ROUMANIA IS COURTIED BY THE POWERS

FRENCH AVIATORS SUCCESS -- MUNITIONS ACT APPLIED TO WELSH COAL STRIKE

RUSSIA AND GERMANY BIDDING FOR SUPPORT OF ROUMANIA

EACH OFFERS INDUCEMENTS TO ROUMANIA TO ENTER THE WAR—MUNITIONS ACT APPLIED TO SOUTH WALES COAL STRIKE—FRENCH AIR RAID—HUGE WAR LOAN

London, July 13.—Germany and Russia are each offering inducements to Roumania to enter the war. Austria offers to take Bessarabia from the Russians for Roumania, while Russia offers to conquer Transylvania for Roumania. Austria offers part of Bukovina in return for a friendly neutrality.

Munitions Act.

The government today applied the munitions of war act to the South Wales coal strike on the ground that it is prejudicial to

the transport, production and the supply of munitions of war. 42,000 men had been ordered to cease work on Thursday by the unions.

French Air Raid.

Paris, July 13.—A successful raid was made by 35 French aviators on the German railroad base at Vigneulles. They all returned safely after blowing up the station and barracks.

Huge War Loan.

London, July 13.—It is announced that subscriptions to the new war loan reached a total of 600,000,000 pounds sterling.

OWNER OF SEATTLE TIMES PASSED AWAY

(Special to The Daily News.)

Seattle, July 13.—Col. Blethen, owner of the Seattle Times died last night. Col. Blethen was one of the best known newspaper men on the coast. He had been seriously ill for a number of weeks.

LICENSE REFUND

The license committee recommended that M. M. Stephens be refunded the sum of 17.90 paid by him on the Tessier license, and that on and after July 15 the by-law be strictly enforced.

Ald. Dybbavn strongly objected to the proposal as forming a dangerous precedent, and moved an amendment, seconded by Ald. Edge, that the action of the collector be upheld.

On a vote, the motion to refund the money was adopted.

The vote was: Frank Holland, 4; W. Shaw, 1; F. Poole, 1; W. H. Sherman, 1.

Frank Holland will take up his duties as market clerk on July 15.

GERMANY'S SENSE AS REVEALED BY THE WAR

PROTEST AGAINST MAGISTRATE CARSS

Judge Carss, this morning, sentenced Alba O'Neill to six months hard labor for selling liquor on Comox Ave.

L. W. Patmore for the defence protested against the verdict, in view of the fact that the evidence for the prosecution was contradictory and unreliable, while the evidence for the defence was overwhelmingly strong. Mr. Patmore stated that, as it was evident that the bench had decided to make a conviction in spite of the evidence, he would not call witnesses in the other cases, but simply enter a plea of not guilty.

A. M. Manson, at the outset of the trial, entered protest against the propriety of Judge Carss occupying the bench, in view of the fact that the prosecution was at the instigation of Lena Sylvia, a client of Mr. Carss, and a prostitute living on Comox Avenue. Mr. Manson said that he had evidence which fully warranted his protest, but in spite of that Judge Carss occupied the bench. Mr. Manson felt with Mr. Patmore that when such strong evidence for the defence carried no weight with the court, it was useless to call evidence in the other cases.

Jean Dubois and Rosie Bloom were each sentenced to six months hard labor. Counsel for the defence entered an appeal in each case. The appeals will come before His Honor Judge Young in September.

AUSTRO - GERMANS IN POLAND ARE CONTEMPLATING RETREAT

NO EFFORT TO ADVANCE MADE SINCE KRASNIAK DEFEAT—BOTH SAYS GERMAN POWER IN AFRICA IS COMPLETELY BROKEN—CRUISER KOENIGSBURG IS DESTROYED

(Special to The Daily News)

London, July 13.—The Austro-Germans are reported to be contemplating a general retreat following the reverse at Krasnik in Poland. General Von Mackenzen is making no effort to resume the advance on Warsaw, evidently afraid that it would expose his left flank. He may be planning a coup.

Completely Broken.

Capetown, July 13.—General Botha cables to the British government that German power has been completely broken in South Africa and that they may soon

expect to see Boers on the firing line in Europe.

Koenigsburg Destroyed.

London, July 13.—The British monitors Severn and Mersey penetrated the Selija river and completely destroyed the German cruiser Koenigsburg after a hot engagement which was aided by aeroplanes.

Sultan Dead.

Paris, July 13.—The Sultan of Turkey died several days ago. This information has now been obtained. The fact that the announcement was kept back was due to the fact that the young Turks have been hiding the news fearing political complications.

CORP. FRANK SALTER HAS RECOVERED FROM WOUNDS

E. A. Woods received an interesting letter from Corporal Frank Salter last night, in which he stated that he has quite recovered from his wounds and ready for action again.

FOOTBALL

In a league game at Recreation Park last night, the Callies defeated the Sons of England by 3 goals to 1. The result was a big surprise as the Callies' side had been so badly depleted by the last draft of men for the front. However, the married men came along and eight of them helped the Callies to victory.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT COSTS

The health committee presented a report to the city council last night comparing the cost of garbage collection by auto and horse traction. By auto, the cost is \$674 per month, and by horse it would be \$765. It is proposed to collect on four days weekly instead of six as at present and that the men shall be paid at the rate of \$4 per day.

The point was raised in view of the fact that the city has four unemployed horses. It was pointed out that if the work were done by horse traction a new wagon would be needed. The report was adopted.

THE WAR

On the eastern front things are looking much brighter than they did a week ago. The Austro-German drive on Warsaw has been definitely checked, and the enemy has lost many thousands of men.

There are repeated reports that the Germans are rushing men from the eastern front to Flanders and France, in order to make another rush for Calais. For such a movement, the Allies are thoroughly prepared, having consolidated the German trenches which they have already taken, while the reserve trenches are filled with fresh troops ready to turn defence into attack.

With the Italians putting up a great fight along the Isonzo River, and the attack in the Dardanelles resumed with increased vigor, there is undoubtedly cause for optimism.

Every week sees the Allies better organized with regard to munitions, and men are coming forward as rapidly as they can be absorbed. It is a long, stubborn struggle, but the Prussian eagle will be getting shy of plumage before the summer is over.

FEET OF CLAY

In the war atmosphere of England, L. P. Jacks, an instructor at Oxford university, complains in a contribution to the New Republic that he has lost his perspective in his teaching functions; that philosophy and science and literature sag in importance before the brutal and insistent facts of existence; that idealism is farther away from human conception than ever.

"I have taken a keen interest in explaining to students the intricacies of Kant's philosophy," writes the professor. "I confess that I can take no interest in such things at the present moment. A sense that I am fiddling while the world is on fire comes over me. In the presence of the war issues it seems to me hardly worth debating whether Kant was right or wrong."

Underneath the artificial superstructure of civilization that the world has builded so laboriously are the real and elemental issues of existence. We must possess and protect life before we may acquire and maintain the flower of civilization. Of what use is a head full of knowledge without life to give it effect?

"Perhaps," writes the professor, "We have been taking ourselves a little too seriously. Perhaps our interests were not quite as important as we thought them to be. I believe that hereafter we shall try to bring our academic life into closer touch with reality."

In other words, the professor's head has come down from the clouds.

NO ALUM



No doubt one is inclined to get out of sight of land in exploring the ideal. It has been found by the professor to be a reasonable and practical thing, in all walks of life, to keep one's feet in touch with the earth. We have builded a system of living in which men become highly specialized; they grow into the habit of traversing a little circle of knowledge. One comes to rely upon the support of the material world about him as a matter of course, and when this support is taken from under his feet the winged one is helpless and the feet of clay stumble.

The cataclysms of war bring men back to the elemental facts of life. Of what use are theories and our finely-spun conceptions in the presence of the brute with a club?

There is no doubt that the professor, in company with many other specialists, will contrive for the remainder of his life to keep at least a handhold on the material world while continuing his explorations in the realms of the ideal. Seattle P. I.

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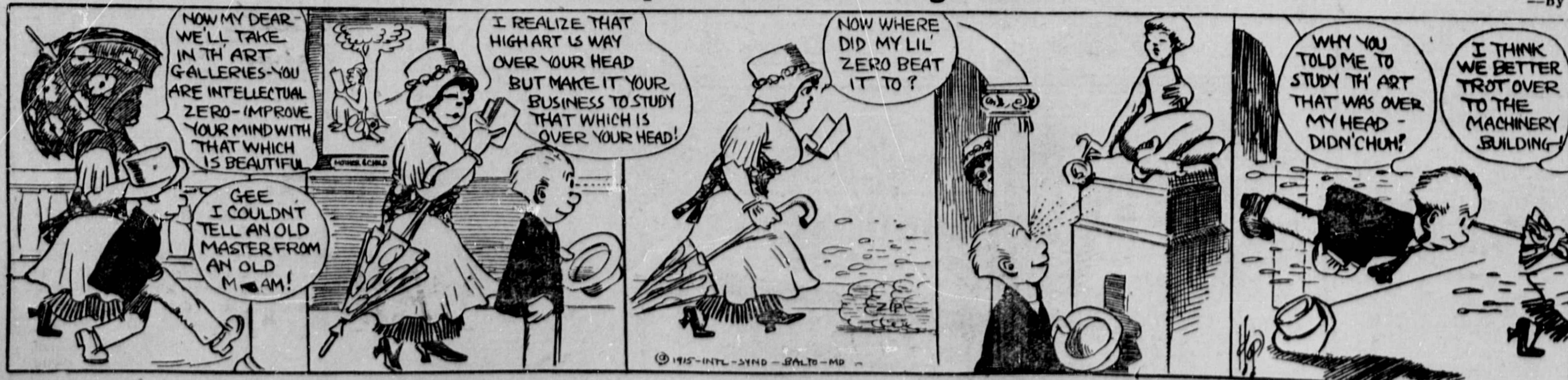

DIGBY WATER SCHEME

The correspondence regarding the Digby water scheme was brought before the council last night. The department, in a letter dated June 9th to G. H. Hull, refused to entertain the city's proposal to do the work by day labor at a cost of \$26,000. It proposed that the work be done by contract, or by day labor, the city to pay the actual cost of the work.

The board of works replied on July 2nd, standing firm by their former proposal.

Ald. Dybbavn said the estimate of \$26,000 seemed reasonable.

The mayor said that if the government did not agree to this, the board of works would probably propose that the city do the work under its own engineer. He said it would be unwise for the city to make itself liable for an indefinite amount.

Ald Casey said it would be unwise for the council to make a move meantime, but he thought that the letter of June 9th should have been considered by the whole council. He was averse to a committee dealing with such an important matter. He felt certain that the department would not comply with the request, as it seemed to question the estimate given.

It was decided to await a reply from the department.

In the Letter Box

In the following letter, ex-Ald. Morrissey expresses his views on G. L. Clayton's fishing proposition:

To the Citizens of Prince Rupert, the Mayor and City Council, Ladies and Gentlemen:—Re the proposal of Geo. L. Clayton submitted to the mayor and city council of Prince Rupert, as published in Sunday's Journal, in my opinion should receive more than passive thought by the city council and citizens in general before being condemned or acted upon rashly. To me it strongly appeals as being a move in the right direction, and one that should receive ample dissection before being laid aside.

The proposition of supplying the necessary funds for the erection of a plant suggested by Mr. Clayton, on a bond issue of the city, covering a 15-year period. Upon this special phase of the question I have not a knowledge as to how such a proceeding is controlled by the act governing municipalities. If such power is not vested in the city by the passage of a bylaw sanctioned legally by the people, then I believe such necessary steps should be taken to have special legislation enacted covering such an undertaking by the city of Prince Rupert.

A bond issue, say for \$200,000, for a period of fifteen years, on a net assessment roll of city real estate of \$15,000,000, subdivided into annual payments for sinking fund and interest at 7 per cent per annum would not exceed one half mill per annum, provided certain methods could be adopted.

Taking Mr. Clayton's figures on the number of vessels engaged in the fish business, contributory to Seattle, and their average fare per month, viz 131 bottoms at 25,107 pounds each monthly, would amount to 3,420,000 pounds as a total receipt in fish per month.

I will here venture a suggestion that would aid in lessening the burden of taxation on the rate-payers, while endeavoring to pay the sinking fund and interest for the redemption of the bond issue. That a civic port tax of one-sixteenth of one cent per pound on the gross receipt of 3,420,000 pounds monthly, to be collected from each vessel's fare upon landing, chargeable to each fisherman, if he fishes on shares, or to the vessel if she hires her crew, and such a tax on the suggested amounts would realize \$25,000 annually, a sum sufficient to cover the total sinking fund and interest on the required amount. This would be on a basis of the bonds selling at par and not to exceed 7 per cent per annum. Further considering the growth of the enterprise to the figures suggested by the fares landed in Seattle, and the possibility of a year of the fish failing, provision must always be made for the payment of the sinking fund and interest, hence the necessity of estimating the cash by direct taxation, which would not exceed one and one half mills annually upon a \$15,000,000 assessed real estate value, to redeem the total obligation if the tax upon fish was not resorted to.

Viewing the situation from this angle I am of the opinion that the city council would be acting wisely by calling a public meeting in the largest hall in the city and have Mr. Clayton demonstrate his plans, have the city solicitor give the law points that the citizens may get a full knowledge of the pros and cons bearing upon so important a subject before turning it down; that if necessary to petition the government for special legislation covering this matter if the municipal clauses act does not already permit it. If it does permit such steps being taken by the municipality under the

sanction of a bylaw passed upon by the people, then I venture to suggest such a bylaw being submitted at the earliest date possible.

I do not in anywise consider this matter dealing with franchises. I fully believe it to be a just means of aiding the development of our greatest natural resources, and of establishing a permanent payroll, the results of which can hardly be estimated in its far-reaching results.
