Big Libel Case in Courts at Victoria

EVERYONE IS WATCHING FOR THE BIG JAZZ CARNIVAL ON JULY 1 AND 2

Premier Oliver's Libel Suit Against R. T. Elliott Goes On Claim that Charges conveyed in Telegram were true denied; Counsel for First Minister uses Scathing Language

VICTORIA, June 29.—The Premier and hearing his lawyer, Elliott libel case is attracting great attention here.

Vulgar Graff.
In outlining the case yesterday afternoon, M. P. Jackson, counsel for Premier Oliver, spoke of the libel referred to in the allegations that the Premier was reserving northern lands chosen for soldier settlement, for himself. He described the allegations as a "vulgar graff." It was a poisonous, injurious lie, a distortion of facts, a malignant untruth.

Mr. Jackson admitted that the Premier had visited the vicinity of the Pelley Keith land in 1917, long before there was any talk of land for soldier settlement. He did not take any. In 1919, when the Premier was endeavoring to get his son back to farming, this land looked promising but no deal was made.

Cowper on Stand.
J. S. Cowper, M. P. P., the first witness, referred to the telegram handed Colonel McInosh in the house. The Premier had told Cowper he "would never bring in the legislation wanted." Reference was made to R. J. Cromie, publisher of the Sun, and of his activities with R. T. Elliott.

Cowper said that after discussing the Dolly Varden matter with

the Premier and hearing his lawyer, Elliott libel case is attracting great attention here.

C. J. White, lawyer for Pelley Keith, said the offer to sell lot 108, Ootsa district, was not intended as a bribe.

Mr. Jackson, for the Premier, said Pelley Keith and not the Premier elicited the interview regarding the sale of the land. He also said the Premier was willing to pay \$10 and not \$5 an acre for the land, if he could induce his son to go back to farming.

Pressed in regard to the Cromie incident, C. J. White said he went to Cromie in connection with the deal as one who was friendly with the Government and as the official Liberal mouthpiece. He was unaware, he said, that Cromie had been turned down on a \$10,000 subsidy for his paper.

Elliott's Lawyer
Mr. McLean for the defence declared the land was offered the Premier because Pelley Keith expected to get exemption on other holdings sought by the Land Settlement Board. The Government had just then started its policy of taxing undeveloped land.

INDIAN BALL TEAM ARRIVES

Three Launches Carry Players and Supporters from New Metlakatla.

At ten o'clock this morning the big launch Welcome sailed into the harbor, with many flags to the breeze, bringing the New Metlakatla baseball team and the first squad of rooters. There were 28 on board but two more boats arrived later; on in the day, the Key City with 38 passengers and the Good Mariner with 30 passengers. The trip was made by the Welcome in 12 hours, which is two hours better than the trip made last year. The trip was pleasant and the sea calm all the way.

The club from up the coast comes here with a very enviable record as they beat Ketchikan once and then played them 13 innings to a tie score. The personnel of the team is as follows: Jack Lops, Gordon Williams, James Evans 1st base and captain, Harold Hudson 2nd b., Billy Josiah 3rd b., Rony Atkinson ss., Phillip Hudson rf., James Williams cf., and Alfred Dundas lf. The manager, Everett Hudson, is a very popular man with the boys and he said this morning that they were going to make the Rupert boys step. The basketball players who made such a hit here, are back again on the team and are performing just as capably on the diamond.

Manager Hudson says: "We are going to play you and beat you, if we can, and then we'll stay and root for you against Ketchikan. When you come up north to play the return game on July 4, we'll still root for you but as soon as you come over to New Metlakatla to play us on our baseball ground which is above tide water, we quit and you'll have to bring your own bunch of supporters."

RAILWAY UP BEAR RIVER

Repairs Being Made to Enable Supplies to be Taken in.

Work is proceeding with the repairs to the railway up the Bear River by the Algonquin Syndicate to enable that concern to take in supplies for the work it is doing on the Fitzgerald property at Goose Creek and the George Bros. claims which they have bonded. A gas engine will be used to carry freight up the valley. The properties are about twelve miles from Stewart.

W. A. Maloche is in charge of the work up the valley. His principal, Mr. Vanophen, with Mr. Vanophen recently visited all the properties both up the Bear and Salmon rivers and arrived here on Sunday and is gone north on the C. P. R. boat. They have the Spider property 19 miles from Stewart and the Northern Light close to the Premier.

IS EXPLORING UNUK RIVER

Two Reconnaissance Parties to Cover Country Between Unuk and Salmon Rivers.

Two reconnaissance parties are being sent out by the Provincial Department of Mines this year under the supervision of George Clothier, district mining engineer, for the purpose of exploring the country between the Unuk River and Stewart. This country is all highly mineralized, it being the contact between the alluvial formation and the granite.

One of the parties has already gone into the Unuk River country and will work in a southeasterly direction meeting the other party which will go in this week from Salmon River and which will move over the divide to the Naas slope and northwesterly along the line of contact.

The party which is gone up the Unuk River; is made up of Phil McDonald, Carl Whitmore and Jack Kirkup. The other party is not announced yet.

The ground these parties will cover has not yet been explored and it may prove just as rich as Salmon River and Alice Arm.

CORONER'S JURY SAYS OFFICIALS RESPONSIBLE

Balmoral Fire Inquiry Ends at Vancouver and Non-Enforcement Given as Cause.

VANCOUVER, June 29.—Non-observance and non-enforcement of the fire protection laws, laxity of city officials and owners of property are the chief causes for the fire and consequent loss of life at the Balmoral Block last week, declares the coroner's jury.

FINE FISHING AT KHTADA LAKE BY LOCAL SPORTSMEN

A tired but contented fishing party returned yesterday afternoon from a trip to Khtada Lake and many envious eyes were turned in their direction as they plodded up Third Avenue with the tails of the big fellows sticking out of the basket. The party consisted of Geo. W. Bryant, George Gorkle, Mr. and Mrs. Ghet Neff and Mr. and Mrs. Ben Self. About 200 pounds of trout were landed altogether by the several members of the bunch. The heaviest fish weighed around the 6 1/2-lb. mark.

The only exciting feature of the trip was Ghet Neff's plunge into the cold waters of the lake. He went down to the float for a bucket of water and while stooping down to fill it slipped and took a nice dive towards the bottom. A wetting was the only satisfaction received from the escapade.

TWO MILLION VOTED FOR CANADIAN NAVY

Trying to Put Lid On the Cabarets.

Another effort is being made to put the lid on the cabarets. The bars too are to be somewhat curtailed in their activities, if the bylaw which was passed last night by the City Council becomes law. It has to be reconsidered and finally passed at the next meeting of the City Council. Then the question will be whether or not it can be broken by the courts.

Take away from the cabarets their singing and dancing, their near beer, and make them open to view of the people who pass to and fro on the streets, and much of their attractiveness would be gone. Take away the girls from the cabarets and bars and the cabaret is destroyed and the bar will languish and die.

Alderman Perry And New Bylaw.

Apparently Alderman Perry does not like the new bylaw. He commenced expressing himself at the meeting of the City Council last night, but was ruled out of order.

At a meeting, such as that of the City Council it is not in order to discuss any subject when there is no motion before the house. When Alderman Perry commenced to speak last night the committee had just reported and the motion to read the bylaw a third time had not been moved. Directly the alderman had been voted down and not allowed to speak, the third reading was moved and that would have been the time for him to express himself on the general provisions of the measure, at as great a length as he pleased. He says, however, that he will shoot his bolt on the motion for reconsideration and final passing.

We know nothing about the right or wrong of what Alderman Perry was about to say because he did not say it. We do not know why he disapproved of the bylaw, but we believe he should be given every opportunity to discuss this public question, whether we agree with him or not. There is nothing to be gained by refusing him an opportunity to speak his mind. Naturally the mayor and aldermen were tired of the bylaw last night after having discussed it in detail. In that case they should have simply reported it and left it at that, not tried to rush it through another stage without discussion. The intention of the provision for various readings of bylaws is that they shall not be rushed too quickly but that every opportunity shall be given for full and free consideration and discussion. It has become a habit to try to get through measures of this kind with undue haste. Then when they are upset later there is additional expense and labor involved.

Interesting Events Proceeding Today.

Two interesting events are proceeding today. There is the Oliver-Elliott libel suit being tried at Victoria and the Democratic Convention being held at San Francisco. In the former the reputation of the Premier of the Province is at stake; in the latter the fate of one of the big political parties of the United States may be decided. Both are important to us. Naturally we are more interested in our premier than in the President of the United States, but we are such close neighbors of the States and our business relations are of such an intimate nature that what concerns them concerns us.

TROPHY GIVEN FOR RIFLE SHOOTING

Dominion Rifle Association Recipient from W. C. Macdonald, Reg., Inc.

MONTREAL, June 28.—A challenge trophy has been presented by W. C. Macdonald, Registered, Incorporated, for rifle competitions in Canada, the prize being accompanied by permanent cash additions to be paid by the company. The challenge trophy is the "Brier" shield, which will be presented to the Dominion Rifle Association, and which is now in course of making here.

This is a sterling silver shield, mounted on a mahogany base, the shield being about two feet high and eighteen inches wide, of decidedly beautiful design and embellished with rifle competition scenes in heavy relief. It will be a permanent challenge trophy for the Dominion Rifle Association, with a suitable inscription bearing the name of the donors and the date 1920, the whole being surrounded by a wreath along the edges, one side maple leaves and the other laurels, while at the base are two rifles crossed behind a target, while at the top is a scroll, "Macdonald's Brier Shield."

The shield, which is valued at \$500, will be open for competition as an annual challenge trophy, to be competed for at the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association annual prize meetings at Ottawa, open to all members of the D.C.R.A., and will be held each year in charge of the officer commanding the winning team.

Provision has been made by the D.C.R.A. that each team competing for the trophy shall consist of eight men from any rifle association, to be competed for, ten shots at 300 and ten shots at 600 yards.

In addition to the shield to the winning team, the Macdonald Reg., Inc., will each year donate \$1,000 to be divided in prizes among the 182 best competitors, with five team prizes. The team prizes will run from \$36 down to \$25 for the best scorers down to \$4 for the lower prize winners.

\$500 Yearly for P.Q.R.A.

Besides this challenge trophy and series of cash prizes for the D.C.R.A., the W. C. Macdonald, Registered, Inc., have donated to the Province of Quebec Rifle Association an annual subscription of \$500 to be shot for annually at their prize meetings at the Pointe aux Trembles ranges to be known as "Macdonald's Brier Match." To this the P.Q.R.A. has decided to add \$75 annually as team prizes.

The "Macdonald's Brier Match" will be shot for annually, with ten shots each at 300 and ten shots at 600 yards, these matches to be open to all members of the P.Q.R.A.

In recognition of these handsome donations from the W.C. Macdonald, Registered, Incorporated, the councils of the Dominion and Province of Quebec Rifle Associations have sent letters expressing their warm gratitude to the company.

He told the Californians that he had resigned from his post at Prince Rupert chiefly because of the climate."

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.



DR. H. R. GRANT ON DIVORCE

Says Frequent Cases Indicate Lower Moral Standard

Last Sunday morning Dr. H. R. Grant made a particularly strong attack in his sermon against the public attitude today in regard to divorce. About twenty or thirty years ago he maintained that a co-respondent in a divorce case would practically have been ostracised. Naturally there were very few occurrences when civil action became necessary; but nowadays at almost every sitting of the Assizes there are three or four cases before the judge. This he felt denoted a depreciated public opinion as regard to the moral standard, apart from any Christian point of view.

Again too the minister attacked the modern political views and cited as an instance the recent Convention held in the United States in order to settle who should represent the Republican party for the presidency. He said the people had gone wild in their enthusiasm for Hoover, but the higher party interests decided upon another, a dark horse. Until actions such as these, which might be duplicated in Canadian politics, are stopped, there will be no healthy moral welfare for the Dominion and the world as a whole.

INJURIES FROM A DETONATING CAP RESULTED IN DEATH

VANCOUVER, June 29.—David Jamieson, 13 years of age, died of injuries caused by the explosion of a detonating cap which exploded. The boy struck the cap with a stone with fatal results.



BRITISH SHIPS SHELL TURKS

Kill Thousands in Asia Minor—Greeks Take Four Towns.

LONDON, June 27.—British warships have been shelling the Turk at Smyrna, Asia Minor, killing a thousand of the enemy. The Greeks later took four towns in the Smyrna district.

In the Crimea General Wrangel captured 10,000 Bolsheviks.

LESS THAN 2,000 REGISTER IN THIS ELECTORAL DISTRICT

Only 1747 people in this district so far have registered. There may be other names taken but not yet turned into the government agent. It is unlikely, however, that more than 2,000 have taken the trouble to register out of five or six thousand that should be on the list.

There is now only two weeks left in which to qualify as a voter.

In this district there are no less than 66 polling divisions and the names from each division are kept separate.

For Prince Rupert there are scarcely 1,400 registered, so there should be another 2,000 put on the roll during the next two weeks. It will be rather a serious matter if several hundred people find themselves unable to vote when election day comes.

REDUCTION PLANT NEAR KETCHIKAN

KETCHIKAN, June 29.—The Marine Products Company is installing a fish offal reduction plant at Seow Bay where they have leased the old mill site of the Arness Lumber company. Machinery will be shipped up from the States and installed as soon as possible.

Two other additional sites have been approved by company officials and will be erected as soon as arrangements can be made with canneries in the vicinity of the sites.

Alderman McLennan said that it was to put the places where beverages were sold in a position where they could be controlled. Alderman Perry then said that when he first read the bylaw it had given him a pain in the spine.

Out of Order. Alderman Dybbahn expostulated that an hour and a half had been spent in considering the details of the by-law and Alderman Perry should have criticized it then.

The mayor upheld Alderman Dybbahn, ruling Alderman Perry out of order.

An appeal was taken to the council, all the members voting to sustain the action of the mayor. The motion to read the bylaw a third time was carried, all voting for it except Alderman Perry.

Sport Briefs

The Game Conservation Committee for B. C. will hold its annual meeting in Victoria on July 21. Dr. A. R. Baker of Vancouver will be in the chair for the occasion.

In the friendly football game last evening between the Callies and the Trail Club, the former brought home the bacon to the score of 3 to 2.

George Farr won the fifteen-mile Marathon race at Vancouver on Saturday, his time being one hour, thirty-five minutes and five seconds.





REGULATE BARS AND CABARETS

No Girls to be Allowed Where Near Beer is Sold.

BOOTLEGGING CARRIED ON SAYS ALDERMAN

New Bylaw Considered in Committee at Council Meeting Last Night.

What is known officially as the "Beverages Bylaw" was discussed by the City Council last night in committee for a long time and this was practically the only business done. City Solicitor T. B. Hooper was present to advise on points of law, and all the aldermen were present with the exception of Alderman Casey, who has been away for a couple of months at his mine at Alice Arm.

The by-law is one designed to go away with the employment of women or girls in places where near beer is sold. It seems to be aimed particularly at the cabarets and bars.

Alderman McLennan, who is fathering the bill, explained that Vancouver was moving in the same direction as that aimed at in this measure. The aim was to prohibit women being in such places.

The mayor expressed the opinion that some of the houses conducted here were not much better than houses of assignation.

Bootlegging. Alderman Rochester suggested that bootlegging was carried on by women, who were better able than men to conceal liquor. This bylaw if passed would prohibit women being employed.

Alderman Murray, in discussing the clause making it an offense to sell to a person under 21 years of age, said he thought the person buying as well as the person selling should be punished. The city solicitor, however, explained that they had no powers to deal with that.

There was a lot of discussion of the provision for the removal of all boxes or inside rooms and the disallowance of back entrances. It was finally decided that windows must be uncurtained above four feet from the ground in order that it might be easy to see what was going on inside. No back door for the customers to enter or leave would be allowed except in the case of hotels.

No Dancing or Singing. Dancing and singing and the giving of concerts in such places is prohibited and no intoxicated person is to be allowed to enter. Also no sub-lease of part of the premises can be allowed, there being a special provision against any part of it being used as a taxicab station.

No license for such places will be granted near a school or church and they must close all day Sunday and from 12 to 6 every other night. The penalty for any breach of the bylaw is set at \$100 or sixty days' imprisonment, no lighter fee being allowed. The cost of such a license is to be \$200 a year.

PROSPECTING PARTIES GONE TO MOUNTAINS

Sixteen Returned Soldiers Under Government Scheme Working in This District.

In connection with the sending out of prospecting parties of returned soldiers, mention of which has been made before in this paper, the party from this district is made up of John A. Young, an experienced prospector, and John Murdock, both of Alice Arm. Young was the only experienced man who offered, and he picked his partner. They will prospect in the Alice Arm district.

Fourteen men have been sent north to this district, two going up Gardner Canal, two to Stewart, two to Alice Arm, two to Allin, two to the Naas and four to Hazelton. These have been placed under the direction of the local district engineer.

PROCEEDINGS AT COURT WHEN DUFF SENTENCED

Chief Justice Listens to Plea of Prosecuting Counsel and Gives Short Sentence.

In passing sentence yesterday afternoon upon Richard Leahy who pleaded guilty upon the second count of stealing liquor from Lipsett and Sweet, Chief Justice Hunter said that he had adopted the wisest plan. Already he was serving sentence for complication in the same case and saved the court considerable expense. He thought that he was not acting too leniently when he sentenced him to three months' imprisonment for the offense.

Before the other prisoner, Duff, was called upon to give any statement which he might wish to make, W. E. Fisher, counsel for the prosecution, asked that the sentence be not made a serious one. The ugly part of the offense was that Duff had been a police constable at the time of the offense. When he had returned from overseas the prisoner had suffered from a bad wound in the stomach which seemed not to have left him the same man. His mentality had been weakened and after beginning his duties well, apparently fell into temptation, which was too attractive for him to withstand.

Stuart Henderson, counsel for the accused, had nothing further to say.

The judge asked Duff if he had any statement to make and the prisoner made his reply in a very steady and audible tone. "However bad I may have got mixed up in this liquor business towards the end, there were certain influences which had bearing upon the whole case which were not brought out at the court. I wish to tell the court and the public that I was perfectly innocent of the theft."

The judge in passing sentence stated that, had it not been for the interference of the Crown counsel, he would have found it impossible to do otherwise than send him to the penitentiary. Now he sentenced him to a year's hard labor in the common jail.



POISON BAIT FOR HOPPERS

Effective Work Done in Southern Saskatchewan, Says University Professor.

SPLENDID PROSPECTS FOR SEASONS CROP

SASKATOON, June 28.—Dr. A. E. Cameron, entomologist of the University of Saskatchewan, has returned from an extensive visit to the southern part of the province, to North Dakota and Manitoba, where he has been studying the grasshopper outbreak. He is much pleased with the results being obtained by the use of poison bait, and declares that if the work is kept up on its present scale there will be practically no serious damage from the pest this year.

Much better results are being obtained on the Canadian than on the American side. This is due to better organization and also to the fact that all ingredients of the poison bait were bought cheaper in Canada. The grasshoppers in North Dakota hatched out earlier and are now nearer maturity. In one county where no effort was made to control them, the crops have already practically disappeared.

Crops Have the Start
In Southern Saskatchewan the hopper fighting organization is in excellent shape, the crop of grasshoppers has been very heavily diminished by the poison, and the crops, owing to the plentiful supply of moisture, now have a good start over the pests.

Farmers Optimistic
Dr. Cameron said that the farmers in all the districts he had visited were very optimistic and expected a bumper crop this year. He himself had never seen such excellent conditions in Saskatchewan. In some places the grasshoppers had eaten into a field for a distance of about a rod, but the dead hoppers were being found at the rate of several thousand to the square yard, and it was unlikely that any very extensive damage would result from the pest this year.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, is making a visit of inspection in the Okanagan and Kootenay country, especially in connection with the irrigation schemes which come under his department.

SELLING BRISK FISH EXCHANGE

Three Cars Available Tonight When Train Arrives From East.

With three fish cars available which are due on the passenger train tonight, selling was rather brisk at the Fish Exchange this morning.

One car went to Booth Fisheries at 17.1c and 7c to be made up from the Fisher with 12,500 lbs., Bartalome, 10,000 lbs., and Viola, 3,700 lbs.

The National Independent Co. got the second car at 17.2c and 7c to be made up from the Clara N., 7,000 lbs.; Dorreen, 13,000 lbs.; Verma, 5,000 lbs., and Mab, 1,500 pounds.

The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., Ltd., got the third car at 17.2c and 7c to be made up from the Fram, 8,000 lbs.; White Star, 10,000 lbs.; Ethel June, 4,000 lbs.; Margalice, 4,000 pounds.

Pauline, 11,000, to Gold Storage at 10.1 and 6.5. Lincoln, 12,000 lbs., to Atlin Fisheries, Ltd., 10.7c and 6.6c, and Tyce, 11,000 lbs., to Gold Storage at 10.5c and 6.6c.

Nuba, 10,000, to Booth Fisheries at 11.7c and 7.1c. J. P. Todd No. 2 with 13,000 lbs., to Gold Storage at 10.3c and 6.1c.

A considerable amount of salmon is now coming in and the four boats selling today received very good prices.

The Gatham with 1,900 lbs. of red and 100 lbs. white sold to Royal Fish Co. at 14c for reds and 5c for whites.

Torberg 6,500 red, 400 white and 12 cohoes, sold to B. C. Packers at 13.6c and 5c, and 35c per fish for cohoes.

The Mackerel with 7,900 lbs. red and 900 white to B. C. Packers at 12.6c and 5c.

The D. C. F., No. 1 with 7,000 lbs. reds and 400 lbs. whites sold to Gold Storage at 13.6c and 5c.

Last evening the B. C. Packers' boat the "B. C. P." sailed for the south at nine o'clock carrying in the hold about 75,000 lbs. of salted iced down. This cargo constitutes what has been bought at the sales here during the last few days. The fish will be used for freezing at the cannery at Steveston. This is rather a new venture and great interest is being taken along the waterfront in the project.

TAKE CENSUS OF SEAL HERD

Dr. Hanna on Way North to Undertake Work and Make Report.

Dr. G. Dallas Hanna, member of the staff of the California Academy of Sciences, is on his way to Alaska where he will make a census of the fur seals on the Pribilof Islands under the direction of the United States bureau of fisheries.

Dr. Hanna has been connected with this work each year since 1913. In 1919 it was reported that there were 510,000 animals in the herd. In 1910 when the government first took over the operation of the Island industry there were less than 200,000. During the time when this increase was taking place enough surplus and useless males have been killed and their skins sold at auction to provide the National Treasury with \$5,500,000 above all expenses, according to W. W. Sargent, secretary of the California Academy of Sciences.

The purpose of the census is chiefly to determine how many animals can be safely removed each year and still provide for a maximum percentage of increase of the herd. If the increase in 1920 continues as heretofore, it is said that there should be about 600,000 of these amphibious fur-bearers, by far the largest herd in existence, as well as a surplus of about 39,000 males which can be killed for their skins. At current prices of these furs they will be valued at about \$3,000,000.


