## ITALIANS CAPTURE AUSTRIAN POSITION

### RUSSIAN LINE STILL INTACT—GERMANS LOST 500,000 MEN IN BIG ADVANCE

#### ITALIAN FORCES CAPTURE STRONG AUSTRIAN POSITION

5,000 PRISONERS, GUNS AND MUNITIONS TAKEN—A FIERCE BATTLE FOR CARSO PLATEAU—DARDANELLES ADVANCE CONTINUES—VIOLENT FIGHTING AT SOUCHEZ

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, July 28.—Italian forces have completed the conquest of the Monte Dei position, taking five machine guns, two cannon, trench mortars, ammunition and war materials, and 3,200 prisoners. A fierce battle continues for the crest of the Carso plateau.

##### The Dardanelles.

London, July 28.—At the Dardanelles a steady advance continues, several hundred yards being gained. A Turkish aviation camp has been burned.

##### Attacks Repulsed.

There has been violent fighting in the Arras district north of Souchez. All attacks by the enemy were successfully repulsed by the French.

##### Trawlers Sunk.

The British trawlers Iena and Salacia have been torpedoed. The crews were landed at Lowestoft.

The gasoline engine was the only part saved from the Northern, which was wrecked recently near Tow Hill, in the Queen Charlotte Islands.



THE EXPLOITS OF THE GERMAN SUBMARINE U-51. DISPATCHES say that the U-51 has been sunk in the Black Sea by Russian warships. The map gives the route taken in the phenomenal voyage of the submarine to the Dardanelles, where it sunk two British warships. Captain Herring, commander of the vessel, is Germany's hero. It is not known if the crew was lost or not.

#### GERMAN LOSSES AGAINST RUSSIANS NUMBER 500,000

RUSSIAN LINE STILL UNBROKEN—VON HINDENBURG HELD ON NAREW RIVER—REICHSTAG MEETING POSTPONED FOR TEN DAYS—RUSSIA IS CALLING OUT MORE TROOPS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 28.—Though the Germans hold the line from the Gulf of Riga around Warsaw to Galicia, it is estimated that they have lost 500,000 in the effort. The Russian line is still unbroken and they are holding Von Hindenburg on the Narew river. After four days fighting the attempt to seize the Lublin-Chelm railway continues.

The next plenary session of the Reichstag has been postponed for ten days until August 19. The

delay is taken to signify that unexpected difficulties have arisen in the Warsaw campaign.

##### Russian Mobilization.

Petrograd, July 28.—An Imperial ukase calls to the colors all men born in 1896. It is reported that a general mobilization throughout Siberia is about to be ordered.

##### Press Attacks.

London, July 28.—The German government today notified the Berlin papers to refrain from attacks on the American government on the submarine notes.

#### BYLAWS ENDORSED BY BOARD OF TRADE

The council of the Board of Trade met yesterday afternoon to consider a letter from the mayor asking for the endorsement by the board of the two money bylaws, which are to be voted upon on July 30. These are for the re-planking of city streets and the construction of a plank roadway to Seal Cove.

The question was asked whether the work of re-planking could be proceeded with, whether the bylaw passed or not.

Ald. Dybhavn, who was present, said it would. He explained that if the bylaw passed the cost of the work would be extended over four years, and if it did not pass, the work would have to be done, as it was essential, and the cost paid from general fund this year.

The board decided to endorse the two bylaws.

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#### HAYTIAN PRESIDENT SEIZED AND KILLED

(Special to The Daily News.)

Port Au Prince, July 28.—President Guillaume has been seized and killed while under the refuge of the French legation. The population was angered by the massacre yesterday of 160 political prisoners, including ex-President Zamor, and arranged an attack on the French legation in order to seize Guillaume. Governor-General Oscar, who ordered the massacre, was shot by a firing squad. Half the city is in flames.

#### Hazelton Mining Prospects

Contributed by F. S. Wright, Secretary of the Northern British Columbia Agricultural Association

What has the Interior to offer Prince Rupert, the mining man and prospector? This is the answer of Hazelton: Hazelton, the oldest community of Northern B. C.—in existence before Rupert or railways were ever thought of—Hazelton, a district hardly prospected and certainly not developed as far as mineral is concerned.

While the G. T. P. was being led to completion, mining as well as other industries in this district suffered. Money had too many other attractions. Labor had too easy a field with surer money. Townsite land speculation and railway contracts all presented better chances for quick returns, and thus mining suffered accordingly.

True there were a few who, ignoring this temporary rush and fever of speculation, pinned their faith on the future of Hazelton district as a mining field, and here and now their confidence is daily being justified. Gone is the railway contractor, the blanket man and all the various types that follow the steel as it is laid. The casual observer passing through sees quiet towns and absence of rush and remarks on the change. He forgets that railway construction spells loose and easy money, forgets that the land speculator, the townsite promoters are gamblers only, and that production is the only sure permanency for any district. He shrugs his shoulders and passes on.

The hardest thing in the world is to make the public believe in a mining field until it is too late. Until the wise ones have slipped in and grabbed the plums. Then, in comes the public. Reason is cast aside, anything that looks like a prospect commands a figure

and the boom is on. Forgotten are the times when John Brown the prospector, offered that half interest for a mere song, and ground-floor locations could be obtained for a mere song.

This public are not strangers either, they know or think they know the district, but their perspective is too close, and it takes the stranger to see the country's possibilities.

Hazelton: Four years ago, ore bunkers, ore shipping and other mining activity was the dream of a few, every one else was too busy. Mining was too speculative even in the days when everything was speculation, but today Hazelton district is making regular shipments of ore to the smelter, has developed mines, a payroll—on one property alone over 100 men are employed. Already the local farmer is beginning to find a market for his produce at the mines, and the Hazelton district has arrived. It has become a recognized camp.

Is the country prospected? In places, but ask anyone who has ever attempted prospecting how long it takes to cover country. Every creek, gully, mountainside, presents its possibilities. In some few places a walk over discovers what the prospector is looking for but seldom does this happen. Nature does not yield up her secrets so readily. It requires intimate knowledge and experience to get the results and few there are in the district who have the requisite knowledge and experience to make sure that they do not miss what they seek. The country requires the services and the experience of the old prospector of Nevada, Montana, Cobalt, Mexico and other camps. To these the

It spells a healthy holiday, awakened confidence in your district and you must arrive at the conclusion that Prince Rupert, as a mining centre, has a future.

It is claimed that Masset Inlet, where the family resided, furnished more men for the first contingent, according to its population, than any other part of the Dominion. Nearly all of that brave band of thirty men have been listed as killed, wounded or missing.

**STEALING "FOR THE PARTY."**

In its closing argument before the royal commission appointed to probe the Manitoba Parliament Buildings scandal, Mr. Wilson, the leading counsel for the present administration, claimed that not less than \$800,000 had been stolen from the people of Manitoba in the form of payment for extras which were never provided, or of gross over-payment for extras assented to by the Roblin government. Much of the money was stolen as deliberately as if the contractors had secured it by blowing open the safe in the provincial treasurer's office. It has been stated in evidence by the consulting architect, a reputable English professional man, that he was informed when he questioned the wisdom of some of the changes proposed that the Roblin government had to obtain through "extras" the money for the general election held a year ago.

In plain English, the Messrs. Kelly were to be permitted to loot the treasury in return for this privilege they would pay to the guardians of the people's money a reasonable percentage of their stealings. The proportion in which the spoils were divided does not yet appear. If the Kellys were allowed to steal \$800,000 it is not unreasonable to suppose that the treasurer or treasurers of the Conservative campaign funds in the election of July, 1914, got twenty-five per cent. of that amount. It is of course entirely possible that no member of the Roblin administration knew what a tremendous sum was being taken in the form of bogus extras. In that event the party funds might not be enriched to the extent of anything like two hundred thousand dollars.

A scrap of paper and a bit of string found in the strong box of Dr. Simpson, the Conservative party treasurer in Winnipeg, would seem to in-

dicate that the Parliament Buildings loot was shared on some recognized principle. An official of the Imperial Bank has given evidence that on June 10, 1914, Thomas Kelly presented to the bank a cheque for \$81,000. In paying this cheque the bank official gave Kelly a sealed package containing one thousand \$20 bills. The seal of the Imperial Bank affixed to the string found in Dr. Simpson's strong box more than a year afterwards shows that it had once bound together a thousand \$20 Imperial Bank bills such as Contractor Kelly drew from the bank. Is it going too far to assume that the contractor paid to the party treasurer, that day at least, \$20,000 of the \$81,000 he drew out of the bank? and if he did so on that particular occasion is it unreasonable to suppose that he did so on other occasions of which no telltale strings and seals remain?

If the administration of justice is not to become a mockery in Canada "respectable" thieves must no longer be permitted to slip through the meshes of the net. The Manitoba scandal is one of the most brazen offences against public morals ever unearthed in the Dominion. If no one goes to jail, justice should no longer be represented as blind to all sinister influence, and wielding the sword impartially on high and low alike, but as leering out from beneath a shrewdly adjusted bandage upon her favorites, the crooked contractor and the perjured politician.—Toronto Globe.

**A DESPERATE GAME**

The Germans are playing a desperate game, which looks like a last great effort to defeat Russia. It is very unlikely that a strategist of the ability of the Archduke Nicholas will allow himself to be trapped, and in the end the huge German circle is liable to have a few kinks and breaks in it.

**WESTERN FRONT**

There is little news filtering through from the western front, but this is no sign that General Joffre and Sir John French are having a vacation. The new British army will be very busy one of these days, and the Kaiser will wish Warsaw and the Argonne were next door to each other.

**ORDUNA SAILS WITH AMERICANS ABOARD**

New York, July 27.—With 195 passengers on board, including eight Americans, and with 10,000 tons of general cargo, the Orduna, of the Cunard line, sailed on the 22nd for Liverpool.

There was no attempt to prevent friends of departing passengers from going on board before the steamship departed. All baggage was examined and the hand baggage brought by the passengers underwent a close examination before it was brought on board.

There were no Americans in the first cabin, but in the second cabin were Mr. and Mrs. George Dean, of Worcester, Mass., who are on their way to visit relatives in England, and Hilda D. Hogg, a young woman of Lawrence, Mass. Mr. and Mrs. Joseph M. Hartley, young English persons, also from Lawrence, had their ten months' old baby girl who was born in this country.

The other Americans, three women and a man, were in the steerage. None of the passengers showed any fear that the Orduna would again be attacked by a German submarine.

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**ITALIANS RESPONDING TO CALL TO COLORS**

Seattle, July 27.—Between 700 and 800 Italians from the Northwest will respond to the call to the colors, according to Dr. A. J. Ghiglione, Italian consul. These men come from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana. At the outbreak of the war between Italy and Austria the Italian government gave instructions to consuls to enlist the reservists.

No volunteers are being received by Consul Ghiglione. Only those who come in the particular classes of reservists are needed in the service.

None have been provided with transportation or arrangements completed for their journey to the east for passage to Italy, but some have gone on their own resources. The majority of the men will entrain from Seattle and other Northwest cities in August.

**EDMONTON GIRL IS KILLED BY SNAKE BITE**

Entiat, Wash.—Edith, 6-year-old daughter of Mrs. John Dunlop, who is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. K. McKenzie, living 15 miles up the valley, and who is visiting her parents from her home in Edmonton, was bitten in the foot last night by a rattlesnake and died at 8:20 this morning after suffering intensely.

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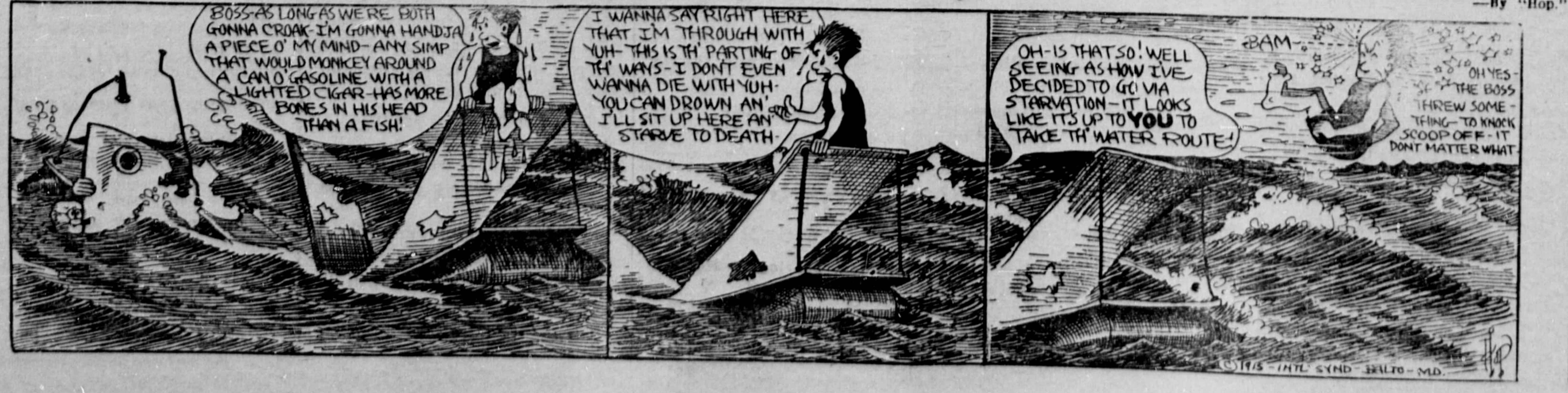

# CANADIAN PRESS TO BE CENSORED

Montreal, July 27.—The Gazette's Ottawa correspondent telegraphed last night: "There will be published in the Canada Gazette on Saturday an order-in-council establishing a censorship in Canada. Large powers are taken by this regulation, which has been framed under the war measures act.

One clause provides that censors may be appointed to censor all products of any publisher or printing establishment and that after such appointment no literature is to be issued until censored.

"The printing of any news concerning war movements or operations, or criticizing or commenting upon policy, proceedings or action of the government of any neutral state if such would interfere with the success of the allied forces or prejudice allied relations will be deemed a contravention of the censorship order.
