RUSSIANS HOLD GERMANS ON NAREW RIVER

GERMANS LOSE 13,000 MEN IN POLAND—ITALY TO DECLARE AGAINST TURKEY

IMPORTANT BATTLE RAGING WILL DECIDE WARSAW'S FATE

GERMANS HELD ALONG NAREW RIVER — PREPARATIONS FOR EVACUATION OF WARSAW COMPLETED — GERMANS DRIVEN BACK EIGHT MILES IN SOUTH-EASTERN POLAND

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, July 23.—The Russians are now holding the Germans along the Narew river. The battle which is raging in the Lublin district is expected to decide the fate of Ivangorod and Warsaw. Preparations for the evacuation of both strongholds are completed. The war office hopes that the Grand Duke Nicholas will succeed in repulsing Von Mackenzien in the south, and thus relieve the pressure of the Iron

ring. Riga is in course of evacuation. The populace has been ordered to leave if Von Buelow reaches the city.

Russian Rally.

Geneva, July 23.—Rallying from the staggering blows dealt by Von Mackenzien, the Russian forces on the Vepz river in Southern Poland have driven the Germans back eight miles to Krasnostaw. The German losses in the action are believed to exceed 13,000.

EXPECTED DECLARATION OF WAR BY ITALY AGAINST TURKS

TURKEY REFUSES TO PERMIT ITALIANS TO LEAVE—REPORT-ED TURKISH-GERMAN EXPEDITION HAS LANDED IN TRIPOLI—NO SUBMARINING—AUSTRALIAN LOAN

Rome, July 23.—A declaration of war by Italy against Turkey is expected as a result of her refusal to permit Italian subjects to leave Turkey. Reports that a Turkish-German expedition has landed in the Italian section of Tripoli has aroused the ire of the Italian press.

Submarines Quiet.

London, July 23.—No British

vessel has been the victim of a German submarine for eight days. This is the first week since the war began during which there has been no shipping loss of some kind.

Australian Loan.

Melbourne, July 23.—The House of Representatives has passed a measure providing for a £100,000,000 war loan to Great Britain.

SOCIALISTS PROTEST AGAINST MILITIA

A meeting under the auspices of the Social Democratic party was held in the S. D. P. Hall last night as a protest against the action of certain men of the Irish Fusiliers on Wednesday evening, when they forcibly broke up an open-air meeting which was being addressed by Chas. Lester, a Socialist. At the meeting last night 150 men were present and passed the following resolution: Prince Rupert, July 22, 1915.

Resolved in mass meeting that the citizens of Prince Rupert here assembled resent to the bitter end the act of the militia on the evening of July 21 in forcibly breaking up the street meeting conducted by Chas. Lester. And that we hereby call upon the members of the city council to pass a vote of condemnation on the act of the militia. And to guarantee by motion in council the right of free speech within constitutional lines.

GRAND DUKE MICHAEL TO BE REINSTATED

As a reward for his bravery and great tactical skill during the Carpathian battles, the Czar has reinstated his brother, Grand Duke Michael, to all the court honors of which he was divested in 1911 for marrying morganically the Countess Brassof. After the war the couple will be allowed their full rights of precedence in the Imperial Court.—Ex.

INSPECTION OF THE CITY CADET CORPS

Major W. H. Belson, of Victoria, Inspector of Cadet Corps for this military district, is in the city. He is here to make his annual inspection of the local body, which has been instructed by George Leek, and which has shown so much proficiency.

Last evening at Government Place, the inspection took place. Owing to the fact that the holidays are on, a number of the cadets are out of town, so that the attendance was not as great as would otherwise have been the case. About 21 were present and were put through drill by the inspector and by R. Fisher, the acting Cadet Captain.

Major Belson, in addressing the cadets, paid a compliment to the work which was being done by Mr. Leek. He spoke in high terms of the efficiency shown by the cadets. He explained that the drill which they took was not for the purpose of encouraging them to fight. They were driving a good training from this, which would benefit them in every way for all time.

Rev. Canon Rix, who was present, also spoke briefly to the cadets, supplementing what the inspector had said.

Major Belson takes a deep interest in the cadet movement. He believes that it should be identified with the school work, and that the training should be open to every boy attending the public schools. The School Board should see that an instructor was appointed.

KAISER WANTS WARSAW FOR AUG 1 CELEBRATION

Paris, July 23.—The Kaiser has ordered Generals Von Hindenberg and Von Mackenzien to take Warsaw by August 1, in order to celebrate the anniversary of the war with a Teutonic victory.

REFUSE TO FIGHT AT DARDANELLES

Rome, July 23.—Bulgarians from Philippopolis state that Turkish regiments in the garrison at Adrianople have refused to leave for Constantinople, en route for the Gallipoli Peninsula, says a despatch to the Tribuna from Salonika.

The despatch asserts that fifty officers and men were executed by the authorities in one day recently because of their refusal to go to the front.

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BIG LABOR CONGRESS TO MEET IN VANCOUVER

The Thirty-first Annual session of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada will convene in the Labor Temple building, Vancouver, beginning at 10 o'clock, Monday morning, September 20th.

The annual meeting of the Congress, held last year in the city of St. John, N. B., was considered one of the most successful. It was in the centre of the Maritime Provinces and afforded opportunities for those who live along the Atlantic coast to become better acquainted with the progress and work of the Congress. This year it is the turn of the Pacific coast and the city of Vancouver has been selected as the meeting place for the convention of 1915. Thus in the two years the labor interests at the two extremities of the Dominion find ventilation for their requirements and interests through the ever-expanding influence of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada.

Prince Rupert unions are entitled to eight delegates at this convention.

The forthcoming convention will be among the most important in the history of the Congress. Many legislative questions of vital interest to labor in Canada will be discussed and decisions arrived at. In addition a great number of pressing difficulties arising out of the gigantic struggle in Europe, will face the delegates for consideration and decision. The industrial situation in Canada is much different at the time of issuing this call than when our last convention was held. At this convention policies of great moment to the working class in Canada will have to be outlined. Among the many subjects for consideration are:—

Dominion and provincial legislation affecting labor interests, enforcement of the misrepresentation and monetary clauses of the immigration laws all the year round, the proposed eight-hour Labor Bill, and workmen's compensation acts in various provinces.

IMPORTANT RUSSIAN OFFICIAL COMING HERE

It is reported that a noted Russian visitor will arrive shortly, in His Excellency Gregory Wilenkin, special representative of the Russian Minister of Finance. He has been entertained by the financial and transportation men in Toronto and is coming west over the Transcontinental to Prince Rupert. It is reported that the G. T. P. has placed at the disposal of the Russian government all the facilities for handling munitions and other war materials at this point.

With the finest roadbed on the continent and terminal appointments capable of handling such material there is no reason why shipments should not go through Prince Rupert to Vladivostok. The huge crane at the drydock is powerful enough to meet all the requirements, while the ocean voyage is two days shorter than from any other coast point. It is to be hoped that the reports are true, and that at no distant date Prince Rupert will be getting its share of the world's war business.

AUGUST FOURTH

Wednesday, August 4th, is the first anniversary of the declaration of war between Britain and Germany, and throughout the Empire the British people will commemorate the occasion by demonstrating their firm determination to see the thing through to the end. Many had hoped that Prussianism would have been finally crushed before a year had passed, but the fact that it has not does not affect the British mind in the least. A year ago we set out to do something which humanity demanded, and if it takes ten years, or twenty years, and the last man and the last dollar, the end will be accomplished.

Lord Kitchener, at the outset, stated that the war would last for three years, and has since repeated his statement on several occasions. It is safe to suppose that the British War Secretary has good grounds for his belief, and, therefore, wise for us to make up our minds accordingly. If it is over sooner, so much the better, but one thing is certain—the war will be over only when Prussian Militarism has gone down to rise no more.

MANITOBA CONSERVATIVES

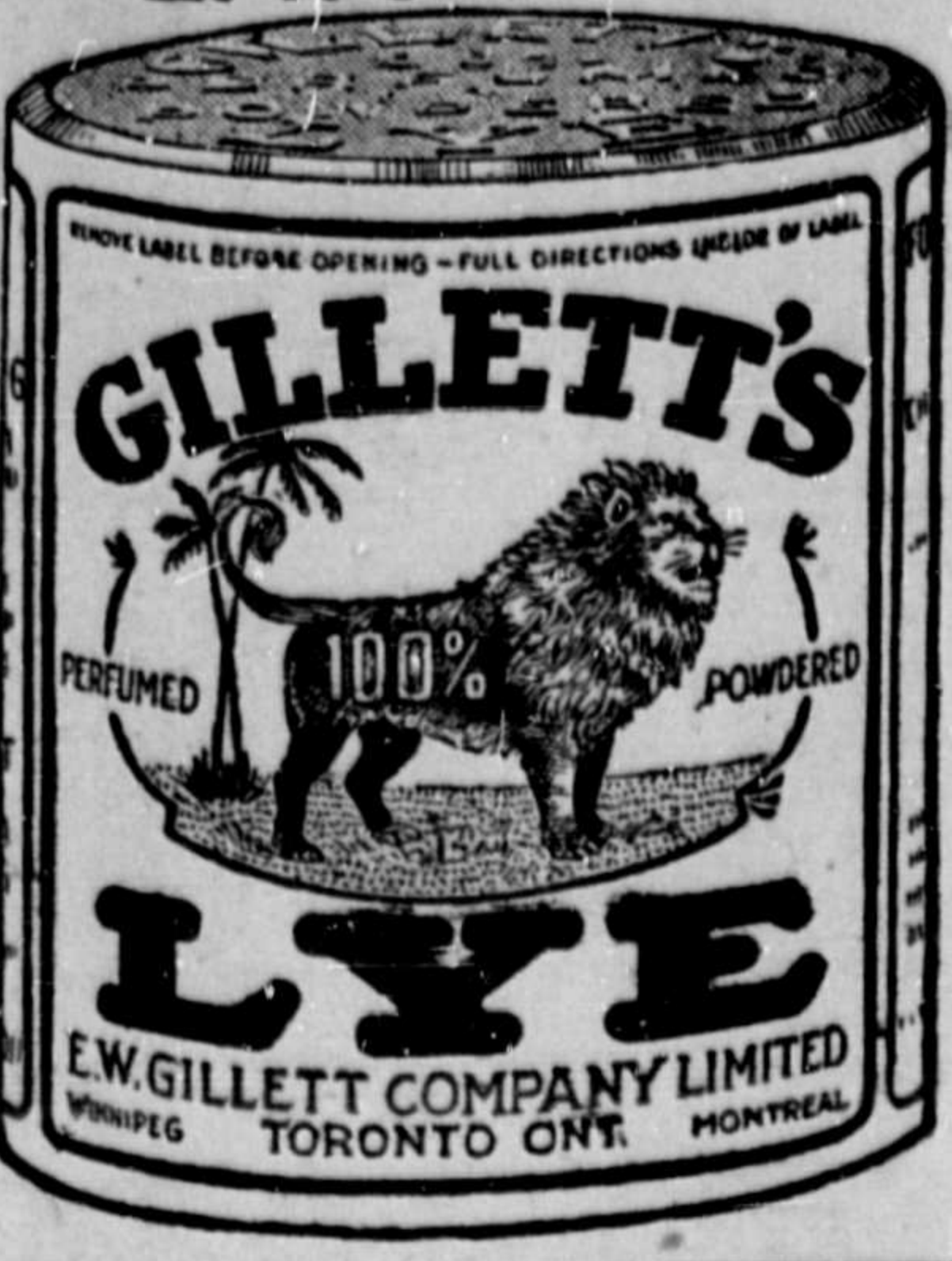
Having sent a whole flock of "scapegoats" into the wilderness bearing with them the burdens of their party's misdeeds, the Conservatives of Manitoba have met in convention to reorganize in view of an impending general election. The two obvious things to do were to wash their hands of the scandals which their leaders had perpetrated in the party's interests, and to adopt a platform of captivating planks on which to take their stand during the campaign, and they did them very thoroughly. Doubtless Sir Rodmond Roblin, Dr. Montague, Mr. Coldwell, and Mr. Rogers will feel indignant as well as

humiliated at such treatment, but that matters little now; they are all down and out except Mr. Rogers, and he may have to follow his old associates before very long.

The Planks selected by the Aikins faction are very good. It would have been sheer folly to choose any other sort, because they are the very planks on which the Liberals also will have to stand before the electors. This means that the respective platforms of the two parties will have very little to do with the outcome of the contest. The people of Manitoba will, if they are wise, note the fact that the Roblin-Montague scandal has not yet been cleared up, and that it will not be disposed of until after the perpetrators have been criminally prosecuted. The task of making further exposures cannot safely be entrusted to the party responsible for the scandals; if the clearing up is to be thorough that can best be secured by leaving the matter in the hands of those now charged with the investigation.

Those Conservatives who may feel like resenting this way of putting the case should bear in mind that the Parliament Building scandal was only the natural sequel of a long line of maladministration, which was just as rampant when Mr. Rogers was the real leader of the party as it was after his translation to Ottawa. It was always his boast, and he frankly repeated it on the floor of the House of Commons, that he knew how to "carry elections." So long as he could do this the Conservatives in the Legislative Assembly were willing to stand by him, and so far as the general public knew the Conservatives outside of it tacitly endorsed him. Their silence when they could have spoken with effect will be one of the grounds of judgment against them now. —Toronto Globe.

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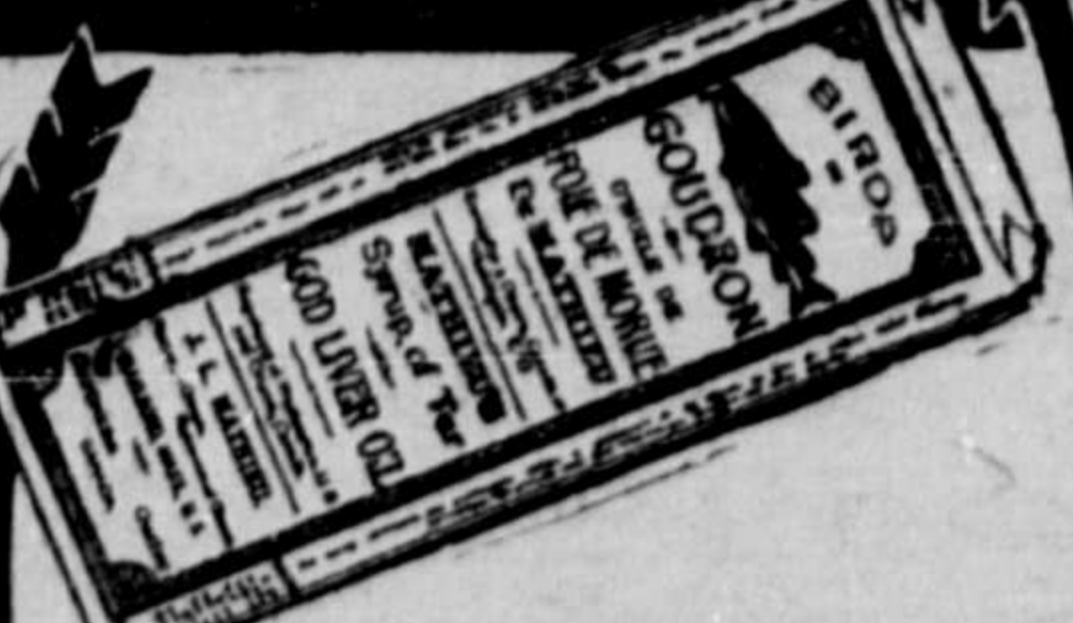
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SMITHERS NOTES

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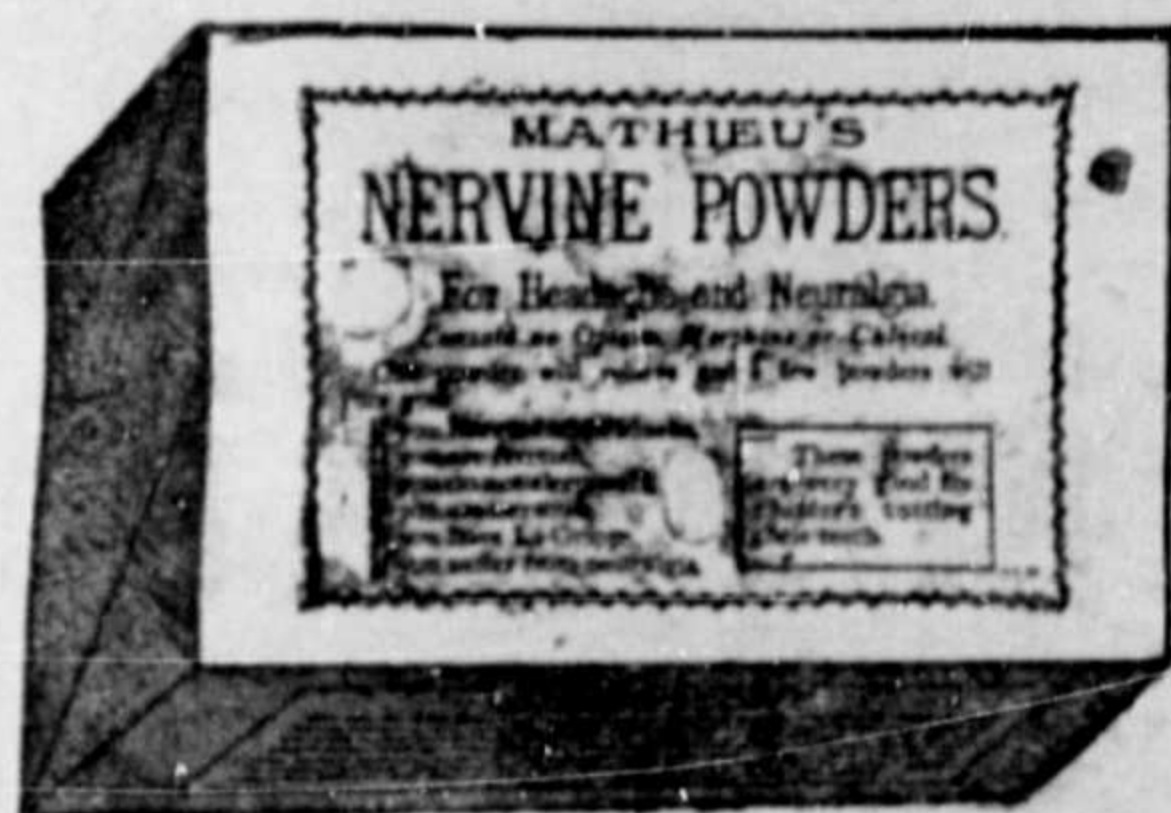
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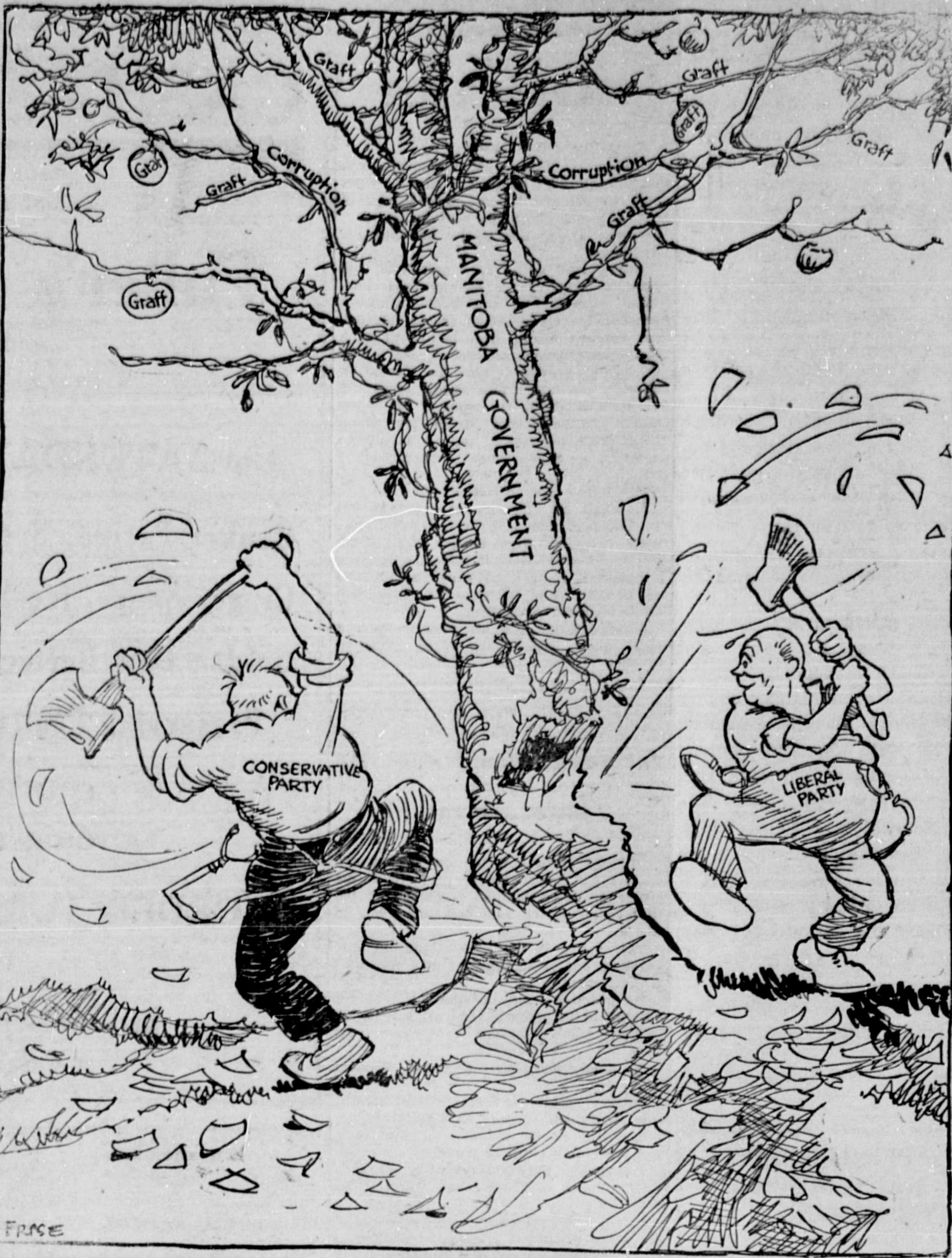

BRING CANADIAN WOUNDED HOME

Ottawa, July 22.—The convalescent hospital commission, appointed recently to undertake the work of caring for Canadian wounded men on their return to the Dominion from France and Flanders, have met for organization at Ottawa under the chairmanship of Hon. Senator Lougheed, acting minister of militia. The commission will make a selection of the homes and estates offered to the department for convalescent homes, of which there are about seventy, with a view to the establishing of a number in every province so that men who return may be as near home as possible while convalescing from their wounds.

It is proposed to bring as many of the more heavily wounded as can be transported safely to Canada for treatment instead of leaving them in France or England. The more serious cases will be treated at Quebec, where the new immigration hall, with accommodation for 500 beds, will be requisitioned.

NOTICE

Pursuant to Bylaw 255 governing above, also resolution of Council dated July 12th. All licences are due and payable on July 15th, 1915, and must be paid forthwith.

Section 33 of this Bylaw provides the following: "Any person guilty of a breach of this bylaw, or who carries on any profession, trade, occupation or calling, for which a licence or tax is provided for in this bylaw, without having first taken out such licence and having paid the licence fee or tax herein provided, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) together with the amount of the licence fee or tax, which should have been paid, and in default of payment, to imprisonment for sixty (60) days."

The Bylaw also declares: "It shall be the duty of every person or company holding a licence under this bylaw to exhibit such licence at all times in a conspicuous place in his office or place of business, so that the same may be seen by the officials of the city and any person doing business with them."
