ALBERTA GOES DRY BY LARGE MAJORITY

RUSSIANS RETREATING AND LAYING WASTE COUNTRY BEHIND THEM--U.S. REPLY

RUSSIANS FOLLOW TACTICS EMPLOYED AGAINST NAPOLEON

RUSSIANS RETIRING AND LAYING WASTE COUNTRY BEHIND THEM--DRIVING ALL LIVESTOCK AHEAD -- PRESS CONTRAST RUSSIA'S TASK WITH THE WESTERN INACTION

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 22.—Services are being held throughout Russia praying for aid for her armies. They are attacked on the north, south and west. The Grand Duke Nicholas has maneuvered his armies so as to enable them to throw superior forces to either side, expecting to hold two fronts while he attacks the third. The Russians are following the tactics employed against Napoleon in 1812, burning and laying waste the country while they retreat, driving all livestock ahead of them. The situation is admittedly critical, requiring a high order of strategy. The spirit of the

army remains unbroken, though the Russian press contrasts the colossal battle along a 600-mile front with the comparative inaction on the western front.
Berlin Report.
Berlin, July 22.—Before evacuating Windau, the Russians applied a torch to the buildings, destroying the greater part of the city. They also fired the villages and farmhouses round Courland.

PATRIOTIC DEMONSTRATION AT AUDITORIUM AUGUST 4

CITIZENS OF THE EMPIRE TO COMMEMORATE THE FATEFUL DAY--THE CITIZENS OF PRINCE RUPERT WILL GATHER AT CITY HALL AND MARCH TO SKATING RINK

At a meeting in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon arrangements were made for a great patriotic demonstration to be held on August 4th, under the auspices of the I. O. D. E. and kindred associations. August 4th, 1914, was the fateful day, when Britain went to combat the barbarian despoilers of gallant little Belgium. On August 4th, 1915, the citizens of every city, town and village throughout the British Empire will place themselves on record as being united in the struggle for liberty. On that night the citizens of Prince Rupert will gather at the City Hall and will march en masse

to the skating rink on Sixth Ave., which has been kindly offered for the occasion by Mr. Marren, a patriotic concert will be given and a speaker will deliver an address on the progress of the war. Everything will be free, and it is earnestly hoped that the united voice of Prince Rupert will be heard, and that the echo will carry across the ocean to our boys in the trenches; to the munition workers; to ship workers, and coal miners, telling them that the citizens of the uttermost parts of the Empire are with them to the last man, and the last dollar, in bringing about the downfall of Prussianism. Be at the City Hall on the 4th and bring a flag.

INTERESTING LETTER FROM MRS. PHILPOTT

A letter reached town last night from Mrs. H. A. Philpott. Mrs. Philpott gives a very interesting description of her voyage across the Atlantic, including the embarking of 500 Canadian soldiers at Halifax. For the last two days the ship was navigated strictly according to orders from the Admiralty. Mr. Philpott, after drilling at Colchester, was transferred to Salisbury Plain, where he is now located. They are living in a beautiful quaint old farm house of the fourteenth century, situated a mile and a half from camp. Captain Philpott has received a letter from G. A. Hill, who went with the first contingent from here, and was transferred to the Princess Pats, in which he states that he fears V. F. G. Gamble was killed at the second battle of Ypres. Mr. Hill was wounded, but has since recovered and has now obtained a commission in the Manchesters. He has also taken unto himself a bride from the land of the Czar. Mrs. Cambie left for the south this morning. W. R. Trotter, of Vancouver Trades and Labor Council, arrived on the Rupert today, on labor business. Mr. Durkie, travelling pursuer for the G. T. P., came north on the Rupert this morning, accompanied by Mrs. Durkie and Master Durkie.

CHIEF ENGINEER WOODS ARRIVED LAST NIGHT

H. E. Woods, chief engineer of the G. T. P., accompanied by Mrs. Woods and their two daughters, arrived on the train last night. The ladies were delighted with the magnificent scenery of the mountains and rivers. Mr. Woods states that the trains from the coast will now connect with the government section east of Winnipeg. When in that city, Mr. Woods witnessed the arrival of the first train over the eastern section. The chief's party is making the round trip, leaving on the Prince Rupert for the south this morning and returning east over the C. P. R. from Vancouver.

SHAMELESS OFFER BY GERMANY TO STATES

London, July 21.—The Manchester Guardian concludes an editorial on the German reply to the American note as follows: "Since Germany cannot obey the laws of humanity while she uses submarines to do cruisers' work, she contends with characteristic logic that it is right for her to break them. It is the kind of logic which America has given ample proof that she will not tolerate; and coupled as it now is with an attempt to make the United States participate in German methods by communicating to Berlin the names and sailing time of ships that may go safe and thereby implicitly consigning others to their fate, it will probably convince President Wilson of the folly of continuing diplomatic relations with a government so shameless."

FOOTBALL MEETING

A meeting of the football association was held in the City Hall last night, when the fracas of Tuesday night was informally discussed. E. A. Woods suggested that the delegates from the various clubs impress upon their supporters that they should refrain from making offensive remarks to each other and the players. The matter will be officially discussed at a meeting in the City Hall on Friday at 8 p. m., when the referee will make his report on the game. The Callies and the Drydock meet tonight at Recreation Park in a league game.

GROSS SKIMPING BY SUB-CONTRACTORS

Toronto, July 21.—As the result of investigation made by government engineers in connection with the work done by sub-contractors of the Toronto harbor, entailing \$5,000,000 of contracts, gross skimping of the amount of material used has been found. Fifteen government inspectors have been dismissed following the discovery of the use of steel band to join up the crib work instead of wood. The value of the work done is about \$900,000 and may have to be done over again. The James Stewart Co., of New York are the original contractors.

PLOT TO BLOW UP C. P. R. ANGUS SHOPS

Montreal, July 21.—The police have under arrest an Austrian, Dementro Marelo, whom they believe was plotting to destroy the big C. P. R. Angus shops. Marelo was discovered yesterday in one of the big boiler rooms of the plant making measurements and he attempted to escape when discovered by the watchman. In the police court this morning he appeared badly scared and no satisfactory explanation of his presence in the works was obtainable. Incriminating papers were found on the prisoner. He was remanded.

LITTLE DONNYBROOK ON SECOND AVENUE

Evidently taking exception to remarks made by the Socialist speaker, H. Lester, at the corner of Second Ave. and Sixth St., last night, a number of Irish Fusiliers made a charge on the orator, demolishing his chair and putting an end to the meeting. Constable Shields protected the speaker, who was escorted along the street without further molestation. Disputes between civilians and soldiers followed and a few amateur boxing exhibitions were given, without anybody being seriously hurt.

ANCHORAGE LOT SALES AGGREGATE \$133,000

Seward, Alaska, July 20.—A report on the sales of lots in the townsite of Anchorage, Gook Inlet headquarters for the Alaska engineering commission, up to July 15 shows that 450 lots have been disposed of at a total of \$133,000. The sales for the first day, including a night session, totalled \$58,470, which breaks all department records for one sale. Commissioners Fred. Mears and W. C. Edes, with Andrew Christensen, head of the Alaska division of the United States land office, recently visited Matanuska Junction, the point from which the branch line to the Matanuska coal fields will leave the main line of the railway. They have decided that no townsite survey will be made there this year, owing to their inability to select the best location until the road is farther along. The commission has driven piles out to deep water at Anchorage, on which a drill will be mounted for the purpose of determining the nature of the bottom before commencing dredging for a coal dock slip. RUSSIAN TACTICS

For the next few days every eye will be centered on the German movement against the Russians. There is a difference of opinion as to whether the Russians will make a stand at Warsaw, or simply allow the Germans to take possession. From the start of operations, the Russians have kept the Kaiser and his staff guessing. In face of tremendous difficulties in transportation, Grand Duke Nicholas has kept his line intact, and has repeatedly inflicted very heavy losses on the enemy. It is clear that, if an attempt to hold Warsaw will endanger the solidity of the Russian line, the Russians will quietly withdraw as they did from Lemberg.

The farther the German forces are drawn away from home, the harder will it be for them to bring along re-inforcements and munitions, and the more liable are they to be cut off unexpectedly. It is much more important that the Russian line should remain intact than that Warsaw should be held. The whole business is a colossal game of chess which is clearly understood only by the players, but we may rest assured that the Russians are very far from being beaten. The apparent territorial advantage gained by the Germans may be their own undoing. The Allies on both fronts are working in conjunction, and it is more than likely that when the enemy has spread far enough afield in Russian Poland, interesting developments will take place on the western front, and in the Dardanelles.

ORGANIZATION

Why are not the factories of Canada more fully organized to manufacture munitions of war? Ten months passed before the factories of the United

Kingdom were organized. While it is true that a great many war orders have been placed in the factories of Canada they are still far from utilizing their entire capacity for making all sorts of articles needed by the Allies.

There is little use dwelling on the mistakes of the past except in so far as they spur us on to improve the present and future. The question is, are you awake now? Since the war started the principal concern of Canadian manufacturers was not whether they could make war munitions but whether they could get the orders. Many, after trying in vain to secure orders, gave up in disgust. Many are still seeking orders without success.

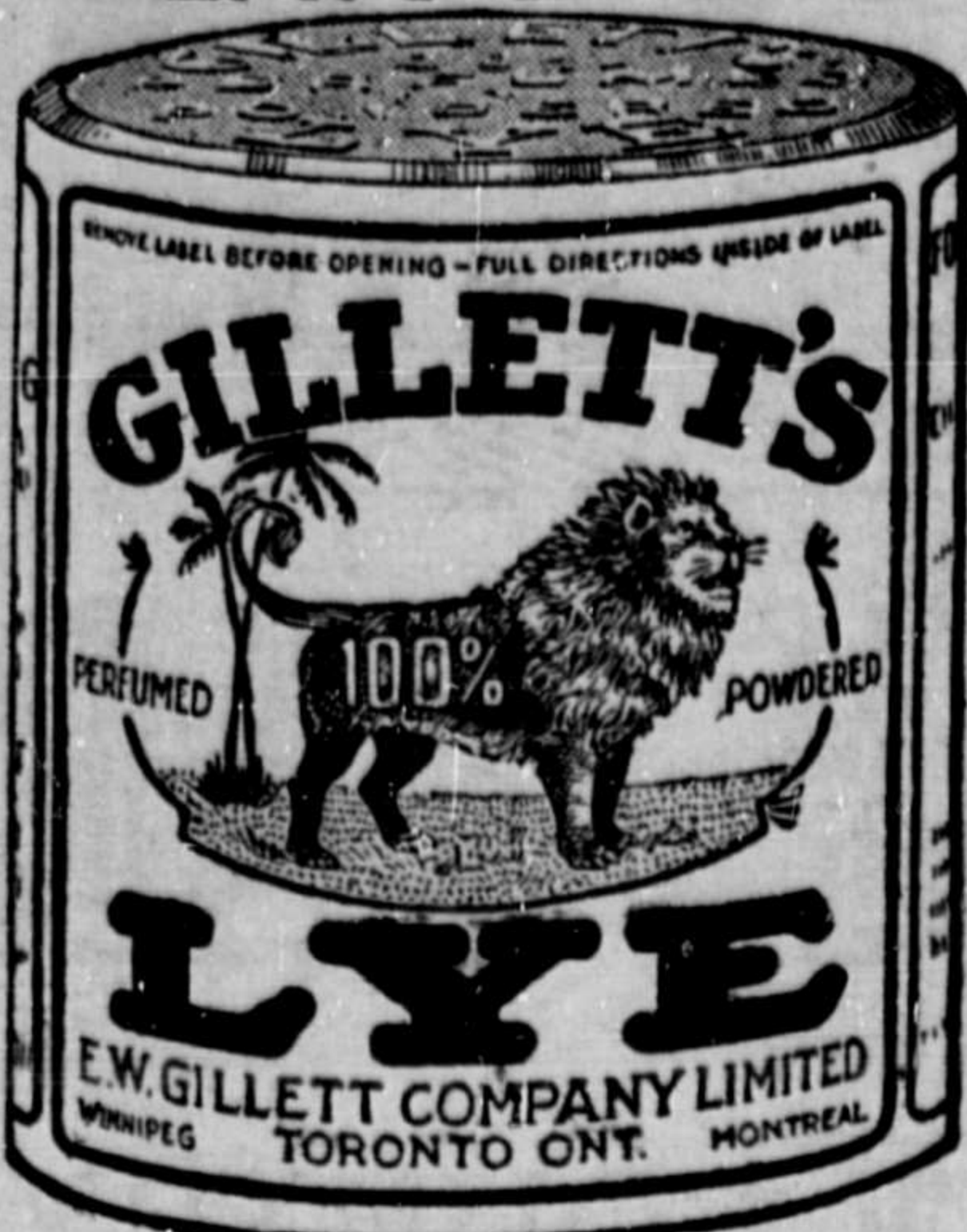
If the Allies are short of munitions as they claim, no factory in Canada that can make them should be idle. Instead of manufacturers chasing war orders, war orders should be chasing manufacturers.—Industrial Canada.

EMINENT SCIENTISTS ON INVENTIONS BOARD

London, July 21.—A number of eminent scientists and inventors have been appointed to assist Admiral Lord Fisher, who was recently selected as chairman of the invention board, the duties of which will be to co-ordinate and encourage scientific work in relation to the requirements of the navy.

The board will consist of a central committee and a number of consultants who will advise the main committee on questions referred to them. The central committee will be composed of Admiral Fisher, Sir Joseph Thompson Cavendish, professor of experimental physics at Cambridge University; Sir Charles A. Parsons, an expert on turbines, and Geo. T. Beilby, chairman of the Royal Technical College at Glasgow.

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AMERICAN CITIZEN IS SHOT BY AUSTRIANS

London, July 21.—Franz Berka, a laborer, who claimed American citizenship, was shot for high treason at Mafersich-Ostrau, in Austrian Silesia, June 14, according to the Daily Chronicle, which says it gets its information from a copy of the official journal of the province of Silesia.

Berka, who was 46 years old, says the Daily Chronicle, was tried before the military court, charged with using two traitorous expressions in an inn at Gross Helendorf. The expressions were alleged to be calculated to disturb the peace of the neighborhood. The court sentenced the man to be hanged, but the sentence was changed to shooting and was carried out two hours after its pronouncement.

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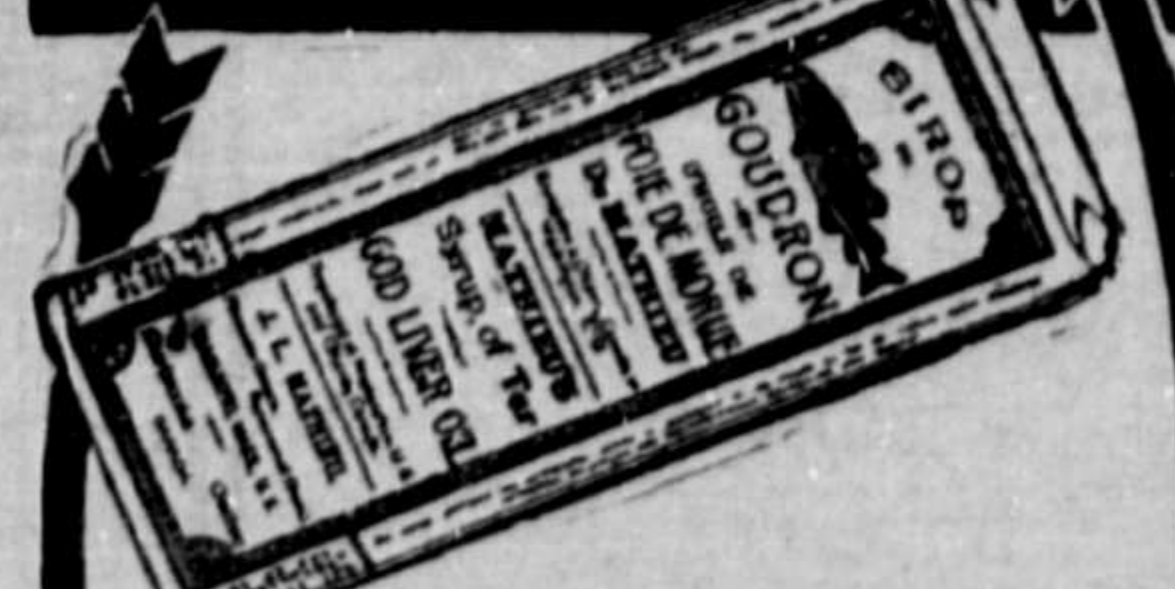
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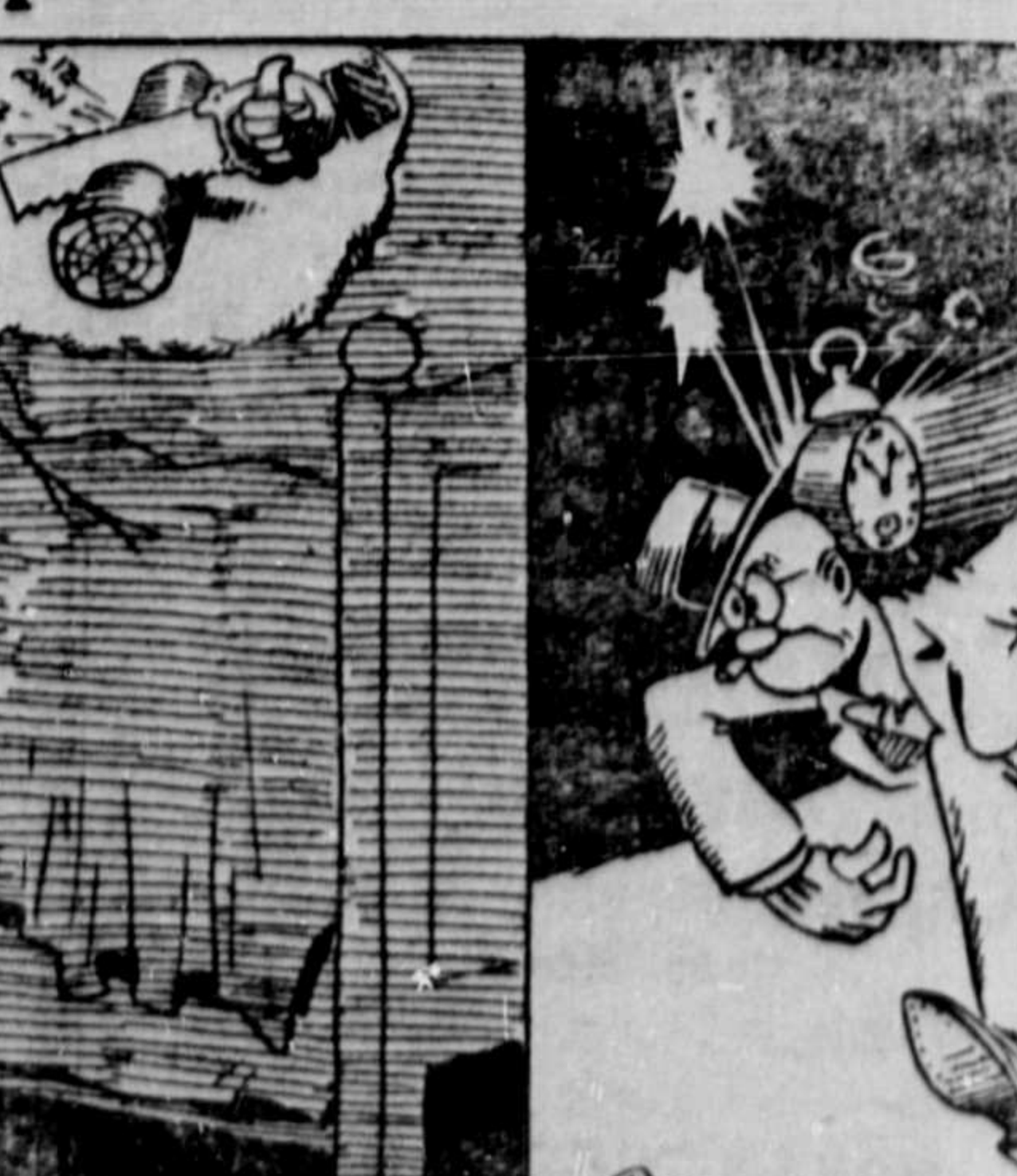

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Fisher left for Victoria on the Prince Rupert.

Mr. and Mrs. W. Fletcher Bredin left for San Francisco this morning.

A party of American tourists arrived on the Rupert, en route for Jasper Park.

The Prince Rupert left a party of five mining men at Hardy Bay on the way north.

W. S. Henderson, sub-editor of the Victoria Colonist, arrived on the Rupert this morning.

The body of Neil McLeod was taken to Seattle on board the Prince Rupert this morning. Mrs. McLeod and family accompanied the body south.

SENDS TEN THOUSAND TO CONSCIENCE FUND

Washington, July 21.—Ten thousand dollars in currency, the second largest contribution to the "conscience fund" ever received by the government, arrived at the treasury department today, mailed yesterday at New York, accompanied by an unsigned letter, saying: "The sender has paid double to the United States the amount he stole and still conscience is not satisfied. Here is another payment."

The package contained three one thousand-dollar gold certificates, eight five hundred-dollar certificates and thirty one hundred-dollar certificates and gold notes.

The money was placed with \$500,000 more which has accumulated in the treasury vaults from conscience-stricken folk, who have sent sums ranging from one cent to \$18,669.

AUTHORITY OF BRITISH COURTS IS QUESTIONED

Washington, July 21.—Formal notice that the United States holds that the rights of Americans who have cases before British prize courts rest upon international law and not upon the various British orders-in-council, or municipal law, is given in a brief statement cabled to Ambassador Page and presented by him to the London foreign office.

Secretary Lansing explained that this communication was not to be confused with the general note now in preparation relating to contraband and interference with American commerce on the high seas.

He said it was more in the nature of a legal caveat, generally conserving the rights of citizens of the United States whose cases are about to be tried by English prize courts.
