MARTIAL LAW ASKED FOR IRELAND BY UNIONISTS LONGSHOREMEN'S STRIKE MAY BE ARBITRATED UNDER CONCILIATION ACT

Battle Royal Being Fought in Streets of Londonderry

Many Killed and More Wounded; Barricades Erected in
Streets; Unionist Members Ask for Martial Law

LONDON, June 23.—In Londonderry today there is no cessation of the fierce battle between the Unionists and Nationalists. Barricades have been erected on the streets and the men are fighting behind these. Many are dead and more are injured. Looting continued throughout the night.

The Unionist members of Parliament demand that martial law be declared in Ireland. They say that the viceroy and his secretary are virtually prisoners in their own houses.

Assizes Opened and Grand Jury Consider Charge Against Duff and Leahy.

The Assize Court opened this morning before Chief Justice Hunter and the first case called was that of Rex vs. Simon Duff and Richard Leahy. W. E. Wisher appeared for the crown and Stuart Henderson for the defence. The grand jury was sworn and retired to consider the evidence given at the police court trial and the court then adjourned. Duff was present in court but Richard Leahy, who has been serving a sentence at Okalla Prison Farm for selling liquor, did not arrive on the steamer. The court was to sit again this afternoon at 2:30.

Superintendent Beaumont this morning received word from the head office of the steamship line in Vancouver saying the embargo had been raised for all those consignees who were willing to discharge their freight on arrival here.

W. C. Orchard has also received word from his company that the embargo is lifted in regard to their steamers.

WOMEN NOMINATED FOR LEGISLATURE

WINNIPEG, June 23.—Some 150 citizens, including four women, were nominated yesterday in connection with the provincial elections which take place June 29. There are fifty-five seats, many of which are being contested by independents. There are 16 farmers and nine labor candidates.

The Tillamook has arrived in port from Alaskan waters with over three hundred barrels of herring oil as a cargo. Last year the packers in the north salted down many thousands of barrels but this year as the bottom of the market seems to have dropped out for this particular product, they have begun to manufacture fertilizer and oil from the herring.

KIDNAPPED GIRL WHO ESCAPED

Miss Helena George, the pretty twenty-one-year-old Italian girl who was kidnapped by three men in a big touring car in Brooklyn, N. Y., while on her way to work, succeeded in tricking her captors in a lonely house on the outskirts of the city, and returned safely to her home. She had pretended that she was willing to marry the cave-man suitor and received permission to telephone home. Instead she enlisted a policeman's aid. The police are searching for the would-be cave-man, and will charge him with attempted abduction when caught.

CRIMINAL JOKER CAUSED A PANIC

People in Vancouver Apartment Pitched Furniture Out of Windows Thinking Was Fire.

VANCOUVER, June 23.—As a result of a false alarm sent in by a criminal joker scores of residents of Blenheim Court apartment suites came near panic last night. For an hour they were pitching their belongings out of the windows and carrying them out of doors.

PRINCE ARTHUR NEW GOVERNOR OF SOUTH AFRICA

LONDON, June 23.—Prince Arthur of Connaught has been appointed governor-general of the Union of South Africa in succession to Viscount Buxton. He visited British Columbia in 1918.

OTTAWA, June 23.—The Franchise Act amendment has passed the House of Commons giving Japanese veterans who fought with the Allies a vote in federal elections only.

Farmers Oppose Aid Shipbuilding

T. A. Crerar gives "Need of Retrenchment" as reason; Finance Minister Drayton says Security is Good

OTTAWA, June 23.—The Progressives, or in other words, the farmers' party, is opposing the Government's plan of endorsing the notes for the purchase of ships to be built in Canadian yards. T. A. Crerar, their leader, formerly a member of the Union Government, said the reason for their opposition was the need of retrenchment.

Hon. G. G. Ballantyne, minister of marine, replied that 25,000 men were employed in the shipyards of Canada and one-fourth of them were veterans.

Finance Minister Drayton expressed the opinion that the security was good.

Arbitrate Strike Difficulty Under Law as Provided

W. P. Hinton expresses Views of G.T.P.
in regard to difficulty with
Longshoremen

VANCOUVER, June 23.—W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager of the G.T.P., interviewed here this morning regarding the Prince Rupert merchants' appeal for arbitration of the strike dispute between the company and the longshoremen's union, said: "This question must first come under the Industrial Disputes Act. Outside of this no decision will be made by the company."

Mr. Hinton expressed surprise at a message received here in regard to amalgamation of the G.T.P. and the G.N.R. with a view to co-ordinating the work of the Vancouver offices.

Mr. Hinton said he would be staying here for four days.

Peck withdraws Amendment to Report of Committee on Pensions before House

OTTAWA, June 23.—The House of Commons has turned down the amendment of Colonel Peck in connection with the matter of pensions and adopted the report of the committee of which Colonel Peck was a member, dealing with the whole subject of pensions and reconstruction. Peck withdrew his amendment when he found that it could not carry. In doing so he said that rather than run the risk of delaying the benefits to be obtained from proposed legislation and after having tried to include subsidies to fishermen he would withdraw his amendment. He tried to include in the report the granting of subsidies to soldier fishermen as the only way of reopening the question of the rights of returned men.

EARNINGS OF LONGSHOREMEN SHOOT OFFICIAL

Official Figures Provided by Delegation from the Union
Assistant Director of Constabulary Wounded in Head and
Cheif in Legs.

DUBLIN, June 23.—The assistant director of the Irish constabulary has been shot and badly wounded in the head. He was attacked when riding in an automobile by a party with revolvers and bombs. His escort returned the fire.

The driver of the car was hit in both legs, but he kept driving and a running fight was maintained for some distance, during which the assistant director was shot in the head.

MINING CAMP BUILDING BOOM

TWO CABARETS AND MANY RESIDENCES GOING UP AT ALICE ARM

Alice Arm is now undergoing a building boom and new buildings of varied architecture are being erected all over the town. In the last year the increase in buildings has been very noticeable the number having about doubled. The new building is about evenly divided on the new Alice Arm Development Co.'s townsite and the original site now belonging to J. M. Morrison.

A new three story hotel is in the course of erection by Anton Serbich and should be ready in a few weeks' time. Room accommodation here is as scarce as all reports on the outside have stated and every available bed in the place is always occupied. This fact accounts for shacks and tents rising almost overnight.

Two large cabarets built of logs are also in course of erection and will be opened shortly. On account of the scarcity of lumber and the difficulty of transportation, logs are being used largely in the new buildings. There are many skilled loggers in the place and the buildings put up are of first class architecture and construction.

The camp seems to be taking on an established air that it has never possessed in the past and all the residents are filled with confidence at the outlook. Although work has not actually commenced this summer in full swing, in another month's time the height of the season should be on and all should be fully occupied.



BAD CONDITION IN TORONTO

Tightening of Money Causes Merchants to be Embarrassed and Consequent Failures in Business

The following received from Toronto from one of the largest merchants in his own line of retail stores may be of interest:

"So far as business is concerned there ain't any; in fact, the backwash season, the curtailing of credits by the banks, together with the budget, have jointly and severally put the skids under several firms already. They have not been able to dispose of their businesses as going concerns, nor have they even been able to sell their leases. With their stake gone, nothing remains for them but to close down."

"This burg is slow enough when in bonanza, but when a slump like this comes along, all the money goes out of circulation in the first fifteen minutes; the people simply won't buy anything and the clothing trade, and in fact dry goods generally, is particularly embarrassed, with the result that the reaction is felt everywhere. I doubt whether things will improve at all this year; and it looks as if the fall will see many more firms out of business and very much unemployment through the winter—a cheerful prospect."

Editor Daily News:

As Mr. Hinton gets older he does not seem to have any more regard for what he says than he did in his youth.

For a great many years he has been telling us what great things the railroad was going to do here and he would come back next year and tell us it all over again, and our papers would publish it and laugh to himself.

But this time he has made statements to a committee of citizens which are so far from the truth they ought to be corrected.

I have just returned from Vancouver, and while there I looked into the prices of various things I did not see a thing that was dearer in Vancouver than it is in Rupert, even fish. All kinds of clothing, overalls, boots and shoes are away cheaper there than here. Meats are only a little over half the price there, all you have to do is to read the ads. in the paper and you will see for yourself.

Mr. Hinton tells us how many dollars per month the longshoremen are receiving. I do not know anything about that. He may be correct, but if we are to judge him by his other statements I would say that the men are getting about one hundred and fifty dollars per month.

I am not saying anything about the merits of the strike, but this I will say, that any man working here should have at least fifteen per cent more than is paid in the cities to the south.


