WASHINGTON DISCUSSES GERMANY'S REPLY

NINE UNEXPLODED BOMBS ON STEAMER FROM NEW YORK--LONDON OPTIMISTIC

GERMAN REPLY RAISES ACUTE DISCUSSION IN WASHINGTON

GENERAL OPINION THAT THE UNITED STATES WILL TAKE ACTION—LIABILITY FOR LOSS OF LIFE ON THE LUSITANIA EVADED—DIPLOMATIC SEVERANCE LIKELY

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, July 10.—The German reply to the American note repeats the assurances that American ships engaged in a legitimate trade will not be interfered with, stating that American passenger ships will be allowed to pass freely and safely. Germany expresses the hope that the American government will see that these ships do not carry contraband.
The reply has occasioned acute discussion here, and the general opinion is that the United States will be bound to take action, as a result of Germany's unwillingness to concede the right of American citizens to travel on merchantmen of any nationality. Germany's evasion of all liability for the lives lost on the

Lusitania is regarded very seriously, and it is believed that a severance of diplomatic relations will come, with the announcement that America will assert her full rights if further violations occur.

AUSTRIANS RELEASE ITALIAN PRISONERS

Rome, July 10.—Six thousand war prisoners held at Trent, among whom are included some Russians captured in Galicia, have been released and are now on their way to Italy via Switzerland. Others, it is understood, are to follow. There have been frequent reports that the Austrians could not find sufficient food for their prisoners and consequently have been compelled to release them.

BECKER REFUSED FURTHER APPEAL

New York, July 10.—Justice Hughes has refused to grant a further appeal in the Becker case. Becker is condemned to die on July 26.

HAD TWO REASONS FOR REJECTING THE ORDER

Chicago, July 9.—The recent refusal of the Pullman company to accept a huge order for railroad cars from the Russian government was explained yesterday by a high official of the Pullman company, according to the Daily News.

The Russian agent who approached the company wanted 50,000 cars, worth about \$25,000,000. The Pullman company rejected the offer for two reasons, namely, that pay was to be made in Russian notes and 40,000 of the cars were to be built at a plant which the Pullman company was asked to build in Russia. President Runnels, of the Pullman company, demanded cash, as he said was demanded of all customers, and declined to build a plant in Russia. The Russian agent was without discretion in the matter. He had his instructions and could not change them so the deal fell through.

NINE UNEXPLODED BOMBS ON BOARD STEAMER KIRKOSWALD

FEELING OF OPTIMISM PREVAILS IN LONDON—KITCHENER AND PREMIER ASQUITH CONFER WITH THE ALLIED COMMANDERS—THREE SHIPS ARE SUNK—MINNEHAHA STILL AFIRE

(Special to The Daily News.)
New York, July 10.—Nine bombs, each big enough to blow up a 25,000-ton steamer, were found on the steamer Kirkoswald, when that vessel unloaded her cargo of sugar at Marseilles, from New York. The bombs were hidden in bags of sugar and failed to explode.

Optimism Prevails.

London, July 10.—A feeling of optimism prevails, resulting from the general surrender in German Southwest Africa; the stubborn resistance put up by the Russians in Poland, and the repulse of the German offensive movement on the western front.

Allied Conference.

Lord Kitchener and Premier Asquith have returned from France, where they have

been holding a conference with Generals Joffre and Sir John French.

Three Steamers Sunk.

The Italian steamer Clio, the Norwegian steamer Nordas, and the British steamer Ellesmere, have been torpedoed. A Norwegian fireman on the Ellesmere was killed by shell fire.

Minnehaha Still Afire.

Halifax, July 10.—Fire has broken out again in No. 3 hold on the transport Minnehaha. The hold has been battened down and flooded.

G.T.P. GENERAL MANAGER ARRIVED LAST NIGHT

Morley Donaldson, vice-president and general manager of the G. T. P. arrived in the city last evening, his private car Transcontinental being attached to the regular train from the east. He left again a few hours later, having his car attached to the special fish train of express cars which left at 9:20.

Mr. Donaldson found it necessary to make a very brief stay here, as he wishes to get back with as little loss of time as possible. By leaving last night, he was able to save a day in getting back to Winnipeg, having a stop to make on the way. He was not able to get about the city during his visit this time.

The vice-president says it is very difficult to make calculations as to prospective trade now. The conditions are abnormal and in common with all the other lines of railway on the continent and in other avenues of business, there are no rules that serve as an actual guide. The trade is very good on the G. T. P., but not what the company could have expected under normal conditions. The outlook for a crop on the prairies is magnificent, however. It looks now as if a crop that has never been excelled may be harvested. Every acre possible was put under crop last spring. The consequence has been that farmers to get further land available for next year broke up new areas this summer, so that the available acreage has been most extensively increased.

SIR RICHARD'S RETURN

Sir Richard McBride has returned to Victoria, and is keeping the official press busy recounting his magnificent efforts on behalf of British Columbia, while in Europe. Thanks to the premier's advertising, Britain has discovered that British Columbia grows timber, and that even railroad ties can be produced here. In order to confirm his statements regarding this industry, and to "secure recognition for our timber products in the old land," Sir Dick has arranged that the British Columbia government shall take over an inter-continental vessel that was formerly stationed at the Falkland Islands.

Sir Richard's ambitions as a ship-broker are evidently growing, though they seem to have turned into a new channel. Probably he figures that a timber ship looks a bigger bargain and is less controversial than pesky little submarines. The new scheme has one big advantage, in that those meddlesome, inquisitive gentlemen at Ottawa won't be able to ask a single question. Having drained the province dry, Sir Richard probably wants to start his friends in the overseas carrying business. The new field offers great possibilities, though he will have to take great care that all the ships are in port on election days, or that he gets the Hon. W. J. to pass special legislation empowering voters at sea to record their votes by wireless.

The premier says "London knows all about our magnificent resources, and expresses confidence in our management of them." It would be interesting to know just exactly what the term "London" covers. Does it include any shareholders or depositors in the Dominion Trust Company, or is it made up of capitalists who

have been gifted with some thousands of acres of fertile land? British Columbia has undoubtedly great resources, but, thanks to McBride and his friends, the land of the province is in the hands of a few speculators, who doubtless think the business was cleverly managed.

Sir Richard was also able to impress upon the various committees in London the desirability of British Columbia as a home for soldiers after the war. Is this a hint that the speculators are to hand back the land they hold, in order to provide farms for the men who offered all they had to the Empire? The cities of British Columbia have more men now than they can find work for, and the government has left little to be farmed that is worth farming, therefore it would be interesting to have a little more detailed information on this point.

In many columns of type, the premier does not divulge the reason for his hurried departure and tardy return, but perhaps this is more than can be expected. He carefully avoids any mention of Ottawa, but this is only natural as the subject must be distasteful for various reasons.

GIVES PROPERTY WORTH \$7,230,000 TO HIS SON

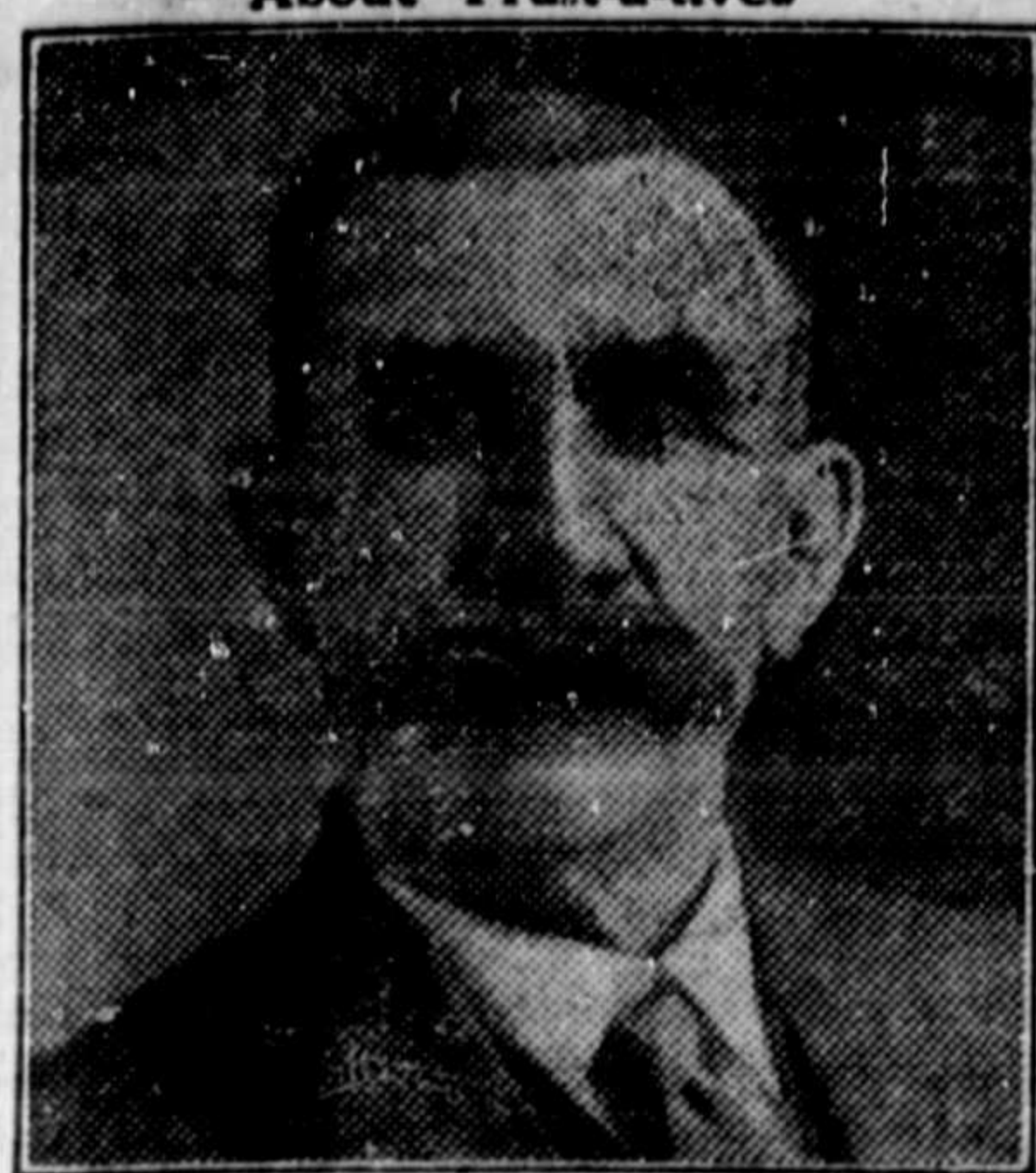

TROOPS' CONDITION CONSIDERED EXCELLENT

New York, July 10.—The condition of the allied troops along the western battlefront was described as excellent by Dr. G. Sterling Ryerson, president of the Canadian Red Cross, and surgeon-general of the Canadian forces, who reached here yesterday on the steamship Espagne from Havre.

"During my absence I visited almost the entire battlefront along the Aisne and the Marne," Dr. Ryerson said. "I found the conditions of the Canadian and Allied troops excellent, as well as the spirit of the men."

"Within two months there will be put under way along the entire western front a tremendous drive, which will be the greatest that this war has seen. General Joffre recently said that the Germans would be out of France by the first of the coming year, and from what I have seen and heard I have every reason to believe they will be. The war will be over in another year and the Germans will be defeated."

"The Allied troops have no lack of equipment, and their general health is excellent."

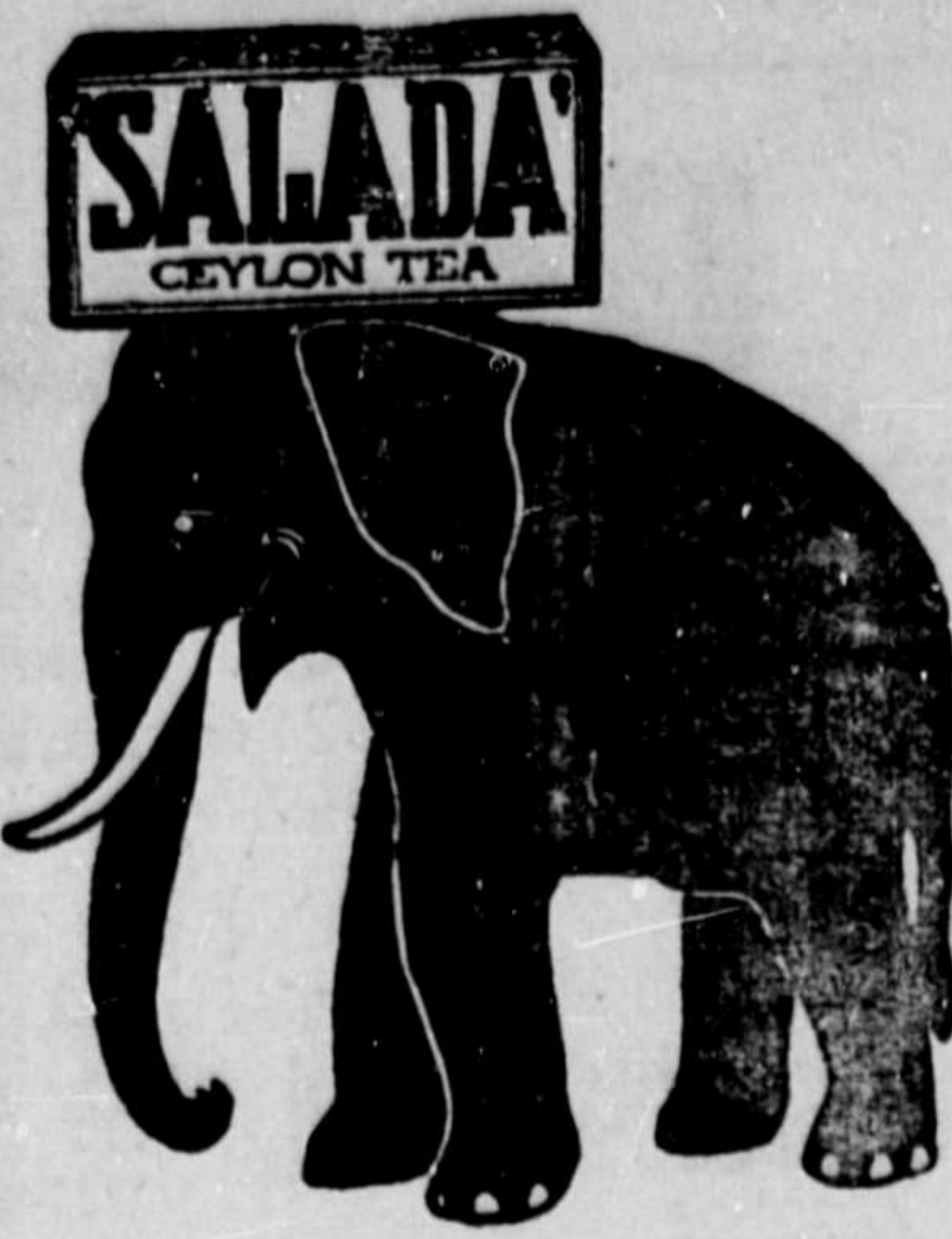
