## BRITISH GOLD BROUGHT ACROSS ATLANTIC

### BULGARIA THREATENS TURKEY--VON SANDERS SUPERSEDED IN DARDANELLES

#### RECORD GOLD CONSIGNMENT FROM BRITAIN TO AMERICA

**FIFTY-THREE MILLIONS LANDED IN NEWYORK--CANADA ALSO GETS A SHARE--HEAVY FIGHTING ON WESTERN FRONT--GRAIN VESSEL TORPEDOED--DESTROYER SUNK**

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Aug. 11.—A special train has arrived from Halifax carrying \$53,000,000 of British gold and securities. The gold is in the form of double eagles and is the largest shipment on record. It was brought across the Atlantic on a battleship convoyed by destroyers, and is alleged to have been under the command of Sir David Beatty. The specie was carried on an armed train, conveyed by a pilot engine to test the bridges. The purpose of the shipment is to reinforce British credit. A large shipment was also delivered in Canada.

#### Steamer Torpedoed.

London, August 11.—The British steamer Rosalie, of 2,700 tons net, bound from South Shields to Portland for grain, has been torpedoed. She was beached and the crew saved.

#### Heavy Fighting.

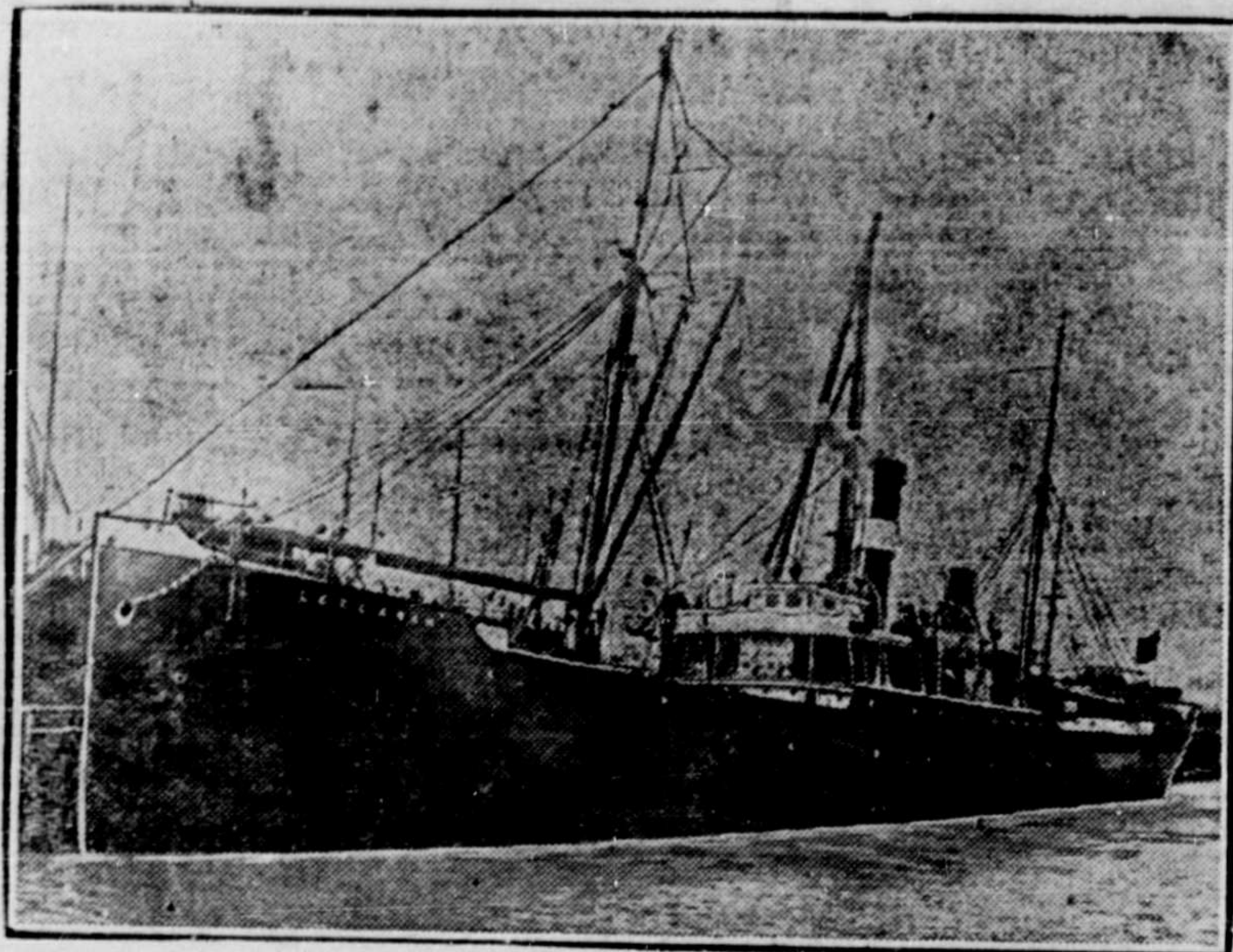
French and English reports state that a heavy bombardment marks the resumption of active hostilities on the western front. Heavy fighting continues on the Dneister.

#### Destroyer Sunk.

The British destroyer Lynx has been sunk in the North Sea. She struck a mine. Four officers and twenty-two men were saved. The Lynx was a modern vessel, built only about three or four years ago. She had a displacement of 935 tons and carried two 4-inch guns, two 12-pounders and had two torpedo tubes.

#### Aeroplanes Missing.

Paris, August 11.—Four aeroplanes which took part in the bombardment of Saarbrücken, failed to come back to our lines. One is said to have landed in Switzerland.

#### FISHING, FARMING AND MINING ON QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

**THE ISLANDS ARE DELIVERING THE GOODS IN ALL THREE BRANCHES OF INDUSTRY--FARMERS WILL MAKE GOOD SHOWING AT THE FAIR**

The Queen Charlotte Islands without steamboat connection with Prince Rupert were decidedly up against it. For several months the settlers have had to take any old chance or means of getting their produce carried over the Heate Straits to Prince Rupert, and from all accounts it was hard luck on the man who had ventured on the new life to be so suddenly cut off as to outside communication, as were the Islanders last spring.

This, however, is a thing of the past, and from now on the old reliable Camosun, a boat known well and truly by every miner, farmer and prospector in the north, has taken up the work of keeping up the travel route between Prince Rupert and the Islands.

Recently tales have been told on all sides, how hard conditions were on the Islands; how transportation was lacking and work scarce. True, work is scarce as work is understood by roads and trails, but it is not scarce as to development of the various farms, etc. As in other districts dollars are scarce, but more stuff is being grown, more acreage coming under development, stock increasing, and mining development going on steadily.

If you want to see good produce growing, fruits, vegetables, etc., then go to Sandspit, to Skidegate, to Lawn Hill, to Queen Charlotte City and you will see produce growing, about which one passenger remarked (he had come from far Maryland): "We have nothing like the growth in the Southern States," and it is doubtful whether they have.

Do the people of Prince Rupert realize that on the coast of these islands green hands are engaged in trolling for salmon for the market, are getting good prices for their catch, and that in one case two men, fishing from a gasoline boat, caught 5,000

pounds of salmon in four hours? They got 4 1-2 cents for their fish, so figure out what can be made in fishing off the Islands. The only complaint the fisherman has is that they have only one carrier boat for their fish between Prince Rupert and the grounds, and they want another, so that they can have the fish they catch coming steadily into the Rupert market.

Here is the chance for the man who can use a trolling line and has a boat. One of the carrier boats will land him on the grounds, and will carry all the fish he catches to the Rupert market for one cent per pound. No danger of having the fish left on his hands. No danger of not being able to catch the fish, they are there in quantity, and all that is required is the ability to row a boat and use a troll. Surely that is not too much to ask a man in return for at any rate a good living these hard times. Of course there will be the usual amount of objections from scoffers: "This cannot be done. You must have that, or this to do it with;" but nevertheless some progressive ones are doing it and they are not yelling hard times either.

Minerals. Well, the Camosun, on her last trip drew in to the Ikeda wharf and spent a few hours loading up sacked ore for the Granby smelter. Not a large quantity, perhaps, as judged by Granby receipts, some fifty tons, but every pound was heavy with copper, and copper these days has its own price. There are other properties too on Moresby Island, some have been found and are being developed, but go and look at that country yourself Mr. Prospector, and then say whether everything in the way of prospects have been located on Moresby Island. #### BULGARIA TO ATTACK TURKEY IF CONCESSIONS ARE GRANTED

**EARLY ENTRY OF BULGARIA, GREECE AND ROUMANIA INTO THE WAR EXPECTED--FRESH BRITISH FORCES FOR GALLIOLI ATTACK--THE GERMAN COMMANDER SUPERSEDED**

London, August 11.—Bulgaria has offered to attack Turkey if she is granted Serbian Macedonia, as was promised her at the close of the Balkan war.

The early entry of Greece, Bulgaria and Roumania into the war is expected.

#### British Reinforcements.

Fresh British forces have been landed at Karachali, north of the Gulf of Saros. The offensive has been resumed south of Gallipoli and north of Gabatepe Points. An early forcing of the Dardanelles is looked for.

#### Von Sanders Removed.

Field Marshal Liman Von Sanders, the German commander-in-chief in the Dardanelles, has been superseded by the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg.

The Rocher de Boule Mine had a slight fire the other day which destroyed some of the shops at the mouth of the tunnel. Repairs have been effected and everything is in full swing again. Shipments of ore at the rate of 100 tons a day are being made.

#### A WESTERN SCOTS BATTALION BEING FORMED

Lieut.-Col. Ross, who is home at present recovering from wounds received in Northern France, has been given a free hand in the organizing of a battalion of "Western Scots." It will be different from any other unit of the service and will seek to give expression to ideas formed by Col. Ross while at the front.

The lack of a few teeth, or an odd toe, or even an eye, will not disqualify a man if he can deliver the goods in the way of fighting quality. Col. Ross believes that the man who has faced the hardships of the trail, the mine and the plain is already half trained and he wants to put the idea to the test. These men will be a trifle unorthodox in their methods perhaps, but they are liable to be terribly effective, especially at close quarters. Col. Conservative brains are busy trying to guess the right kind of bait to use, when the fateful day comes along, but they are still more concerned about the right day. They needn't use up any more grey matter over the day; the day is long since past.

EMPIRE'S VITALITY

For years past, pessimists have drawn woeful pictures of the fall of the British Empire. It was the fashion for a certain class of writers to compare the rise of Britain to that of the Roman Empire, and to wind up with a doleful warning that the great British nation had passed the zenith of its power and was on the downgrade.

How splendidly has the youth of the Empire belied these statements. In the great crisis, the Empire has shown itself to

be a thing of youthful vitality, instead of decrepit age and decadence. Britain's sons have shown that they possess to a marked degree the spirit of their ancestors and are in no way inferior as fighting men to the stalwarts who fought at Waterloo and in the Crimea.

Instead of being on the downgrade, there is every evidence to show that the British Empire is still on the upgrade in everything that makes for liberty, freedom and justice. From the titanic struggle now being waged the Empire will emerge as a stronger, more complete whole than it ever has been.

TODAY'S LEADERS ARE ALL OLD MEN

Oldish men still remain on top in this war after a year of hard fighting. The four conspicuous commanders are Joffre, of the French; Von Hindenburg, of the Germans; French, of the British, and the Grand Duke Nicholas, of the Russians.

That is an unusual circumstance. Caesar was a young man when he invaded Gaul. Alexander was a boy when he made his first conquests. Napoleon became the military meteor on earth before he was 30, and he and Wellington were only 46 when they met at Waterloo for the last fight either ever witnessed.

Washington was but 45 when he wintered at Valley Forge, and he was not yet 50 when Cornwallis surrendered to him his army at Yorktown. Grant was only 43 as he stood at Appomattox. Stonewall Jackson had won a military record for all time before he was killed at 39.

Von Moltke was the exception, as he was 70 when, 45 years ago this summer, he trapped the armies of France in six weeks. But these seem to be the days when age gets the plums.

Didn't our governor just designate as Pennsylvania's three greatest men one 73, another 75 and a third 77?

And yet Elihu Root, at only 70, pretends he is too old to be president!—Philadelphia Ledger.

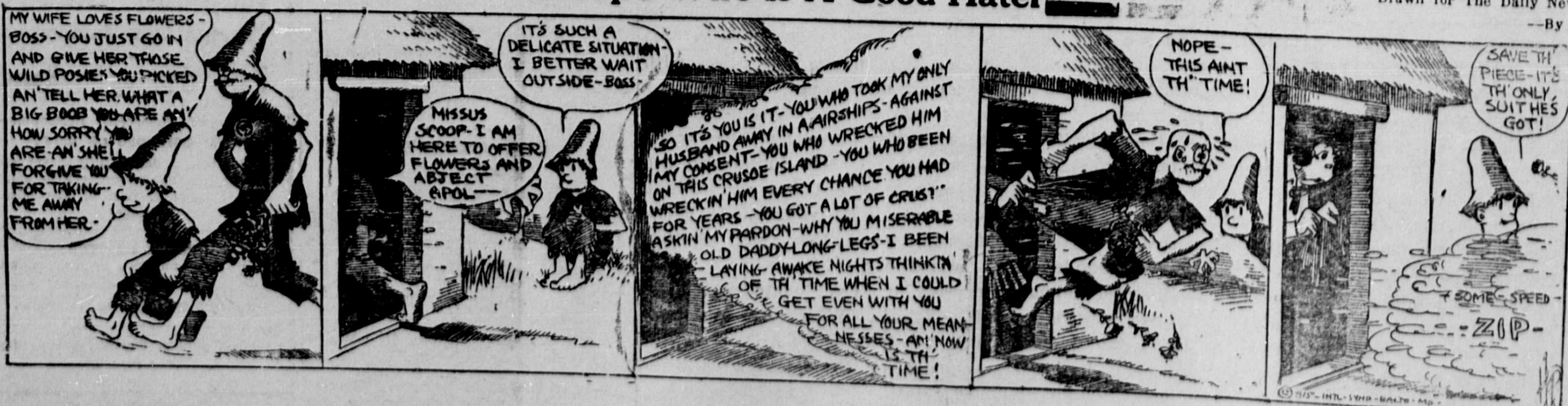

### DROP IN GERMAN EXPORTS TO AMERICA

The effect of the war on the trade of this country with Germany is shown in a statement of the declared value of exports to the United States through the ports of Hamburg, Kiel and Luebeck during the first six months of this year, made public by the Department of Commerce. During the first six months of 1914, these ports sent to the United States goods valued at \$14,994,585. This year in the same period, the shipments amounted to \$1,153,257. Hamburg, which handled the bulk of the trade, fell off from more than \$43,000,000 in American exports to a little more than \$1,000,000.—Dun's Review.

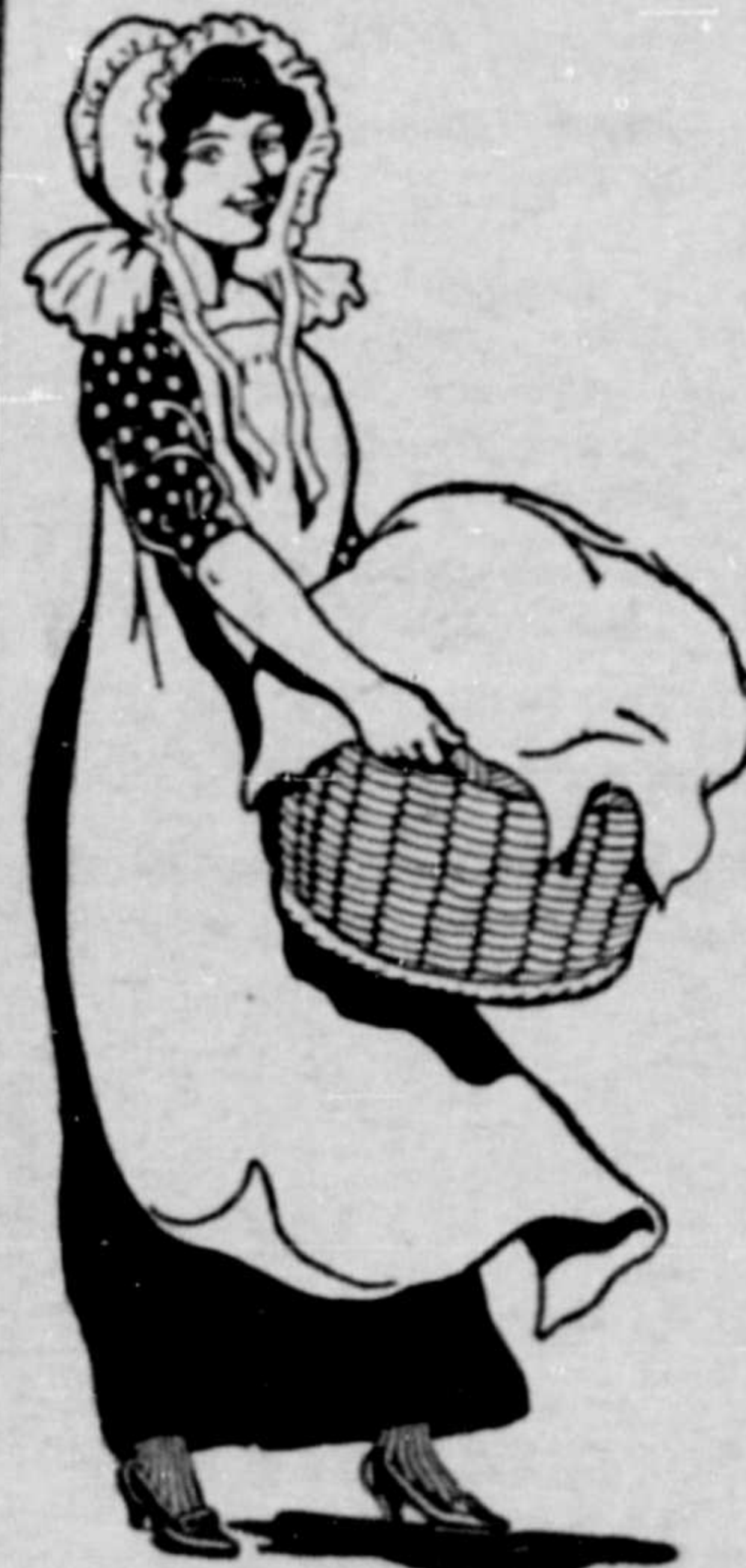

**RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.**

**RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.**

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

**QUESTIONS ANSWERED.**

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
