Vice-President of G. T. P. Optimistic DOMINION GOVERNMENT IS IN MELTING POT; PECK AND STEVENS MENTIONED

Railway will Show Profit Earlier than Was Predicted

Results will Confound Pessimists says W. P. Hinton in an Interview at Vancouver; Higher Rates necessary to Make Road Pay

VANCOUVER, June 28.—W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, who has been here for several days, interviewed here said: "Most of the prophecies in regard to the volume of traffic over the line between Prince Rupert and Edmonton have been shattered. There has been more traffic in and out of northern British Columbia than transportation men ever dreamed of. The G. T. P. northern line will confound pessimists of years past. It will show a profit much earlier than was predicted."

Mr. Hinton went on to urge support for the Canadian-owned line. Higher rates he said were necessary both on passengers and freight in order to make deficits vanish.

Democratic Convention in Session at San Francisco

Favorites for Nomination are McAdoo, Palmer and Cox. Nothing Expected to be Done Today

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—The National Convention of the Democratic party of the United States opened here this morning. The credentials committee were busy all morning and little was done which would be of interest to the public.

The favorites so far in the race for the nomination are McAdoo, Palmer and Cox. They are spoken of as the "big three." Very great interest is being taken in the big event, but it is not expected any steps will be taken towards nominating a man today. The platform will have to be dealt with and other matters taken up.

IN HOSPITAL AS RESULT OF ASSAULT

James Garrat Was Still Unconscious When Case Called In Court Today.

The case of J. J. Urlacher, charged with assaulting James Garrat by striking and kicking him and thus doing bodily injury, was adjourned until the morning of July 2. By that time it is hoped that the victim of the violent attack will have recovered from the effects. At the time of the calling of the court he was still in the hospital in an unconscious state. Very serious wounds were inflicted by the attacking party and word from the hospital today was to the effect that although the patient was still resting easily in a semi-conscious state, it was difficult to ascertain just how dangerous might be the complications.

R. Nelson and Gopal Singh appeared on a charge of drunkenness and were each fined \$10 and costs.

MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE MAKES CIRCULAR TOUR OF CENTRAL BRITISH COLUMBIA



Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture in the Oliver Government, who arrived in the city last night and went south on the steamer Prince George.

Mr. Barrow is not given to much talking but rather to action. He went up on the G. T. P., visited at different points, including Prince George, and arrived here on the train last night. He was accompanied by Col. Davis of the Land Settlement Board and the visit had to do partly with the workings of that organization.

Mr. Barrow said he was very pleased at the way in which the land settlement was operating in central British Columbia. A large number of new settlers were coming into the country.

COMMITTED FOR STEALING

Alleged Norris Held Woman's Hand and Stole Her Ring.

This morning in the police court before Magistrate McMorde Jack Norris, alias James Sullivan, was committed for trial on a charge of stealing a ring from Mary Annie Sayer on or about June 16. It was reported to the police at the time and the accused was brought to the station and searched. However, nothing was found and he was allowed to go free. Later on the woman again informed the authorities and the culprit was brought into the station by Sergt. Adams but this time the search revealed the missing article of jewelry inside the man's cap.

Besides the constables this morning, Mary Sayers and Ernie Pierce testified as to the occurrence of the accused's visit to the West End Rooming House about the time of the loss of the ring. Mrs. Sayers claimed that while fooling around Norris had held her hand, and that is what made her so sure that none of the others had taken the ring. The ring which was on exhibit she attested to be hers.

Ernie Pierce told of how he had met the accused at Swanson Bay and had gone to visit Mrs. Sayers on the day of the loss of the ring. When the accused was asked to give his testimony he maintained that he had never seen the ring before.

The Magistrate committed Norris for trial.

OLIVER-ELLIOTT LIBEL CASE IS GOING ON TODAY

C. H. French Kept on Jury Even Though Passage Booked to Nome.

VICTORIA, June 28.—The trial of R. T. Elliott for libel on the suit of Premier Oliver following the infamous letter sent during the closing hours of the Legislature to try to influence Parliament against passing the Dolly Varden bill, opened here this morning before Mr. Justice McDonald.

C. H. French, one of the jurors, had his passage booked to Nome and asked to be released, but this was refused. He was later elected foreman. The court room was crowded to watch the preliminaries.

It is expected that the trial will last until Wednesday.

DRUNKEN EUROPE CANNOT COMPETE SOBER AMERICA

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—William Jennings Bryan, who is here for the Democratic convention, interviewed on Saturday said: "Prohibition is not the main plank in the Democratic platform. This country will sweep the world. Drunken Europe cannot compete with sober America."

Harry Lipssett, who was one of the principal witnesses in the Duff case which closed on Saturday at the local assizes, returned to Vancouver on the Grand Trunk steamer last evening.

Peck and Stevens May Go to Cabinet

Both Mentioned as Possible Nominees; Reorganization of Cabinet Expected Directly After Session Closes

OTTAWA, June 28.—Rumors are busy here in regard to a general reorganization of the Union Government. It is said that Premier Borden is likely to retire as well as several of his colleagues. H. H. Stevens of Vancouver and Colonel C. W. Peck, V. C., of Prince Rupert are mentioned as cabinet possibilities.

The general opinion seems to be that if the Government is to carry on until after the census there will have to be a reorganization. There is another opinion that the present Government cannot stand the process of reorganization but that it will fall to pieces directly.

A good many names are mentioned for the premiership. When the salary advance was made at the week-end it was understood that it was for the new man who was to take the position directly after the session closes.

DUFF GETS A YEAR IN JAIL

Leahy Pleads Guilty and Has Three Months Added to present Sentence.

Sentence was given this afternoon in the cases of Rex vs. Duff and Rex vs. Leahy. Duff gets one year of hard labor in the common jail and Leahy three months added to his present sentence. Leahy pleaded guilty.

BRITISH LABOR IS AGAINST PROHIBITION

Large Majority Against at Convention at Scarborough.

SCARBOROUGH, Eng., June 28.—The British Labor convention here turned down prohibition by a very large majority. There were only 472,000 supporting it, whereas 2,600,000 votes were recorded against such a policy.

BREAK MILITARISTIC SPIRIT OF GERMANY

So Says Marshal Foch in Interview—London Could be Laid Waste in Night He Suggests.

PARIS, June 27.—The militaristic spirit of Germany must be broken, said Marshal Foch in an interview here. If given a chance they would fight with airplanes and they could lay London waste between dark and dawn.

PROVINCIAL ELECTION IN NOVA SCOTIA

HALIFAX, June 28.—A provincial election is to take place in this province. Nominations will take place on July 20, it is announced, and the elections on July 27.

COMING HERE TO VISIT FOR FEW DAYS

Mackenzie King is Bigger Man Than Expected, Says F. G. Dawson, who is Just Home.

Among the arrivals on the train last evening was F. G. Dawson, who has just returned from attending a meeting of the Liberal executive at Ottawa. He was very much enthused of the optimism of the eastern representatives, who feel sure that when an appeal to the country is made, the Liberal party will be returned to power.

The gathering was presided over by W. L. Mackenzie King, and Mr. Dawson says he is a far bigger man than he expected to find. He is well supported by all the leading Liberals of the country and has a complete grasp of affairs, which bodes well for the future of the country.

Mr. Dawson had a long conversation with Mr. King and arranged for him to visit Prince Rupert in the near future and to spend a few days here, when he will meet the people and find out their needs and be in a position to help them solve their problems. He is very much interested in the west and is keen on finding out about conditions here.

Speaking of crop conditions, Mr. Dawson says that everything seems late on the prairies but the crops are growing fast and everyone is hopeful.

**City Bonds
 Are for Sale.**

Prince Rupert people are often asking for new work to be done. They are keen on seeing the city improved. Now there is an opportunity to do something practical without hurting ourselves. There are some short-term city bonds for sale in small denominations. In order to get these it is necessary to drop in at the city treasurer's office and say you want them. Already some of these bonds have been taken, but not enough. If we expect other people to buy our bonds, we should surely not be backward about taking a few ourselves.

**What About
 Cost of Living?**

When one has to pay sixty cents for a pound of cherries and when notices from wholesalers come in saying there is an immediate advance of 25 per cent in all lines, it is difficult to realize that prices are going down. Perhaps they are not, but there is a very general feeling that they are.

It is an interesting situation and one that is causing much stir among merchants. Prices went up very fast and they may come down very fast, but, it is argued, not while the demand is greater than the supply.

It is well to remember, however, that when real estate took a slump there seemed no reason for it. There certainly was no change in supply and demand. It was simply a matter of psychology. Today there is a psychological move toward lower prices. Merchants are cancelling orders with wholesalers and everyone is watching and waiting and no one seems to know what to do next. What is certain is that prices are inordinately high and that the time is not far distant when they must come down, and the time may be right now. We shall all know before long.

**Money is Tight
 And Credits Short.**

Money is tight throughout the country, and at other places much more so than here. Banks will not lend, even on Victory Bonds except for purely productive purposes. There is a drawing in of credits and people will have to spend only money they have instead of money they think they have. All this may bring business to a saner basis.

In some of the larger cities the automobile vendors are going out of business, and these men will have to turn their efforts to productive work. They are in a position similar to that once occupied by the real estate salesman.

For anything that looks at all like extravagance the banks have shut down. Not a dollar can be obtained for the purchase of luxuries. Note issues are being gradually withdrawn in order to improve the Canadian credit, which, on an inflated currency had gradually become debased.

**Better Money and
 Lower Prices.**

Canada has debased her currency. Her note issues were too large and were not backed by a gold reserve. As a result her money was not worth its face value on the markets of the world. In the United States it was worth from ten to fifteen per cent less than par.

It is understood that the Government has set out to put the currency on a sounder basis. We do not hear the call of the Government for the notes that have been over-issued, but we soon feel the effect. If the paper currency is gradually assuming its normal value, so will prices of commodities naturally assume a nearer approach to normal value. With the drawing in of paper money by the Government there must go with it a downward tendency in prices of commodities, because the money supply is lessened, and it has become consequently more valuable.

There has been too much of a tendency on the part of the Government to make good deficits by working the printing presses overtime and turning out a few thousand more notes, and distributing them as currency. That must cease; in fact it has ceased and the result is already having a good effect on prices.

A. C. Hearnik returned to Vancouver last evening. He will be greatly missed in baseball circles during his absence as he was a very competent umpire.

Mrs. Fred Wesch and family and Miss May Martin were passengers aboard today's train for Terrace where they will holiday during the summer months.

G. McAfee of Georgetown was among those leaving for the south on the Grand Trunk steamer last evening. He will be away for a short time on a business trip.

The case of Rex vs. Richard Leahy which opened at the Assizes at 10:30 this morning was adjourned until 2:30 this afternoon upon agreement by both counsel. The petit jurors were excused until that time.

Up to one o'clock today no reply had been received by Mayor McClymont in regard to the wire which he sent regarding the local strike situation to the Minister of Labor at Ottawa. Advice is expected some time this afternoon as to what possible action may be taken to relieve the situation.

School Inspector Patterson accompanied by Mrs. Patterson and children left for the south by the boat last evening where they will spend the summer vacation. During the past year Inspector Patterson has been in charge in the north. Many new schools have been opened in a number of out of the way places. Next year it is likely that one or two High Schools will be opened between here and Prince George to accommodate the many children of the interior.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land raised to \$1 an acre, second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportional improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture of the claim.

Where pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record and receive a certificate of improvement in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided that improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the date of death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers whose pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS. Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole or part of land, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING. Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for granting of rights of range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for establishment owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

MUCH WOOL IS HELD BY THE GOVERNMENT

Great Britain Still Has Million Bales—And Another Million is Available.

LONDON, June 19.—The Australian wool trade is at the parting of the ways. In June the contract under which the Imperial Government bought the whole wool clip of Australia at a fixed price will expire and much discussion is now going on as to the procedure that is to be followed to bring the trade back to pre-war conditions. It would be impossible to jump back at a sudden bound to a free marketing of wool in London. To begin with, when the contract runs out, there will still be in Australia 1,000,000 bales of wool which has been both bought and paid for by the Imperial Government, and about another 1,000,000 bales in transit and unsold to England. Practically all this wool will have to be sold in Great Britain for civilian purposes and the interest of the Australian growers in it has not ceased although it has been paid for at the flat rate by the British Government. It was one of the terms of the last contract made with the Imperial Government that on all the wool not required for war purposes the growers should receive half the profit, if any, which the British Government makes on the resale of the wool for civilian use. At present prices this is a huge thing, for the whole world is crying out for Australian merino wool, and the result has been that at the sales in England during the last few months wool has fetched enormous prices—prices far in excess of the flat rate at which it was bought by the Imperial Government.

But while values are now unprecedentedly high, there would be small likelihood of their continuance if the London market was swamped by 2,000,000 bales of "contract" wool within a few months, to be followed immediately by the 1920-21 clip, which will be ready for sale at the end of the year.



Norma was idolized by the natives of Idyllwild. They never tired watching her work or her play. Before she left the reservation the Indians insisted upon giving a party in her honor. A huge celebration consisting of tribal dances and a barbecue was tendered her. She was made a princess of the tribe, the highest honor an Indian tribe can bestow on a woman.

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
