### World of Pretend Is Happy Place.

When we were very young we loved to live in the world of pretend. Life was humdrum, but every other life had remance in it. As boys we were teamsters, we drove coaches, we rode on horseback, we lived in castles, we fought battles, we made sea voyages on land boats and we chastized families of unruly children.

As we grow older we still like to live in the world of pretend. We attend plays at the theatres, we become exalted rulers at lodges, we put on airs and do many other things which indicate that what we liked as children remains with us. This was impressed very forcibly last night when the Shriners went through on the way to the big pow-wow at Portland. The men were decked in the gaudy colors of another race and carried themselves with an air of abandon that showed they were playing the game well. These men were not children in the ordinary sense of the word. They were mostly successful business or professional men, yet they played the old child game with all the zest of youngsters. They dressed up to represent some people whom they had never seen and lived in the world of pretend.

### Sam Hughes is Out of Date.

Few people take any notice of the ravings of Colonel Sam Hughes. His bitter attacks on General Sir Arthur Currie are in poor taste, even if true. There is nothing to be gained by vilifying a man who has done things and made good. Currie may have made mistakes, he may not be popular in the ranks, he may even have a touch of the same streak of yellow that most of the rest of us have, but it cannot be gainsaid but that he did effective work in the war and he has since been rewarded.

Hughes was at one time a minister in the Dominion Government. He was at the head of the militia in Canada. His delight at that time was to ride about in state and impress people with his greatness. His mannerisms became a standing joke. Now he is set aside and is a disgruntled sorehead, honored by neither friend nor foe. The only way he can reach the newspaper headlines is by abusing someone better than himself under privilege of Parliament.

### British Labor Not Impressed.

Further information is coming to hand in regard to the recent visit of the labor delegation from Great Britain to Russia. They saw there was no freedom in that country. Workmen have no right to strike or change their jobs without permission from "superior authority." They have compulsory military service and the death penalty, conscription of labor and as the Yorkshire Post remarks editorially, "compulsion is their God."



Elliott, K.C., in the \$1,000,000 Hodgson-Elliott-Dunsmuir suit concerned with the distribution of the commission for the sale of the \$10,000,000 Dunsmuir coal mines near Ladysmith and Comox district.

E. Hodgson has been claiming half of the \$1,000,000 commission. Some time he got judgment against G. B. French, also a claimant in the commission, for \$25,000 of the large sums of money which it is alleged that Mr. Elliott paid French. This money, it is claimed, was held by Mr. Elliott in case of litigation such as this one.
