CONSERVATIVES ARE ROUTED IN MANITOBA

LONDON PRESS DISCUSSES ATTITUDE OF SWEDEN AND BALKANS—ITALIAN GAIN

SUMMIT OF MOUNT SAINT MICHELE TAKEN BY ITALIANS

HEIGHT CAPTURED BY ITALIANS DOMINATES THE CITY OF CORIZIA—ITALIAN SUBMARINE SUNK BY AN AUSTRIAN IN ADRIATIC—SMACKS ARE SUBMERGED

Paris, August 7.—After a desperate battle the Italians have stormed and captured the summit of Mt. St. Michele dominating the city of Corizia. The fall of Corizia, which is 22 miles northwest of Trieste on the Isonzo river, is now imminent.
Italian Submarine Lost.
The Italian submarine Nereide

is reported sunk in an encounter with an Austrian submarine off the Island of Pelagossa in the Adriatic. The Nereide was built in 1913, was 130 feet long and had a displacement of 315 tons. She carried a crew of 17.

Fishing Boats Sunk.

London, August 7.—Four fishing smacks have been sunk by a German submarine. The crews were landed here today.

WESTERN BATTALION OF PIONEERS FORMING

INTERNATIONAL FRICTION AT PANAMA EXPOSITION

The French guards refused to allow them entry and summoned the assistance of other guards.

LONDON BELIEVES THAT THE RUSSIAN ARMIES ARE INTACT

LONDON PRESS ENTERTAINS GRAVE FEARS OVER SWEDISH UNFRIENDLY ATTITUDE—EFFECT OF GERMAN SUCCESS ON BALKAN POLICY IS CHIEF ANXIETY

London, August 7.—It is believed that the Grand Duke Nicholas was able to withdraw his armies from Warsaw intact.

Swedish Attitude.

The press here discusses the disquieting character of the attitude of Sweden towards Russia. The strong anti-Russian element in that country has been emboldened by the recent German suc-

cesses. The press says that if Sweden persists in her unfriendly attitude, she will drift into the war and will prove an obstacle to future progress.

Balkan Attitude.

The chief cause for anxiety is the possible effect of the Russian retreat on the policy of the Balkan States, which have been hesitating over the course to take for the future.

MANITOBA RETURNS LIBERALS BY OVERWHELMING MAJORITY

CONSERVATIVES WILL HOLD ONLY FOUR SEATS—SIR J. A. M. AIKENS DEFEATED IN EVERY SUBDIVISION OF BRANDON—ONE INDEPENDENT ELECTED IN WINNIPEG

Winnipeg, August 6.—Outside of four seats, three of which have been held by the Conservatives, the other showing a Conservative majority meantime, the Liberals have been returned by overwhelming majorities in the Manitoba provincial election. One Independent, in Alderman Rigg, for B division of Winnipeg, has been elected.

Sir J. A. M. Aikens, the new Conservative leader, suffered just as badly as the rest of his supporters, failing to carry a single sub-division in the riding of Brandon, which constituency he formerly represented.

Such a landslide was not unexpected after the findings of the Mathers commission on the graft scandals and the Perdue enquiry into the baseless Fullerton charges.

JUDGE YOUNG DECIDES CROWN LAND ASSESSABLE

According to a decision that has just been given by Judge Young, crown lands that may be under lease by private persons may become liable to be taxed by the municipality for the full value of the land, and not for the interest represented by the rental paid. The case came up under an appeal for the city's assessment taken by the Westholme Lumber Company. The land in question is provincial government land in the city, which has been leased by the Westholme Company and is being used by the company.

A. Carss, representing the Westholme Lumber Co. contended that the only assessment that could be levied against the company was on the rental value that was paid for the land.

The assessment made, was on the full assessed value of the land. The case was argued out before His Honor some days ago, and after reserving judgment to go fully into the points that were raised, His Honor has now given his judgment. He finds that under the act, the company will be liable to pay taxes on the full assessed value of the land.

A MODERN RAILWAY

First-class construction has been vindicated as a policy for the National Transcontinental. A freight train of forty cars, in all about 1,400 tons, leaving Toronto on the night of the 23rd of July arrived in Winnipeg at 10:40 a. m. on the 27th, ten hours ahead of schedule time. The route was by the Grand Trunk and T & N. O. to Cochrane and by the National Transcontinental to Winnipeg. Building in accordance with the dictates of experience in railway operation is a line of investment that brings ample returns. The absolute necessity of first-class construction has been forced on the leading railways of the continent by the pressure of competition. As locomotives increased in weight and power and trains increased in length proportionate changes became necessary in track design and construction. The older railways found it profitable to spend large sums in cutting out curves, leveling gradients, and laying heavier rails on better roadbeds. Curves and gradients formerly accepted as satisfactory were found too costly in motor power and labor. The difference between the possible service of a modern locomotive on a straight, level, solid, heavy-railed, and well-ballasted track and a similar engine on a track of the class of construction acceptable a few decades ago is so great that the old track must almost everywhere give place to the new. An inferior track not only lessens capacity and wastes time, fuel and labor, but rapidly damages and depreciates rolling stock. Costly and in some cases fatal accidents have resulted from attempts to make the old standard of track construction render an approach to the service of the new.

The cost involved in building a first-class track has not

unnaturally occasioned criticism. The attitude of those who seek and expect profit from construction is diametrically opposed to that of those who look for returns from operation. Costly construction means cheap and profitable operation. It is by operation that a railroad serves a useful purpose, and from that source alone can permanent gains be derived. Builders may find it profitable to curve around hollows and climb over hills, disregarding the essentials of first-class design. But when the real purpose of the railway must be served by the transportation of freight and passengers, much of the work of construction must be done again, and done in accordance with modern requirements. The money invested in first-class construction on the National Transcontinental has been well and wisely invested. Cheaper and necessarily inferior standards would have entailed serious waste in operation, with the inevitable and costly necessity of bringing the road abreast of modern requirements in the immediate future. Not only future but present needs demand a road suitable for modern freight and passenger traffic.

Canada is a land of great distances. Productive development over our vast area demands a network of railways. This is as essential as the network of streets in a city. A farmer more than ten miles from railway facilities finds the road haul costly and discouraging. Greater distances make farming unprofitable. A vague conception of two or three lines across the continent is misleading, and likely to create unwarranted fears regarding the results of duplication. Excessive construction is a serious waste, and may be even a danger, but the network of iron is essential to development. As it serves its purpose

PRECAUTION AGAINST BUSH FIRES IN AUGUST

Reports to the Minister of Lands from the forest districts show that, although many fires have occurred, they have been mainly confined to slashings, with attendant damage to logging camps in a few cases.

The occasional rains during the month of July, when the fall was above the average, reduced the fire hazard so far as the standing timber was concerned, but the intervening spells of hot weather quickly dried up those areas covered with slash and other debris, leaving them in a highly inflammable condition. As the vegetation ripens and dries out, the fire hazard will certainly increase, unless kept in check by frequent rains. Every effort should be made by campers, settlers, logging employes, and those whose work or pleasure brings them into close proximity to the woods, to observe the utmost precaution during the month of August and the rest of the dry season.

HOW FAST STEAMERS COMBAT SUBMARINES

It is the surprise attack which in nearly every case enables a submarine to torpedo a hostile ship. Captain Turner, of the Lusitania, for instance, might have avoided the torpedo fired at his ship by the German submarine had he known of its proximity, but a brief glimpse of a periscope was the only warning he received before the liner was struck. There are several manoeuvres by means of which a ship can trick a submarine. Several vessels have diverted torpedoes by swinging round their stern until it points in the direction of the under-sea craft. In this way the wash of the propellers has deflected the torpedo from its course, and it has sped harmlessly past its mark. Another successful ruse is to stoke up the furnaces of a ship chased by a submarine, and thick black smoke belches from its funnels and envelops the vessel in a protective shroud. In this way the submarine gunners are confused, and cannot perceive the correct direction in which to send their torpedo.

A speedy ship which follows an erratic, zigzag course presents a poor mark to a submarine. When a torpedo is dispatched against a fast-travelling vessel it is directed to a point just ahead of its mark, and the craft literally runs into the death-dealing device. This obviously cannot happen, however, if a ship is swinging rapidly from side to side, and alternately pointing the narrow expanse of its bows or stern to the under-sea marksmen.

Ships in many cases now travel in pairs. A submarine seldom attacks a vessel if it is not alone, for it can only attack one at a time, and whilst it is launching a torpedo at its first mark the

second vessel has an excellent opportunity of ramming the submarine, which can be located by its tell-tale periscope.—Tit Bits.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
