Republican Candidates Now Named

DAMAGING EVIDENCE GIVEN AGAINST THE BOXING CHAMPION BY HIS WIFE

Final Session of Republican Convention Choosing Leader

Major Wood was First Name Proposed amid much demonstration; Platform drawn up shows great hostility to President Wilson

REPUBLICAN NOMINEES.

CHICAGO, June 11.—(Flash) The Republican nominees are Wood, Lowden, Johnson, Coolidge, Pritchard and Butler.

CHICAGO, June 11.—The Republicans having adopted a platform overnight with a round of applause, resumed their sitting this morning determined not to adjourn until a candidate for the presidency is nominated.

The first name proposed was that of Major General Wood and the nomination was followed by forty minutes of demonstration, including marching and cheering. It is thought possible here that an all day and all night session is possible, although the climax may be reached much earlier.

The Republican platform states: That the Republican party recognizes the right of collective bargaining on the part of the workers.

It condemns the clinging tenaciously to war-time autocratic powers by President Wilson.

It urges the prevention of unreasonable profits and favors the development of water transportation and the further development of the merchant marine.

It approves existing legislation against big combinations and monopolies which tend to hinder trade.

It would insist on a higher standard of physical fitness for immigrants to the country.

It condemns President Wilson's action in asking Congress to empower him to accept a mandate for Armenia.

It favors Home Rule for Hawaii and the rehabilitation of the native people.

Aerial Officers are at Hazelton Today

Captain Howard T. Douglas, United States, and H. A. Le Royer, Ottawa, Making Plans for Trans-continental Flight

HAZELTON, B. C., June 11.—Speculation is rife about here since the arrival by yesterday's train of Howard T. Douglas, United States air service, and H. A. Le Royer, of Ottawa, both of whom are registered at the Omicron Hotel. Captain Douglas is making final arrangements for the 2,500-mile aeroplane jump across the continent from New York to Nome, in which Hazelton has been sited as a stopping place ever since the flight was first mooted.

Early in July four military fliers will start out from New York with B. H. 4 type machines, equipped with Liberty motors.

The route to be followed will take the expedition to Portal, North Dakota, where a crossing will be made into Canada. On this side of the line the fliers will first make a landing at Saskatoon. The next jump will be to Edmonton, where a landing will be effected at May's herodome. The following stops will be at Jasper and from then on the line of the Grand Trunk will be followed until deviation north is made after the stop here.

"The purpose of this expedition is to establish a military air route across the continent," says Captain Douglas. "One particular value will be that Nome is 150 miles from the continent of Asia. The progress of flight largely depends on the surmounting of difficulties which can only be learned in flights of this kind."

CAR SITUATION NOT VERY GOOD

Colonel Peck Writes Board of Trade Regarding Matter and Gives Information.

LETTER FROM CHAIRMAN RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS

The local Board of Trade has received two letters from Colonel Peck in regard to the refrigerator car situation, in which the minister states that he is doing everything humanly possible to assist in getting cars. He says he has discovered that the American railways are not unduly delaying the return of cars from this port. He regrets that the report he is able to make is not more encouraging but he is still working energetically to secure the cars. The following letter is from Hon. F. B. Cury, chairman of the Railway Board, to Colonel Peck: "Immediately on receipt of yours of the 28th ultimo re refrigerator cars upon the Grand Trunk Pacific, we took the matter up with the Canadian National Railway's, but am sorry to say that they contend that they are unable to grant any relief as they have not the equipment for that purpose. I am enclosing herewith copy of a report made to me by Mr. Spencer, our chief operating officer, showing the amount of equipment of this kind owned by the Grand Trunk Pacific. "Today we received from Mr. Driscoll of the Car Service Department of the C. N. R. the following telegram:—"Your wire re shortage express refrigerators Prince Rupert. We cannot assist as we are actually short cars for handling fish Atlantic seaports and Orient Bay. "We have today wired Mr. Riddell of the Railway Association of Canada, Montreal, to see if the relief can be granted from other railways, and will let you know the result as soon as we have an answer."

Mr. Carvell appends a report from the G. T. P. superintendent of car service which follows: "For your information I quote below the Grand Trunk Pacific report for May 21st, 22nd and 25th—"May 21—4 express refrigerators on hand Prince Rupert; 9 in transit; 2 loaded Rupert 17th; 3 on 19th; 86 freight refrigerators on hand Terminals; 69 in transit. "May 22—2 express refrigerators on hand Prince Rupert; 8 in transit; none loaded; 87 freight refrigerators on hand Terminals; 74 in transit. "May 25—2 express refrigerators on hand Prince Rupert; 9 in transit; 2 loaded 22nd; 3 loaded 24th; 82 freight refrigerators on hand Terminals; 70 in transit."

Government Ships Commence Operate Service September

VANCOUVER, June 11.—Mr. Keely, representative here of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, says the Government excursion into the Pacific carrying trade will start in September next at the latest. They plan to use seven ships on the run and a monthly service will be inaugurated in the early autumn with either the Canadian Traveller, now being finished at the Victoria Harbor Marine Yards at the British Columbia capital, or the Canadian Reaper being built by the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. at Prince Rupert.

Sensational Testimony Against Champion Boxer

Jack Dempsey's Wife Declares She led Life of Shame and He Struck Her when She Failed to Bring Him Money

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—Maaxime Dempsey, wife of Jack Dempsey, champion heavyweight boxer of the world, gave some sensational testimony in the witness box yesterday at the trial of her husband on the charge of being an army slacker.

Mrs. Dempsey declared that after her marriage she led a life of shame and that on one occasion when she did not earn money he struck her, dislocating her jaw.

Intense interest is being taken in the trial here, and the court house is crowded with spectators.

Foreign Ship Contracts are Offered to Canadian Yards

Shipbuilders ask Government Aid to Finance Project; Two Suggestions made and being considered by the Government

MANY ATTEND BIG FUNERAL

Obsequies for Richard Marpole Took Place Yesterday at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, June 11.—The C. P. R. offices were closed yesterday to mark the funeral of the late Richard Marpole, executive for the C. P. R. in this province, who died at the Hotel Vancouver a few days ago. There was an enormous and automobile loads of flowers.

Services were held at Christ Church and interment followed at Mountain View Cemetery.

RETIRES, BUT STAYS

Hudsons Bay Factor at Port Macpherson, although Retired, Will Remain Inside

DAWSON, Y.T., June 10.—Word comes from Fort Macpherson, on the Arctic coast, of the retirement of John Firth, famous factor of the old Hudsons Bay company post at that point, said to be the most northerly station operated by the company. Probably every trader, trapper and whaler along the Arctic coast knows Firth. His son-in-law, Jack Parsons, has succeeded him as factor. The old factor will spend his remaining years in a home built for him at the fort.

OTTAWA, June 11.—A delegation of shipping interests from the maritime and Pacific provinces, introduced by H. H. Stevens, M. P. of Vancouver, yesterday waited upon Sir Robert Borden and asked assistance from the government in shipbuilding. Two forms of aid were suggested: a \$100 per ton subsidy on displacement, \$10 per indicated horsepower and assistance in financing foreign contracts. It is understood that a very large foreign shipbuilding contract has been offered. The buyers are willing to put up a large proportion of the cost but want the Government to make an advance, too. The cabinet is considering the question.

Longshoremen's Strike Shows No Sign of Ending

Men Give Out Statement Regarding their Position and Quote Letter from Mr. Brewer Showing Company's Contention

On the surface the longshoremen's strike at Prince Rupert shows no sign of settlement. The officials of the union state that they are open for negotiations at all times but as yet have been able to receive no satisfaction from the Grand Trunk in their demands.

In a statement given to the Daily News this morning, Wm. Denning, chairman of the committee, stated that the union had sent in its notice to terminate the existing agreement in 30 days, the time expiring on June 4 when the strike commenced. The main claim in the request for a wage increase was that the cost of living in Prince Rupert was from 10 per cent to 15 per cent higher in Prince Rupert than in Vancouver. "Mr. Brewer," stated Mr. Denning, "refused to admit this, saying that as far as he could learn the costs at Prince Rupert and Vancouver were about the same, in some cases lower at Prince Rupert. He refused to accept the market reports in the Daily News and Vancouver Province of the same dates."

Cannery Business For this City.

Some of the cannery managers complain that Prince Rupert merchants want them to do business here, and then charge them much higher prices for the goods than has to be paid for the same in Vancouver. This they claim is the only reason why they do business in Vancouver rather than here. They give specific instances of what they consider to be overcharges, say it is useless for the people here to complain at losing business if they cannot compete.

Just what ground there is for this charge, we are not in a position to say. The cannerymen purchase in large quantities and it is to be assumed from wholesale houses. They are on that account able to secure the very best rates. Whether Prince Rupert merchants, either wholesale or retail, are able to meet those rates and still make a profit on the goods, we do not know. It is quite possible that by meeting the cannery managers and discussing the matter of prices, the merchants might be able to secure business which at the present time is going away.

It is to be noted that already considerable supplies are purchased here, although only a fraction of the whole. Some local merchants, it is understood, have set out to secure some of the business. Others who sell only an article now and then, when the canneries run short, refuse to make any concessions to them and their prices seem high. The merchants say that it is only when the cannerymen have to buy from them that they come, so why should they secure more favorable prices than others.

The whole question seems to be one of getting together and using every possible effort to have any local handicaps removed. If the merchants meet the canners and talk over with them the question of supplies and prices, there is a likelihood that the business may be secured. If the steamer Otter is to come here for the Skeena run the handicap of transportation will be removed.

Being Represented At Other Centres.

Prince Rupert is being represented more than ever before at the various conventions and gatherings throughout the country and especially in this province. Delegates from here have been attending trade, political and fraternal gatherings of all kinds and the result is that the city is being advertised as never before. It is to be hoped that this will continue.

Great Interest Taken in Hospital.

Great interest is being taken in the work of the Prince Rupert General Hospital. The graduation exercises last night show that the people of the city are keenly interested in the institution, which, under Miss Atkinson, has been brought to a high degree of efficiency. In order to keep it modern and to pay the running expenses at the same time, there is a good deal of money needed.

Splendid work for the hospital is being done by the Ladies' Auxiliary under Mrs. McClymont and the result is that better work is being done and greater interest taken in properly caring for the sick or injured.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water. 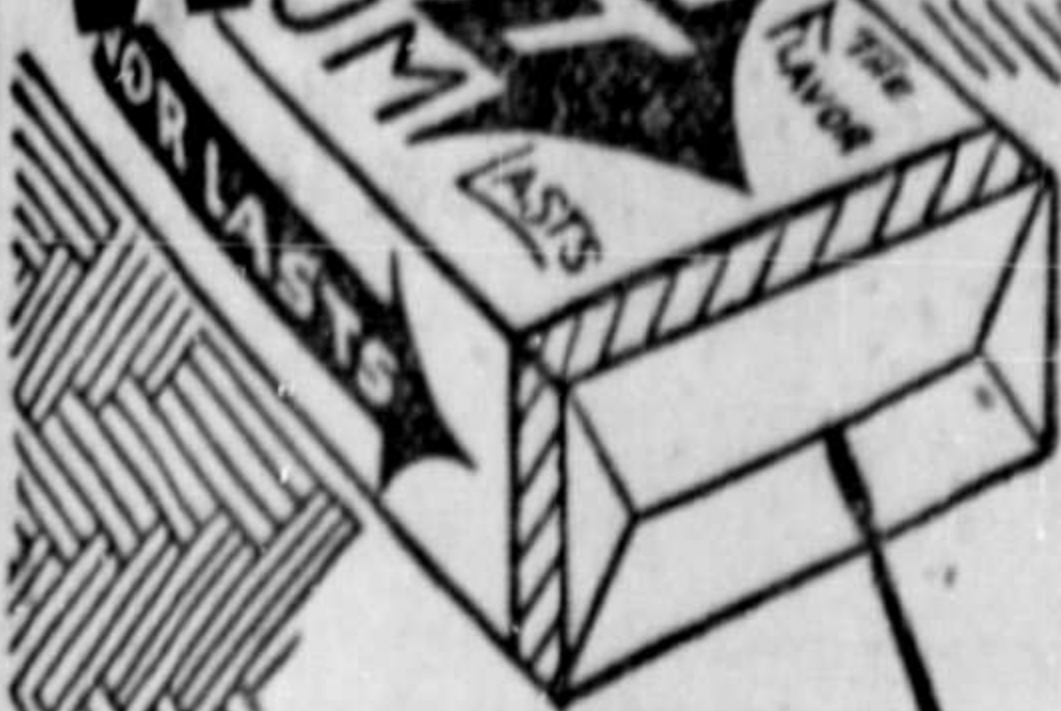

Sport Briefs

The Home Run King.

New York is "Babe" Ruth crazy. He's the latest fad of a town that goes the limit in hero idolatry. His name and his feats are getting places in big print over the world's news in New York papers. He is being interviewed and the "sob" sisters are pulling yarns of Mrs. Babe. Under the bright lights of Broadway they are talking not of Ina Claire, Lenore Ulrich, Fay Bainter and others whose names are glared to the night skies, but the wonder of Gotham, Babe Ruth. Down in the canyons of commerce, in the hotels and society circles he is all the rage. With the season just about one-fourth gone the Babe has played to more people than the Yanks drew in the whole season of 1917. In three days he hit four home runs for close to 90,000 fans. Twice he has packed the huge Polo Grounds tighter than they ever were before. Last year's price for Babe, \$150,000—deemed a prize bit of folly—has turned out to be one of the shrewdest bits of business ever pulled off in baseball.

Betting Marks Fall.

The close races for leadership in the two major baseball leagues are almost eclipsed by the heavy batting and scoring of nearly all the teams. The American League amassed a total of 309 runs and 574 hits in twenty-eight games played last week while the National League had a total of 250 runs and 532 hits in twenty-seven games. Of the thirty homeruns made in the younger league, 2 were pounded out at New York, where Babe Ruth brought his season total to 15. In the National League 18 home runs were scored.

Good Old Boat.

The "America," the staunch schooner that sailed across the Atlantic in 1851 and brought back with her the most highly prized yachting trophy in the world, is still afloat. She lays at Lawley's Yards, Neponset, Mass. She was bought ten years ago by the Eastern Yacht Syndicate when her owner planned to sell her for junk. The Resolute and Vanit built to defend the cup against the English challenger, Shamrock IV next month, are much faster but can't compare with the America when it comes to thrilling experiences and romantic careers.

Mining News

On Vancouver Island

Investigation of copper deposits in the Jordan River section, Vancouver Island, by experts of the Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Co., the big concern that operates the Trail Smelter, leads color to the report that it is the intention of the company to ultimately establish a smelter on Vancouver Island, thus eliminating the long haul to Trail. The coke supply for such a plant is assured on the Island, where the existing coal producing concerns are in a position to produce all that would be required. Vancouver Island mining men feel that the entry of such a large concern into the active development of properties will mean much for the exploitation of resources on the Island.

Drum Lummon Fine Ore.

Reports recently received are to the effect that the tunnelling in the Drum Lummon Mine near Hartley Bay is continuing in the same high values encountered last January. A considerable amount of high-grade rock has been sacked for shipment, while the mill at tidewater is kept busy with the general run of the mine, which is in itself rock of more than average value. Samples from the high grade vein in the Drum Lummon assay 71 per cent copper, sixty-six ounces in silver and \$45 in gold. It is described as being most beautiful ore.

Regia for Stewart.

On the recommendation of George Clothier, provincial resident mining engineer for this district, the provincial government proposes to spend a considerable sum of money in bettering transportation conditions in the Salmon River mining district and in the Portland Canal division generally. The wagon road which has been built at the joint expense of the Premier Mining Co. and the provincial government will be continued to the mines to the north of the Premier and from it branch trails are to be made to assist owners and prospectors to reach their properties. The regions around the headwaters of the Naas, Unuk and Iskul rivers has been included in the Portland Canal Mining Division and in future prospectors will record mines taken up in those districts at Stewart.

Two unbalanced men have been placed in the city police cells yesterday afternoon. John Amoth was brought south from Anyox by Special Constable Aekroyd last night and Constable Ponder, of Masset, came over on the John this morning with Louis Moe.

After lunch the process of canning was shown, some fish having been secured for the occasion through the kindness of Manager Lord of the Cassiar Cannery, who aided Mr. Strang in entertaining the guests and in explaining the process of canning. On the wharf photographs were taken by the official photographer, Harry McLeod, and a hearty vote of thanks was proposed by President Parker of the Board of Trade, to Mr. Strang for his kindness and courtesy, and was carried by acclamation, the party singing "He's a Jolly Good Fellow."

The party arrived home in time for dinner, bringing Mr. Strang in for the dance in the evening. On board the boat there was much merry-making. The fish men of the party ably sustained their reputation as raconteurs of wonderful yarns and on arrival back in Prince Rupert expressed the results as particularly pleased with the entertainment they had received.

 - Sporting goods, such as tennis racquets, nets, racquet covers, and presses, skates, snowshoes, skis, toboggans, canoe paddles, and cushions, polo mallets, baseball bats, gloves, masks, protectors, shoes and uniforms, football helmets, harness and goals, basketball goals and uniforms, golf bags and clubs, lacrosse sticks, balls of all kinds, fishing rods and reels, billiard and pool tables, chess and checker board and pieces, dice, games and parts of games (except playing cards and children's toys and games), and all similar articles commonly or commercially known as sporting goods, in excess of 50 cents;
 - Licensed ware not otherwise provided for in this resolution adapted for household or office use:
 - Velvets, velveteens, plush and silk fabrics;
 - Embroideries of silk;
 - Lace, including collars or collarettes of lace and all manufactures of lace;
 - Ribbons of all kinds and materials.
 - A tax of twenty per cent on—
 - Cigar and cigarette holders and pipes in excess of \$2.50 each;
 - Cigar and cigarette cases, ash trays and match boxes of gold or silver;
 - Humidors and smoking stands;
 - Hunting and shooting garments and riding habits;
 - Hunting and bowie knives;
 - Gold and silver handled pocket knives and penknives;

 - Wearing apparel, not otherwise provided for in this resolution, the component material of chief value being fur;

 - A tax of fifteen per cent on—
 - Automobiles adapted or adaptable for passenger use;
 - A tax of twenty per cent on—
 - Mechanical player pianos, graphophones, phonographs talking machines, music boxes and records used in connection therewith or with any musical instrument;
 - A tax on playing cards for every fifty-four cards or fraction of fifty-four in each package—
 - When selling at \$25 or less per gross package—twenty-five cents per pack;
 - When selling in excess of \$25 per gross package—fifty cents per pack.
 - A tax of thirty per cent on—
 - Patient and proprietary medicines, including medicinal or medicated wines, vermouth and ginger wine containing not more than forty per cent of proof spirit.
 - A tax of two dollars per gallon—
 - On rum, whisky, brandy, gin, wines containing more than forty per cent proof spirit, cordials, liqueurs and spirituous and alcoholic liquors not otherwise provided for in this resolution suitable for beverage purposes;
 - On lime juice or fruit juices, fortified with or containing more than twenty-five per cent of proof spirit;
 - On spirits and strong waters of any kind, suited with any ingredient or ingredients, as being or known or designated as, anhydrous, esters, essences, extracts, tonics, infusions or medicines, or ethereal and spirituous fruit essences not otherwise provided for in this resolution:
 - On alcoholic perfumes and perfumed spirits, bay rum, cologne and lavender waters, hair, tooth and skin washes and other toilet preparations containing spirits of any kind.
 - A tax of thirty cents per gallon—
 - On ale, beer, porter and stout;
 - On wines of all kinds except sparkling wines, containing not more than forty per cent of proof spirit.
 - A tax of three dollars per gallon—
 - On champagne and all other sparkling wines;
 - A tax of fifty cents per gallon—
 - On lime juice and fruit juices fortified with or containing not more than twenty-five per cent of proof spirit not otherwise provided for in this resolution.
 - That the excise taxes as imposed by the preceding resolution shall be payable in addition to the present duties of excise and customs at the time of sale by the Canadian manufacturer or when imported, but shall not apply to such articles when exported, and shall be imposed for His Majesty in accordance with such regulations as may be prescribed.
 - That every person selling or dealing in the articles upon which taxes are imposed as prescribed by the foregoing Resolutions, may be required by the Minister to take out an annual licence therefor, for which license a fee not exceeding \$2 shall be paid.
 - That the provisions of the said foregoing Resolutions shall be deemed to have come into force on the 10th day of May, 1920, and to have applied to all goods mentioned therein imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on and after that day, and to have also applied to goods previously imported for which no entry for consumption was made before that day.
 - (a) That a tax of one per cent in addition to the present duties of excise and customs be imposed, levied and collected on sales by manufacturers, wholesalers, or on importations; that the purchaser shall be furnished with a written invoice of any sale, which invoice shall state separately the amount of such tax, when not included in the purchase price; that such tax must not be included in the manufacturer's or wholesaler's costs on which profit is calculated; and the tax shall be paid by the purchaser to the wholesaler or manufacturer at the time of such sale, and by the wholesaler or manufacturer to His Majesty in accordance with such regulations as may be prescribed, and such wholesaler or manufacturer shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$500, if such payments are not made, and in addition shall be liable to a penalty equal to double the amount of the excise duties unpaid.
 - (b) That the Minister may require every manufacturer and wholesaler to take out an annual licence for the purposes aforesaid and may prescribe a fee therefor, not exceeding \$5, and the penalty for neglect or refusal shall be a sum not exceeding \$1,000.
 - (c) That any such tax, costs or penalties may, at the option of the Minister, be recovered and imposed in the Exchequer Court of Canada or in any other Court of competent jurisdiction, in the name of His Majesty.
 - (d) That this tax on sales shall not apply to sales or importations of—
 - Meats, fresh, salted or pickled; butter; cheese; oleomargarine, margarine, butterine or any other substitute for butter; lard; eggs; vegetables; fruits; grains and seeds in their natural state; buckwheat meal or flour; pot, pearl, rolled roasted or ground barley; vena rosa; oatmeal or rolled oats; rye flour; wheat flour; coffee, green, roasted or ground; tea; salt; cattle foods; hay and straw; nursery stock; fish, fresh, pickled, salted, smoked, dried or boneless; sugar, syrups and molasses; anthracite or bituminous coal; artificial limbs and parts thereof or to goods exported.
 - (e) That the provisions of this Resolution respecting a tax on sales shall be deemed to have come into force on the 10th day of May, 1920, and to have applied to all goods imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on and after that day, and to have also applied to goods previously imported for which no entry for consumption was made before that day.
 - That a stamp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on promissory notes and bills of exchange of the value of one hundred dollars or less, and that a tax of two cents additional be imposed on every one hundred dollars or fractional part thereof in excess of one hundred dollars.
 - That a stamp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on each share of stock transferred.
 - That the provisions of the said Act relating to stamp duties on bottles and packages containing a proprietary or patent medicine or perfumery requiring that an adhesive stamp be affixed to such articles by the person selling the same, or by the importer, the manufacturer or producer, be amended to provide that the said provisions shall remain in force as regards the stock of such articles in retail stores remaining un-stamped on the 31st day of July, 1920, and such stock may be sold in accordance with such provisions until the 31st day of December, 1920, but on and after such last mentioned date every such article must be stamped, before being exhibited or offered for sale. The stamps shall be affixed to all such articles on or after 1st August, 1920, by the manufacturer or importer thereof, or by such person as the Minister may prescribe.
 - That respecting bottles or packages containing wine, sparkling and non-sparkling, manufactured or imported previous to the 10th day of May, 1920, stamps as set forth in the said Act shall be affixed thereon under regulations made by the Minister.
 - That the provisions of the said Act relating to moving picture films and all the other provisions of the said Act inconsistent with these resolutions, be repealed.

musical numbers and addresses with D. G. Stewart, president of the board, in the chair. Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant led in the opening prayer and Miss F. L. Edmunds then gave a delightful solo. A vocal duet, "Whispering Hope" by Miss Edmunds and Mrs. Jarvis McLeod was especially well rendered and A. Bentley did full justice to his solo "Mother of Mine." W. J. Pitman and Miss Edmunds were the accompanists.

Noble Profession.

The address of the evening was given by W. E. Williams, vice-president of the Hospital Board. He referred to the years of work the girls had put in and the reward that they now had won. He remarked on the nobility of the nursing profession, describing it as a calling close akin to the ministry in that mercy and sympathy were requisite to a woman's success in it. The duties of a nurse's work were outlined, attention being called to the factors that are necessary to its successful carrying out. The sterling characters of Florence Nightingale and Edith Cavell were cited as examples to be followed by all members of the profession. The three girls graduating went out with the best wishes of the Prince Rupert General Hospital.

Other speakers were Mayor McClymont, who stated that he was in favor of the establishment of a nurses' home and gained applause on the statement, and Dr. W. T. Kergin, who was chosen to represent the medical profession as their speaker. Both Mayor McClymont and Dr. Kergin extended the heartiest congratulations to the ladies. Dr. Kergin emphasizing the fact that their careers had now but commenced.

The Presentation.

The formal ceremony of presenting diplomas and medals to the graduates then took place, being conducted by Miss Atkinson, the matron of the hospital. The Florence Nightingale pledge was read and the girls made their promises to follow its requirements. Miss Atkinson then pinned the medals of the Prince Rupert General Hospital on each

girl's uniform and D. G. Stewart presented the diplomas amid the applause of the audience. Beautiful bouquets of pink and white roses were given the ladies, after which Canon G. A. Rix gave the benediction and the assemblage joined in the national anthem.

Delightful refreshments, provided by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the hospital under the supervision of Mrs. McClymont, president were served in the main hall, after which dancing commenced. To the strains of Gray's Orchestra about 200 dances took the floor and the affair was voted most enjoyable by all. Dr. W. Kergin acted as master of ceremonies and was ably assisted by Sergeant Cope, of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. It was well on into the hours of the morning when the memorable affair broke up.
