

Archbishop and Psychic World.

A great discovery is being made in the Phychic World. Something very old is being seen in a new light.

Our physical bodies have so long separated us, one from another, that we are only beginning to realize that our psychic spirits are not confined by material barriers to one limited space. Our minds can interpenetrate other minds, whether they be near at hand or far away. Our spirits can intermingle with other spirits, whether they be "in the body or out of the body," and so hold communion together. This is the fellowship of the spirit.

Let us take, first, the case of a pupil and his teacher. The one may be at his desk on the platform, and the other in his seat . an intervening space, but their minds meet. The teacher's mind glows with the knowledge he wishes to impart. The pupil's mind responds to this glow. It is not simply that the thought of the one mind passes into the other mind, but the spirit of the one intermingles with the spirit of the other. This is the fellowship of the spirit. Applying to this experience the test of moral value, we find that not only has knowdelge been imparted, but the one person has received an inspiration from the other person. There has been an inter-penetration of personality.






thing to tell anybody." The Coroner -- It was a brutal thing to say. Was he upset about it?-Yes, it seemed to worry him

Report From New York on Granby Operations Proves Interesting.

Of the 11,260,585 pounds of copptr produced by the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power, Company during the six months' period ended December 31 last, 7,088,000 pounds were sold at an average price of 19.6 ents a pound, says a New York report. The smelter cost of this metal was 14.20 cents a pound. In the corresponding period of 1918 the company sold 23,217,971 pounds of copper, against its production of 16,113,670 pounds. The average price then received was 23.8 cents a pound and the smelter cost 15.4 cents a pound. Much of the excess cost in the earlier period was due to the fact that the Grand Forks smelter was then in operation and its cost was around 20 cents a pound.

During the last half of 1919 the Granby increased its loans from bankers by close to \$1,000,-000. This item at the end of December stood at \$5,983,900 as against \$5,035,243 on June 30. Accounts payable and accrued liabilities in the same period rose from \$1,073,500 to \$1,203,000.

Accrued liabilities of \$643,000 ncluded provision for unpaid the company for Dominion income taxes for the two fiscal years ended June 30, 1919, and for provincial taxes for the calendar years 1917, 1918 and 1919. These liabilities are estimated at ap-WANT OPEN EVENINGS proximately \$400,000.
