AUSTRIAN CAVALRY HAS ENTERED LUBLIN

OCCUPATION OF LUBLIN CUTS RUSSIAN LINE — LEYLAND STEAMER SUBMARINED

GERMANS GRAB METALS FOR MUNITIONS OF WAR

(Special to The Daily News.)
Berlin, July 31.—The military authorities have issued an order appropriating all copper, brass and nickel, including skillets, pans and household kettles.

LEYLAND LINER IBERIAN SUBMARINED

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 31.—The Leyland liner Iberian has been submarined off the south coast of Ireland. Seven of her crew, including four Americans, were killed. The remainder of the crew, numbering sixty-one, were landed at Queens-town. The Iberian was bound from Manchester for Boston. She was of 5,233 tons, and built in 1900, and has been engaged for many months carrying war supplies. The casualties were caused by shell fire when the vessel tried to outspeed the submarine.

ROYAL COMMISSION EXONERATES NORRIS

AUSTRIAN CAVALRY HAS ENTERED LUBLIN

(Special to The Daily News.)
Vienna, July 31.—The War Office announces that Austrian cavalry has entered Lublin, one hundred miles southeast of Warsaw, cutting the Russian communications with the southern front.

London Opinion.

London, July 31.—The occupation of Lublin increases the difficulty of the retreat from Warsaw, unless the main forces are already out. 800,000 inhabitants are fleeing eastward from the city.

The British press emphasizes the fact that the situation calls for conscription as a proof that the western Allies propose exerting all possible pressure in aid of Russia.

COAST OPIUM RING IS SUSPECTED

Bellingham, July 29.—Special United States customs officers who arrested N. Scharlin here on Friday and confiscated 300 pounds of opium in one lot, are working on the belief that the smuggling of that amount of contraband drug was made possible through powerful agencies in Vancouver, B. C. and Hongkong. Scharlin is free under \$40,000 bonds given by a brother at San Francisco.

1,000 DOLLARS

POPE'S IMPLICATION RESENTED BY PRESS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 31.—Pope Benedict's plea for the arranging of peace preliminaries find no response in the British press. The implication of the Pope that all the nations are equally involved in a fratricidal struggle is resented. The press says the Pope's wish cannot be realized without the deepest wrong being done to the cause of right, liberty and peace itself.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL OF ALBERTA HERE

The attorney-general of Alberta, the Hon. C. W. Cross, arrived in the city on the train last night, and left this morning on the Prince Rupert for the south. He is on his way to Victoria to visit his family who are there.

Mr. Cross states that the people of Edmonton are greatly interested in the growth of Prince Rupert and its fishing business. He reports that crop conditions on the prairies are ideal, now that a warm spell has set in after a wet summer.

Mr. Cross and family will return via Prince Rupert in the course of ten days.

ARCHBISHOP OF EDMONTON ARRIVED LAST NIGHT

There arrived on last night's train the Archbishop of Edmonton and other clergy of the Roman Catholic Church. They were met by Father Bonoz, the head of the church in this district. The Archbishop is accompanied by Father Boutin, who is Superior of the Seminary of St. Albert at Edmonton and Father Lee, of St. Edward's Church, Winnipeg. The party will be here until the beginning of the week.

RUNAWAY

The horse of a local grocery firm made a sudden dash from the depot towards the government wharf this morning. Before any serious damage was done, the runaway was captured by Jack Wynne and Customs Collector McLeod. Groceries were scattered along the track and a few dozen eggs came to grief.

Mrs. Hogan, widow of the late Rev. Hogan, of Massett, arrived on the Rupert this morning, accompanied by her daughter.

BOARD OF TRADE AND A COPPER REFINERY

A meeting of the council of the Board of Trade, presided over by President D. G. Stewart, was held in the rooms yesterday afternoon to consider the question of the location of a copper refinery and zinc reduction works on the coast. J. B. Roerig went very fully into the matter, quoting from the recent report compiled by A. C. Garde, mining engineer, and pointing out that Vancouver was doing its utmost to secure the refinery for the south, while R. F. Greene was striving hard to have the zinc reduction work done in the Kootenay district.

The matter was fully discussed, and finally G. R. Naden, seconded by L. W. Patmore, moved that a wire be sent to Col. Carnegie, the Minister of Mines, and H. S. Clements, M. P., asking whether it would be advisable to send a deputation from this city to Ottawa, and that the mining committee of the board take the matter up and report.

PROBABLY \$10,000 JOB FOR THE DRYDOCK

The Delhi, the 1,000-ton steamer which is coming to the drydock for repairs, is under charter to the Pacific Coast Steamship Co. She went on the rocks off the Alaskan coast last week. It is estimated that the cost of the repairs will amount to about \$10,000. The Delhi was in this port about a year ago.

SHOT BY HIS WIFE, HE FEELS SATISFIED

Juneau, Alaska, July 29.—During a family quarrel at Kake on Friday noon, Walter Campen, well known resident of that town, was shot three times with a revolver by his wife. He arrived here this morning on the launch San Jaun for medical attention.

Campen refuses to state the exact nature of the differences which terminated in his wife's making such an earnest attempt at ending his life, but says he feels satisfied with the work accomplished and has forgiven her, and should he recover, will refuse to prosecute.

Campen was rushed from Kake to Petersburg for treatment, but owing to the serious nature of his wounds could not be treated there and was brought here.

Physicians have probed the wounds, one of which was in the side below the ribs, another in the chest and the third in the back. One bullet has been recovered.

Physicians believe there is an excellent chance for recovery.

ENEMY'S LOSSES

Mr. Hilaire Belloc, the famous war correspondent, recently stated that the Austrian and German casualties amounted to four millions. His figures having been called in question, he returns to the matter in a recent issue of "Land and Water," and makes out a very convincing case.

The calculation of enemy losses is not, as he says, an exact science, but it is something in which two quite exact limits are possible—a maximum and a minimum. After discussing several of the factors in the problem, Mr. Belloc sums up as follows:—

Germany has not armed less than six million men since the beginning of the war; she has not armed more than seven and a half millions. The maximum that Austria-Hungary can add to Germany in man power is 80 per cent. She has certainly not added less than 60 per cent. The allies hold about a million and a quarter prisoners, at the very least, but not more than a million and a half at the most.

The figures of wounded and missing to date are, even in the severest trench fighting, not lower than four to one. Of wounded admitted to hospital and of some sick about half are discharged as fit to fight again some day or other, but of wounded only you cannot count on more than a fifth getting back on the average of all services within, say, two months.

Now put all this together, and what do you find?

The average number of men in the British Expeditionary Force is not a twelfth of the numbers Germany has passed through in this war. We had

less than a hundred thousand men in the field when Germany had more than thirty times as much. We have perhaps now in the field a sixth of what Germany has altogether put forward. The average is certainly, I repeat, far less than a twelfth. The German forces have been compelled, or have chosen to undertake, the most violent and prolonged offensive actions. They have fought in the most expensive tactical fashion.

Our casualties give 50,000 dead. Who can doubt that the total German dead must be over 600,000? It is absolutely certain an underestimate; less than the lowest possible minimum. Austria-Hungary cannot conceivably have less than 60 per cent. of that total. It is certain that she has added more than 60 per cent.

In other words, it is absolutely certain that your minimum of enemy dead must—absolutely without escape from the simplest laws of arithmetic—be over a million. You have certainly well over a million prisoners. It is conceivable that disablement from wounds and prolonged sickness should be less than double the number of dead? It is inconceivable.

Well, then, the figures of four millions, so far from being an extravagant figure, is an extremely modest one. And when I said that the total number of enemy permanently out of action was "nearer four than three millions" I was putting the figures far below even the strictest minimum. It seems to me certain that they must be over four.

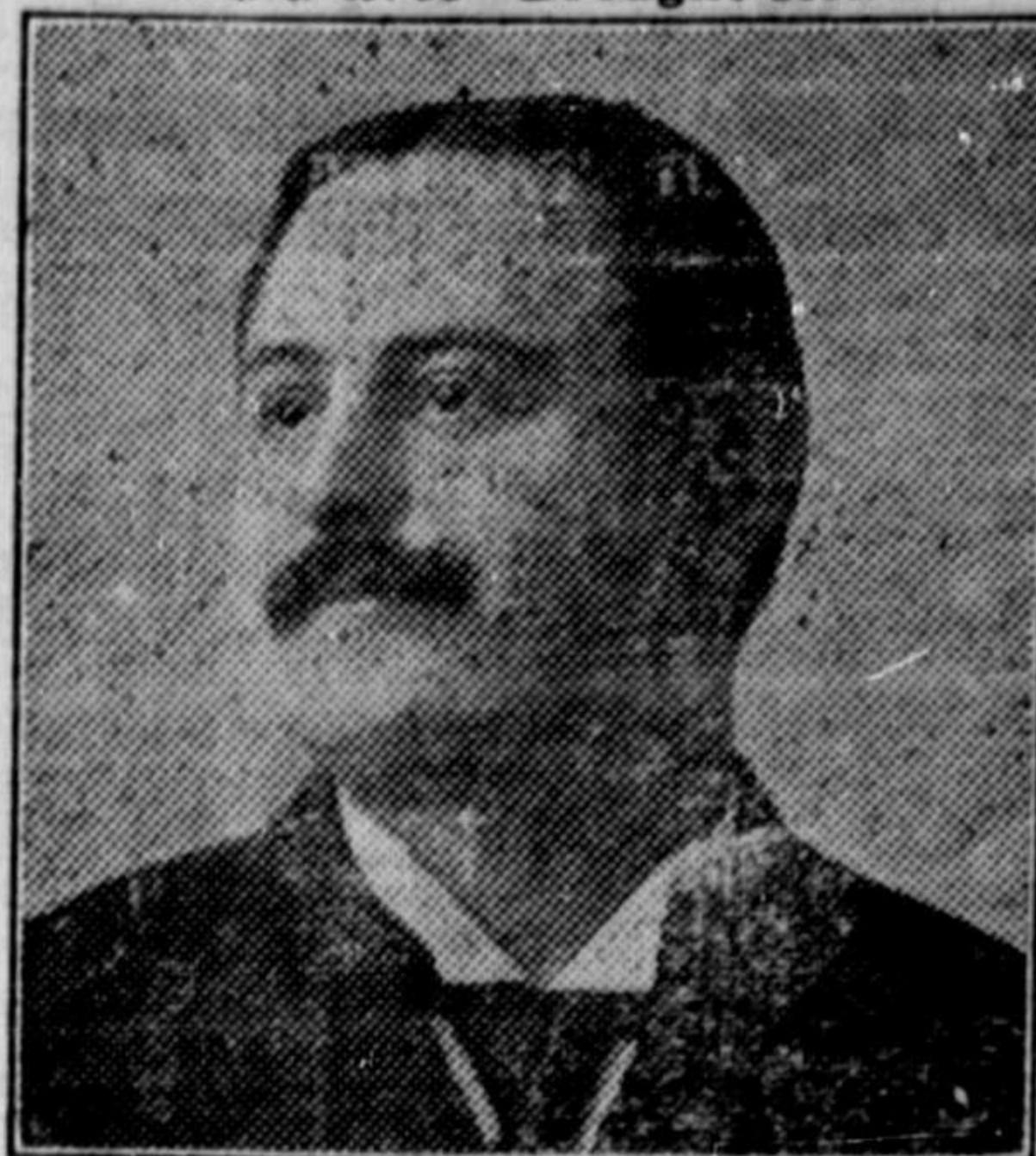

THE THIRD CANADIAN UNIVERSITIES COMPANY

The Canadian Militia Department has authorized the organization of a third University Company for overseas service, similar to the first and second Universities Companies, which are joining the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

The company will be organized at Montreal by Captain A. S. Eve of the McGill Contingent C. O. T. C., and will proceed overseas when up to strength.

The first Universities Company, under the command of Captain Barclay, is already overseas. The second Universities Company, under Captain G. C. McDonald, and Captain P. Molson, now over-strength, was raised and equipped in seven weeks, and will proceed overseas shortly.

Recruiting for the third company has already been started and applications from all parts of the Dominion are being received.

The company will be composed of graduates and undergraduates of universities (or their friends) and men of that type. Only men who are physically and medically fit will be accepted.

Conditions of service and rate of pay will be the same as in the other units of the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

A married man must obtain his wife's consent; a man under 21 years, his parents consent before enlisting. The consent must be written.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
