12 BODIES RECOVERED IN CHICAGO DISASTER

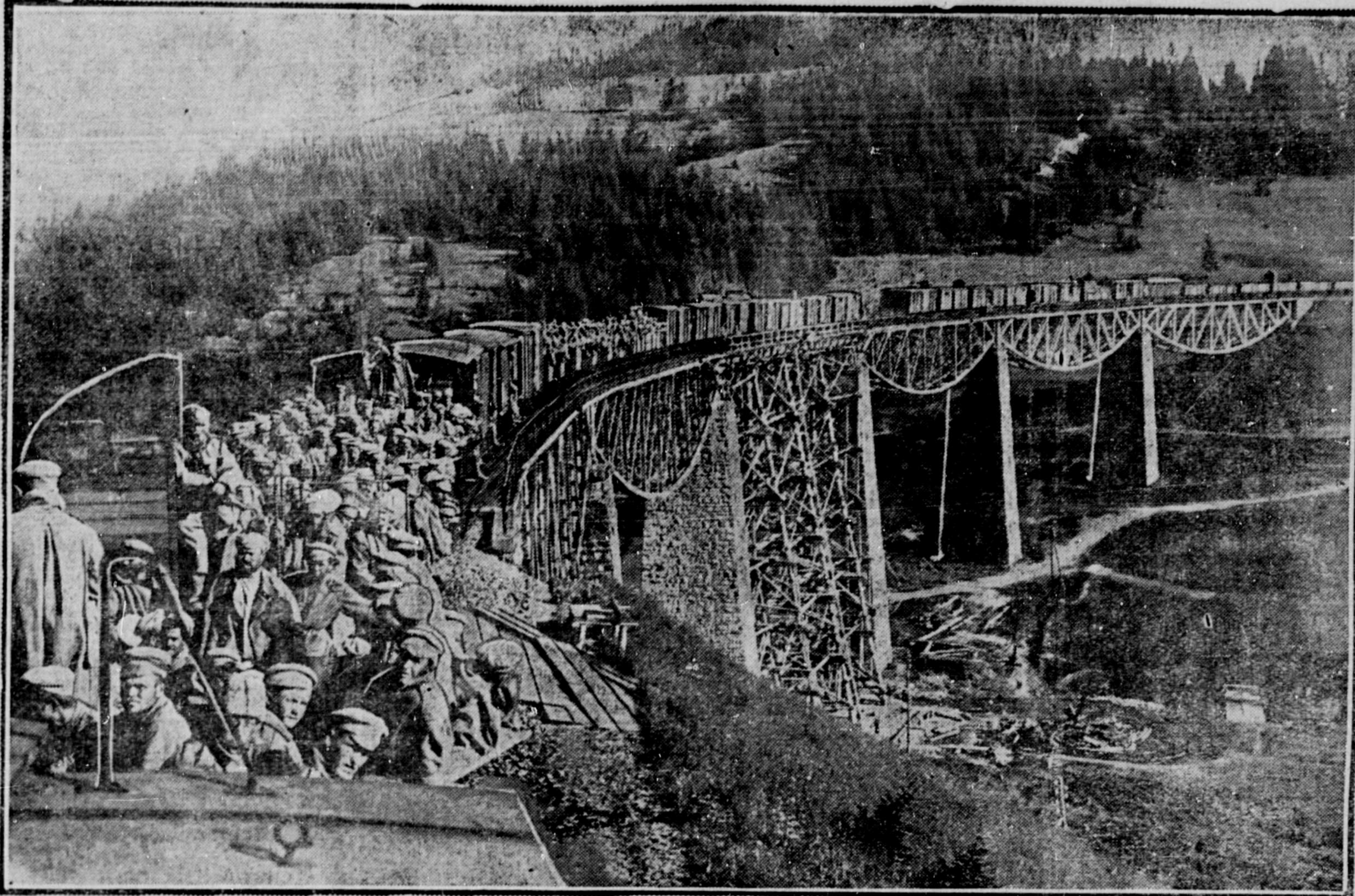

GERMAN SUBMARINES ARE ACTIVE AGAIN

London, July 26.—The American steamer Leelanaw, from Archangel to Belfast with a cargo of flax, has been torpedoed off the north coast of Scotland. The British steamer Brangewood, 3,000 tons, from Archangel to France, has also been sunk. Both crews were landed.

BRITISH SUBMARINES REACH CONSTANTINOPLE

London, July 26.—A British submarine has returned to the Dardanelles, having penetrated Constantinople harbor, sinking two gun-boats and a steamship. Another submarine sank a transport and blew up the wharf at Tophane, near Constantinople.

VON MACKENZEN REPULSED--RUSSIANS MAY SAVE WARSAW

GERMANS ARE SHOWING SIGNS OF EXHAUSTION AFTER TWO WEEKS FIERCE FIGHTING--VON HINDENBERG IN A DANGEROUS POSITION--FORWARD MOVEMENTS ABANDONED

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, July 26.—Von Hindenberg and Von Mackenzen are both threatened with defeat. The Germans are showing signs of exhaustion after two weeks unbroken battle between the Vistula and the Bug. Sorties by the Russian garrison at Norogeorgievsk have retaken all the ground north and east of the fortress which was lost in the previous operations. Facing Von Hindenberg in a dangerous position. Von Mackenzen has been repulsed at all points. He has abandoned his forward movement and is making strenuous efforts to protect his flank. At Klimek, the Germans have been driven back with the

loss of six guns and 500 prisoners.

In Galicia.
General Bohem has been defeated at Spokal, in Galicia, with a loss of over 4,000 prisoners. The Lublin line shows no sign of weakening.

MACHINE GUN

The gentlemen in charge of the list feel that it would be very appropriate if the announcement could be made on August 4th, the anniversary of the war, that Prince Rupert has been able to purchase a machine gun. The subscriptions will be published daily.

HEDLEY PRESENTS THREE MACHINE GUNS

THE PURGING PROCESS IN THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY

H. F. GADSBY DEALS WITH THE MANITOBA ENQUIRY—SUGGESTS THAT SUCH AN INQUIRY IN BRITISH COLUMBIA WOULD DISCLOSE SOME EXTREMELY INTERESTING FACTS

Ottawa, July 25.—Much interest is expressed here in the efforts of the Conservative party in Manitoba to purge itself of the Roblin crowd. The parliamentary branch of the Conservative party, all over Canada, has had to do a lot of purging lately. Methods have differed, but the results have been about the same—the grand old party is in a bad way yet, seal brown taste, fur on its tongue, specks before the eyes and other symptoms of torpid liver.

At Ottawa Premier Borden purged the party by kicking Garland and Foster out, which was good medicine as far as it went, although Bob Rogers stated his opinion that a general election was needed to complete the cure. He changed his mind, however, when the Roblin "Real Estate government" started to purge itself of its records resigning, not willingly you may be sure, but under compulsion from the lieutenant-governor, who held the bitter cup of a graft inquiry to its lips. That was the way they did it in Manitoba. In British Columbia they have another plan—coalition government, which would head the other fellow off by making him an accomplice after the fact. There is no doubt that a Royal Commission of Inquiry, which would deal with the purchase of submarines by Sir Richard McBride, the railway subsidies granted to the Vancouver, Victoria and Eastern and the alienation of crown lands to specula-

tors, would open up a lot of interesting facts.

Meanwhile, the Manitoba disclosures hold the centre of the stage. With two commissions going on at the same time, it has been a matter of some difficulty to keep track of the evidence. It (Continued on Page Two)

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS

For weeks past, honest men of all shades of political opinion have been disgusted because of the revelations disclosed by the Royal Commission sitting in Winnipeg, which culminated in warrants being issued for the arrest of ex-Premier Roblin and three of his colleagues. If these men are convicted of the crime for which they have been arrested, there should be no display of maudlin sentiment in their favor. This is no occasion for party rejoicing over the downfall of opponents. The matter goes far beyond the bounds of party politics, though it had its origin there. In the interests of public purity, men who are found guilty of misappropriating public funds should be dealt with as ordinary criminals. If there is any difference between highwaymen or burglars and politicians who are found guilty of graft, it is that the former are straightforward, while the latter display the lowest possible type of cunning.

Apart altogether from the moral aspect of the matter, it is bad business for any province in the Dominion to tolerate for a moment anything in the shape of misuse of public funds. Canada is a borrowing country, and must continue to borrow for years to come, therefore the credit of the Dominion must be kept beyond reproach. The good name of Canada should be infinitely more important than any temporary party political expediency. The situation seems to call for an independent audit of all public accounts at regular intervals. Such matters should not be left to the tender mercies of party appointees.

Recent happenings in Manitoba will have been reported all over the world, and there is bound to be a general suspicion that a similar state of affairs exist in other provinces. Under the circumstances, a

searching audit should be made of the accounts of every province in the Dominion. Doubtless Sir Richard McBride would rise up in righteous indignation at the idea of such a thing in British Columbia, just as he resented enquiry into the purchase of the submarines. If it is necessary that the books of a municipality be strictly audited at regular intervals, it is doubly necessary that the accounts of every province should have the same treatment.

Were an independent audit made in British Columbia, we should probably discover what became of the \$45,000 which was not accounted for in the Songhees Reserve deal, and it is just possible that the public might find out why the cheque in payment of the Chilean submarines was split. It would be interesting to find out whether it was the fault of the cheque, the submarines, or someone else. Accidents will happen in the best regulated families or governments, and the McBride government has been so nicely regulated in some ways that accidents may often have happened. After what happened, Canada must show a clean bill of health politically, or remain under grave suspicion.

MONEY BYLAWS

On Friday, July 30, citizens will be called upon to vote on two money bylaws, one to sanction \$10,500 for the re-decking of plank roadways, and the other for \$1,500 to construct a plank roadway to connect with the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage plant at Seal Cove.

Many of the plank roadways are at present in a dangerous condition, and it is therefore imperative that they be re-decked as soon as possible. The object of the roadway to the Cold Storage is to link the fishing trade more closely to the city. It is considered

will be well to recall the main facts, which are these: The Mathers commission was the first appointed. Its object was to inquire into charges made in the legislature by Mr. Hudson, then an opposition member, now attorney-general, to the effect that the foundation of the new parliament buildings in Winnipeg, which was to cost \$60,000, had cost \$860,000, and that Kelly, the contractor, had been paid for an enormous quantity of building materials which he was never called on to supply.

Whereupon the Roblin government resigned and each member thereof proceeded in his own way to stand from under. They expected to head the commission off by getting Kelly to return the graft and making a bargain with the Liberals to use the soft pedal, but public opinion was too strong, and Premier Norris was too honest for them and so the inquiry went on. It was up to Sir Rodmond Roblin's cabinet ministers to make excuses, and this they did. They did it good and plenty.

wise, in order to keep down taxation for this year by spreading the cost of this work over a period of four years. The council apprehend no difficulty in disposing of debentures to cover the cost.

It seems good business to proceed with this work at the earliest possible moment, and the hearty support of the citizens on Friday is looked for.

A little later it is proposed to submit a bylaw for the purpose of establishing a wharf in order to encourage the fishing industry of the port.

Excuses were as thick as leaves in Vallambrosa, but none was quite good enough to save the face of a discredited government. Premier Roblin admitted "over-payments" and laid the blame on department officials. He also admitted tearing up orders-in-council and signing papers which he did not read and acting one way and another more like a lunatic at large than the prime minister of a great province. Dr. Montague, minister of public works, admitted discrepancies, but blamed it on his health—he was too sick to attend to little matters of detail which might have prevented the people of Manitoba being robbed of a million dollars. It transpired, too, that the Doctor was a great hand at troublesome or incriminating orders-in-council, and could tear up as many of them as Sir Rodmond himself. Ex-Attorney-General Howden admitted irregular transactions with Kelly, but blamed it on custom, tradition and party method of raising a campaign fund. He could see that splitting with Kelly, perhaps on a fifty-fifty basis, was wrong, particularly when some part of it was to be devoted to such a good cause as returning the Roblin government to power. In short, the blame was well shifted. At this game of "passing the buck" the Roblin outfit showed itself a world beater.

However, the evidence kept coming out. Horewood, the provincial architect, now an exile in New York State, admitted changing plans, making bogus specifications, certifying fraudulent estimates and jockeying the figures generally, with a view to helping Kelly to draw \$1,000,000 out of the provincial treasury for the

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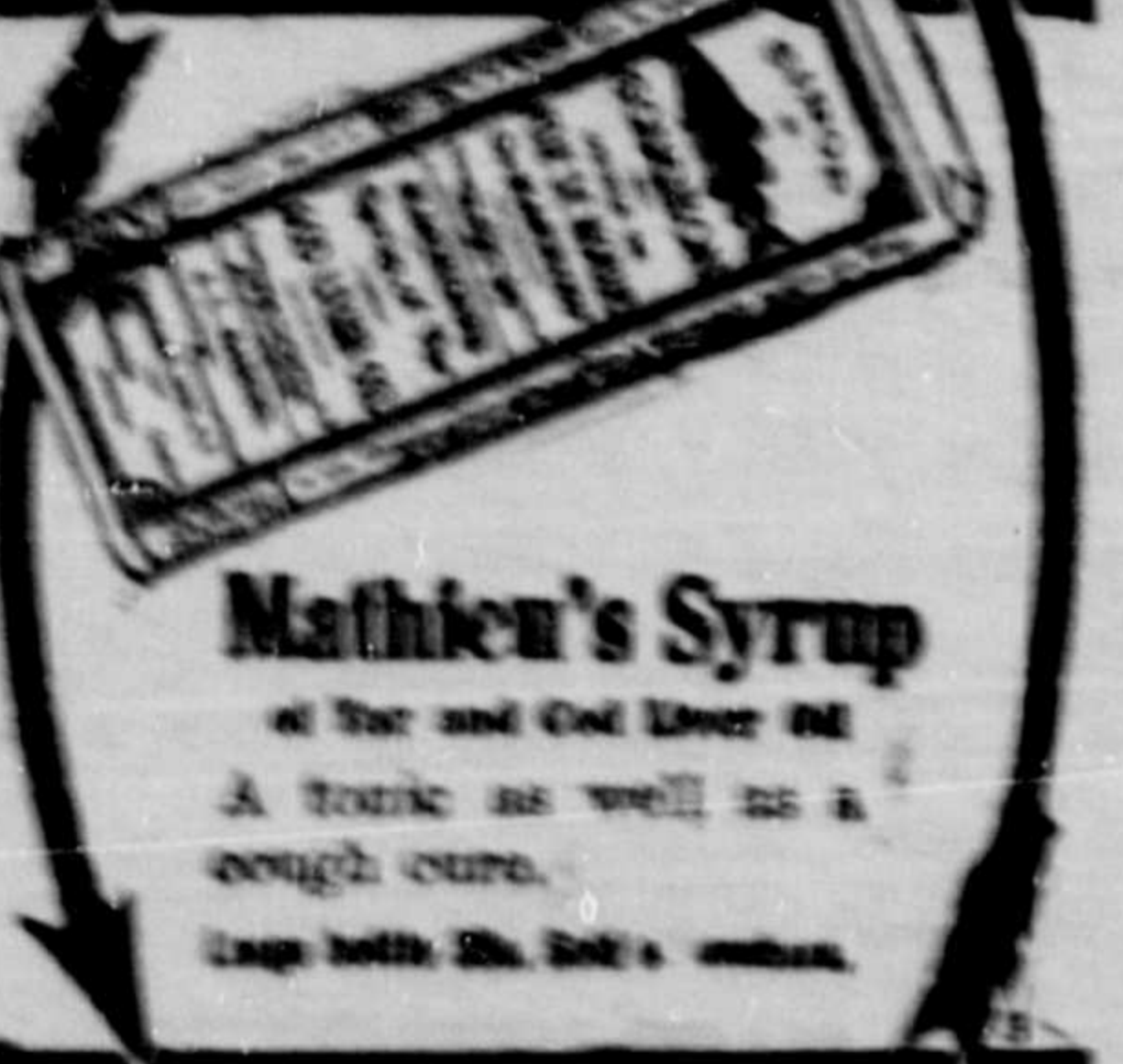
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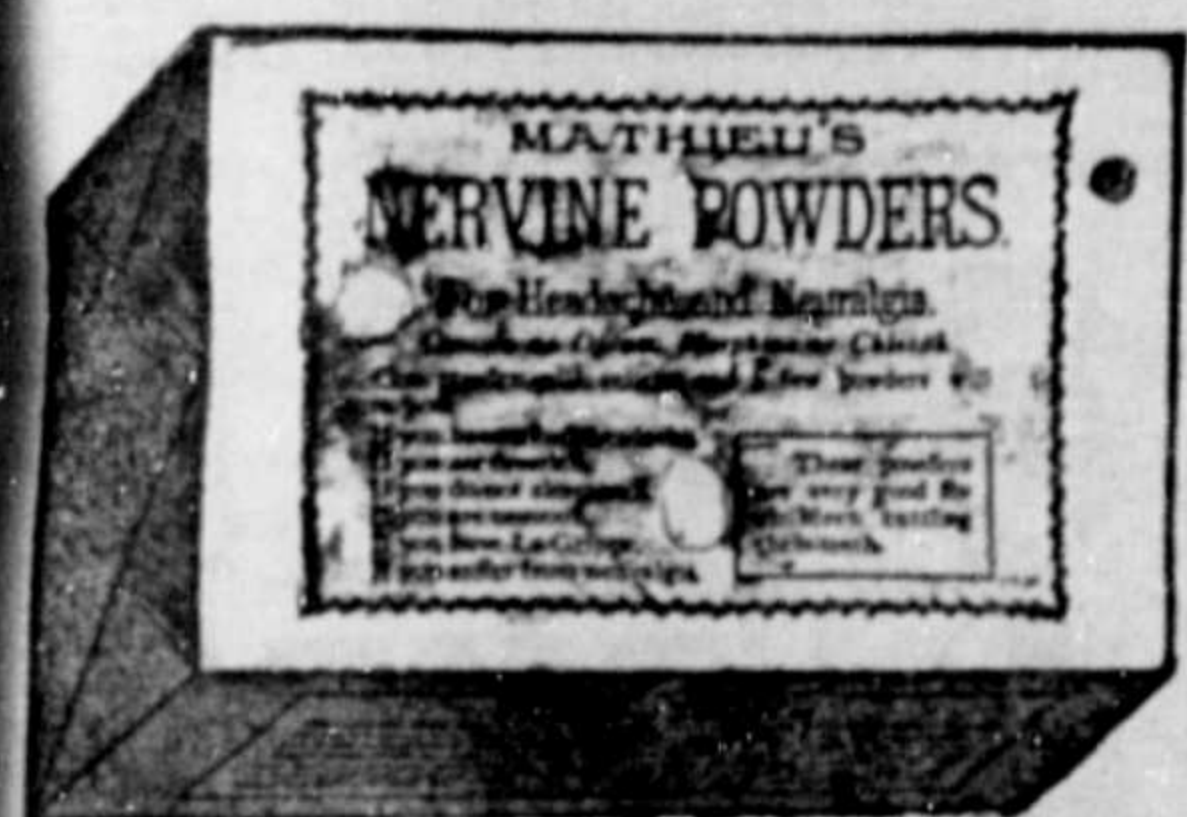

campaign purposes of the Roblin government. It transpired, too, that the Roblin government, being in a desperate hurry to get a campaign fund for the election of 1914, let the contract to Kelly for the construction of the dome for \$802,000, a figure so outrageous that the perpetrators had to steal papers from the lieutenant-governor's office and mutilate the records of the privy council to give it a presentable coloring.

These were the net results of the Mathers commission. The Perdue commission, which was appointed to inquire into the charges made by Lawyer Fullerton to the effect that the Liberals were to take over the government and stifle the parliament building scandal, came to an impotent conclusion. The fact seems to be that an enthusiastic Liberal worker named Chambers listened to the time-worn proposition that there should be a saw-off of election protests, and was given \$25,000, which must have come from Kelly, to defray legal expenses. As soon as Chambers discovered that the money had a more sinister purpose, he hustled it back and was mighty glad to wash his hands of it. Premier Norris knew nothing of Chambers' indiscretion and did not countenance his over-zeal.

The process of purging is still going on in the Conservative party in Manitoba. Kelly has purged himself out of the country. Dr. Simpson, who kept the party strong box, has been absent for a long time on overseas service. Dr. Montague, who was too sick two weeks ago to appear in court, and who has not practiced medicine for fifteen years, is to join the Army Medical Service at the front. Ex-Attorney-General Howden and G. R. Coldwell, formerly Minister of Education, whose evidence at a criminal trial might put both themselves and Kelly in wrong, are to be given overseas appointments. In short, patriot-

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ism is the last refuge and you all know what Dr. Samuel Johnson said about that.

The Conservative party is also looking for a new leader. Sir Hugh John Macdonald is said to have waved away the crown, that genial gentleman having had enough of public life ever since his famous father's justly celebrated nose and equally renowned necktie failed to land a victory for Sir Charles Tupper in 1900. Sir J. A. M. Aitkens—called Jam for short, because of the sweetness of his eloquence—is also mentioned. Sir James would not be a bad choice. He is capable and honest and rich enough to have ideals. It's a long road to a place in the Ottawa cabinet, especially now that R. B. Bennett, his old side partner, has become the travelling companion of Sir Robert Borden on his visit to England. The opinion grows that Premier Borden is grooming the brilliant young Calgary statesman for a cabinet job. If that is the case, Sir James may be satisfied with an ambition nearer home.
