GERMAN SUBMARINE SUNK IN BLACK SEA

AUSTRIANS DRIVEN ACROSS DNEISTER---FIGHTING RENEWED ALONG NIEMAN

GERMAN SUPER-SUBMARINE SUNK BY RUSSIAN WARSHIPS

SUBMARINE WHICH DID DAMAGE IN THE DARDANELLES IS SENT UNDER IN THE BLACK SEA — WELSH MINERS STILL IDLE—LLOYD GEORGE TO VISIT SOUTH WALES

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 16.—The German super-submarine U-54, which is credited with sinking several of the allied ships in the Dardanelles including the battleship Majestic, has been sunk in the Black Sea by Russian warships.

The vessel eluded the cordon at Gibraltar and, after passing through the Dardanelles, entered the Sea of Marmora to attack the Russian Black Sea fleet.

Miners Still Idle.
In spite of a recommendation made by the miners executive, the South Wales miners refused to return to work today. D. Lloyd George is to visit the district. Mr. Lloyd George has admittedly

U. S. BATTLESHIPS PASS THROUGH PANAMA CANAL

Panama, July 16.—The canal was used today for the first time for battleships. The first-class battleships Missouri, Ohio and Wisconsin passed through from the Atlantic to the Pacific in eight hours.

FATAL EXPLOSION IN KENTUCKY POWDER MILL

Louisville, Ky., July 16.—A rigid investigation which has been made into an explosion which occurred at a factory of the United Safety Powder Company, resulting in the loss of four lives, shows that the explosion was caused by outside agencies.

Since the war began the factory has been under lease to a Canadian company, until a month ago.

The Board of Trade Information Bureau has received an inquiry regarding Prince Rupert's fish trade from McDonald, Seales & Co., of London, England.

This company is a large importer of frozen salmon, etc., and desires to get in touch with the Prince Rupert exporters. F. S. Wright, the Information Bureau commissioner, has furnished them with full particulars, including a list of Prince Rupert's fishing concerns.

FRENCH SUCCESSES IN HEAVY FIGHTING IN ARGONNE REGION

HILL IN ARGONNE FOREST RECAPTURED — HEAVY FIGHTING CONTINUES—GERMAN OFFENSIVE REPULSED AT VERDUN — RENEWED FIGHTING ON NIEMAN FRONT

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, July 16.—Hill 825, in the forest of Argonne, which was stormed by the Germans early this week, has been recaptured by the French. Heavy fighting in the Argonne continues.

A German effort to break through the French line of attack on the fortress at Verdun was repulsed with heavy loss.

Fighting Resumed.
London, July 16.—There has been a renewal of fighting on the Nieman front in the Russian provinces of Coutland and Kovno, following the arrival of German reinforcements. The Russians are offering a stubborn resistance. The general fighting on

the Russian front shows little change. The Austrians have been driven across the Dneister with heavy losses.

THAW DECLARED SANE BY JUDGE HENDRICKS

New York, July 16.—Judge Hendrick upholds the jury's verdict in the Thaw case, and finds that Harry Thaw is sane. The judge now orders Thaw's release on a \$50,000 bond.

CANADIAN EYE WITNESS MENTIONS MAJOR PECK

Sir Max Aitken, the Canadian Record officer serving with the army in France, in a detailed report upon the fighting of the Canadians from May 17 to 20, makes mention of Major Peck of this city, who commanded one of the companies that was assigned hazardous work. The morning of the 20th orders were issued for an attack on the orchard that night. A reconnaissance of the position was made by Major Leckie, brother of Lieut.-Col. Leckie, when patrols were sent out, one of which very neatly managed to escape being cut off by the enemy, and another suffered a few casualties. This showed that the Germans were in force, and that an attack on the orchard would be no light work. That night the Canadian Scottish occupied a deserted house close to the German lines and succeeded in establishing there two machine guns and a garrison of thirty men. The enemy were evidently not aware that we were in possession of this house, for although they bombarded all the British trenches with great severity throughout the whole of the next day, this garrison was left untouched. The attacking detachment under Major Rea consisted of two companies of the Canadian Scottish, one commanded by Captain Morrison, the other by Major Peck."

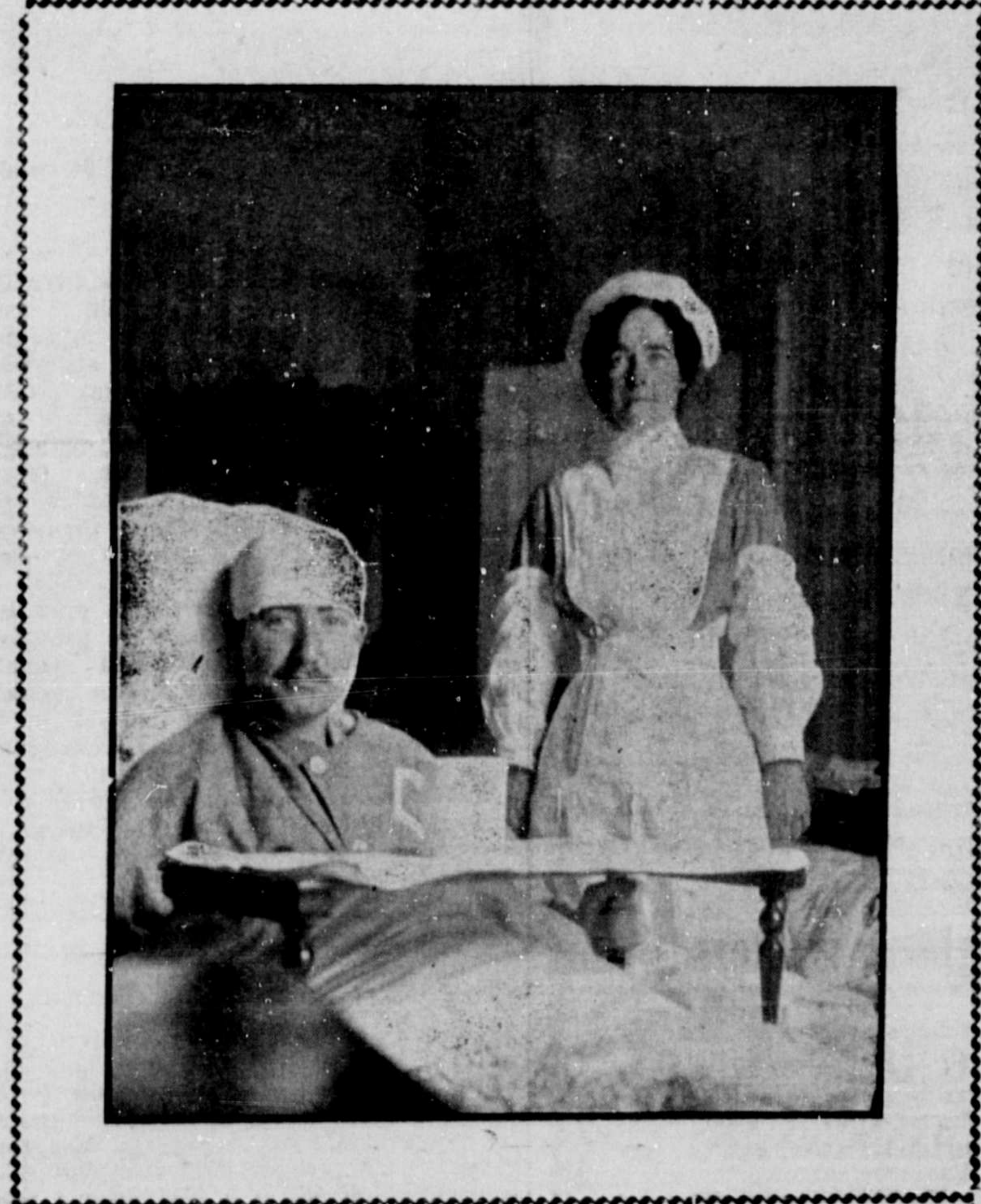

DAVID A. THOMAS WILL VISIT OTTAWA THIS WEEK

Ottawa, July 15.—The British government's new purchasing agent in Canada and the United States, David A. Thomas, is expected to be in Ottawa this week, and one of his first tasks will be to take up with the militia department's shell committee and with Canadian manufacturers the question of placing further orders in Canada for shells and fixed ammunition. A number of iron and steel manufacturers have been in conference with the shell committee during the past few days with a view to finding out Canada's capacity for shell and ammunition making. They are willing to enlarge the present equipment and output considerably if there is a reasonable assurance given that the orders will be forthcoming in sufficient volume to warrant the outlay for new machinery.

GERMANY'S REPLY

The German reply to the American note is typically Prussian in its insolence. It carefully ignores the question of guarantees for the future, and, in delightfully evasive language, throws the blame for the Lusitania disaster on to British methods of conducting the war.

The same type of argument was used to explain away the Belgian atrocities, and the use of asphyxiating gases in the trenches. From the German view-point, the end must always justify the means, no matter how brutal, and contrary to recognized international law the means may be.

Britain must be fought by any means, foul or fair, and if careless American citizens get in the way that is their own affair. What Washington may think or have to say in the matter is not of the slightest importance. It is plain that Berlin will be pleased to carry on a correspondence with Washington for years if need be, but that America will never get the slightest satisfaction.

The best reply America can now make is to have her shipyards go ahead and build the suggested motor speed boats, with which the British admiralty propose to clear the seas of submarines. It is evident that the only argument which is paid any attention to in Berlin is an argument backed by force. So long as Germany has a submarine, that vessel will

act the pirate, therefore, the only plan is to capture every submarine in sight and destroy those which are building. America can assist by producing a huge fleet of aeroplanes with which to attack the German ship-yards, ammunition depots and factories, and railroad centres. This is the only line of argument which suits the occasion, and America can follow it up without the formality of declaring war.

WAR BUSINESS

Estimating the "war business" for the United States at \$1,500,000,000, it is fair, says the National City Bank of Chicago, in a recent circular, to put the profit at \$300,000,000 or 20 per cent. "Such a profit appears enormous, but it has to be judged in each instance with reference to the loss encountered in dismantling the plant, and equipping it with expensive machinery for turning out work which it was never designed to produce. Most of the machinery will go to the scrap-heap as soon as the war ends, when each plant will have to be put into condition again to handle its normal business. This situation was clearly foreseen by manufacturers and in a measure provided for. But the after effects represented by the cost of restoring the plants and regaining the business that had to be sacrificed will be highly interesting, to say the least."

Putting the Canadian war business at \$420,000,000 and profits at 20 per cent., the profits would figure at \$84,000,000. To some extent the same conditions with respect to machinery, and noted above, apply to Canada. The after effects here will also be highly interesting. Gamblers in war stocks will suffer and some plants which have rushed headlong into the war order business, without proper consideration, will learn an ex-

pensive lesson. On the other hand, the war order business is likely to lead to a substantial Canadian export trade with Europe after the war is over.—Monetary Times.

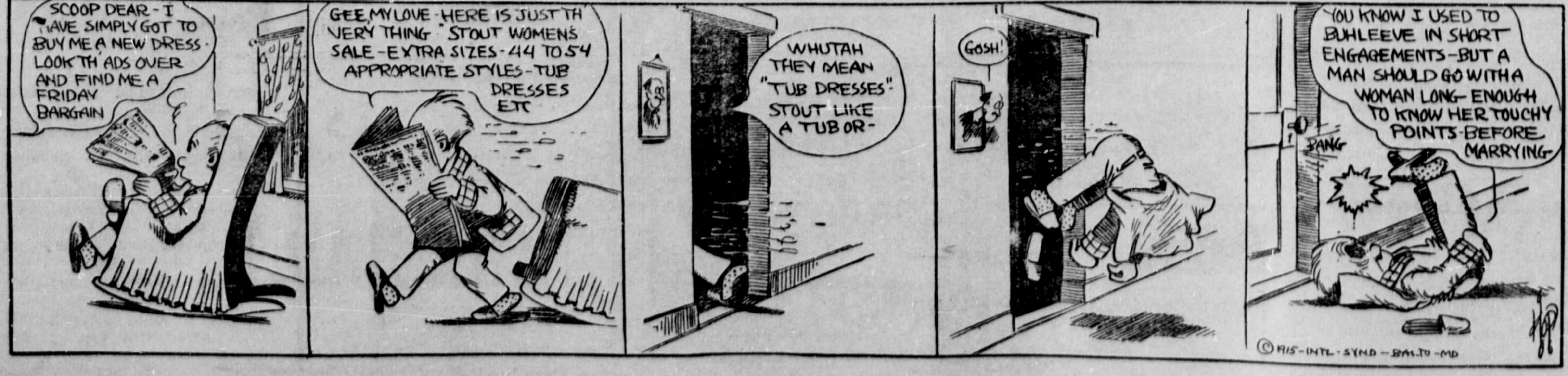

Pursuant to Bylaw 255 governing above, also resolution of Council dated July 12th. All licences are due and payable on July 15th, 1915, and must be paid forthwith. Section 33 of this Bylaw provides the following:

THE SUBMARINE BADGE OF OFFICE

As a crown is the badge of kings, and the three balls are the badge of pawnbrokers, so the badge of a submarine officer is a handfull of cotton waste.

When the half-dozen officers of a modern submarine, clad in their black leather waterproof suits, come aboard, a sailor stands on the tiny gangway to receive them, and to each he hands his waste rolled in a neat ball.

The reason is tht the steel doors and steel walls of a submarine sweat oil eternally. The seats sweat oil. The submarine officer, before opening a door or before sitting down, wipes the oil from the knob or from the seat with an unconscious gesture like that of pulling up the trousers to keep them from bagging.

Jovial young submarine lieutenants say that even the dishes sweat oil on a submarine trip. They say that before filling their plates with meat they mechanically wipe the oil from them with their balls of oily waste.—Ex.

The continued success of the italians in their invasion of Austria has led to the belief among diplomats that this nation will be a power to be reckoned with when the time comes to establish the future status of the Balkan states. This belief is having a great influence upon the shaping of the present policies of the Balkan nations.
