TERRIFIC BATTLE ALONG RUSSIAN FRONT

GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED—VON BUELOW CONDUCTS GREAT CAVALRY MOVE

TERRIFIC BATTLE ALONG THE ENTIRE RUSSIAN FRONT

GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED AT PULTASK AND IVANGOROD—GERMAN ENVELOPING MOVEMENT IS GREATEST IN HISTORY—RUSSIANS TORPEDO FORTY COAL TRANSPORTS

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, July 27.—German attacks southeast of Pultask have been driven back. The Germans are battering the advanced defenses of Novo Georgevsk. The assaults on Ivangorod have been repulsed. A terrific battle is in progress along the entire front between the Veherez and the Bug rivers.

Enveloping Movement.
London, July 27.—Latest reports state that Von Buelow with 30,000 cavalry has turned south

from Riga to within eighty miles of the railroad between Petrograd and Warsaw. The German enveloping movement is the greatest in history. If successful, it involves the whole system of Russian railway defence. It is hoped that the Russians can resist till winter.

Coal Vessels Sunk.
Petrograd, July 27.—Russian torpedo boats sunk forty coal-laden sailing vessels in the Black Sea on Sunday.

VANCOUVER COUNCIL MAKES BIG REDUCTIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)
Vancouver, July 27.—The city council has decided to cut \$200,000 from the estimates at the beginning of the year, cutting police estimates by \$33,000, the board of works by \$94,000 and schools by \$35,000. The industrial commissioner has been discharged to bring expenditures within receipts. The council adjourned at midnight without discussing a proposed reduction in their own salaries.

HORSE WANTED

Wentz, of Kitsumkalum, was read at the city council meeting last night stating that he wanted to buy a horse, and, as he understood the city had several for sale, he hoped to be able to make a deal, though he had no cash. The matter was referred to the board of works, with power to act.

Handicapped by a five-run lead in the first two innings, the Rupert boys gamely kept plugging away and wore down the Prince George lead and emerged victors by the score of 7 to 6. Rupert's young infield showed a slight nervousness at the outset of the game, and, with a couple of errors, aided by a couple of hits, it looked like another defeat for the coast city, but Pitcher Hunt just gritted his teeth and the visitors were never dangerous after the second.

REV. F. G. SHEPHERD GOES TO FRANCOIS LAKE

After over three years' faithful work as the pioneer resident missionary of the Ootsa and Francois Lake districts, Rev. Geo. McKay has left for California. He was the only clergyman of any denomination in this region, there being none other within a radius of 75 miles. Bishop Du Vernet has moved the Rev. F. G. Shepherd from Port Essington to Francois Lake to fill this vacancy.

REV. HEBER GREENE, B. A., APPOINTED TO BULKLEY

Bishop Du Vernet has appointed the Rev. Heber Greene, B. A., to take charge of the three Anglican churches in the Bulkley Valley, viz: Smithers, Telkwa and Hubert. Mr. Greene began his work in his new field on Sunday, July 25th. It will be a month yet before Mrs. Greene, who has been seriously ill, will be able to take the journey from the Queen Charlotte Islands. Meanwhile a parsonage is being built on the hill at Smithers, the Bishop having let the contract for this while there a few weeks ago.

HOSPITAL BOARD MEETS CITY COUNCIL

A delegation from the Hospital Board waited upon the city council last night to discuss financial matters. A report from the city treasurer showed that the levy of one mill for health and hospital maintenance along with one-half mill special tax, would bring in over \$14,800, which would provide \$7,564.10 for the hospital.

The finance committee recommended that the sum of \$3,564.10 be granted to the hospital in addition to the \$4,000 already paid. The money to be paid over as it is received by the city.

O. H. Nelson, president of the hospital board, pointed out that the hospital required the sum of \$10,000, and that the \$4,000 already paid by the city cleared off their indebtedness to the bank for last year. He stated that they had reduced expenses to the minimum, but that there had been a marked falling off in receipts. They had also decided to reduce the rates in the public wards from \$2 to \$1 per day, and the minimum charge for a private ward from \$20 to \$15.

Geo. W. Morrow stated that salaries had been reduced from \$750 to 350. He said that with the \$3,500 promised by the city they might be able to get along with the assistance of the bank. He believed that they would not be in a worse position than last year.

W. P. Lynch said that the matter was largely one for the council. He felt satisfied that the council would do what they could and he believed that the \$3,500 would carry things along if the bank were willing.

Ald. Nicol dealt with the various schemes adopted to raise funds, all of which had been unsuccessful.

Ald. Casey said he had had considerable experience with hospitals and had never found one to be a financial success except in big centres. He suggested that the board try to make some arrangement with employers of labor whereby employes would contribute so much per month as hospital fees.

Ald. Nicol and Matland explained that this had been done without any good result. The finance committee's report was adopted.

Norwegian Barque Fired.
Amsterdam, July 27.—The Norwegian barque Harhoe has been attacked and set on fire by a submarine.

ONE GUN

At a meeting of the officers of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company yesterday, it was decided to raise the sum of \$1,000 to provide for a machine gun. The heads of departments state that they will have the funds in seven days, and have notified Gen. Sam Hughes to this effect.

HELPING THE BOYS

The little mining town of Hedley has presented three machine guns for the use of the Canadian soldiers at the front. Prince Rupert may not be able to provide for three, but it is expected that by August 4th this city will have added at least one of those useful weapons to the equipment of the 62nd Battalion. This city has done its share in assisting the Red Cross Society in its noble work, and will continue to do so, but every additional machine gun will help to keep down the amount of work falling to this department.

The Germans are using machine guns wherever possible, as they are effectively handled by a very few men, thus releasing large numbers for other work. Whether in defence or attack, these deadly little guns are able to do the work of several hundreds of men. It is well known that the earlier Canadian contingents were not fully equipped in this respect, and patriotic citizens throughout the Dominion are giving what they can in order that our boys may stand a fighting chance when faced by the Hun hordes. The Canadian courage will be many times more effective if combined with machine gun batteries. These batteries will save lives and wounds, and will help materially in shortening the war. WHY CANADA IS AT WAR

"The contention that Canada is in the war for the sake of democracy and because we could not endure to see a small nation trampled on is fine, and partly true. But why should we persist in ignoring the fact that, as part of the British Empire, it was our duty to assist the mother land to the full extent of our power?" —Toronto News.

The side of the case which the News refers to is not ignored. On the contrary, it is probably the reason why Canada is in the war, while the United States are neutral. That is to say, it is not the only motive which governs us, but it may be the determining motive.

After all, what is the real reason and meaning of the British connection and of Canada's sympathy with Britain? To a certain extent it is a family feeling. That is good and it is natural. The young man who stands up for his father and mother, right or wrong, is made of the right stuff. His heart is right, even if his head is wrong. But surely the young man is in a still better position if he knows his father and mother are right, and can prove it.

That is how Canada stands today. It takes a certain stand because that stand is British and because it is right. A well-known Canadian politician said that he preferred those friends who would stand by him when he was wrong. In our humorous moods we want to see our friends and relatives on the right side. We recognize that the word "Right" is superior to our national and family preferences.

Let us always remember that this war is not a mere rivalry between the British Empire and the German Empire. If it were, we should be on the British side because of our family sentiment. But there is a great deal more than that. We believe that we are right. We cannot expect neutral nations to sympathize with our family sentiments. But we can expect neutral nations to sympathize with us if we are right and can show them that we are right.

Why is Canada British? What is the value of the British Empire? Does its value lie in its size, or its wealth, or its population, or its physical

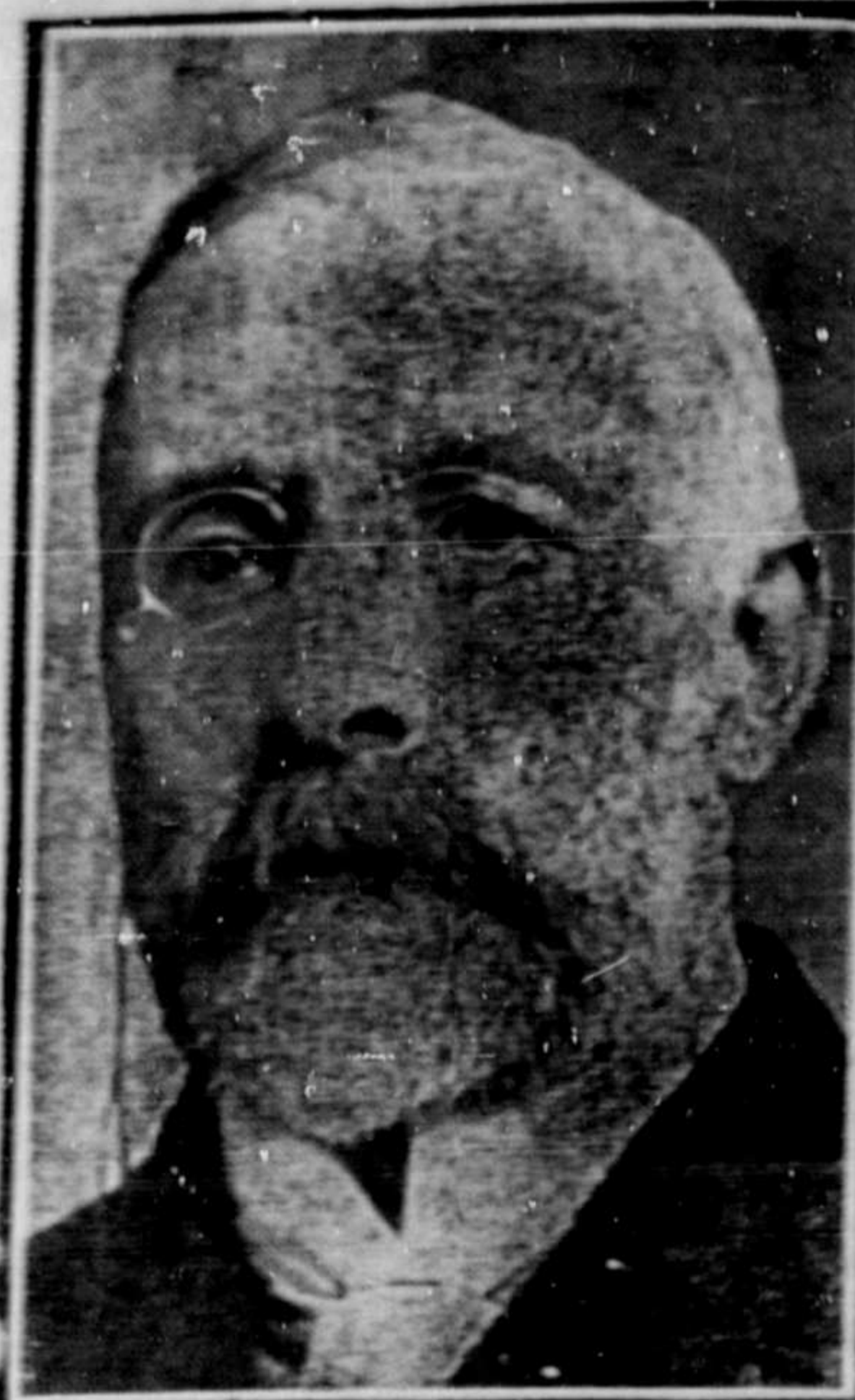

power? Surely not. It is to be valued because, on the whole, it has advanced freedom and justice, because it has been a good influence in the world.

Canada's influence in the British Empire and in the world is bound to grow. Canada is about as large as Europe, and upon the most moderate estimate is sure to contain a population larger than that of Germany. Canada cannot escape the responsibility of judging between right and wrong by pleading parental influence or family friendship.

Canada is today engaged not in a conflict for the defence of Canada alone, but in a world conflict between right and wrong, between anarchy and order, between tyranny and freedom, between decency and the kind of conduct of which German soldiers have been found guilty in Belgium. Surely the Canadian case is strengthened by putting it on the broadest grounds. Surely that is the right way to enlist all humanity against the insane and monstrous German delusion.—Toronto Globe.

Ald. Kerr stated that the pipeline had always been more or less in bad shape, but that the securing of it would not cost much, as the patrolman could do most of the work.

Ald. Maitland explained that the ground was frozen when the pipe was laid, and that some of the supports had sunk. He pointed out that concrete abutments were required at some of the valves.

Ald. Nicoll said that Mr. Mason had told him three or four months ago that new supports would have to be put in place soon.
