Proposal to Finance Ship Contracts

PRELIMINARY REPORT ON POWER PLANTS FOR THE CITY HYDRO-ELECTRIC

Government May Back Notes on Shipbuilders' Contracts

Legislation to be passed giving Executive authority to Keep Shipyards Busy on French Vessels which are offered

OTTAWA, June 22.—It is reported semi-officially that legislation will be passed which will aid the shipbuilding industry. A delegation representing the shipbuilding interests and also returned soldiers and others recently waited on the Government and explained that contracts were being negotiated, but it required a lot of money to handle these and without Government backing it would be impossible to take the contracts. The ships would be built at various yards throughout the Dominion, including British Columbia.

The Government has been considering the matter in executive sessions and as a result it is said here that legislation will be passed giving the Government power to back the notes of the shipbuilders to half the contract price of the ships.

It is French orders that have been under consideration and it is now considered likely that the contracts will be secured and that Canadian yards will be kept busy for some time to come.

MEETING ASKS ARBITRATION OF LOCAL STRIKE

EARTHQUAKE IN CALIFORNIA

Buildings Partly Destroyed and Woman Dies of Fright Near Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES, June 22.—Eight business buildings were partly destroyed and a woman died of fright as the result of an earthquake, which took place here last night about seven o'clock. The hotel front at Inglewood collapsed and the whole community was startled.

ALPINI LOSE 100 MEMBERS

In clash with Bandits There is Much Bloodshed.

ROME, June 22.—One hundred members of the Italian Alpini were killed in a clash with the Arditi. The losses of the insurgents was greater than those of the regulars.

The Arditi are bandits that infest the mountains in large numbers and the Alpini are mountain military doing police duty.

NO GASOLINE FOR SEATTLE JOY-RIDERS

SEATTLE, June 22.—Gasoline supplies have been cut off for a week for all pleasure cars. A million gallons of gasoline is expected on June 29, which will relieve the shortage.

Launch Alice B. Phone Blue 548. ship Co. refused to come because they said the G. T. P. and the C. P. R. were subsidized boats and it was impossible to compete with them. There was a differential in favor of this port over Alaska in the matter of freights amounting to \$2.75 a ton.

BROTHERHOOD WAGE INCREASE

Meeting of Railway Employees Last Night Hear Report of Delegate.

Members of the Prince Rupert Division of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees last evening heard the report of their delegate to the grievance committee conference recently held at Edmonton. O. H. Nelson, secretary of the local branch of the C. B. of R. E., was the delegate from this city.

In his report to the meeting on Monday evening Mr. Nelson told of a unanimity among employees of the system to open negotiations at once for a substantial increase in rates, with employees

the western end to be given a differential rate due to higher costs of necessities than prevails eastward.

With the end in view as above outlined the conference nominated three delegates, one each from Prince George, Edson and McBride, to prepare a schedule based upon the increases to be asked for; and to present this schedule to the railway management. The committee of three is at present working upon this new schedule.

It was further explained that members of the C. B. of R. E. employed by systems that have come under the direct control of the Dominion Government are now negotiating for a new schedule and that it is possible the new G. T. P. rates will be brought into conformity with those to be adopted by the Canadian National Lines.

RAISING MONEY FOR NEW SCHOOL

Fifty Thousand to be Borrowed From Bank to Make Payments Under By-law.

At the City Council meeting last night, a bylaw giving the right to borrow \$50,000 from the bank to be used in making payments on the school building which is going up was passed through its early stages.

During the discussion the matter of moving the pipe line was discussed and it developed that probably the pipe might remain where it is or be moved only a short distance at a comparatively small expense. A committee is working on that today, along with the engineer and architect.

Alderman Perry took occasion to voice another protest at the way in which the money was being spent. It was pointed out that the people had approved the building of the school and that the School Board controlled the expenditures. All the City Council had to do was to provide the engineer and architect.

The money will be used to make payments on the work which is already proceeding.

VANCOUVER, June 22.—The last victim of the fire which took place on Sunday evening at the Balmoral Apartments has been identified as Theodore Hanson of Long Beach, California. He was a visitor in the city.

Officials declare that the Balmoral was a fire-trap and that there are 105 similar places here that lack fire alarms. An investigation will take place shortly.

Engineer reports that Detailed Estimates would Cost Additional \$20,000; New Project \$700,000

The estimates of the engineer in regard to the cost of the two hydro-electric projects, Thulme River and Shawatlans, were tabled at the meeting of the City Council last night. These are simply rough estimates and T. G. Duncan says that to make a detailed report for the two installations such as would give a working basis for the schemes would cost about another \$20,000. INVESTIGATE COAL AND IRON

Chairman of Canadian Collieries Promises to go Into Matter Before Location is Decided On.

At a meeting of the Mining Committee of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade the following letter from Henry S. Fleming, president of the Canadian Collieries (Dunsmuir) Ltd., was read with satisfaction:

"Please accept my thanks for your telegram of yesterday inviting me to visit Prince Rupert and investigate the coal and iron deposits before determining upon the location of the steel plant which is under consideration."

"Thus far, the matter of the steel plant is altogether in abeyance pending a further investigation of a market for steel products and after that has been satisfactorily concluded there will then be a full and detailed investigation of the ore and coal resources before the location of a plant is determined upon."

"I am already slightly familiar with the mineral resources of the Prince Rupert district and beg to assure you they will not be overlooked in the investigation which is in progress."

**Work of Local
Teacher Appreciated.**

It is always difficult to single out from a group of hard working and efficient people one that is in some respects more prominent than the others. That is the case among the local school teachers, all of whom seem to have done excellent work during the year. It is timely, however, to draw special attention to the excellent service of Miss Mills in encouraging local games and sports, especially among the boys. Her work is unique. She takes a keen personal interest in every pupil at the school and her influence is such that the clean sport has reached such a stage of efficiency as it has never before reached here among the young people. We are not suggesting that Miss Mills' influence is the only one working along this line, but it is a fact that it is very powerful.

We look on the play feature of the school course as just as important as that of study. Boys and girls who learn to play well have received a large part of their training for the contests of later life. Unfortunately here we are somewhat handicapped in this matter, on account of the difficulty of securing proper grounds, but in spite of this, there is great activity among the boys and girls, an impetus toward which is the generally cool weather which obtains here.

That the work of Miss Mills in teaching the pupils to make the most of their play opportunities, is appreciated by the pupils themselves is shown in the recent presentation made to her by them. We take great pleasure in voicing the sentiment of a large part of the community in expressing to Miss Mills appreciation of the public of the splendid work she is doing in the city.

**Longshoremen's Strike
Becomes Interesting.**

The strike of longshoremen is being taken up by the business men and it is possible there may be some developments in the near future. The News has given the men's side of the controversy and also that of the company. Last night a group of local business men wired Mr. Hinton asking for arbitration. 

Mining News

The Kitselas Mountain Copper Company's concentrator at Usk has been running steadily during the past week and considerable development has been proceeding at the mine at the same time. Much high grade ore is being handled and recently a new vein has been scraped off along the face of the mountain and some fine samples have been taken out and sacked for shipment. A tunnel on the level of the ore bunkers has been run in several hundred feet to tap the vein. Drifting and stoping will now follow. The ore carries gold, silver, mercury, copper and other elements in smaller percentages.

Almost immediately now will the work start on the wagon road up the Salmon River to the Big Missouri Flats. This news will not only be greatly received by the companies operating in the district but by everyone interested in the progress of Stewart. Construction of the road will make it possible to carry on much earlier shipping besides hastening the further development of new and rich showings. Very probably the road will be finished before the winter sets in and will be made as permanent as present conditions permit. Geo. Clothier, the district engineer, made the recommendation some time ago and when Hon. William Sloan made a personal visit to the district the matter was finally settled.

Statistics of the world's gold production for 1919 indicate that Canada was the only country to record an increased output. The estimated value of the gold mined last year is about \$350,000,000, a decrease of 6 per cent compared with 1918 and of 25 per cent compared with 1915. Last year 70 per cent of the total was produced within the British Empire, where the decrease amounted to only 2.3 per cent. This relatively favorable result was largely due to the stimulating effect which the premium on gold had on mining in South Africa during the last quarter of the year. On the other hand, the output from Australian mines decreased by 16 per cent. In the United States there was a decline of 14.5 per cent, and there is likely to be a further marked decrease this year.

During last week thirteen cars containing over a million pounds of ore went out from Cobalt. This constituted a record shipment for many months. The total approximated 520 tons.

AMERICAN AIRMAN SANK TROOPSHIP

LONDON, June 21.—An American airman sank a Bolshevik troopship in the Dnieper River in the Polish-Ukraine drive that resulted in the capture of Kiev.

RETURNED MAN IS ACQUITTED

Charged with Misappropriating Money should Never have been Made, says Chief Justice

"Not Guilty," was the verdict given in the case of Rex v Driscoll by the jury without retiring, after being directed by Chief Justice Hunter to return that verdict.

Driscoll was accused of receiving \$235 from the Soldier Settlement Board and not accounting for the monies. This money was received from the sale of a mare and colt to one Bowden, the mare and colt having been purchased through the Soldier Settlement Board and to be their property until paid for. The animals remained in Driscoll's possession from September, 1919, to January 20, when he disposed of them. Driscoll had, however, according to the prosecution, received permission from the superintendent of the S.S.B. to sell the animals provided he refunded the money due the S.S.B. He had not refunded the money, hence the charge. There were two other charges of a similar nature.

Could Not Prosecute

Chief Justice Hunter, after reviewing the depositions, told the Crown that if the charges in the depositions were all they had, he could not see his way clear to prosecute under the criminal act, and that on those charges Driscoll should never have been brought into the criminal court, as it was a case of common debt. He then directed the jury to return a verdict of "Not Guilty," which the jury did. The other two charges were quashed.

The Chief Justice advised Driscoll to settle the accounts and to get right with the community. The jurors were: A. E. Forrest, foreman; Ed. Ball, F. McArthur, A. F. Greene, J. Leith, J. D. Cornings, Harry Avison, K. A. Houghtaling, W. G. D. Harper, G. C. Hartley, W. C. Flynn and Emil W. Person.

TERRACE BOOMS SAYS EDITOR

School Population Doubles in a Few Months and Land Sells Fast.

Land is selling fast in Terrace and the school population has doubled within a few months. That is the news brought to town by E. E. Chandler, editor of the Terrace News, who is here for a few days in connection with a drainage scheme for the city. There are a few swampy spots which can be easily drained and which will reclaim a good deal of good land.

wanted at this time of year when the tourist-business was on. If the company would not haul the freight, they should take action. He asked if it was not true that the longshoremen had not only been treated without courtesy but had actually been insulted by the G. T. P. officials. He suggested that they would not be strike-breakers, any more, but that if they did not settle with the men an independent steamship company should be asked to enter the business. The longshoremen were not used well. They were willing to arbitrate the matters at dispute but the company was not.

Untimely Action.

S. E. Parker suggested that it would be ill-advised to take untimely action. That would be the way of the opportunist. They should look to the morrow. He suggested that they should advise arbitration. He held no brief for the G. T. P. but he thought the merchants should hesitate before acting.

G. C. Mills of the Kelly Douglas Co. said that no stone had been left unturned in efforts to get freight sent here. He had heard both sides of the question and he believed the longshoremen were earning more money here than at Vancouver. The G. T. P. did not hesitate to show them figures on it.

H. S. Wallace suggested that the merchants should act as an arbitration board, and this was supported by J. B. Roerig.

D. G. Stewart thought it would be better to wire to Ottawa and get an official board appointed.

G. W. Nickerson said that if the cost of handling freight was higher here than at Vancouver they should not advocate paying more. If the G. T. P. figures were correct the men were lying down on the job.

Not Men's Fault.
J. C. Gavigan suggested that it was not the men's fault, but that the equipment here was not up to date. The checkers were often not able to keep the work going. The G. T. P. did not provide sufficient help.

Mr. Nickerson: "The local team last year unloaded the boat cheaper than the longshoremen ever did."

Mr. Gavigan: "Often there was only one checker here to ten truckers."

Mr. Parker suggested that it cost more to discharge a boat with a side hatch such as the big G. T. P. boats than it did for the Beatrice and other boats with open hatches. There was a lack of shed accommodation here.

Mr. McLachlan expressed the opinion that the longshoremen should not be held responsible if the equipment here was not up to date.


