TERRIBLE DISASTER IN CHICAGO RIVER

THOUSAND PICNICERS DROWNED--WARRANT ISSUED FOR ARREST OF ROBLIN

THOUSAND PEOPLE DROWNED WHEN VESSEL TURNED TURTLE

TERRIBLE SCENES ALONG CHICAGO RIVER WHEN STEAMER EASTLAND TURNS OVER WITH 3,000 PEOPLE ON BOARD--VESSEL OVERLOADED--MATE AND CAPTAIN ARRESTED

(Special to The Daily News.)

Chicago, July 24.—One thousand picnickers were drowned in the Chicago river at 8 a. m. today, when the steel steamer Eastland with 3,000 on board, made up of the Western Electric picnic party, turned turtle at the wharf. The hawser parted under the heavy strain and the big vessel floated out into the stream with a thousand women and children trapped in their cabins. The ship was overcrowded, as she had capacity for only 2,500. A broken airchute caused a rush to the side, which upset her.

A corps of workmen with acetylene torches, electric drills and steel saws are at work on the hull

trying to open the escape vaults. The hospitals are full of wounded.

Many crazed relatives had to be beaten back by the police with sticks in the rush of the mobs as bodies were brought ashore. The river was dotted the length of a city block with bobbing heads. There is no hope that any who were in the cabins are still alive. All brought out so far were dead. The steamer Roosevelt is being used as a temporary morgue. Five hundred bodies had been re-chute caused a rush to the side, which upset her.

There is terrific fighting between struggling people in the water were harrowing. Captain Pedersen and Mate Fisher of the Eastland have been arrested.

RUSSIAN PROSPECTS BRIGHTER FRESH TROOPS TO THE ATTACK

TERRIFIC FIGHTING BETWEEN BUG AND VISTULA RIVERS--RUSSIAN LINE SHORTENED AND STIFFENED--ITALIANS TAKE CORIZIA--NEUTRALITY VIOLATED

London, July 24.—Fresh Russian forces are attacking the Germans in Galicia with the purpose of relieving the pressure on the Warsaw line.

There is terrific fighting between the Bug and Vistula rivers. With the shortening of the Russian line here, the Russian defence has been stiffened and the prospects of the Russian armies improved.

Italian Success.

The Italian troops have taken Corizia. Swiss infantry has fired on German aviators. German troops have cut the barbed wire barrier at Largin on the Swiss frontier. It is supposed that they intend to violate the neutrality of Switzerland in order to outflank the French. The violation was discovered and Swiss troops were mobilized at this point.

He met Mrs. French here, she having come north for that purpose. Mr. and Mrs. French proceeded by the Princess Maquinna to Port Simpson last night. Returning they will go on to Victoria.

Mr. French has been out for several months now on his annual inspection of the northern posts. He visits Telegraph Creek on the Stikine before proceeding to the interior by way of the G. T. P.

In the interior he went in by Babine and proceeded to the junction of the Peace and Findlay rivers, on the way out he came by Prince George, where he took the train for here.

The advent of the train to this northern part of the province has simplified the work of the inspection considerably, doing away with many of the tiresome river voyages which were necessary before the railway line was constructed.

WARRANTS ISSUED FOR ARREST OF ROBLIN AND EX-MINISTERS

ROYAL COMMISSION ENQUIRY RESULTS IN ATTORNEY-GENERAL ISSUING WARRANTS FOR ARREST OF ROBLIN, COLDWELL, MONTAGUE, HOWDEN AND CONTRACTOR KELLY

Winnipeg, July 24.—Following the disclosures made by the royal commission enquiry into the parliament buildings contract, and the report of R. A. Bonnar, warrants have been issued by the attorney general for the arrest of Former Premier Sir Rodmond Roblin, the three ex-ministers, G. R. Coldwell, J. H. Howden and W. H. Montague, and Building Contractor Thos. Kelly.

Bonnar will conduct the prosecutions. Extradition proceedings will be taken to compel the return of Kelly.

The commission proved conclusively that Contractor Kelly

had been over paid to the extent of \$800,000, the bulk of which sum was to be used for party purposes.

At the last moment, when disaster seemed certain, the conspirators tried to bring down the Liberals in the crash, but utterly failed in the attempt.

ANOTHER APOLOGIST

Mr. A. Lucas, M. L. A., is the latest disciple of Bowserism to attempt to deal with the statements in "The Crisis." Like the others, he sticks to delightfully vague generalities, and makes no attempt to take the statements in detail, and say that any particular statement in regard to the land held by speculators is false. Mr. Lucas deals at length with the per capita production of British Columbia, and talks in real McBride fashion of the vast increase to be expected in the future, but he does not attempt to say that such-and-such a syndicate does not own a certain huge acreage which should be in the hands of farmers. He states that the government "wants to give everyone a chance," but he carefully passes over the hundred chances to one which the speculator has been given, in preference to the genuine producer.

The figures quoted in "The Crisis" are not Moses Cotsworth's, but official figures taken from the records at Victoria, and these records show clearly that huge tracts of the most fertile land in the province have been handed over to capitalists, in order that these gentlemen may reap a rich harvest from the land-seeker. Mr. Lucas states that 58 per cent. of the 22,618,000 acres of agricultural land in the province is available for settlers, but he carefully omits to mention that "in answer to questions sent by the Agricultural Commission to the Provincial Assessors, asking how much agricultural land is still available within twenty miles of a railroad, or wagon road, no less than twenty out of twenty-nine Provincial Assessors replied that there was none left."

Mr. Lucas forgot to mention that "these answers were entirely suppressed in the report of the Agricultural Com-

mission, and though Mr. Parker Williams, M. L. A., secured an order of the house on February 19, 1915, for a return showing the complete answers, the return was never made. McBride stated that it could not be got ready in the fifteen days intervening. But Mr. Cotsworth found the original answers in the office of the commission and, later, compiled the full return in half a day."

The official records speak much more clearly than the party politician on the platform, whose sole aim is to cover up "mistakes."

MY SOLDIERS

"I send you my congratulations and the admiration of my soldiers, who have carried the badge of Canada into the battlefields of Flanders for liberty." This striking message was cabled to Hon. Louis Botha by Major-General Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defence, who fifteen years ago met the South African Premier as a foe, says The Mail and Empire's London correspondent in a cable dated July 12th. The Globe has refused to take part in recent attacks on General Hughes, believing that the Minister of Militia had a great work to do and that his attention ought not to be distracted by the necessity of defending himself from the assaults of his enemies. Criticism of the Militia Department in the raising, equipping, and sending forward of men to the front is legitimate and has proved salutary, but personalities should be avoided if at all possible.

General Hughes, however, goes too far in his cable to General Botha, and his colleagues in the government should tell him so plainly. He has a perfect right to send his congratulations to the great South African, but he offends against good taste when he



speaks of Canada's army as "my soldiers." There are too many budding Napoleons abroad in the world today who regard themselves as heaven-inspired leaders of men, entitled to command by reason of their superior mental endowment. General Hughes may think he belongs to this superior order of humanity, and that Canada's soldiers are really his. But they are not. They fight for freedom, not for General Hughes. It is an impertinence on the part of the Minister of Militia, in a message to the Premier of South Africa, to speak of the Canadian troops in Britain as "my soldiers." The King himself, who alone has the right to use the phrase, does so very rarely. Let General Hughes cultivate modesty; he will thus possess himself of at least one of the attributes of true greatness.—Toronto Globe.

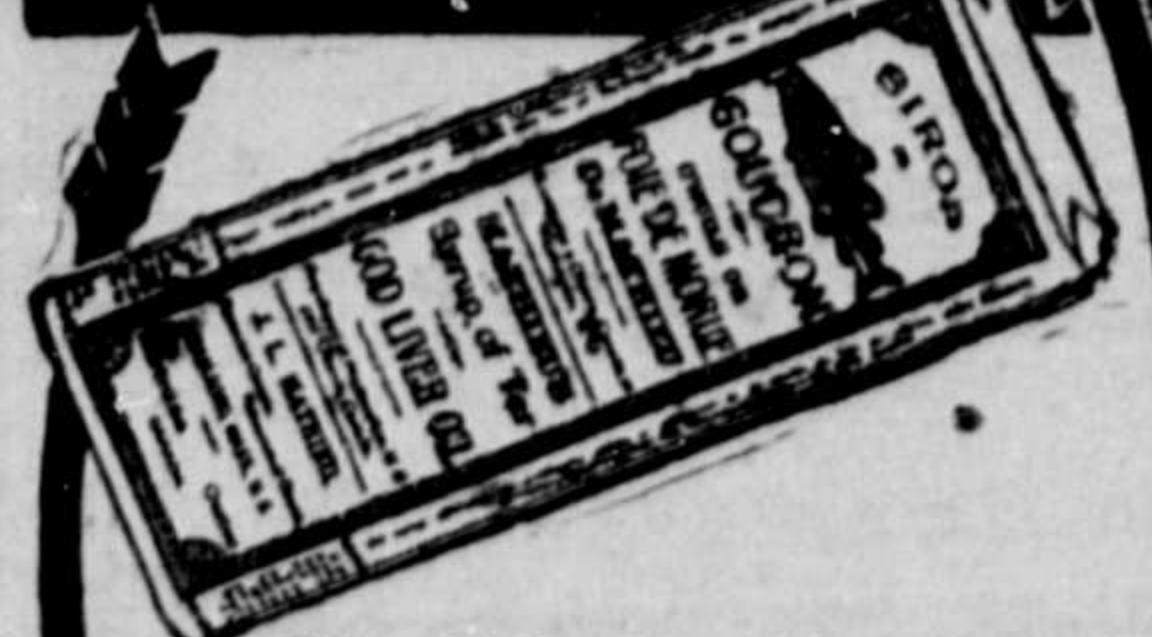

DEVELOPMENT ON GROUSE MOUNTAIN

F. C. McKinnon has secured control of a very promising property of copper ore on Grouse mountain back of Barrett's ranch and within five miles of the railroad. He has three men sinking a shaft in the way of development. They are forking on a twelve-foot vein which shows two feet of ten per cent. copper on the foot wall and five feet of four per cent. copper adjoining it. Every effort is being made to get a considerable tonnage ready for shipment this winter, when the ore will be hauled to the railway in sleighs. The property is a big one and promises to employ quite a large number of men as soon as the development is far enough advanced.—Omineca Herald.

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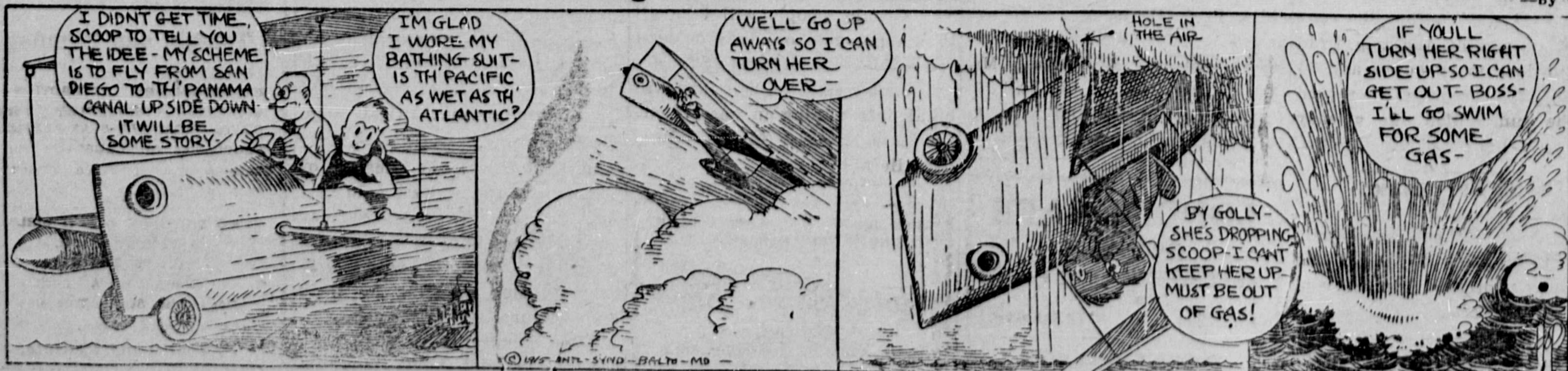
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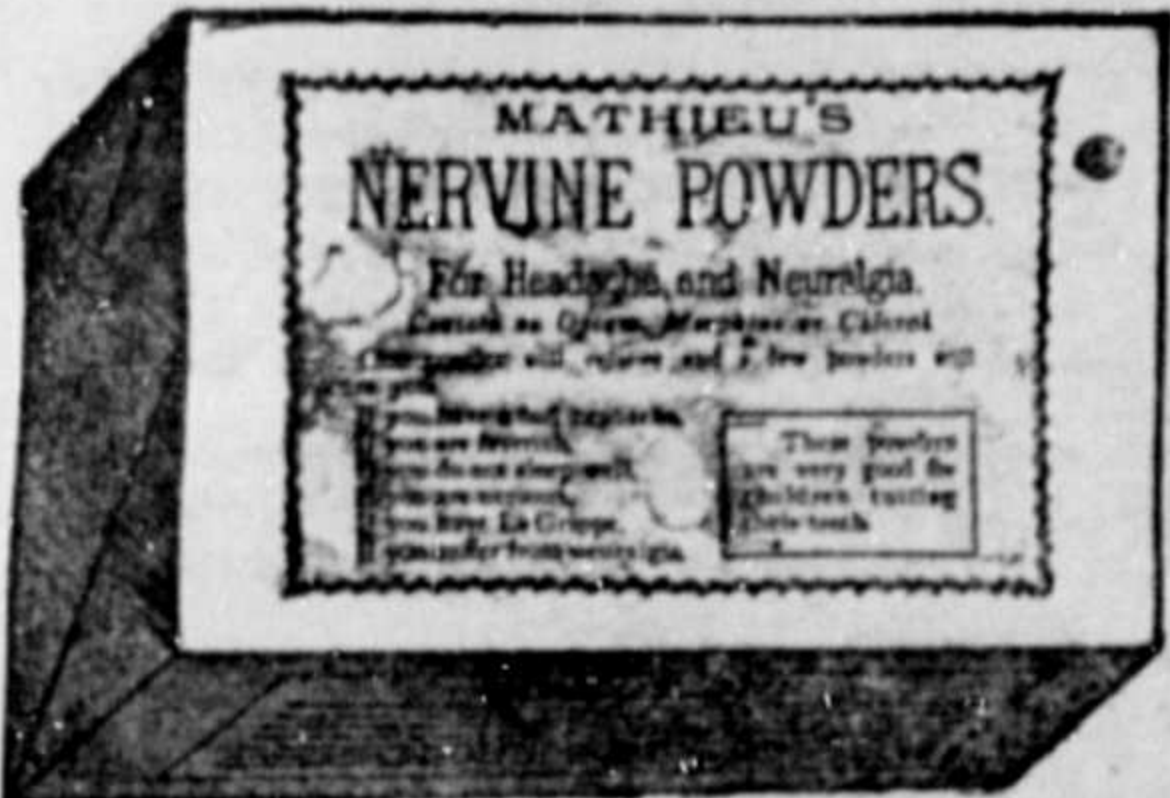
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ANOTHER LUSITANIA VICTIM'S BODY FOUND

BRITISH INVENTIONS MAY SURPRISE ENEMY

London, July 23.—The appointment of an invention board of scientific men, with Lord Fisher, recently first secretary of the lord of the admiralty, as its head, to assist the British navy, was largely the result of the suggestion made by Lord Bryce, formerly ambassador to the United States, to the House of Lords, and following upon a discussion on which similar proposals were made by Sir William Ramsay and other eminent scientists.

The admiralty received 16,000 offers of new scientific devices during the first five months of the war. The board undertook to sort the wheat from the chaff; to eliminate the "crank" proposals, and to reduce to 25 the number which, in the board's estimation, were worthy of any attention. Another board has scrutinized these 25 more rigidly and reduced them to just two. These two are being worked out with every precaution of secrecy.

Elaborate trials have been made of one of these devices in English waters and in actual service in the Dardanelles. Rigid secrecy has been observed as to the details, but it can be said that the trials give promise of rendering a battleship immune from the submarine torpedo.
