IRISH ENGAGE IN STREET FIGHT AT LONDONDERRY

BOARD OF COMMERCE AGAIN ATTEMPTS TO PREVENT SUGAR PROFITEERING

Violent Fighting Takes Place in Streets of Londonderry

Trouble between Nationalists and Unionists arise and Residents were Terrorized; Armed Parties Searched Houses for Arms

LONDONDERRY, June 19.—Violent street fighting has taken place here. For two hours a Nationalists and Unionists melee continued, and the whole city was in ferment. Residents were terrorized and troops took control of the situation.

Armed parties searched all the houses looking for arms, which it was reported were concealed there in large quantities.

Sockeye Fishing Begins Tomorrow Evening at Six

For Some Days Fish have been Seen Jumping in the Skeena and it is Anticipated that Fishing may be good

The sockeye fishing season opens in the north tomorrow, Sunday, evening at six o'clock and once more the boats will be busy on the Skeena and Nass rivers and at Rivers Inlet. Tomorrow afternoon a string of boats from the Prince Rupert cannery will go out to the river and the cannery plants will all be busy.

The prospects for fishing on the Skeena seem fairly good, although this is not expected to be a big year. Four years ago the spawning grounds were not very well seeded and for that reason this should be a slim season for sockeye. For some days past, however, fish having been going up the river and as late as yesterday were seen jumping.

Fishing is likely to commence a few days later at the Nass and on Rivers Inlet as the sockeye are rather later at those points. Usually at Rivers Inlet the boats go out about the 25th or 26th and possibly a day or two earlier than that at the Nass.

Trolling for spring salmon on the Skeena has not been very good this year, but on the Nass there have been excellent catches. As soon as the herring begin to run at Dundas Island and at Wark Channel the springs will come in and the catches will improve. The spring salmon seem to follow the herring.

AFGHAN TROOPS ARE CONCENTRATING ON BORDER OF INDIA

LONDON, June 19.—A Moscow despatch says that Afghan troops are being concentrated on the Indian-Afghan border for the purpose of attacking British India. Bolshevik gold is said to be behind the rising.

Speculation in Sugar is Declared to be a Crime

Board of Commerce Restricts Profit to Two Cents a Pound and Refuses to Allow Boost of Prices on Old Stock

OTTAWA, June 19.—The Board of Commerce in session here has ordered restriction of dealers' profits on sugar to 2c a pound or five per cent. The advance on price of sugar now in stock will be stopped and refiners will not be allowed to boost the rate. A maximum price of 23 cents a pound has been set and speculation in sugar has been declared a crime.

Higher Pensions Are Recommended

Special Committee on Pensions and Reconstruction handed in Report to Parliament Yesterday; State Insurance Proposed

OTTAWA, June 19.—The report of the special committee on pensions and reconstruction, which was yesterday presented to the House of Commons, recommends considerably higher pensions for those who were injured during the war. It also recommends that the Government provide state insurance for veterans who, owing to disabilities consequent on service overseas, are unable to get insurance from the companies.

Gratuities for war widows and the disability scale for dependents overseas are included in the scheme, the dependents incomes increased fifty per cent.

NEW DRY KILNS IN OPERATION

*** Work on Planing Mill Being Rushed and Should Be Ready for Operation by July 15**

LOGS PURCHASED AT DIFFERENT POINTS

The new dry kilns at the Prince Rupert Lumber Mill are now in operation and it is expected that the planing mill will be ready to commence about July 15. The power is being secured from the city and the new transformers are on order. If these arrive on time the new mill will be started up directly the work is completed. The construction gang which has been employed on the kilns is now at work on the planing mill and the work is being rushed.

The resumption of work at the Islands is assuring a supply of logs to keep the mill going. At present there are three Days rafts ready and the tug Lorne has gone across to the islands to fetch the first of them. There is one raft at the company's own camp at Shannon Bay, another purchased from the Buckley camp and a third at Atlin Inlet which has been purchased from the Kelly Logging Company. The Lorne will fetch all three rafts.

ALBANIANS MASSACRED PRISONERS

Italians Suffer for the Murder of Essad Pasha in Constantinople.

GENEVA, June 19.—Infuriated Albanians massacred 330 Italian prisoners in revenge for the assassination of President Essad Pasha in Constantinople. Turks bombed British troops but supported by the fleet they are safe.

MRS. SAWYER FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER

SEATTLE, June 19.—Mrs. Sawyer has been found guilty of murder in the second degree, the jury recommending a minimum of ten years in the penitentiary. The prisoner was carried out in a state of collapse.

City to Sell Bonds Locally.

The city is offering the people of Prince Rupert short term bonds at a good rate of interest. They are as good as anything in the country in the way of security and can be used as collateral. They pay a better rate of interest than Victory Bonds and the only objection to them is that they cannot be marketed just as promptly as a Dominion Government security. They are not a liquid security. This, however, is often an advantage in that it compels saving. It is the nearest approach to buying life insurance as an investment.

Prince Rupert people will probably want to support their own city, just as they supported their own country during the war. A city bond is a good thing to put in the safe or in the bank among the other papers. "Buy a bond" is a good slogan during the next few days.

Local Building Society Prospects.

Another local security has turned out well. Reference is made to the Prince Rupert Housing Ltd. The annual meeting is to be held during the week, and there is a sufficient balance on the right side to enable the company to declare a dividend. This was entirely unexpected by most of the shareholders, although it was carrying out the suggestions made at the time of organization.

There is some talk of winding up the company as soon as possible and distributing the proceeds. It is argued that it has filled its purpose in that it has financed nineteen new houses, which were badly needed.

The Daily News is of opinion that houses are needed today just as much as they were a year ago. The building company is needed just as badly, and if another dozen houses can be financed during the coming year, the concern would well justify its existence. What would seem to be more to the point would be for each shareholder to double his holdings so that there would be a fund with which to work. The company is paying fairly well, it has passed through the throes of organization and there should be a useful future for it. If there are one or two shareholders who are pressed for cash they might be bought out, but certainly the company should be continued.

Judging from the statement issued by the company, the funds have been handled conservatively and all the borrowers are in good standing. The valuers have worked without fees and they seem to take a pride in serving the company.

The Daily News is glad to give this free advertising to a local concern which has served the city so well. Such an institution is worthy of support and if there are any people who would like to take an interest in it and see that it is continued as a purely commercial concern, it would be well to get in touch with the officers at once for there is plenty of treasury stock still for sale and loans can be made if the money is available.

Crop Prospects On the Prairies.

While it is early yet to predict the crop prospects at present are better than usual on the prairies. The acreage in wheat is not as large as last year owing to the late season, but if the yield is high, it will make the general output just as large. There are still dangers to be passed, such as rust, and hail, but the prospects are reported very good, compared with other seasons.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

Lieut. W. R. S. Hayes Tried for Bigamy Declares His Brother Exactly Like Him.

LONDON, June 15.—A case worthy of being used as a movie plot was tried at Topeka. It was a bigamy charge and the defence of Lieut. W. R. S. Hayes, the defendant, was that he was married only once, but that his brother, who was exactly like him, had married the other girl.

In evidence Hayes described himself as a lieutenant in the Royal Navy now on the retired list, and gave H.M.S. Aurora as his address. "Edith Elizabeth is my proper wife," he declared, "and Lilian Hayes my brother's wife." His brother's name, he said, was Wilfred Reginald. He (the defendant) was born at Bangor on April 6, 1892. His brother was 15 months older. At the age of six his brother was sent to the residence of his uncle and aunt at Larne owing to the difficulty his people had to distinguish between them. The only difference was that he (the defendant) had a scar on the left temple, and his left arm was somewhat crooked through an accident. He was educated at Mossley Public School in Belfast. When he left school he was apprenticed to Kirk and Sons, electrical engineers, Belfast. He had a quarrel with the principal and left. He joined the navy, went to Harwich, and proceeded to Plymouth about 1910 on board H.M.S. Gloucester.

While at Plymouth witness met Miss Phillips, and they became engaged towards the end of 1912. Shortly after he met his brother, whom he had not seen since 1908. He stated that he was in need of funds, and the defendant lent him £20. About a week after he quarrelled with Miss Phillips, and the engagement was broken off, but they became engaged again. At the end of 1913 she wrote to him at Portsmouth asking for her freedom, and returned the engagement ring. In March, 1915, he met her again, and the following day again met his brother, to whom he gave the key of a locker at the Drake Institute, where he had his plain clothes. He told him he had to meet Miss Phillips two days later, and that he could take his place, as he wanted to go to Ireland on leave. He did not see her again until the end of May.

In the second week in May he met his brother, who explained that he had taken the witness's place, and married her. In December, 1915, he saw his brother again, and agreed to take his place as Miss Phillips' husband. That was the last time he saw him. He went to the West Indies and elsewhere, and on his return lived with her. Last autumn he met Miss Hill, became engaged to her, and was married on February 14, 1916. He concluded: "That is the end of the story."

The defendant, who was committed for trial, was admitted to bail.

**DEPARTMENT OF
LABOR ISSUES
ANNUAL REPORT**

Gives Review of Conditions with Particular Reference to International Organizations.

The Ninth Annual Report on labor organization in Canada, containing statistics, etc., for the calendar year 1919, has been issued by the Department of Labor. The report deals with the advent of the One Big Union and also gives a review of the progress of the national Catholic unions in the province of Quebec. Notwithstanding these two forces, the international organizations have made a very substantial gain in their following, while the non-international bodies and independent units show losses.

The figures given in the report show that trade union membership in the Dominion has reached the highest point recorded since the department commenced the publication of these annual reports in 1911, the total reported membership for all classes of labor bodies in Canada at the close of the year 1919 being 378,047. There are in all 2,847 local branch unions in the Dominion, of which 2,309 are affiliated with international organizations, comprising 260,247 members, an increase over 1918 of 412 branches and 58,815 members; 325 local branches with 33,372 members are connected with what are termed non-international bodies, these figures showing a loss of seven branches and of 4,556 members; 29 are independent units, a decrease of 16, and the reported membership was 1,249 less than that reported in 1918; the national Catholic unions number 83, comprising a membership of 35,000; the One Big Union reported 101 units with a membership of 41,150.

These figures show a gain of 573 in local branches of all classes of labor bodies operating in Canada, and the remarkable increase in membership of 129,160. The membership of all classes of organized labor in Canada, as reported to the Department for the past nine years, has been as follows:

**CONSUL TELLS
AMERICANS OF
PRINCE RUPERT**

Speaks of New Work About to be Done Here With Large Expenditures of Money.

In the United States commercial report for May 20 appears an article signed by Consul E. A. Wakefield of Prince Rupert telling of the expected developments in this district. It says:

"A general belief prevails that Prince Rupert and the surrounding district will expand and develop wonderfully during the next few years; in fact, that the development period has arrived.

Conditions in Prince Rupert today are said to be more promising than ever before in the history of the municipality, and the same is true of the surrounding district.

Mining activities throughout central and north central British Columbia and the demand for forest products are responsible for many new arrivals here, and the city of Prince Rupert has been full to overflowing, from a housing standpoint, for many months.

Government Expenditures

Provincial acknowledgment of these conditions is seen in the amount allotted to this district in the government estimates which have just been submitted to the Assembly. The principal expenditure in Prince Rupert itself will be for provincial government buildings to cost \$500,000, of which \$100,000 is provided in the expenditures for this year. A new public school is to be constructed at a cost of \$150,000 to \$200,000, for which the provincial government will provide one-third of the necessary funds.

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SPREAD GOSPEL OF FREEDOM

Liberal Leader Appeals to Women
of Canada to Encourage Spirit
of Good-will.

"And in the great work of seeking to reconcile differences, and to promote the greatest good of the greatest number women's work will be, as it has been through all time, that of healing and restoring," said Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King in addressing the Ontario Women's Liberal Association. "We as Liberals appeal to the women of Canada to spread the gospel of a greater freedom and a larger spirit of good-will, that out of the ruins of the world lying shattered at our feet may come a resurrected life in matters political, industrial and social, to meet the sacrifice of our noble men, who laid down their lives for mankind."

Speaking of the destructive powers of war and the wreckage following in its wake, as in the wake of every storm, Mr. King said there came also a certain temporary lessening of the power of Liberalism. He pointed to the Union Government, formed for the purpose of winning the war, but not for holding on to power till the last possible moment. Several Liberal members have withdrawn, but some professed Liberals are willing to stay with a Government which is prepared to usurp power for some years to come, and which wholly ignores the wishes of the people. This is the speaker attributed to the wartime attitude of mind, an attitude revealing itself in a number of instances of autocratic action which he quoted, and in matters of lavish expenditure for which he gave figures, such as the increase of the country's debt since the end of the war at the rate of a million dollars a day.
