## RUSSIAN SUBMARINE SINKS BATTLESHIP

### RUSSIAN CENTRE RETIRING SLOWLY -- TWELVE KILLED ON BRITISH STEAMER

#### HON. ARTHUR MEIGHEN AND OPPOSITION OBSTRUCTION

H. F. GADSEY CRITICISES A RECENT SPEECH BY SOLICITOR-GENERAL—DISCUSSES LIBERAL ATTITUDE TOWARD THE NAVY—BORDEN AND THE NATIONALISTS

Ottawa, June 26.—The Hon. Arthur Meighen, who is the little busy bee of debate, lighting anywhere, sipping everywhere, stopping anywhere, got off a few casual remarks on the war and the Laurier navy at London which need checking up. As the Hon. Arthur was using the Masonic Temple as an auditorium at the time, one of the criticisms urged against him is that his arguments ought to have been more on the square than they were.

The Solicitor-General made the statement that the opposition did all it could to obstruct the war supplies and put stumbling blocks in the way of the government. As the opposition joined heart and hand with the government supporters in voting the two war funds of one hundred and fifty million dollars the solicitor-General's allusion is taken here to mean the proceedings in the public accounts committee which revealed some of the government's party friends as doing all they could to prevent the hundred and fifty millions from reaching the spot. If insisting that the people of Canada get a dollar's value for every dollar spent, if seeing, as in the case of the binoculars, that eight middlemen did not come between maker and purchaser; if showing up one Conservative member of parliament as taking three prices for surgical dressings and another Conservative member as unloading foundered horses at the top figure; if waving back all the lean and hungry party patriots who had organized to milk profits; if cutting out sham shoes and fake elections for soldiers; if any or all of these were factious opposition then the Hon. Arthur Meighen is right and the opposition is proud of it.

The next subject tackled was the Liberal attitude toward the navy. It is a big question which the solicitor-general so lightly opens and as it is one of the articles of the alleged truce which the government claims to be ob-

servating, Mr. Meighen's action in nibbling at it between elections has an appearance of bad form. The question will ultimately be thrashed out on the hustings and the old story will be told over again from those happy harmonious days in 1909 when Leader Borden and Mr. Foster and Premier Laurier were all agreed on what Canada ought to do for herself and the Empire, down to those later acrimonious days when the Conservative party, having come into power, found it necessary to make a play for their Nationalist allies and discard a permanent policy for a contribution.

Nobody would expect the solicitor-general, as a young man with his way to make in the Borden cabinet, to acknowledge that the Liberals were right and that if the Laurier naval policy had been carried out that this country would have been spared the humiliation of asking the British navy for cruisers to convoy Canadian soldiers across the ocean. Neither would anybody expect him to point out that the Laurier navy could have done much to protect the North Atlantic and keep the trade paths clear of Germans, not to mention covering British Columbia's nakedness and saving what Sir Richard McBride paid for two tin submarines.

Nobody would expect him to do any of these things because that might lead the question back too far and too deep, but he could make a long story short and put up an interesting speech at the same time by going as far back as 1911 and telling what Mr. Bourassa and his Nationalist friends said then in behalf of Premier Borden and his policies. The issue was supposed to be reciprocity, but as the game was to play both ends for the middle, the Laurier navy was the chief thing talked about in Quebec. The subject spilled over into Northern Ontario and Mr. Bourassa was brought into Nipissing and Algoma to help the Conservative candidate there. Messrs. Gordon and Smythe had voters who needed inflaming on this subject, and

#### RUSSIAN SUBMARINE SINKS GERMAN BATTLESHIP IN BALTIC

GERMANS ARE ADVANCING ON WARSAW—RUSSIAN CENTRE RETIRING—WINGS HOLD FIRM—DARDANELLES ATTACK HAS BEGUN—D. A. THOMAS ARRIVES IN NEW YORK

Petrograd, July 5.—A submarine, at the entrance to Dantzie harbor, blew up a German battleship of the Deutschland class, which was at the head of the German squadron. A Russian destroyer rammed and sunk a German submarine.

#### PICKING UP THE SILVER CUP LEAD

Last week Roy located the vein, but as it was in a bad place to work, he has since been following the vein down, twenty feet at a time, until he picks it up about a hundred feet below discovery. **KNOCKING**

Rev. A. E. Cooke, of Vancouver, is demanding that the McBride-Bowser government make a thorough investigation into the charges made in "The Crisis," and that gentleman is keeping the government papers very busy indeed. The various attitudes of the Conservative organs are amusing. The favorite method of retort is to declare the statements false, and to follow this up with personal attacks on certain members of the Ministerial Union.

The Victorian, a Conservative weekly published in the capital, takes a new line of argument on this uncomfortable subject. In an amiable, high-toned way it admits that "mistakes" may have been made in the past, but that this is no time for a man of Mr. Cooke's ability to be wasting his time on domestic matters, when he might be stumping the country in the cause of recruiting. When the war is over, there will be an investigation, but, meantime, the situation is so serious that Mr. Cooke would be better employed boosting British Columbia, instead of knocking.

Evidently, the man who successfully robs the people, and cleverly covers up his tracks, is a booster, while the man who, for the sake of the good name of British Columbia, tries to bring the criminal to book is a knocker. Such trivialities as the stealing of a few million acres of the most fertile land in the province should be forgotten, until the Germans are conquered. It would be just as logical to argue that all assizes should be abolished until after the war.

In spite of the fact that Sir Richard McBride purchased two broken-winded submarines the government of British Columbia is not conducting the war. An inquiry into the land grabbing charges would not interfere in the least with the

duties of the Hon. Sam Hughes, nor the operations on the western front, nor in the Dardanelles. Such an inquiry would not retard recruiting in the province or anywhere else, nor would it interrupt the operations of the Conservative commission agents, who produce nothing but unearned increment.

In concluding its article, the Victorian suggests that such an eloquent speaker as Mr. Cooke should go to the old land to enthuse the people there by showing them what the people of Canada are doing. It would be well for the Conservative organ to supply the gentleman with full instructions as to what he is to say, and what he is to leave unsaid, should he undertake the trip. The doings of the Canadian troops have raised the people of the British Isles to a tremendous pitch of enthusiasm, but we can only faintly imagine what would

they calculated that Mr. Bourassa was the boss fire bug. He is, in New Ontario he operated under the direct auspices of the Hon. Frank Cochrane who held the matches for him. To suggestions that Mr. Borden should substitute for Mr. Bourassa the candidates gruffly replied "We don't need Borden to win, we do need Bourassa." Thousands of copies of Le Devoir were circulated free to fan the breeze.

The solicitor-general need not have gone into the rise and fall of Mr. Monk, whose motives were sincere but he missed a lot of hot stuff when he neglected the outpourings of Mr. Bourassa and his band of hope. There is really no excuse for the oversight because of it, also the columns of Hansard the old files of Le Devoir are full where it has been put on record by industrious Liberal members.

Broadly speaking Mr. Bourassa was of the opinion that Canada had paid all her debt to England and that a Canadian navy would embroil Canada in Downing street wars and that Canadian husbands, sons and sweethearts were in grave danger of being dragged away by this sea monster and disembowelled by foreign cannon balls. Mr. Bourassa, to give him credit, still holds these opinions, but all his nationalist allies—in office at Ottawa—are singing the other tune now. It is sweet and becoming to die for one's native land so long as the native land is being run by the Conservative government. Circumstances, as Mr. Meighen will admit, greatly alter cases.

What did Mr. Alfred Sevigny say about it? Mr. Sevigny is now Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons and his sister Madame Plamondon sold pills to the militia department at twelve hundred per cent. profit. Deputy Speaker Sevigny is now waving the old flag now, but at that time he was wiping his boots with it. The flag

is quite an impersonal matter with these fellows—it's just a question of how many votes can be got with it one way or the other. What did Mr. Sevigny say? Oh! he said Laurier was an Imperialist. That his Navy Bill was slave traffic, an attempt to coerce Quebec. Conscription would come next. Doubtless he could have said more if there hadn't been ladies present, but that should be enough to hold him for a while.

Mr. Pelletier said enough to become Postmaster-General, and subsequently judge, and Mr. Nantel got off a few remarks of a contentious nature enough to qualify him as Minister of Inland Revenue and afterwards as Railway commissioner at \$10,000 a year, but Mr. Blondin is more copiously on record. Mr. Blondin may be torn from his moorings as a Nationalist by the tempest, but as Deputy Speaker and subsequently as Minister of Inland Revenue, he never shifted far enough from office to get over his head. As far back as 1911 however, he pointed out that it might be necessary to shoot holes in the Union Jack in order to breathe liberty through it. He was also of the opinion that England had butchered his forefathers on the Plains of Abraham and that anything in the way of naval aid, Laurier navy or otherwise, was a debt that Canada did not owe.

Mr. Paquet, M. P. for L'Islet, was another Borden supporter, who saw in the Liberal navy a great flesh-eating dragon. Mr. Paquet has not landed a government job yet but it is noticeable that when he lets himself go now it is on something like "Foul Brood in Bees," something that will not revive the past and interfere with the rewards of virtue which must come to the man who waits and says nothing.

Meanwhile, just to show Quebec voters that the Nationalists had nothing on him, Premier Borden was saying via Montreal Gazette and other papers, "The Laurier navy will cost immense sums of money to build, equip and maintain and it will probably result in time of war in the useless sacrifice of lives."

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
