty. Judging by the work of the Forsham batters, either the catcher did a St. Vitus' dance or else the California pitcher had never taken a course in marksmanship. In addition to giving nine hits, including a homer, a triple and a few doubles, the visiting twirler also distributed five bases on balls, hit a mignon player on the back of the neck and uncoiled a wild pitch.

 - Clothing, consisting of coat, vest and pants or coat and pants, men's and boys', in excess of \$15.00;
 - Cloth overcoats, men's and boys', women's and misses', in excess of \$50.00 each;
 - Waistcoats, men's, sold separately from suits, in excess of \$5.00 each;
 - Shirts, including nightshirts, men's and boys', in excess of \$3.00 each;
 - Hats, Bonnets and hoods, women's and misses', in excess of \$12.00 each;
 - Hose or stockings, silk, women's and misses', in excess of 2.00 pair;

 - Articles of gold not otherwise provided for in this resolution adapted for household or office use.
 - That the excise taxes as imposed by the preceding resolution shall be paid by the purchaser to the vendor at the time of sale for consumption or use, or on importation for consumption or use other than for re-sale, in addition to the duties of customs already imposed, and by the vendor to His Majesty in accordance with such regulations as may be prescribed.
 - That the following excise taxes be imposed, levied and collected on the articles hereinafter specified, namely—
 - A tax of ten per cent on—
 - Boats, yachts, canoes and motorboats. Provided that on satisfactory proof being furnished that these articles will be used only for trading or commercial purposes a refund of the amount paid under this resolution shall be granted;
 - Cameras weighing not more than 100 pounds;
 - Candy and confectionery;
 - Chewing gum or substitutes therefor;
 - Firearms, shells or cartridges for use other than for militia purposes;
 - Pianos and organs (other than pipe organs); musical instruments not otherwise provided for in this resolution.
 - A tax of fifteen per cent on—
 - Automobiles adapted or adaptable for passenger use;
 - A tax of twenty per cent on—
 - Mechanical player pianos, graphophones, phonographs talking machines, music boxes and records used in connection therewith or with any musical instrument;
 - A tax on playing cards for every fifty-four cards or fraction of fifty-four in each package—
 - When selling at \$25 or less per gross package—twenty-five cents per pack;
 - When selling in excess of \$25 per gross package—fifty cents per pack.
 - A tax of thirty per cent on—
 - Patent and proprietary medicines, including medicinal or medicated wines, vermouth and ginger wine containing not more than forty per cent of proof spirit.
 - A tax of two dollars per gallon—
 - On rum, whisky, brandy, gin, wines containing more than forty per cent proof spirits, cordials, liqueurs and spirituous and alcoholic liquors not otherwise provided for in this resolution suitable for beverage purposes;
 - On lime juice or fruit juices; fortified with or containing more than twenty-five per cent of proof spirit;
 - On spirits and strong waters of any kind, mixed with any ingredient or ingredients, as being or known or designated as anodynes, elixirs, essences, extracts, lotions, tinctures or medicines, or ethereal and spirituous fruit essences not otherwise provided for in this resolution; lavender waters, hair, tooth and skin washes and other toilet preparations containing spirits of any kind.
 - A tax of thirty cents per gallon—
 - On ale, beer, porter and stout;
 - On wines of all kinds except sparkling wines, containing not more than forty per cent of proof spirits.
 - A tax of three dollars per gallon—
 - On champagne and all other sparkling wines;
 - A tax of fifty cents per gallon—
 - On lime juice and fruit juices fortified with or containing not more than twenty-five per cent of proof spirits not otherwise provided for in this resolution.
 - That the excise taxes as imposed by the preceding resolution shall be payable in addition to the present duties of excise and customs at the time of sale by the Canadian manufacturer or when imported, but shall not apply to such articles when exported, and shall be accounted for to His Majesty in accordance with such regulations as may be prescribed.
 - That every person selling or dealing in the articles upon which taxes are imposed as prescribed by the foregoing Resolutions, may be required by the minister to take out an annual licence therefor, for which licence a fee not exceeding \$2 shall be paid.
 - That the provisions of the said foregoing Resolutions shall be deemed to have come into force on the 19th day of May, 1920, and to have applied to all goods mentioned therein imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on and after that day, and to have also applied to goods previously imported for which no entry for consumption was made before that day.
 - (a) That a tax of one per cent in addition to the present duties of excise and customs be imposed, levied and collected on sales by manufacturers, wholesalers, or on importations; that the purchaser shall be furnished with a written invoice of any sale, which invoice shall state separately the amount of such tax, when included in the purchase price; that such tax must not be included in the manufacturer's or wholesaler's costs on which profit is calculated; and the tax shall be paid by the purchaser to the wholesaler or manufacturer at the time of such sale, and by the wholesaler or manufacturer to His Majesty in accordance with such regulations as may be prescribed, and such wholesaler or manufacturer shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$500, if such payments are not made, and in addition shall be liable to a penalty equal to double the amount of the excise duties unpaid.
 - That the Minister may require every manufacturer and wholesaler to take out an annual licence for the purposes aforesaid and may prescribe a fee therefor, not exceeding \$5, and the penalty for neglect or refusal shall be a sum not exceeding \$1,000.
 - That any such tax, costs or penalties may, at the option of the Minister, be recovered and imposed in the Exchequer Court of Canada or in any other Court of competent jurisdiction, in the name of His Majesty.
 - That this tax on sales shall not apply to sales or importations of—
 - Meats, fresh, salted or pickled; butter; cheese; oleomargarine, margarine, butterine or any other substitute for butter; lard; eggs; vegetables; fruits; grains and seeds in their natural state; buckwheat meal or flour; toll, pearl, rolled, roasted or ground barley; corn meal; oatmeal or rolled oats; rye flour; wheat flour; coffee, green, roasted or ground; tea; salt; cattle fods; hay and straw; nursery stock; fish, fresh, pickled, salted, smoked, dried or boneless; sugar, syrups and molasses; anthracite or bituminous coal; artificial limbs and parts thereof or to goods exported.
 - That the provisions of this Resolution respecting a tax on sales shall be deemed to have come into force on the 19th day of May, 1920, and to have applied to all goods imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on and after that day, and to have also applied to goods previously imported for which no entry for consumption was made before that day.
 - That a stamp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on promissory notes and bills of exchange of the value of one hundred dollars or less, and that a tax of two cents additional be imposed on every one hundred dollars or fractional part thereof in excess of one hundred dollars.
 - That a stamp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on each share of stock transferred.
 - That the provisions of the said Act relating to stamp duties on bottles and packages containing a proprietary or patent medicine or perfume requiring that an adhesive stamp be affixed to such articles by the person selling, the manufacturer, or by the importer, the manufacturer, or producer, be amended to provide that the said provisions shall remain in force as regards the stock of such articles in retail stores remaining un-stamped on the 31st day of July, 1920, and such stock may be sold in accordance with such provisions until the 31st day of December, 1920, but on and after such last mentioned date every such article must be stamped before being exhibited or offered for sale. APPLICATION OF ABOVE RESOLUTIONS

- Luxury Tax (see Resolution 1) is payable on the first and fifteenth of every month. Manufacturers' tax and sales tax (Resolutions 3 and 7) are payable on the first of every month.
- ENTRIES FOR LUXURY TAX MUST BE SWORN TO AND SHALL BE ACCOMPANIED BY (a) THE DUPLICATE SALES SLIPS OR INVOICES TO WHICH THE ENTRY REFERS AND (b) AN ACCEPTED CHEQUE OR CASH FOR THE FULL AMOUNT OF THE TAX.

STERILIZE BY VIOLET RAY

Manitoba Government Using System at Brandon Hospital for Insane.

BRANDON, June 9.—By means of one of the latest electrical devices the use of the ultra violet ray for sterilizing water, the provincial government is ensuring that the water supply for the Brandon hospital for the insane shall be as pure as is humanly possible.

Recent inventions in the electrical world have made it possible to utilize the powerful ray for this purpose, and the effect is said to be to kill all the living organisms in the water. Water from the Assiniboine river, tested after passing through the process has been found to be absolutely sterile.

The device used is much the same as the mercury lamp used in printing establishments. At Brandon the water is pumped from the river into settling basins and is then filtered. It is pumped through pipes to the hospital and the Cooper-Hewitt lamp, which generates the ray, is placed inside the pipe. The lamp is contained in a glass cylinder. It is much shorter than the mercury lamp commonly used and results in the intensification of the ultra violet ray, which passes through the glass covering and into the water. In order that the water passing through may be thoroughly treated, three of the lamps are installed at successive points in the pipe.

Daily Capacity 250,000 Gallons. The total capacity of the Brandon installation is 250,000 gallons per day.

Hon. George A. Grierson, minister of public works, announced that the decision of the government, in this regard, had been made because of the danger of typhoid in the district if the water was not thoroughly sterilized.

The hospital is situated some distance from the city, which necessitated a separate sterilizing apparatus.

This, it is stated, is one of the first installations of this kind in Canada, and there are only one or two others on the American continent. The device is more commonly used in Europe, however.
