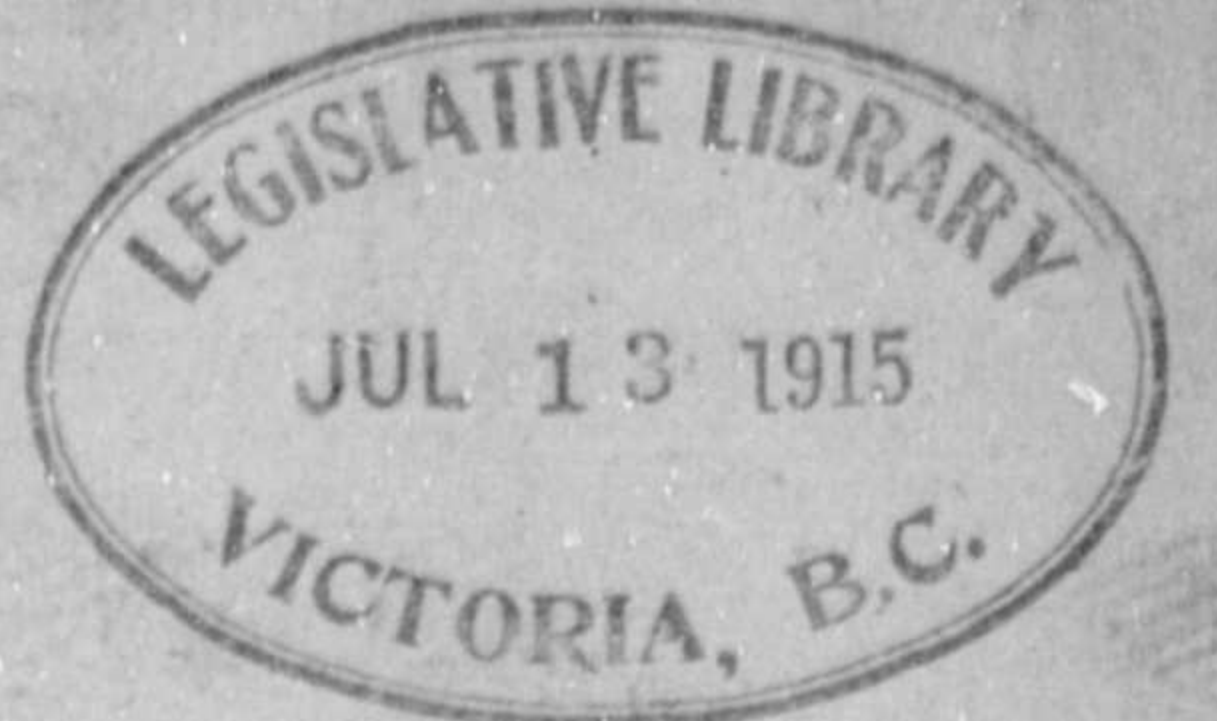

## MOTOR SPEED BOATS TO FIGHT SUBMARINES

### TIDE TURNED IN POLAND--GERMANS IN SOUTHWEST AFRICA HAVE SURRENDERED

#### TIDE OF BATTLE TURNED IN POLAND, GERMANS LOSE 40,000

**ENEMY RETREATS FROM WARSAW—RUSSIANS LOSE 15,000 MEN IN WEST BAGAN—FRENCH TAKE 1,700 PRISONERS AT FESTUBERT—SURRENDER IN SOUTHWEST AFRICA**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 9.—The tide of battle in Poland has turned. The Austro-Germans have been forced to retreat from Warsaw, with a loss of 40,000 men.

In repulsing a German offensive in West Bagan, the Russian army under the Archduke Ferdinand, lost 15,000 men.

**1,700 Prisoners.**

The French at Festubert captured several German trenches, and took 1,700 prisoners.

**Unconditional Surrender.**

Pretoria, July 9.—General

Botha has accepted the unconditional surrender of all German military forces in German Southwest Africa, covering an area of 322,450 miles and containing a population of 80,000 people.

**Powder Mill Destroyed.**

London, July 9.—The Curtis Powder Mills at Hounslow, in the county of Middlesex, were virtually destroyed early today by a series of explosions. The mills employed one hundred men. The explosion was heard at a distance of ten miles.

#### POINT GREY WILL GO DRY THIS MONTH

#### POLICE COMMISSIONERS DECIDE ON REDUCTION

The police commissioners met yesterday afternoon, when the question of reducing the police force was discussed, at the request of the city council. The general opinion of the commissioners was that, though there are not so many drunks, etc., to take care of, the duties of the police have been increased by their having to perform the duties of dog and trade licence collectors.

After a lengthy discussion, in which every phase of the question was gone into carefully, it was moved by G. H. Munro, seconded by Ald. Edge, that the force be reduced by one man, and that the services of the two unmarried members of the force be dispensed with, and one married man engaged. This was carried unanimously.

Chief Vickers was instructed to call for applications for the vacant position.

The chief's report for June showed that \$176 had been collected in fines; that there had been 25 convictions, but no serious cases.

The collection of dog taxes was also discussed, and Chief Vickers was instructed to summons to court anyone found keeping or harboring a dog without a licence.

A letter from a local Chinaman was read, in which he complained that some of his fellow countrymen were running gambling and opium joints on Seventh Ave. Chief Vickers reported that a few weeks ago these men were convicted of dealing in opium, but it was very difficult to get evidence in the gambling charges.

The mayor suggested that action be taken in the matter. The city solicitor said that he believed that it was a case of Tong war, with one faction trying to get the other into trouble. The matter was left in the hands of the chief.

Ottawa, July 8.—Candidates are required from Canada for a limited number of vacancies in the Royal Naval Air Service, for the period of the war. They must be over 19 years of age and less than 30, men between 19 and 23 are preferred.

A high physical and educational standard is obligatory, therefore, only athletic and physically fit men of good intellectual capacity can be accepted.

Full details can be obtained from the secretary, Department of Naval Service, Ottawa.

#### ALLIES TO CONSTRUCT MOTOR BOATS TO FIGHT SUBMARINES

**NEW YORK FIRM TO TENDER ON 150 CRAFT WITH SPEED OF 50 MILES—FIRE ON LINER MINNEHAHA IS ALMOST EXTINGUISHED—SUBMARINE SINKS GERMAN BATTLESHIP**

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, July 9.—G. C. Smith Co. have been asked by the British, French and Russian governments to tender on the construction of 150 powerful speed motor boats, armed with two light guns, for the purpose of seeking out and attacking submarines in the North Sea and the Baltic Sea. The craft will be 30 feet long and will be of 500 horsepower and have a speed of 50 miles per hour. The Smith Company have a factory in Canada.

#### GERMAN EXPORTERS' AGENTS IN SWITZERLAND

Paris, July 9.—A Havas despatch from Rome announces that the Corriere Della Serra asserts that Italian merchants have received circulars from various German exporters announcing that they have established agencies in Switzerland and intend to continue business relations with dealers in other countries. It is stated in Rome that the Swiss authorities have decided not to countenance such a move.

#### ITALIAN SOCIALIST INVENTS NEW BOMB

Rome, July 9.—The Socialist Deputy Battelli, a professor of chemistry at Pisa University, has invented a high power incendiary and explosive bomb that may revolutionize aerial warfare, according to despatches received here today. Experiments are said to have demonstrated the terrific result of the new missile when hurled from an aeroplane.

PARTYISM

A week ago we had to congratulate the Journal on its discovery that the Borden government had appointed officials as numerous "as the sands of the sea," and that this multiplicity of useless job-holders was a hindrance to the proper conduct of the country's business.

Evidently our worthy contemporary, after a week's contemplation, has come to the conclusion that it stated the truth too baldly, and now makes the suggestion that the cause of all the trouble is the fact that the Borden government, when it went into power, did not clean out all the Liberals. Evidently to be a Liberal is to be inefficient. The Journal does not attempt to show how efficient the 12,147 additional job-holders appointed by the Borden government at an annual cost of an additional \$5,000,000, are.

Evidently those 12,147 men had to have jobs, but the Conservative organ finds fault with the government because it did not fire a corresponding number of Liberal employees. As a matter of fact, the government did a considerable business in clearing out Liberals, though the cause was not inefficiency, but insufficient sympathy with the highway robbery methods of the Conservative party.

The most amusing part of the article is that in which it states that fear of the cry of partyism kept the Conservatives from entering into a beheading process. We suppose it was the same fear of the cry of partyism which caused Mr. Garland to cover up his tracks in the drug graft, and that the same fear prompted the Hon. Robert Rogers to see that the telegrams in the Manitoba scandal were got out of the way. Probably the same fear caused Roblin to wire to the Hon. Bob to do all he possibly

could to get a commission for Judge McDonald's son. Foster must have been possessed with a most unhealthy fear of the cry of partyism when he loaded the government up with crippled horses at very sound prices.

This fear of the accusation of partyism is something that has been carelessly overlooked by the critics of the McBride-Bowser administration. Possibly this is the explanation of the fact that the land robbers of British Columbia have been allowed to retain their ill-gotten gains. Who would have suspected it? Perhaps it was the same fear which chased Sir Richard McBride across the Atlantic, after his ludicrously futile attempt to pose as the head of his government.

When the Borden government, with 12,147 more officials than the Laurier government required, cannot run the business of country properly, it is time that the people demanded that party shall have no bearing on the conduct of their affairs. It is ridiculous that politicians should have any voice whatever in the selection of army officers, postal officials or civil servants of any description.

WAR'S EFFECT UPON TEA

The result is that in the United States they are paying about 10c a pound more than when the war began. NEW SUBMARINE TO MAKE FORTY KNOTS

Oakland, Cal., July 8.—A submarine capable of a speed of 30 to 40 knots, running submerged for five thousand miles, diving without the aid of batteries or tanks, and carrying on board fifty torpedoes, eight times as many as the present type, is claimed to be an invention of Washington B. Vanderlip, of Oakland, member of the Institute of American Mining Engineers, for control of which two leading powers of Europe are now negotiating.

Vanderlip has been visited secretly in Oakland by Commander Von Knorr, of the Imperial German navy, who, after examination of the model, agreed that a flotilla of undersea craft of the new type would revolutionize naval warfare.

The German officer was unable to make any satisfactory offer, however, owing to limitation of his authority, and Vanderlip, according to statements today, is now in communication with the British government.

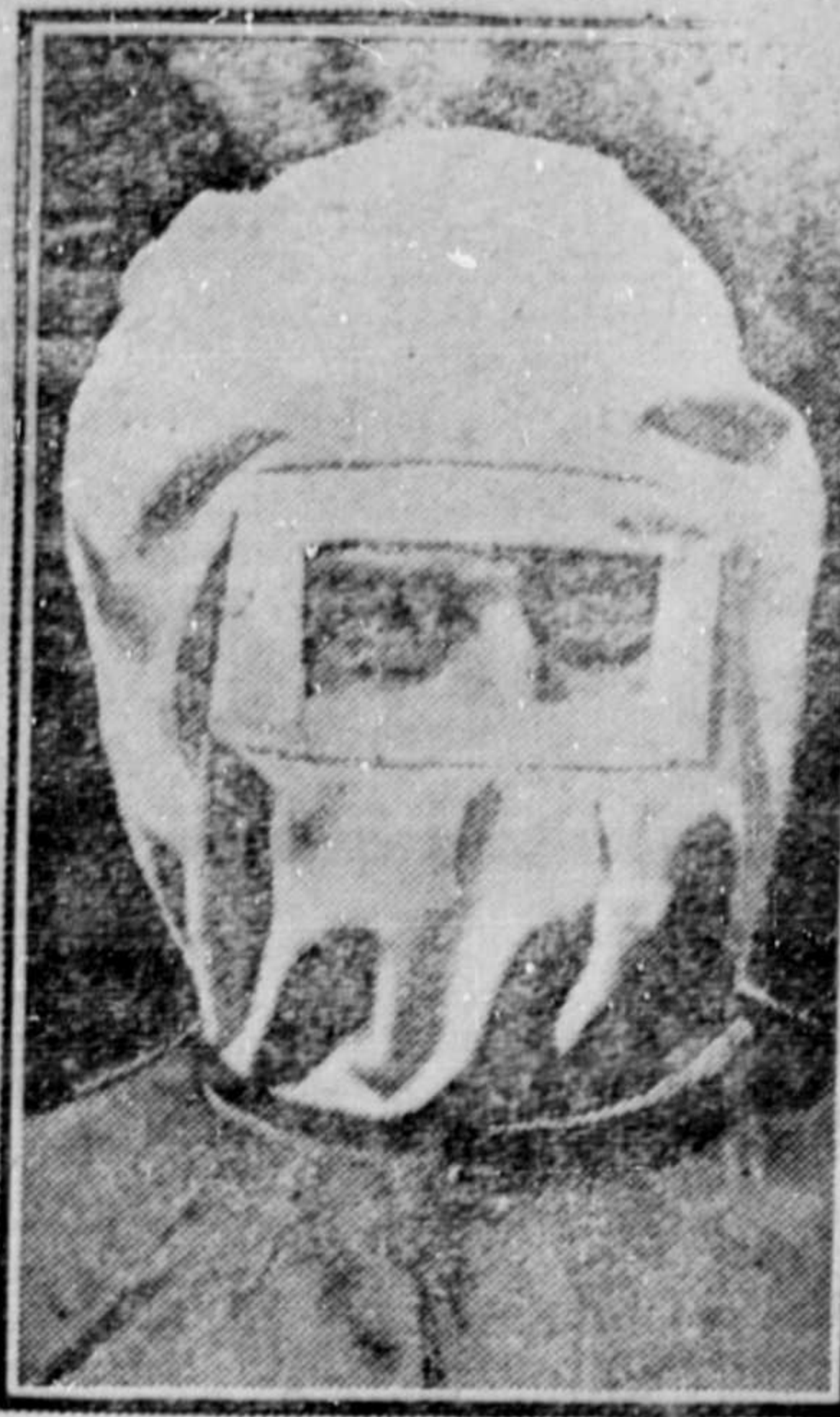
Winnipeg, April 30, 1915.  
To Hon. R. Rogers, Ottawa.

(Confidential). Close friends say very desirable that Geoffrey E. Macdonald, son of one of the commission, now with Strathcona Horse, be given a commission, say lieutenant. See general, as have no cipher with him, and explain situation so that he will understand and act promptly. Am sure he will do this for me. Proceedings here already dragging. Anderson says most important thing to get promotion. Kelly's eldest son died yesterday.

#### Vigorous Denial by Judge.

Immediately after the reading of the telegram Mr. Justice Macdonald made a statement. He wished to say that he had learned for the first time today that such a message had been sent. He had never been approached by anyone in the matter, and had never at any time seen Sir Rodmond Roblin. He was not a friend of his. They were barely acquainted. Sir Rodmond was not a man he would approach for any favors. The message was sent without his permission or consent. **FRENCH SOCIALIST DENOUNCES PEACE**

Paris, July 9.—Under the heading "A Shameful Peace," Gustav Harve, in LaGuerre Sociale, repudiates the suggestion of the German Social Democrats that he and the French Socialist party are willing to accept the principle of peace without annexation as the basis of the statue quo ante.

In his most sarcastic manner, M. Herve pictures Europe under such a peace, with militarism doubled, international suspicion paramount and social programs forced into the background by the burden of military taxation.

"Anyone in our party who dares to speak of peace before the robbers of Belgium have been chased out with rifles, before Prussian militarism has been humiliated and smashed, we French socialists who have fallen to found a new Europe—rise from their graves in protest."
