THIRD CONTINGENT

Today, the third contingent left for camp. Lacking uniforms, and most of them without any recent training, the men had not such a military appearance as the second contingent, but there was ample evidence that the material was there. In three months the 62nd will equal, in every way, those who have gone before.

The departure of men for the front does not cause the excitemnt it did last fall, but there are the same great hopes intensified by the happenings of the past few months. When the second contingent left, there was a feeling amongst them that they might not be lucky enough to take any part in the fighting, but, today, there seems every prospect that the third, and probably fourth and fifth contingents, will be required to do just as strenuous work as the earlier battalions.

Though there was not so much fuss made over them, Prince Rupert is just as proud of the boys who left today as it was, and is, of the first and second contingents. The excitement of the early days of the war has given place to a cool, calm determination to see the thing through. The novelty has worn off, but the steadfast purpose is just as strong as ever.

The men who have gone before set up a standard of fighting quality in keeping with the traditions of the race, and Prince Rupert, Canada and the Empire know that the men who are now on the way will measure up to the same high standard.

There was a time when it was said that the Canadian government appointed judges and army officers regardless of their politics. For very many years that has not been true, except on rare occasions, in respect to appointments to the bench. The patronage system, it seems, has entered the army as well. In fact, every person knows that it has entered the militia.
