FOUR FATALITIES IN RAILROAD COLLISION

(Special to The Daily News.)
Columbus, Ohio, August 12.—Four were killed and twenty injured when a freight train collided with a passenger carrying the Knights of Pythias, Lodge Mount Sterling excursion.

MINING PROSPECTS ON LEGATE CREEK

Legate Creek, situated about a mile west of Pacific on the G. T. P., is showing up well in minerals. A. Halliday and T. Littlefair are at present working on a good shoot of ore, showing high grade galena with particles of native silver, and running about one oz. in gold to the ton. This ledge is a contact between granite and white lime and averages three feet in width for a distance of between two and three thousand feet. The strike runs about east and west, dipping about 85 degrees into the mountain, and apparently of considerable volume.

Halliday and Littlefair are also at work on a very promising copper property, samples from which have assayed from two to twenty-six dollars in gold. This ledge is in lime with a porphyry foot wall, and has the earmarks of a big producer.

Karl Whitmore and Mack Orr recently made an exceptionally promising strike on Mineral mountain, opposite Legate mountain, on which the Halliday-Littlefair claims are located, and in the same mineral zone. Their M. and K. property is copper glance and galena, the average width of this vein being eight feet, and the lead is traceable for about three thousand feet. This ore assays \$224 to the ton as follows: Gold, .04; silver, 108 oz.; copper, 40.5; lead, 17.08. This to all appearances is a new ore in this part of the country. Whitmore and Orr are also at work on their O. and W. property which is bornite and chalcopryite, and also of considerable extent, averaging \$130 per ton on assay and running as high as 33 per cent. in copper. They have some ore now ready to ship and are awaiting the completion of a trail to get it out to the smelter.

The boys hope to have a good display of ore at the Prince Rupert Fair, but same can be seen by any interested at the office of Mr. McCubbin, deputy recorder at Pacific, along with other ore samples from properties in the district.

ER HAZELTON PROPERTY LEASED

Another mining property is added to the working list by the leasing of the Barber and Barber Bill claims on Nine Mile, to Lofquist, Brewer and Anderson. The property will be opened up without delay, and the operators hope to make considerable shipments of silver-lead ore in the near future. The owners are W. H. Burken and Edgar Harris.—Omineca Miner.

GERMANS EXPECTED TO MAKE DASH FOR RUSSIAN CAPITAL

BALTIC FLANK 300 MILES FROM PETROGRAD—AMBITIOUS PLUNGE INTO RUSSIA EXPECTED—AUSTRIAN SUBMARINE SUNK IN ADRIATIC—FRENCH AIR RAID

London, August 12.—The German flank on the Baltic has reached the River Dwina, 300 miles from Petrograd. A big battle on the second line of defences is expected next week.

The British and Russian press believes that Germany has an ambitious plan to plunge deeper into Russia with Petrograd as their goal.

Austrian Submarine Sunk.
Rome, August 12.—The new Austrian submarine U-12, of 1000 tons and with a speed of 18 knots,

has been sunk with all hands in the upper Adriatic. She was torpedoed by an Italian submarine.

French Air Raid.
London, August 12.—French aviators have dropped bombs on Swebruecken and St. Ingbert. Berlin reports that eight people were killed in the raid.

Big Prize.
Paris, August 12.—A civil tribunal has sequestered the property of the German millionaire Herr Jellinek. His real estate in Paris and the Riviera was valued at \$40,000,000.

ELECTION SOON

Vancouver, Aug. 12.—In an interview Sir Richard McBride says he knows the date of the election, but will not disclose it yet. An early announcement is expected.

Washington, August 12.—Villa has informed the government that he is willing to sign a three-months' truce to hold a peace conference.

PRINCESS MARY WAS HELD AS SPY

New York, August 11.—A London cable to the Tribune says: "A member of the British royal family, thanks to the efficient espionage net of the allies at the front, has been arrested, charged with being a German spy. For four hours Princess Mary was held under guard, while officers sympathetic but skeptical, investigated her claims to royal privileges."

"Having gone on an incognito visit to the hospitals at the front, Princess Mary, accompanied by Mlle. Dussau, started to meet her brother, the Prince of Wales, at the British headquarters. When about six miles from the village where the staff was located, her car was halted by a French patrol. Unluckily, the occupants had forgotten their passports and permission papers, nor did the patrol recognize royalty in the name of Lady Chester, which Princess Mary gave.

"Leaving the car, with its occupants under guard of two French soldiers, and with the assurance that they would be shot at six o'clock in the evening, the corporal went in search of the officer in command of the outpost. Not until four hours later did the officer return. The identity of the prisoners was then established by messages to the British headquarters, which was on the point of issuing a general alarm for the missing princess."

FAMOUS PIANIST HAS BEEN DEPORTED

London, August 11.—Maria Cecilia Natalie Janotha, court pianist to Emperor William, was arrested in London today and deported from Tillbury.

Maria Janotha holds membership in many academies of art in Italy, Great Britain and Austria. She received the Victoria badge from Queen Victoria and holds the highest honorary diploma from the St. Cecilia Royal Academy in Rome. She edited Lady Tennyson's songs and translated Chopin's greater works. She was the recipient of many decorations including one from the German empress.

BRITAIN'S GOLD

Striking evidence of Britain's supreme command of the seas is given in the recent shipment of \$53,000,000 in gold and securities across the Atlantic. The incident illustrates the fact that Britain is free to bring or send whatever she pleases and whenever she pleases. Germany must depend for food, raw material for munitions, and all the necessities of warfare, entirely on her own resources. It is true that, thoroughly prepared as she was, her resources are still large, but they are gradually diminishing, while the Allies, so long as their credit is good, can obtain everything necessary. In the long run, the struggle must become a financial duel, or rather a duel of resources. At present, Germany has command of a large part of industrial Europe and for a time she may be able to replenish her stock of war material, but Britain's command of the seas, coupled with her vast financial resources, will enable the Allies to get control of all the material necessary to bring about the Prussian downfall.

GERMAN FAILURES

Germany hoped, by one great coup, to bring Russia to her knees, but in this she utterly failed. The Teuton jaws which closed on Warsaw, enveloped simply an empty shell. The attempt to encircle the Russian army failed absolutely, and the extended German line in Russia is now a liability instead of an asset. The Russian army is intact and ready to strike when the opportune moment arrives. In offering Russia a separate peace Germany misjudged Russia just as she misjudged Britain at the outset of the war. German diplomacy seems unable to grasp the fact that any nation can have a higher motive than mere expediency. The affirmed determination of Russia to stay with her sworn compact

with France and Britain must have caused Berlin to do some tall thinking.

If Bulgaria enters the arena, from whatever motive, it will hasten the downfall of Constantinople and will cut some months off the duration of the war, but it cannot alter the final outcome. The Allies, without any assistance, are strong enough to cope with the situation. Every day sees the Dardanelles defence weakening, and the recent change in German leadership in that quarter is ample proof that all is not well with the Central powers there.

OFFICERS' CASUALTIES

London, August 11.—Officers casualty lists from July 19 to July 20 show that the British army lost 115 killed, 236 wounded and 14 missing; a total of 365. This figure aggregates officer loss since the beginning of the war to 13,656, of whom 4,476 are recorded dead, 8,305 wounded and 1,475 missing.

During the ten days covered by the lists regiments operating in the Dardanelles have again been the greatest sufferers.



TRAIN RUNS TEN MILES WITH LIFELESS PILOT

Columbus, Ohio, August 10.—When a Big Four passenger train speeded through Georgesville, a village near here, today without stopping as usual, the fireman pulled the coat of Engineer William W. Quinlan to attract his attention and found the engineer was dead, though he sat erect with his hand on the throttle. Passengers became excited when they learned after reaching Columbus their train had run at least ten miles with the pilot lifeless. Heart disease caused his death.

BIG GERMAN GUN TO BE SHOWN AT TORONTO

Toronto, August 11.—A Krupp gun, the largest and most complete captured by the British from the Germans, has been received in Toronto and will be the main war trophy feature of the Toronto exhibition. It weighs 13 tons without tender or mounting.

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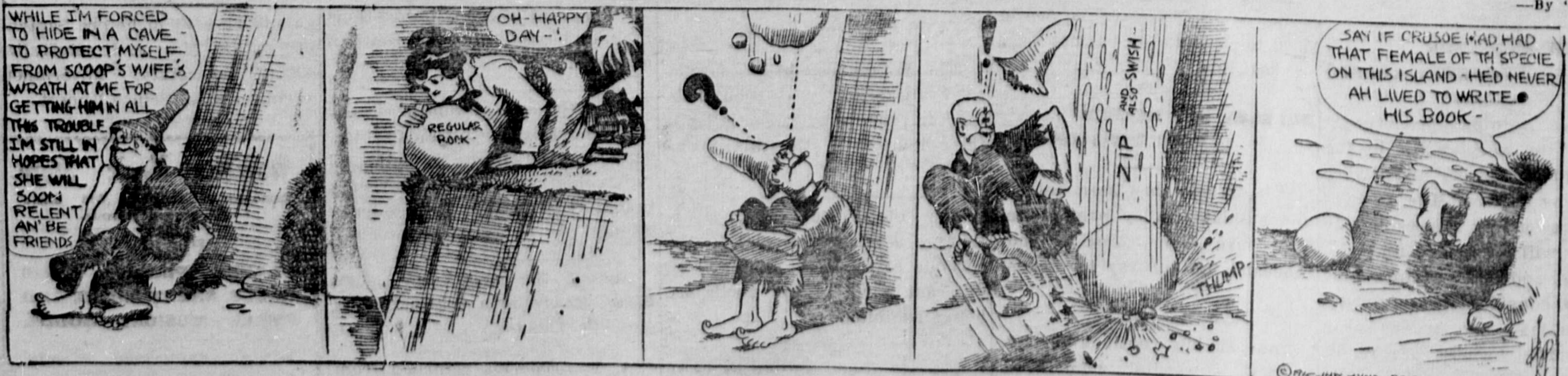

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INDUSTRIAL CANADA BOOSTS PRINCE RUPERT

The following is an extract from a lengthy article on Prince Rupert's drydock, which appeared in the last issue of Industrial Canada, under the signature of Norman Lambert, of the Toronto Globe:

With a sea route to Japan and the Asiatic ports on the Pacific five hundred miles shorter than any other port along the American coast, Prince Rupert is directly in the path of a big volume of trade between this country and the Orient. A port necessarily depends upon its proximity to the shortest route between two countries. Prince Rupert, first, is fortunate in having a splendid natural harbor, and, secondly, in being five hundred miles nearer

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to the east coast of Asia than any other port on the American continent and is connected by a marvellously level line of railway with four thousand miles of territory to the east. It would seem, therefore, that if Prince Rupert is providing good accommodation for shipping in and out across the Pacific, it should become in due time, an important seaport.

On August 1, according to the word of W. T. Donnelly, of New York, the marine engineer in charge of the building, the G. T. P. subsidized drydock at Prince Rupert was practically completed and is now ready to do business. This drydock and its accompanying plant constitutes the largest and finest establishment of its kind on the Pacific coast, either in the United States or Canada, and is one of the most complete in America. Such is the brief description that has been given to it by the engineers in charge, and the chief, as well as the two principal superintendents under him, were all experts from the United States who have seen every drydock worth seeing, on the continent, at least.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.
RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.
In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.
QUESTIONS ANSWERED.
1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
