FIERCE FIGHTING ALONG WESTERN FRONT

BRITISH CAPTURE TRENCHES—ARRAS BOMBARDED—GHURKAS DRIVE OUT TURKS

PROMINENT MANUFACTURERS GREATLY IMPRESSED WITH CITY

THREE MEMBERS OF CANADIAN MANUFACTURERS ASSOCIATION VISIT DRYDOCK AND COLD STORAGE PLANT AND ARE SATISFIED THAT PRINCE RUPERT'S FUTURE IS ASSURED

In response to an invitation from the Board of Trade, J. H. Sherrard, president of the Canadian Manufacturers Association, W. J. Mooney, and J. Leonard Apedaile, arrived from Vancouver yesterday morning. Mr. Sherrard is president of the Alaska Feather and Down Co., Ltd.; Mr. Mooney is the head of the Mooney Biscuit Co., Ltd.; and Mr. Apedaile is Canadian partner of Touche & Company of London.

On arrival the visitors were met by the mayor, and a deputation from the Board of Trade, and spent the forenoon in conference with the Board. In the afternoon, accompanied by the mayor, J. H. Pillsbury, Geo. B. Hull, G. R. Naden, George Tite, Geo. W. Nickerson and E. Grangras, on the Leila R, they left the government wharf for the drydock.

Under the direction of J. H. Pillsbury, the various departments were visited, including the palatial offices recently opened. The visitors showed a keen interest in everything they saw, and were greatly impressed with the magnitude of the structure, and the great things it foretold of the future.

Mr. Mooney said he had been particularly struck with the feeling of optimism prevalent among the business men of Prince Rupert. He had noticed in other places, especially where the business men had neglected business and had given themselves up to real estate gambling, a tendency to bemoan the hard times, without making much of an effort to dig down and help make things better, but in this city there seemed to be a whole-hearted desire to make the best of things

and to prepare for the future. Since seeing such a structure as the drydock, he could realize the cause for this optimism. Prince Rupert's future is assured.

After thanking Mr. Pillsbury for his kindness, the visitors proceeded to the plant of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., where they were met by Mr. Johnson and conducted on a tour of inspection through the stores, packing rooms, cold storage and ice making departments, etc. Here again, the visitors were impressed with the capacity of the plant and amount of business being done. Mr. Sherrard remarked that he was glad to observe that, in every way, Prince Rupert is preparing for the future. Like Mr. Mooney, he had noticed the hearty spirit of optimism which prevails in every line of business in Prince Rupert. As a director of the Export Association of Canada which is being formed to take advantage of the changed commercial conditions resulting from the war, Mr. Sherrard is particularly interested in the Pacific coast ports as shipping points for Canadian goods, and he had great hopes for Prince Rupert in this respect, particularly in regard to trade with Siberia and Russia.

All three gentlemen, on leaving for the south this morning, expressed themselves as delighted with their visit, and were unstinted in their admiration of the scenery and location of the city. They believe that the drydock will soon be a hive of industry and that Prince Rupert has every reason to look ahead cheerfully.



FIERCE FIGHTING ON WESTERN FRONT AND THE DARDANELLES

THE BRITISH CAPTURE GERMAN TRENCHES—ARRAS BEING BOMBARDED—GHURKAS DRIVE THE TURKS FROM THEIR TRENCHES—GENERAL WOUNDED—RUSSIA APOLOGISES

London, July 6.—There has been fierce fighting on the western front as a result of the British advance in Flanders.

The British have captured German trenches southwest of Pilliken on the east bank of the Yser Canal.

Arras is again undergoing a bombardment, and there is incessant fighting in the Argonne district.

Russia Apologises.

Russia has apologised to Sweden for the violation of her neutrality. The occasion was the recent fighting off Gothland, when a Russian ship pursued a German minelayer toward the Swedish coast and fired shells within the three-mile limit. A fog which prevailed at the time caused the miscalculation.

BELGIAN ATROCITIES

The report of the Commission of Enquiry into the doings of the German soldiers in Belgium makes blood-curdling reading. The early newspaper stories of horrible atrocities were looked upon as isolated instances, committed by drunken brutes, but the report of the commission, of which Lord Bryce is chairman, shows, beyond any possible doubt, that the whole diabolical business was simply part of the Prussian doctrine of "fearfulness." Horrible acts were committed by officers, and at the instigation of officers, who were acting under orders from their superiors. Nothing was respected and nothing was sacred. Savages from Central Africa would have been more manly than these "cultured" Huns, in their treatment of women and children.

Details of the report are too horrible for words, but we have the assurance of Lord Bryce and his colleagues that they can prove up to the hilt the truth of the charges made. Old men and women were mutilated and children and women were treated likewise, while hundreds of innocent non-combatants were lined up and shot in cold blood. The report of these atrocities should do more to hasten recruiting than all the appeals Lord Kitchener and the War Office can ever issue.

FORD'S NEW MOVE

Henry Ford has bought a large tract of land outside Detroit and announces that he will build a tractor factory, blast furnace, rolling mill, and motor factory, in which upwards of twenty thousand men will be employed. He will also lay out a new town on the most approved plans in which the men, if they choose, may build homes for themselves.

Owing to the war, Mr. Ford has had some difficulty in securing steel for his auto works,

and this fact set him planning to provide a supply of his own. He is going to do the whole thing in a big way.

The notable feature about the project, as far as it concerns employees, is that Mr. Ford does not intend to build what people call "a model city." He intends, rather, to create what may be called model opportunities for a city—that is to say, the streets will be skillfully laid out, the public sanitary arrangements will be good, and the prospective city will get away to a good start. The inhabitants will have employment at the best possible wages, but as citizens of the town they will be as free and independent as citizens anywhere else. The workman, if he wants to build a home in the town, will buy a lot for what it is worth. There will be no real estate speculation. When a man builds a home he will please himself as to its style and size, and he will own

QUESTION REGARDING DIGBY WATER SCHEME

A letter, signed by W. H. Montgomery and George W. Kerr, was read at the council meeting last night, asking what steps had been taken to get work started on the Digby water scheme. These gentlemen pointed out the advantage of having the work proceeded with, and suggested that the correspondence which had passed between the city and the government, through Mr. Hull, should be submitted to the council.

On the mayor stating that the letter would be referred to the board of works committee, Ald. Montgomery objected to the procedure. The mayor ruled him out of order, but Ald. Montgomery protested and held the floor.

Ald. Casey asked what authority the mayor had to dismiss such a question in this fashion.

The mayor said that the council had previously left the matter in the hands of the board of works committee, and that, so far as they were concerned, the matter stood just as before.

Ald. Dybhavn, seconded by Ald. Edge, moved that the ruling of the chair be sustained.

Ald. Casey said he did not approve of having business of such importance in the hands of one committee and that the council should be informed as to what is being done in the matter.

The mayor said he had seen Mr. Hull today and there was no new development to report, and that the board of works still stood for the original proposal of the council that the work be done by day labor at an estimated cost of \$26,000.

Ald. Kerr said he did not condemn the board of works, but simply wanted to know what is being done. Ald. Montgomery said he understood that the city proposal had been turned down by the government, and that this communication had not been read to the council. He asked the city clerk if a letter to that effect had been received.

The mayor replied that he received a letter, addressed to him personally, and that he had laid that letter before the board, who had again taken the matter up with the government.

Ald. Dybhavn said he thought the whole discussion out of order as the matter had been left entirely to the board of works. The ruling of the chair was sustained.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
