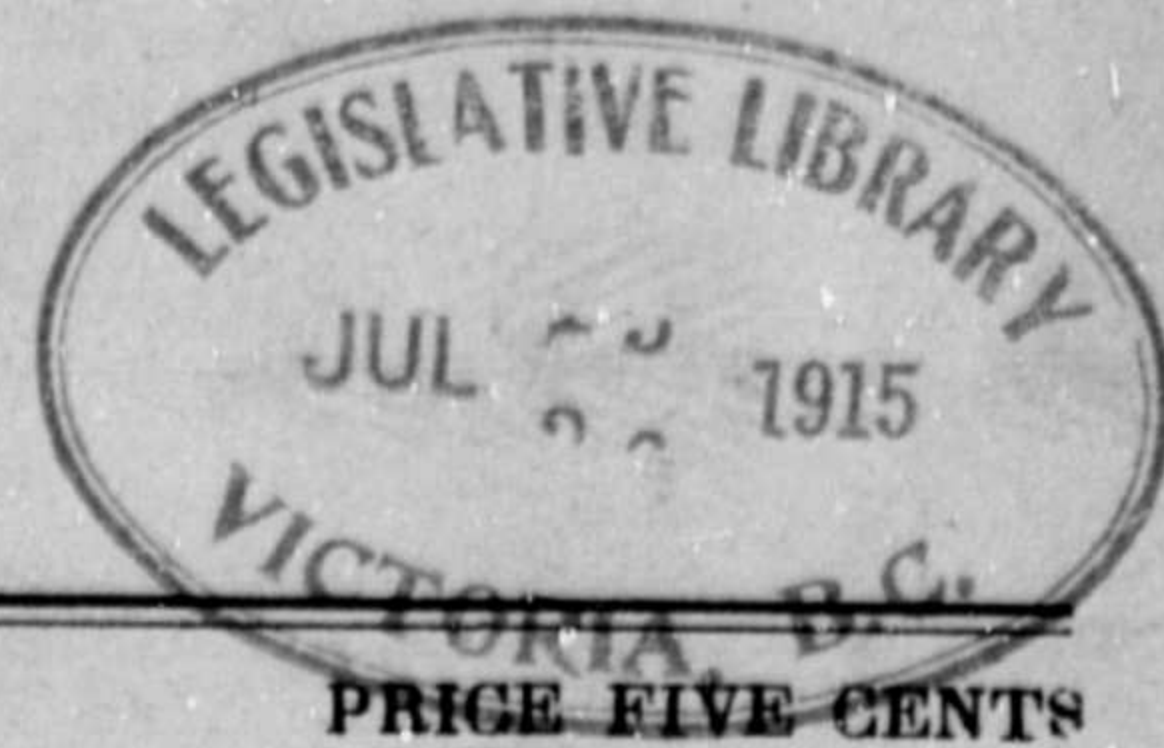

Washington, July 11.—Following the receipt of a letter, signed "Pearce," from an understudy of Muenther, the navy department has flashed warnings to the British steamers Howthead and Baron Napier, which left New Orleans on July 9.

Pearce boasts that he planted bombs on board these ships. He says he will take up Muenther's work of killing J. P. Morgan and Sir J. Spring-Rice, the British ambassador at Washington.

RUSSIAN TROOPS FOR THE DARDANELLES

(Special to The Daily News.)

Manila, July 11.—The Russians are sending large numbers of troops from Vladivostok to the Dardanelles. All the vessels of the Messageries Maritime Fleet arriving at Sagon, in French Cochinchina, have been ordered to unload passengers and proceed to Vladivostok.

INSURANCE COMPANIES ARE TAKING NO RISKS

Ottawa, July 10.—The accident insurance companies doing business in Canada would not take a risk on Sir Robert Borden to cover accidents caused by the war during his trip to England.

When the Premier prepared to leave for England, his secretary instructed an insurance agent, it is stated, to place an accident policy of a very considerable amount on Sir Robert, to cover the time he would be away. However, the head office replied that the companies in Canada, according to the report, are taking no accident risks at all on people crossing to Europe, but under the circumstances that it was the Premier, the company would arrange with other accident companies to co-operate in carrying the risk asked for, but the policy would not cover accidents due to the war, the torpedoing of the ship he was travelling on, for example. It is not known whether the policy was taken out with that exemption, but the company absolutely refused to give the Premier a policy covering an accident due to the war.

SIR RICHARD M'BRIDE AND THE DISCARDED SUBMARINES

ROYAL COMMISSION ENQUIRY DOES NOT SHOW WHY CHEQUE WAS SPLIT—SIR RICHARD'S MOOD UNDERGOES A CHANGE BETWEEN OTTAWA AND TORONTO

Ottawa, July 10.—A breezy interlude last week was Sir Richard McBride's evidence before the Royal Commission on war scandals. It was bounded on the north by Powell, the stool pigeon, and on the south by Garland, the grafter—Garland is the name, but garlic is more like the smell—and it fitted in neatly.

Everybody agreed that Sir Richard was in good form. He followed the usual course of statesmen charged with breaking any of the commandments and denied everything. He did it handsomely, too, talking rapidly to prevent the truth from curdling. His evidence reminded the hearers of the old recipe for making chicken soup without any chicken—it was largely remarkable for what it omitted.

However, it was plain enough that Sir Richard was himself again. Although he was not charged with offering his Kingdom of British Columbia for a horse, he was volunteering an explanation of why he spent \$1,150,000 of the peoples money for two bargain-counter submarines that wanted to sink when they were supposed to swim and wanted to swim when they were supposed to sink. According to all reports they were the devil's own submarines, those two—always wanting to do the wrong thing. Sir Richard, it will be remembered, purchased these submarines on his own responsibility and then sent the bill to Ottawa. The bill seems to have been as badly behaved as the submarines, for the first rough draft of it was for \$1,050,000, which was subsequently changed on receipt of

telegrams, to \$1,150,000. Second thoughts were \$100,000 more expensive. The same ill luck which pursued the submarines and the bill for them, beset the cheque which settled for them. It got split on the way to British Columbia and the final destination of one fragment has never been definitely traced to this day.

Sir Richard did not touch on these matters, probably because he was not asked the questions which led up to them. There is no reason to believe that he would have been any less candid in his answers on this subject. He put the purchase of the two submarines for defenceless British Columbia (with two German warships supposedly in the offing) on the highest patriotic grounds, which was the right and proper thing to do. Nobody expected a statesman of his parts to do less. On certain matters of detail Sir Richard was not quite so convincing. It takes more than a blithe air and a bonny smile to wrestle with figures, and Sir Richard is no mathematician, as the present condition of British Columbia government finances pretty well proves. Sir Richard said that in a period of great nervous tension, "he could not hesitate about the price"—and that is true enough. He didn't hesitate long enough to query Ottawa—he bought the submarines first and sent the bill afterwards to be ratified by Order-in-council. What's more he paid \$1,150,000 for them without blinking on the simple assurance of an English navy officer that he couldn't have them built in England for less than \$600,000 each. Sir Richard could not afford to hesitate. He was so anxious to save the approximate difference of \$150,000 between the Seattle price and the Tyneside price that he closed at once. It is true that the Chilean government was only going to pay \$750,000 for the pair and had refused to come across with the money, not because it didn't have the coin but because the submarines had

WAR ORDERS

The placing of war orders in the United States and Canada is arousing considerable interest, as well defined channels are now being cut in this connection. It is impossible to obtain complete official details, either from the governments or the companies concerned, as to the values of these orders. Reliable figures obtained by The Monetary Times, however, partly from both of those and from other sources, put beyond dispute the fact that the orders placed in Canada for war materials, munitions and equipment, by the Canadian, British, French and Russian governments, have a value of at least \$400,000,000. Large shipments are going forward to Europe but a steady and continuous volume of shipments probably will not be under way before the early autumn.

The exports of manufactures from Canada are being increased rapidly as a direct result of the war orders. For the month of May, the exports of manufactures had a value double that of the May exports a year ago, and the figures are still growing. Important shipments from Canada, such as those of several thousand box cars and fifty locomotives to Russia, and a thousand coal cars to France may lead, after the war, to important trade relations with the countries fighting by Great Britain's side. There are possibilities of a large business in future, especially with Russia, and Canadian manufacturers are planning, individually and collectively, ways and means to obtain this trade.

New industries are being created in the Dominion, as a result of the demand for war orders. A large copper refinery is likely to be established in British Columbia in connection with the manufacture of shrapnel shells. Various by-products of the coke ovens

of the steel plants are being utilized in the manufacture of high explosives, another new industry in Canada.

With regard to the reported utterances of Lord Curzon, in the house of lords last week, as to alleged unsatisfactory features of the shell-making industry in Canada, it should be stated that the only part of a complete shell that is not made or cannot be made in Canada today is the copper band, and that will be soon manufactured here. Deliveries from Canada may have been comparatively poor because Canadian manufacturers had first to install the necessary machinery and learn how to make shells. Transportation facilities also have not been good. The deliveries should improve from now on.—Monetary Times.

BUSINESSLIKE BUYING

There is one side of the war which, from this time forward, is to be handled on a business basis not altogether to the advantage of the producers in this country. D. A. Thomas, the Welsh "coal king," one of the shrewdest business men in England, who has accumulated an enormous fortune and who in the present emergency has tendered his services to his country, has been sent to the United States as purchasing agent, not merely for England but for all England's allies. It was stated at the start that his work would be confined largely to the purchase of munitions of war, but there are indications that the purchase of food supplies will engage a considerable part of his time.

England proposes to establish the price which it will pay for wheat this year and not

permit the price to be put up, if it is possible by shrewd manipulation and buying to keep it down. The food supplies for England, France, Belgium and Italy will be purchased in this country by one agency, and those countries will not be bidding against each other for supplies as they did last year.

The harvest of the greatest crop in history has commenced. There will be nearly a billion bushels of wheat raised this year. The supply, supplementing that which comes from other sources, is ample to meet the foreign needs, even under war conditions, after supplying domestic requirements. With knowledge of that fact there is no rush of foreign buyers or the one great foreign buyer into this market. There is no disposition to pay a fancy price.

That is probably the reason why the price has sagged to the present level. There is not the slightest probability that the anticipated \$2 a bushel will be reached or anything approaching that figure. There will be no bidding of one nation against another. The foreign combination proposes to dictate the price if it can.—Seattle P. I.

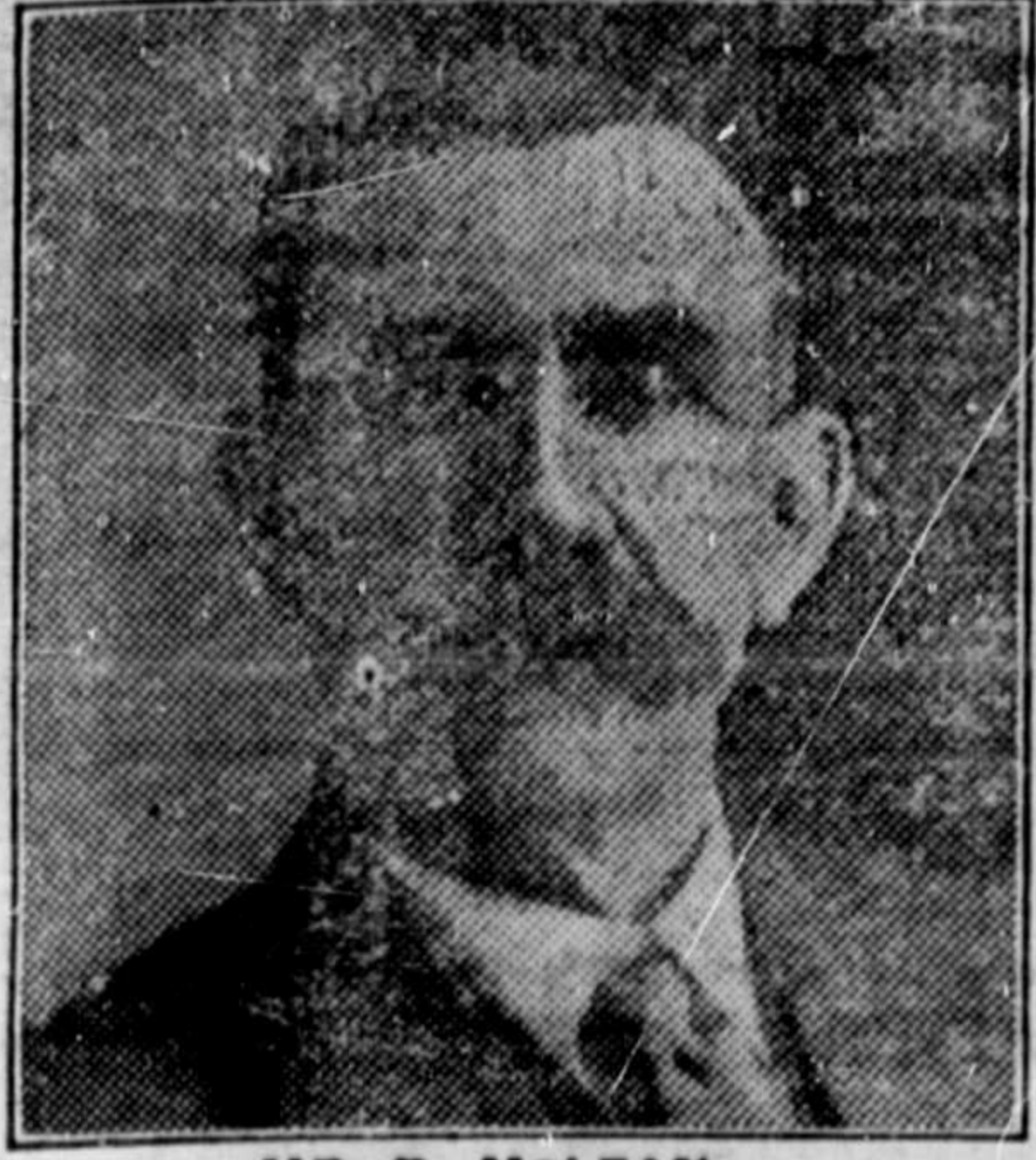

the colic, but that is neither here nor there. A bargain is a bargain and must be snapped up when you can get it. A bargain is very much like a gift horse—you mustn't look it in the mouth. Sir Richard didn't and never will. Take it or leave it—that's Sir Richard's policy and see where British Columbia is now.

Considering the beautiful window-dressing he did at Ottawa, it is hard to understand why Sir Richard should have been so peevish when subsequently interviewed by the Globe in Toronto. It couldn't have been the submarines which he had explained to his own satisfaction—brushing them aside, so to speak, just like that. It must have been local conditions in British Columbia which caused him to speak of political opponents as "liars" and talk of suing if they didn't shut up. The change undergone by this debonair and gallant young knight between Ottawa and Toronto can only be explained by the fact that Toronto is two hundred and fifty miles nearer home than the other place.

Sir Richard talked like a man who feels that the rapids are near and the daylight is past; like one who was coming to his own and expected his own to receive him not; like a Prime Minister, in short, who was apprehensive that his old side-kick, Attorney-General Bowser, would be waiting for him with a club. It was a strange, savage way for a successful young statesman to talk, especially when approaching his home country, and the province which has enjoyed all the blessings of his promissory-note-hand-it-out-to-the-railways government for the last ten years. One would almost think that he wasn't sure of his welcome. There may be something in that, too. Sir Richard is not in the first flush of triumph. His flush is a bobtail now and British Columbia is calling for a show-down. Consequently Sir Richard has been restless of late. Like Sir George Foster who found no rest for the soles of his feet until he lighted in North Toronto, and the Hon. Bob Rogers who is looking for a soft spot in Carlton County, Sir Richard is casting about for a new place to perch. Like Noah's dove, though perhaps more spotted, he is making inquiry where he will land after the deluge. For the last three or four years, Sir
