TEXAS HURRICANE DOES SIXTY MILLIONS DAMAGE

(Special to The Daily News.)

San Antonio, August 19.—The total number killed in the storm is about 400. Galveston lost 250, mainly among the shipping in the bay. Thousands of citizens have left their homes for shelter in the big down-town buildings. There has been much damage by fire. The sea wall at Galveston withstood the terrible onslaught of sea and gale. The total damage is estimated at \$60,000,000.

SAVED FROM LAKE ONTARIO WRECK WITH A LIFE LINE

In one of the worst storms in the history of Lake Ontario the Canadian Steamship Lines' freighter Alexandria, from Montreal to Fort William with package freight for Western Canada, was driven ashore on the famous Scargoro Bluffs, at Toronto's front door. For several hours, while the vessel was breaking to pieces in the storm, the sailors' lives were despaired of. Finally, through the bravery of farmers on shore, a life line was got to the steamer and in the darkness all were taken off. Above are eleven of the survivors, photographed a few hours after the accident.

AGED CARDINAL HAS PASSED AWAY AT ROME

Rome, August 19.—Cardinal Vannutelli, dean of the Sacred College, is dead at the age of 81. He was one of the most influential members of the college and was eligible for the Papacy. He has been cardinal since 1887.

KITCHENER AND MILLERAND INSPECT WESTERN BATTLE LINE

MILLERAND SAYS THAT THE ENEMY HAS NO ILLUSIONS AS TO WINNING—LINER TORPEDOED—HUGE GERMAN LOAN—NORWAY PROTESTS—DANISH MOTORBOAT DETAINED

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, August 19.—An inspection of the western battle line was made on Monday by Lord Kitchenner, M. Millerand, the French War Minister, General Joffre and General French. In an address, Millerand said that after a year of war the enemy had no illusions about winning, and was only predicting internal dissension among the Allies as a hope.

Arabic Torpedoed.

London, Aug. 19.—The White Star liner Arabic was torpedoed off the south coast of Ireland this morning on her way to New York. The crew and passengers were all saved.

Later.

The White Star Co. announces that 375 were saved out of 423 passengers and crew. The ship was torpedoed without warning at 9:15 a.m. near Fastnet, about 40 miles from the scene of the Lusitania disaster. Fifteen boatloads were saved. On the last trip from New York, with a cargo of munitions, dynamite and a fuse were found concealed in a settee of the women's cabin. The Arabic was a vessel of 15,801 tons and was 600 feet long. She was built by Harland and Wolff at Belfast in 1903. She outfooted a submarine on her last trip.

Huge German Loan.

Amsterdam, August 19.—The Voerworts says that the Socialist party in the Reichstag has decided to vote on the war credits, including a new loan of \$2,500,000,000.

Norway Protests.

Christiania, August 19.—The halting of the Norwegian mail steamer Haakon V-11 and the seizure of the mails by a German submarine has been followed by protests to Berlin and a demand for the return of the mail.

Danish Boat Detained.

London, August 19.—The Danish motorboat Jutlandian, bound from San Francisco to Copenhagen with a general cargo, has been taken into Kirkwall, in the Orkneys, and is being detained by British warships.

Cotton Contraband.

Washington, August 19.—An announcement that the Allies agree to cotton being declared contraband of war has been made by the British embassy.

WHAT MANITOBA HAS IN MIND

The people of Manitoba on Friday last did one good job. They cleaned out, almost to the last fragment, the broken-down political machine that had cursed their province for more than a decade and made the idealism of democracy and parliamentary institutions a cynical mockery. The Roblin-Rogers regime—Roblin withdrew only a few weeks ago, and Rogers, notwithstanding his Federal office, stayed with the played-out game to the very last, fighting desperately for his own political life—the disgraced and demoralized regime unclean to its very heart, brazen in its corruptness, and impudent in its program of public rascality, has been swept away. The sorry rump of a Conservative party that will appear at the next session of the Manitoba legislature has neither the wit nor the ability to do either good or harm. Its utter helplessness, even as a Rogers agent of wrongdoing, makes it pathetic.

No other province in Canada, unless it be British Columbia, was ever so deliberately, so systematically, and so extensively looted as Manitoba has been in the past dozen years. The grafting and nefarious exploitation of public interests for private gain was matched in shamelessness only by the lawless manipulation of the electoral machinery permitted by the law officers of the Crown and by which the government itself made political profit. For years the decent citizens of Manitoba were galled by the yoke of their bondage, but against the power and the craftiness of Roblin and Rogers they were almost in despair. The greatest public service Sir Rodmond ever rendered—and this should be counted to him almost for righteousness—was when, in tired-out disgust at "the hungry Ottawa gang," he "chucked" the premiership, gave Norris a free hand, and

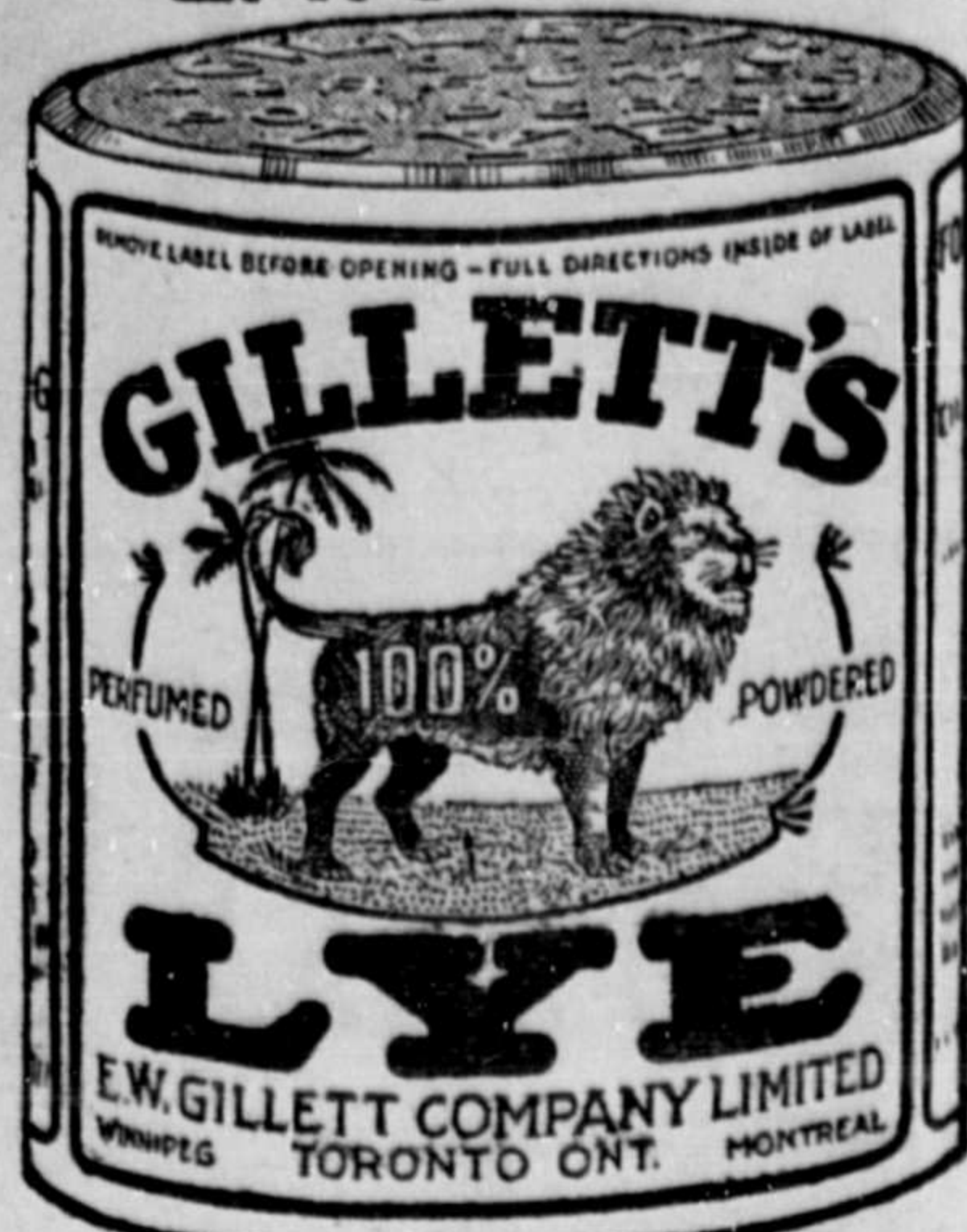
left Rogers to shift for himself.

And the Hon. Robert Rogers did shift for himself. Notorious as a skilled election manager long before he entered the Borden government, and boastful of his success in "winning elections," he gave himself up to win in this provincial campaign. Nothing of his old-time arts was neglected. Nothing in his federal prestige was omitted. And what came of it? His special lieutenants, Sir James Aikins and Mr. W. H. Sharpe, deluded out of the House of Commons, were beaten to the point of disgrace, his own Winnipeg constituency rebuked his candidates with majorities against them far up in the thousands, and ever his nurtured and pap-fed newspapers, in the province and out of it, scarcely did him the hollow reverence of even a crocodile tear. And this is the man to gratify whose ambition for the Canadian Commissioner-ship at London all Canada was to have been thrown into the shame of a war-election a few months ago! How are the mighty fallen!

But let the dead bury their dead. It is the one business of Premier Norris and his colleagues, in spite of the heavy handicap of a too large majority, so to serve their province with integrity and ability that the ugly mess left by their predecessors may be cleaned up, the self-respect of Manitoba's citizens restored, and a government established true to the principles and the spirit of progressive Liberalism.

It matters very little that the government's name is Liberal; it matters everything that the principles be progressive and their work-out in the daily life of the province intelligent and impartial and just. Manitoba has a chance to return to political decency. It is the duty of the Norris government to lead the way.—Toronto Globe.

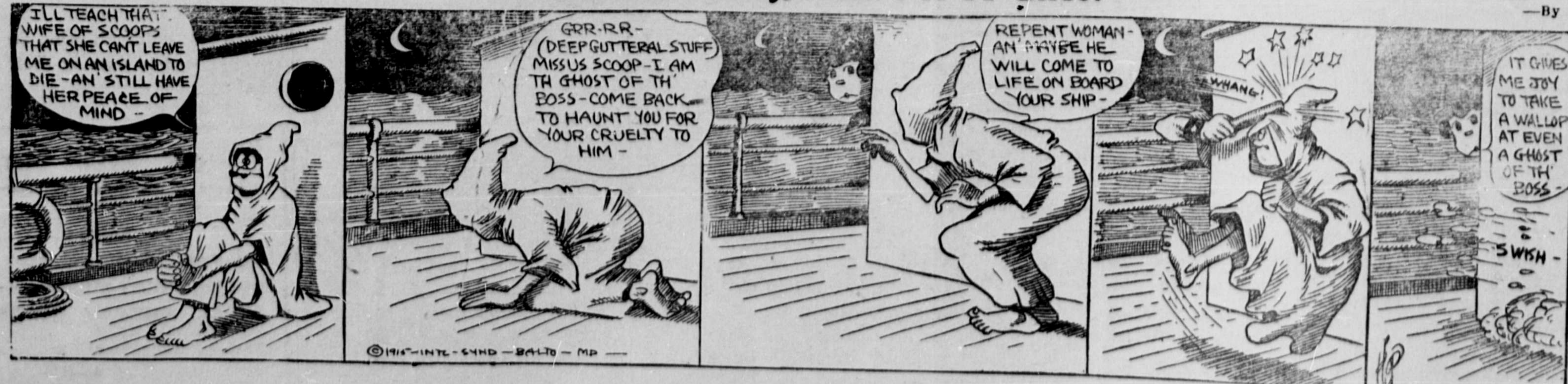

"I have already written letters of gratitude and sympathy," said the Major-General, "to mothers of more than one hundred American boys who have fallen while fighting in Flanders alongside of Canadian comrades. More than 2,000 enlisted, and we could have many more if we wished. Any number of West Pointers offered their services as officers, and some are now with us."

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION,
CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT
OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
