# Last Act But One in Liquor Drama

## DOMINION PARLIAMENT ONCE MORE NEARS CLOSE OF ITS ARDUOUS LABORS

### Duff Found Guilty by Jury Of Stealing Some Liquor

Will be Sentenced at Close of Assizes; Nothing Specific about Verdict brought in Yesterday Afternoon

It was a tense scene in the Assize Court yesterday afternoon when the jury, which had heard the evidence in the Duff theft case that concluded in the morning, returned and gave a verdict of "guilty."

Chief Justice Hunter, who was the presiding judge, reminded the jury that there were two charges, one of stealing and the other of theft from a dwelling.

The jury again returning announced that they found Simon V. Duff guilty of stealing.

Sentence was reserved until the end of the assizes.

Quickly the news spread over town, for the case is a notorious one and there has been much speculation as to the eventual outcome. The fact that Duff was a police constable when the offense was committed and also that he was a returned soldier added to the interest taken in the proceedings. Since Thursday morning the case had been going on and the court room was crowded most of the time.

The prosecution, for stealing followed a conviction for selling liquor contrary to the provisions of the Prohibition Act on which Duff was liberated on a technicality.

W. E. Fisher prosecuted on behalf of the crown and Stuart Henderson of Victoria defended.

### QUARTER CIGAR A DAY TO PAY FOR HOSPITAL

So Said Dr. McEachern at Hospital Convention in Vancouver

VANCOUVER, June 26.—A stinging reply to the Vancouver property owners who boast that they killed the money bylaws, including a vote of half a million dollars for hospitals, was given by superintendent McEachern of the Vancouver General Hospital at the Hospitals' Convention in session here.

Their sacrifice would have amounted to half a cigarette or a quarter of a cigar a day," declared Dr. McEachern, quoting statistics.

The delegates agreed with Hon. Dr. Young that the tax seemed essential.

### LARGE PROFIT ON KNITTING

Earnings of Mills Ran from 69 to 510 per cent

OTTAWA, June 26.—A report of the Board of Commerce made public here shows that some Canadian knitting mills made profits of from 69 to 510 per cent on their common stock investment for two years. The companies reinvested their surplus earnings.

### LUMBER RATE TO THE ORIENT DROPS \$10 TON

No Change on Canned Fish Yet;  
Herring to be Considered  
Later.

VANCOUVER, June 26.—The Pacific Coast Oriental Tariff Bureau in conference here has reduced the freight rates from here to the Orient on lumber from \$35 to \$25 a ton.

The canners' rate of \$16 stands. Salt herrings will be discussed by the bureau later.

A reduction will be made on cotton from the south as against Gulf ports.

### LEAHY ARRIVES FROM OKALLA FARM

Will be Tried Before Chief Justice Hunter on Monday.

Senior Constable S. North arrived from Vancouver on the Prince George this morning bringing with him in custody Richard Leahy who will appear at the Assizes on Monday morning on the charge of whiskey stealing. Constable North was chief constable in the city of Vancouver but since that time has been with the provincial police. He brought the prisoner from Okalla Farm where he has been serving a sentence for a breach of the Prohibition Act.

### STRUCK WITNESS AS LEAVING THE COURT

Simon Duff, After Being Convicted, Hit Witness in Face.

Information was laid at the provincial police office yesterday that ex-Constable Duff when leaving the court house in charge of Constable Ackroyd struck one of the witnesses, Matt Videck, twice with his fist on the face as he was passing him. No charge against Duff was laid.

### M'ADOO BOOM

Texas Delegates Wearing Hat Bands "Mac Will Do It."

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—Postmaster Burleson says the Texas delegation is voting for McAdoo at the Democratic convention. On the hatsbands of the delegates is "Mac will do it." The source of the McAdoo boom seems mysterious.

### GOVERNMENT HOME FOR MENTAL CASES

VANCOUVER, June 25.—Hon. J. D. MacLean in addressing the Medical Association here intimated that the Government would establish a convalescent hospital for mental cases.

### DEADLOCK IN LOCAL STRIKE

Mayor Proposes Wiring Minister of Labor at Ottawa Asking for Conciliation Board.

There is a deadlock between the striking longshoremen and the company, and with the purpose of trying to break it Mayor McClymont stated this morning that he proposed telegraphing the Minister of Labor at Ottawa asking for the appointment of a conciliation board.

The mayor said there seemed no hope of effecting a settlement by any other means than the one he proposed to take.

### FOUR DROWN NEAR MONTREAL

Woman Tries to Save Life of Niece and Loses Her Own and Daughters.

MONTREAL, June 26.—Sacrificing her life to save her little niece, Mrs. Wilfred Hamilton, who was taking a vacation at Vandeneuil, was drowned in Lake St. Louis with her Daughters, Joette and Louise. The other victim was Helen Hamilton, daughter of the proprietor of a department store here.

The children were bathing when the mother went to the aid of her niece who was drowning. The little daughters, twelve and six years of age respectively, became terror stricken and rushed after their mother and all were drowned.

### NEW MOTOR ACT IS EFFECTIVE JULY 1

Only Applies to New Licenses Taken Out after End of Month

VICTORIA, June 26.—The new Motor Act becomes operative July 1. The regulations do not affect the 1920 car owners.

New cars licensed from now on pay the registration fee of \$10 and a license based on the new scale.

### BIG MEETING DISCUSSES PROHIBITION

Joe Martin said He Voted for Prohibition and Would Do So Again.

VANCOUVER, June 26.—At a packed meeting in Dominion Hall last night a resolution was passed unanimously asking for the repeal of the Prohibition Act, favoring the Government sale of malt and spirituous liquors, but emphatically denouncing that the saloons be not restored. Henry Bell-Irving presided.

Joe Martin addressing the meeting, said he voted for prohibition in 1916 and would do so again, but not for the present law.

J. H. Haworthwaite, M. P. P., said: "Christ never called on the police or filled the jails to enforce the moral law."

### DEMENTED MAN KILLS HIMSELF

Gets Constable's Revolver From His Grip and Inflicts Fatal Injuries.

On the last trip of the Prince Rupert south, a provincial constable boarded her at Ocean Falls having in his care a patient suffering from mental derangement. The constable took the patient to his cabin and locked him in along with his grips, while he went on deck. Immediately the policeman had gone, the man broke open the grip and secured the constable's revolver and attempted to kill himself, firing two shots at his own head. The man did not succeed in killing himself at once and was taken ashore to the hospital, but died soon afterwards.

The shooting caused no little alarm on the steamer, one of the buoys passing very close to two young ladies who were passing along the corridor.

Chief Minty received a wire from Constable Beeaven a short time before going to press that the coroner's jury had returned a verdict of suicide in the case of the man whose name is now found to be Smart. A rider to the verdict was attached exonerating the policeman in charge.

### ORE STRIKE ON ROYAL GROUP AT ALICE ARM

Rich Free Ruby Silver Assaying 231 oz. Close to the Dolly Varden Mine.

VANCOUVER, June 26.—A big silver strike has been made on the west side of the Royal group at Alice Arm close to the Dolly Varden mine, wires Manager McLennan today. He says they have struck Number 4 lead of the Dolly Varden and are getting rich free ruby silver, assaying 231 ounces.

The lead is twelve feet wide and has been traced for 300 feet on the surface. It has the same capping as the Dolly Varden.

### Commons Prorogues on Tuesday Next

Grand Trunk gets Grant of \$25,000,000 to Enable it to Carry On; More Money for Ministers

OTTAWA, June 26.—It was announced in the House of Commons yesterday that prorogation would take place on Tuesday next.

The Premier announced that there would be increased indemnities for ministers of the crown and for judges of the superior and provincial courts.

Supplementary estimates were tabled including a \$25,000,000 loan to the Grand Trunk Railway to meet a deficit on construction work, bond guarantees, etc. There were other estimates for public works, harbors, etc., amounting to \$1,977,798.

### MERCHANTS DISCHARGE A HEAVY FREIGHT

Prince George Brought 181 Tons for Northern Points.

On this trip which is No. 418 the Grand Trunk steamer Prince George left Vancouver for the north with 181 tons of freight. 14½ tons were left at Ocean Falls, 9 tons at Swanson Bay, and half a ton was for the Prince John which sailed for the islands at 12 o'clock today. 28 tons will be kept on board for delivery at Stewart and the balance, 132 tons, is being unloaded by the merchants here this afternoon.

Those who were making shipments by the Prince John this morning were kept busy up to noon trucking their own and assisting the others to get their shipments over to the slings.

### FINED IN COURT FOR BREACH OF PEACE

In the police court this morning before Magistrate McDermie there were convictions in two cases for drunkenness and two for fighting. Yesterday afternoon Sergeant Adams was summoned to the Royal Hotel where a great crowd had gathered around the scene of an affray taking place on the sidewalk. The two principals, Wm. Mustokas and George Dirsches, were placed under arrest and brought to the station. This morning they were both fined \$15 or thirty days for breach of the peace.

George Campbell and James Campbell who both belonged to the same party but who had not been mixing things so freely, were each fined \$10 and costs for being drunk.

### WOMAN FINED

Freda Gold Gets Off With Light Sentence After Pleading Guilty.

In the police court today the adjourned case of Mrs. Hearch, alias Freda Gold, came up for final adjudication and the accused was fined \$50 and costs of \$90.50. The original charge was that of the theft of a long list of articles from Lillian Russell, which was amended to lead the theft of two articles which were proven by the police to have been stolen.

The woman being held on the charge pleaded guilty and the \$140.50 fine was imposed on the condition that restitution of the two articles be made. L. W. Patmore appeared for the accused.

### O.B.U. CANNOT SURVIVE LONG SAYS GOMPERS

International Leader Says It Has Done Nothing and Started From Nothing.

VANCOUVER, June 26.—Samuel Gompers arrived here unexpectedly yesterday and remained thirty minutes between the time of arrival of the train and leaving on the boat for Seattle.

Interviewed here by a press representative, Mr. Gompers expressed himself briefly on labor matters. He pronounced the One Big Union abortive, and told of the recent growth of the internationals.

"The O. B. U. started from nothing, it has done nothing and it cannot survive long," declared the big labor-leader.

### GREEKS TAKE 8,000 TURKS

Capture Much Booty Including Guns in Neighborhood of Smyrna.

LONDON, June 26.—The Greeks captured 8,000 Turkish Nationalists near Smyrna. Guns and booty were taken and the invaders now occupy Smyrna Post Office, the port and the Captain's headquarters.

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

### Not in Sympathy With Price Control.

A dispatch received yesterday from Ottawa telling of the resignation of the last surviving member of the Board of Commerce, the price control body of the Dominion of Canada, is enlightening. Everyone thought that the activities of the Board were simply a sham. Now they know it. A member of the Board tells us that the cabinet was never in sympathy with the operation of the Commodity and Fair Prices Act. Anyone else would have said the same thing, but it might not have had as much weight as coming from the labor member of the commission.

One instance of the futility of the activities of the Board was seen when the paper mills refused to supply the newspapers of Canada with paper and insisted on sending the product out of the country. The Board of Commerce issued orders which were completely ignored by the paper mills and the mills eventually won out because the Government refused to back up its own officials in carrying out their duties. The incident was a farce.

### Another Curious Case in Point.

The Dominion Government has on more than one occasion banned from circulation in this province some of the publications of W. R. Hearst because of their strong anti-British and pro-German sentiment. These journals openly derided everything British and sympathized strongly with the enemy during the war. Yet in order to publish these journals it is necessary for Hearst to secure Canadian pulp and paper. Canadian publications were unable to secure paper to keep their presses running, and all the time the paper was being sent to the United States to enable Hearst to continue his campaign of slander against us. The Government in this case was impotent. Why? Because shares in the company were held by the controllers of the Government.

### Unionists May Change Name.

It is reported that the Unionists may change their name before the next general election. There is no objection to that, but we would like to suggest that it would be much better for the Unionists to change their policy and their leaders. There might then be a possibility of their returning to power. The people will not likely allow themselves to be camouflaged by a change of name.

There are some good men in the Unionist cabinet. There are many good men supporting the Government, but the people as a whole are undoubtedly tired of the spineless policy shown by the administration and if an election were held today there would be a complete change in the personnel of the Dominion Parliament. Possibly the Government may yet retrieve itself. There is, however, no sign of any such change taking place.

It must be admitted that these are trying days for governments. There is opposition to almost everything. There is one thing that the country seldom forgives, however, and that is vacillation and weakness. A strong leader can carry a party, even in the wrong direction. He can put over a pernicious policy. He can make people believe in him, even when he is far from the path of rectitude. A weak leader gets nowhere.

### Board was Cabinet's Own Child.

It is possible that the appointment of a Board of Commerce was not the best method of controlling prices and supply. It must be remembered, however, that the Board was the Government's own child. It was appointed under its own legislation and certainly under those circumstances should have been supported. Apparently what the Government wanted of members of the Board was that they should try to make a showing to the country and at the same time see that nobody connected with the administration was injured.

## VANDERHOOF CASE IN COURT YESTERDAY

Trial is Adjourned Until Monday  
Afternoon.

Yesterday afternoon in the Assize Court the case of Vanderhoof vs. Rimes was opened with L. S. Morris of Smithers appearing for the plaintiff and Alex. Young and Groat, Prince George, for the defendant. The dispute arose in the early part of the year over the publication of the paper The Vanderhoof Herald, and the Northern Chronicle.

Herb J. Vanderhoof has property on the south side of the track at the townsite of Vanderhoof and there he started the newspaper The Vanderhoof Herald. He had 1/2 per cent interest in the Rimes Publishing Co., with W. J. Rimes as the other interested party. W. J. Rimes was editor of the sheet and received a salary. Later on the partnership was dissolved without the apparent proper knowledge of the plaintiff.

Rimes moved across the track and started a new paper known as the Nechako Chronicle. He had taken some of the machinery too, but what was not his own he claims to have returned. On account of the great local rivalry the case has assumed great importance for the flourishing little town.

The preliminary evidence was taken yesterday afternoon and the case was adjourned until 2:30 on Monday afternoon.


