### DARDANELLES OPENING LOOKED FOR SOON--ZEPPELIN RAID ON ENGLISH COAST

#### ZEPPELIN RAID ON ENGLISH EAST COAST

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, August 13.—Another air raid has been made on the east coast, four persons being killed. One of the Zeppelins was damaged by aircraft guns, but succeeded in making its escape.

#### BATH-TUB MURDERER HANGED IN LONDON

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, August 13.—George Joseph Smith, the bath-tub murderer, was hanged today. Smith's crimes were of a peculiarly callous nature. Under different names, over a period of years, he married several wealthy ladies, each one of whom was found drowned in a bath. Besides taking possession of his victims' wealth, Smith collected large sums from insurance, and ultimately the insurance companies became suspicious, with the result that the whole series of crimes was laid bare.

#### ARE PLEASED WITH WORK BEING DONE IN CANADA

Ottawa, August 12.—D. A. Thomas, General Mahon and R. D. Carr, representing in Canada Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, minister of munitions in the Imperial government, have returned from a trip of inspection of Canadian munition factories in Montreal and the maritime provinces, and left for New York. The British representatives express themselves as highly satisfied with the work being done by the Canadian firms and with their capacity for turning out shells and explosives. It is expected that the party will commence its tour of inspection of Ontario factories on Thursday next, and after that is finished will proceed westward.

#### SPLENDID SHOW AT THE WESTHOLME THEATRE

The Westholme has a very interesting program for tonight and tomorrow, beginning with a Hearst-Selig Gazette which shows Canadian troops, etc. "A Woman Laughs" is a stirring two-part Selig drama, while "The Little Captain" is a story for the children.

The funny side comprises a Keystone comedy entitled "That Springtime Feeling" and "Easy Money", a comedy of the west.

There will also be shown a view of the Peabody factory which was recently damaged by explosives placed by Germans. The drawing for the Red Cross motor boat will take place during the evening.

#### MOTORSHIP ARRIVES AT SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Aug. 12.—The new Swedish motorship San Francisco, built to run between Stockholm, its home port, and San Francisco via the Panama Canal, arrived the other day on its maiden voyage which was 36 hours longer than expected because of its detention in a British port.

The San Francisco made the trip from Stockholm in 51 days. While rounding the north of Scotland the freighter was pursued by a British cruiser, which hailed the motorship with a shot across the bow and took it into Stornaway, Scotland, for examination.

#### AGRICULTURAL ASS'N WANTS 1,000 MEMBERS

Do you believe that your future depends, for prosperity, on the progress of the town or district in which you dwell? Do you believe that the furnishing of opportunity to the farmer, the miner the fisherman and all engaged in development work in Northern B. C. to show what the country is capable of producing is advisable and profitable? Do you believe that the expenditure of money to bring still more money into circulation in days when a dollar is expected to do the work of ten is of benefit to the city or district? If you do count it a fact that advertising aids development, and that development aids your community and yourself; furnishing profit and payrolls, you will listen.

In the year 1914, 450 citizens enrolled themselves as members of the Northern British Columbia Agricultural and Industrial Association, under whose auspices the fair is conducted each year. The directors submitted this list to the government when asking for a grant towards the 1915 fair and the grant they received was practically dollar for dollar subscribed as membership fees.

In the year 1915 the directors will again submit a list to the government and on this list will be based the grant for 1916. Now 450 members may have been all right for 1914, but since then, although times have been hard, development has increased fifty times, and the directors want to be able to say we have 1,000 members on our roll. That means that dollar for dollar the 1915 grant will be so much more.

It is to the interest of every resident of the city and district to do what they can to get this number of new members. Times are hard, there are many other calls on the purse—in lots of cases more pressing—but this is a matter of business. The holding of the fair each year keeps up interest in development work, advertises it, brings new money into circulation among the business people of Prince Rupert and other residents, and especially in a year like this will help all business in a material way.

The actual cost of joining the Association is \$1 per annum: this is the only charge and carries the privilege of two free entries. Badge and voting power at the general meeting each year. Every dollar contributed in membership fees means two dollars toward a better fair each year.

The prize list etc., for 1915 amounts to 2,200. From all over the district reports have been received showing that 1915 fair will be a winner as to exhibits.

#### EUROPEAN WHEAT PURCHASES CANCELLED

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Chicago, Aug. 13.—Enormous purchases of wheat for Europe have been cancelled, with a loss of from 8 to 10 cents per bushel to buyers. This action is believed to herald the early forcing of the Dardanelles. Two million bushels of wheat are affected.

#### RECRUITING RESTRICTIONS HAVE BEEN ABOLISHED

Ottawa, Aug. 12.—All restrictions upon recruiting which have hitherto been in force have been abolished by the militia council and the government here. No longer will a man be prevented from enlisting because his wife objects. No longer will the parents of a minor have power to stop him enlisting if he desires and no longer will discharge be granted on receipt of \$15 to men who change their mind and desire to leave the force. All such conditions have been wiped out.

"We are at war," said Senator Loughheed, acting minister of militia, in explaining this morning, "and we have decided to adopt the same regulations in connection with recruiting as the British have in force."

### NATIONAL SACRIFICE

The Hon. W. T. White has spoken out at a recruiting meeting in Montreal on the necessity for the spirit of sacrifice in Canada. The minister of finance was not referring merely to the need for service at the front. That is the supreme need, and day by day the appeal for men and more men grips a larger number of Canadians. No matter how long the war may last or how desperate the conditions at the front may become Canada will continue to supply thousands of generous and high-spirited young men who without flinching will face the worst the foe can do.

The spirit of sacrifice is needed at home as well as at the front. There are tens of thousands of well-to-do people in the Dominion to whom the war has meant a golden stream of increased profits, of higher prices for their products, and a gratification of their love for the dramatic. They have not even sacrificed any of their leisure to take part in the work of the various patriotic associations which are caring for the dependents of the men in the trenches or providing comforts for the soldiers themselves. Some are willing and ask how they can help, but the great mass are absolutely lethargic, and look upon the war as a spectacle upon which they can gaze unmoved as those having nothing at stake.

In the Canadian field forces and in the ammunition factories there are probably 200,000 Canadians actively engaged in the tremendous task of pulling down Prussian militarism. How can the remaining eight millions of the people show the spirit of sacrifice? In the first place by supporting generously all the war funds. The Patriotic Association, the Red Cross, the various hospital associations, the numerous funds for providing comforts for the troops, the Y.

M. C. A. work at the camps—dozens of organizations—call for money, and vast sums will have to be provided during the coming winter. Have you who read this, sitting at home at ease while Europe is aflame, done your bit by contributing? and has your contribution meant in any real sense a sacrifice—the giving up of anything of value? If it has not there is still opportunity to surrender something that really counts.

The greatest sacrifice the Canadian people are called upon to make collectively in the cause of human freedom is the surrender of the national habit of extravagance. We have been wasteful in our public and in our private expenditures. The practice of thrift has been a reproach. The free spender has been the popular man, even when he has also been known as a free borrower. The public service has been managed as lavishly as private households and business concerns. Millions could be saved in Ottawa and throughout the country by retrenchment and the inauguration of improved methods of carrying on the affairs of the Dominion and the provinces. And there is grave need for sacrifice in national affairs. Mr. White says the expenditure on the war is now at the rate of \$150,000,000 a year. It will continue rising steadily. It would be no surprise to see monthly disbursements reach \$20,000,000 early in the winter. Two years of war will add a greater total to the debt of the Dominion than all the public works undertaken since confederation. Canada will be fortunate if she emerges from the strain of war in the autumn of 1916 with a net national debt of \$750,000,000.

To carry that burden will involve financial sacrifice and national thrift of the most thoroughgoing sort. The duty of bearing the load should not be indefinitely postponed by

borrowing all that is being spent upon the war. Posterity may have no vote, but it has some moral rights. Mr. White, in calling upon the Canadian people to show the spirit of sacrifice, had in mind the need for the raising of much additional national revenue, which can be obtained only by a material reduction in the private expenditures of the people. Men who smoke and drink a good deal are already paying much into the national treasury for the indulgence of their appetites and habits. The minister of finance, like Mr. Lloyd George in Britain must use a net of smaller mesh and cast it more widely. Sacrifice in the last analysis for most Canadians will mean spending much less upon themselves and much more upon the public service. They must provide the silver bullets to bring down the enemies of human liberty.—Toronto Globe.

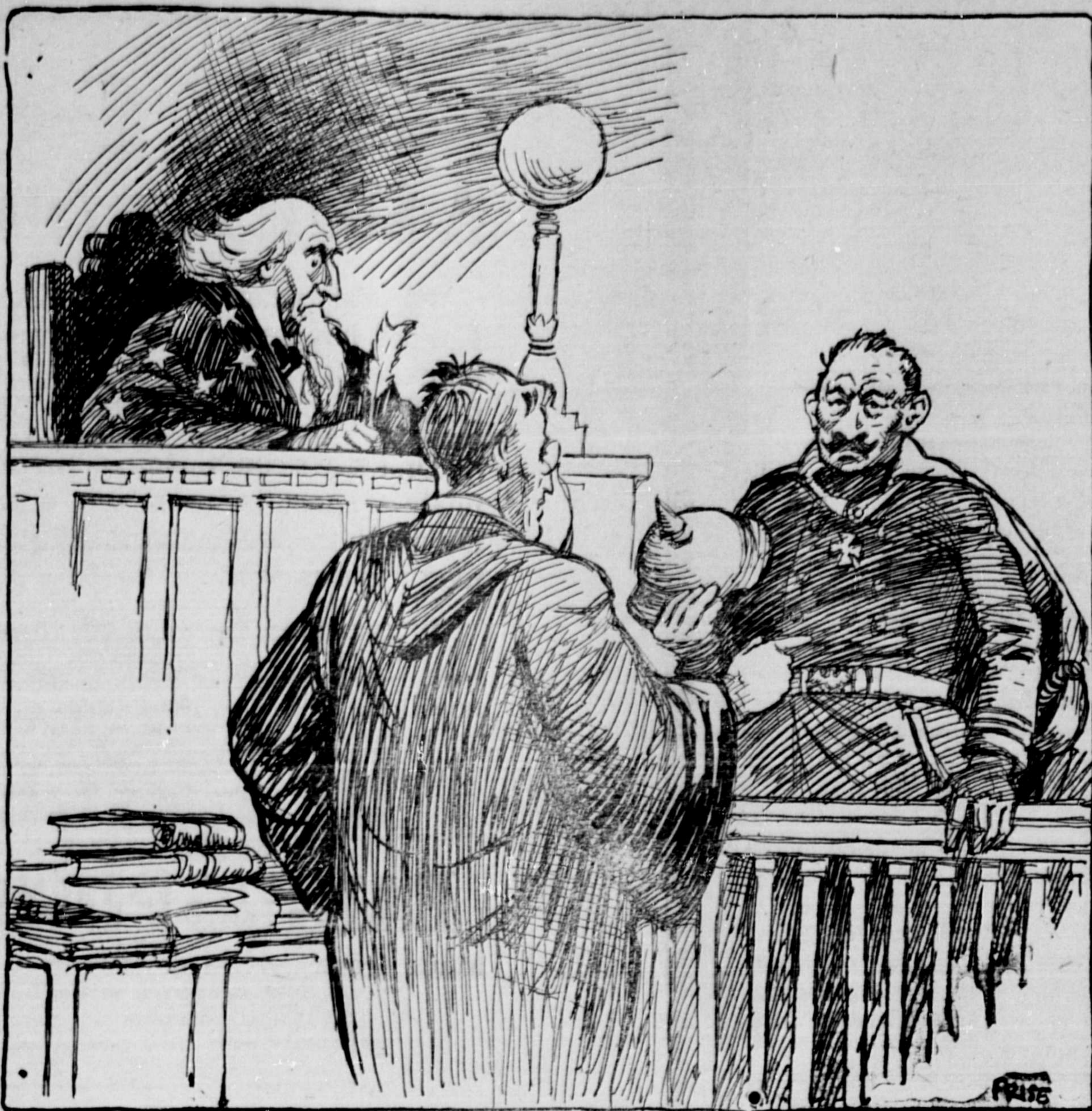

## KRUPPS' OFFER TO ROUMANIA

Milan, August 11.—A dispatch from Bucharest to the Corriere Del La Sera says that following the departure of Prince Von Hohenlohe Langeburg, the German ambassador to Turkey from the Roumanian capital, a representative of the Krupp gun works, arrived at Bucharest and offered

the Roumanian government thirty six batteries of artillery with 2,000,000 pounds of barbed wire, to let ammunition destined for Turkey pass through. After the intervention of the British minister at Bucharest, the newspaper says, however, that the offer was refused.

## Your King and Country Need You

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION,  
CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT  
OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
