## ADDITIONAL GERMAN LOSSES IN THE BALTIC

### ANOTHER CRUISER AND SUBMARINE GONE — RUSSIANS FIGHTING EVERY STEP

#### ONE THOUSAND GERMANS LOST WHEN TRANSPORTS WERE SUNK

ANOTHER CRUISER AND SUBMARINE ADDED TO THE GERMAN LOSSES AT RIGA—FORTY BRITISH WARSHIPS ATTACKING GERMAN POSITIONS—WILSON URGED TO AWAIT REPLY

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 24.—One thousand soldiers were lost when the German transports were sunk in the naval battle in the Gulf of Riga.

##### More German Losses.

Petrograd has been keeping silence regarding the details of the naval battle in the Gulf of Riga, for tactical reasons.

It is now stated by the Russians that the Germans lost another cruiser, and that a German submarine was driven ashore.

##### Admiralty Silent.

The Admiralty has been silent regarding a bombardment of German positions along the Belgian coast by forty British warships. The matter is referred to in a Berlin report.

##### Wilson Urged to Wait.

Washington, Aug. 24.—Count Von Bernstorff urges President Wilson to take no action over the sinking of the Arabic until the German reply to his note has been received.

#### GERMAN ARMIES CONTINUE TO ADVANCE INTO RUSSIA

RUSSIA FIGHTING EVERY STEP OF THE WAY—BREST-LITOVSK STILL RESISTS GERMAN ATTACK—ARTILLERY EXCHANGES IN WEST—TRENCHES TAKEN IN VOSGES

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 24.—The Austro-German advance in Russia continues. The Russians are fighting every step of the way. After severe encounters at Brest-Litovsk, the Germans have decided to abandon their howitzer attack on the fort, and are now preparing to attack by storm.

The enemy is making little progress in the Baltic provinces.

##### Western Front.

On the western front, warfare

is confined to artillery exchanges and bomb combats, with the exception of the Vosges district where French infantry has won German trenches.

##### German Regrets.

The German government has expressed regret at the sinking of the Danish steamer Betty in the North Sea, and has announced its willingness to pay compensation for the loss of the steamer.

#### GOVERNMENT AID TO COTTON GROWERS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, August 24.—In view of the decision of the Allies declaring cotton contraband of war, Secretary McAdoo is prepared to extend financial aid to the southern growers. He will deposit \$30,000,000 in gold in the Federal reserve banks at Atlanta, Dallas and Richmond to re-discount loans on cotton secured by warehouse receipts.

#### HAD JUST OPENED GIRL'S WINDPIPE

London, August 24.—During one of the recent German air raids on the east coast a well-known surgeon was performing the operation of tracheotomy on a girl at a nursing home. It was night, and the municipal electric service was at once suspended. All lights went out at the very moment when the surgeon was opening the girl's windpipe.

Fortunately, it was not the first attack delivered against this place. Taught by experience, the operator had made it a matter of habit to warn his nurses and his assistants that lamps should be kept ready for use at all operations at night. The precaution saved the little patient's life. With but a trifling delay the operation was completed and the girl is doing well.

#### THE PRINCE RUPERT SWIMMING ASSOCIATION

In the Board of Trade rooms last night, Prince Rupert Swimming Association was formed. Dr. W. T. Kergin presided over an attendance of about thirty. He explained that one of the chief objects in forming such an association was to teach the youngsters to swim, and pointed out that in the salt lakes across the bay, the city had a first-class swimming pond. The first work of the association will be to provide suitable dressing rooms for ladies and gentlemen, after which attention will be paid to the construction of a diving platform etc.

The following office-bearers were appointed: President, Dr. W. T. Kergin, vice-pres. Mrs. Freeman, sec.-treas. E. H. Mortimer; executive committee: Mesdames Freeman, Woodland, Mobley, G. Munro, and Messrs. King, Currie and Mortimer.

The membership fee will be \$1 per annum for adults, 50 cts. for children between 15 and 18, and 25 cts. between 12 and 15, and all under 12 free.

#### THE "PATRIOTIC ACRE" MOVEMENT POPULAR

Regina, Aug. 24.—The farmers of Saskatchewan are contributing a portion of their crops to national purposes. The Grain Growers Association's "Patriotic Acre" movement has secured a ready response, and already the crop of 1,635 acres has been promised.

#### TWO THOUSAND PEOPLE FLOODED OUT OF HOMES

(Special to The Daily News.)

St. Louis, August 24.—Two thousand residents of Valley Park are homeless due to a rise of 35 feet in the Merimac River. The town was flooded to a height of from ten to fifteen feet.

#### SHIPMASTERS DISCUSS SHIPPING LAW EVASION

Captain J. Mulligan presided over a well attended meeting of the Prince Rupert branch of the Vancouver Shipmasters and Officers Association last night. After the usual business had been disposed of, the question of boats of five tons and over being allowed to operate out of this port without being in charge of certified men was brought up.

The secretary read the correspondence which had passed between himself and the Collector of the port, and, after due debate, he was instructed to write to the collector once more, on behalf of the association, pointing out that no definite steps had been taken by him to see that the law governing these boats had been complied with. In the event of an unsatisfactory or no reply being received to this letter, the matter will be laid before the Inspector of Steamships at Ottawa.

#### ITALIAN NATIONAL 4 1-2 PER CENT WAR LOAN

The Canadian Bank of Commerce will receive subscriptions to the Italian national war loan until August 31st. As the loan is being issued at 93, it will be seen that subscriptions to the extent of 100 lire may now be procured for 93 lire. In addition to this, the bonds will bear interest from July 1st. This is a splendid opportunity for local Italians to assist to an extent in financing our Allies, and at the same time making a good investment.

#### SASKATCHEWAN HAS PLENTY HARVESTERS

The mayor received a night letter from the labor commissioner of Saskatchewan this morning regretting that arrangements had already been completed for an adequate supply of men for the harvest, and stating that 200 men was not a sufficient number to warrant altering arrangements and sending men to Prince Rupert to select men and issue certificates.

#### FIRE FORCED CHILLIWACK CAR TO TURN BACK

Mrs. Gammon, who returned from New Westminster yesterday, reports that bush fires are causing a lot of trouble in that district. On one occasion recently the car between Westminster and Chilliwack had to turn back on account of the heavy smoke which hung over the tracks.

#### DELHI COMING TO DRYDOCK FOR REPAIRS

J. W. Duthie, representing the owners of the steamer Delhi, which has been on her beam ends on the beach near Ketchikan for several months, arrived in the city yesterday to make arrangements for the bringing of the steamer here.

Yesterday afternoon the tugs McCullough and Topaz, of the North Coast Towing Company, left for the north to bring down the Delhi to Prince Rupert. If successful in getting her here, the vessel will go into the G. T. P. drydock for repairs. The Delhi is a wooden steamer of 986 tons, is 227.4 feet long, with a beam of 39.2 and a depth of 16.6.

#### NINETY THE BEST OFFER FOR CITY DEBENTURES

Terry, Briggs & Slayton, of Toledo, Ohio, have offered to take up the debentures covering the redecking and roadway construction to Seal Cove at 90 cents on the dollar.

On the offer being placed before the council last night, Ald. Montgomery said he thought it was too low.

The mayor said it was the best offer received.

Ald. Dybbavn thought the offer was fairly reasonable considering financial conditions, and emphasized the fact that the only alternative was to do the work out of general fund.

Ald. Montgomery said he believed the lumber for the work was paid for, and, that part of the journey being over, he thought the offer of certain citizens to do the work and take debentures at par as payment should be considered.

The mayor said the citizens' offer did not cover the cold storage roadway. Ald. Dybbavn said it would be impossible to estimate the work to be done in connection with redecking.

On the motion of Ald. Montgomery, seconded by Ald. Casey, the matter was left over for a week.

##### HARVESTERS

At the council last night, Ald. Dybbavn asked if anything more had been done regarding the sending of harvesters from here to the prairie. The mayor said that, on learning that men were going east from Vancouver, he took the matter up with the Alberta and Saskatchewan governments. Saskatchewan had not yet replied, but Alberta said they had plenty of men.

## CHEERING NEWS

Yesterday's despatches were the most cheering for several weeks. The news of the Russian victory off Riga, coming after a Copenhagen report that they had been defeated, was particularly gratifying. News of this success will have put new life into the Russian defence, both on land and sea. One of the most pleasing features of the naval success was the fact that a British submarine helped materially to defeat the enemy. During the past few weeks, the Russians must have been inclined to feel that they were getting more than their share of the struggle, while, apparently, her Allies on the western front were taking things comparatively easy. The fact that Britain assisted in the Baltic fight has naturally increased the confidence of Russia in her friends.

The German fleet has again proven to be of comparatively little account, and, as in the North Sea action, had to beat a hasty retreat. How the crew of that British submarine must be envied by the boys of the North Sea fleet. The men who have waited for a solid year for a chance at the ships of Von Tirpitz have perhaps undergone a greater strain than many who have been in the trenches. Waiting for twelve months, ever on the watch; keyed up to fighting pitch, but with the enemy tucked away out of sight, must have been a very severe nervous strain, on both officers and men. British Jack Tars must detest waiting for that fight just as keenly as they will enjoy it when it does come.

## HALIBUT RETURNS

According to statistics in the Pacific Fisherman for August, 47 American boats disposed of their cargoes of halibut at Prince Rupert in the month of July, as against 26 in June. In

spite of all that has been said by Seattle interested parties to the contrary, Prince Rupert is steadily gaining a large portion of the halibut trade which formerly went south. The fishermen not only feel satisfied with their treatment at the hands of the local buyers, but they find it a great convenience to slip into this port with a small take when the weather gets bad enough to interfere with fishing.

There is every likelihood of another big fishing concern coming here from Seattle shortly, and, in time, there can be no doubt whatever that Rupert will be the centre of the Pacific coast halibut trade. Any month now we may expect Prince Rupert receipts to equal or even surpass those of Seattle.

## THE DIFFERENCE

The Laurier government went down to defeat on a big issue of its own choosing—a new and advanced policy, which the country at the polls refused to accept. That is the difference between its downfall and that of some other governments, Federal and Provincial, in Canada. The Laurier government went down in its full vigor of life, busy, aggressive, attempting to do too much—that is, to say, attempting to do more than the country was prepared to see done.

Some governments die in bed of old age, like the Federal government in 1896, and the Ross government in Ontario. Some governments are shot down with their boots on like the Mercier government in Quebec and the Roblin government in Manitoba.

It is a rare thing in Canada to find a government, strong in office and long in office, going to defeat on its own legs as the Laurier government did—not from rust and wear and not from scandal—but advocating an enterprising new

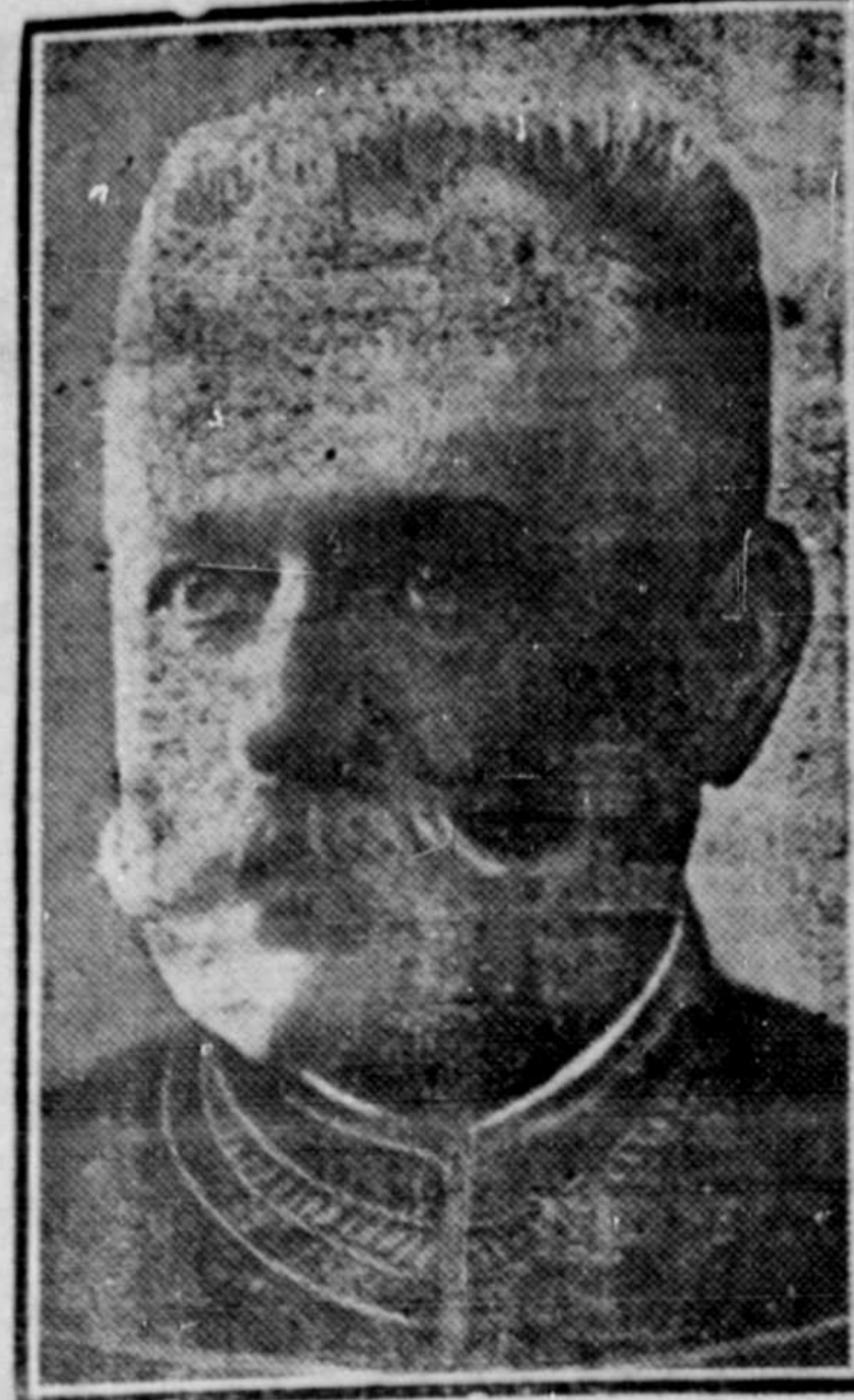

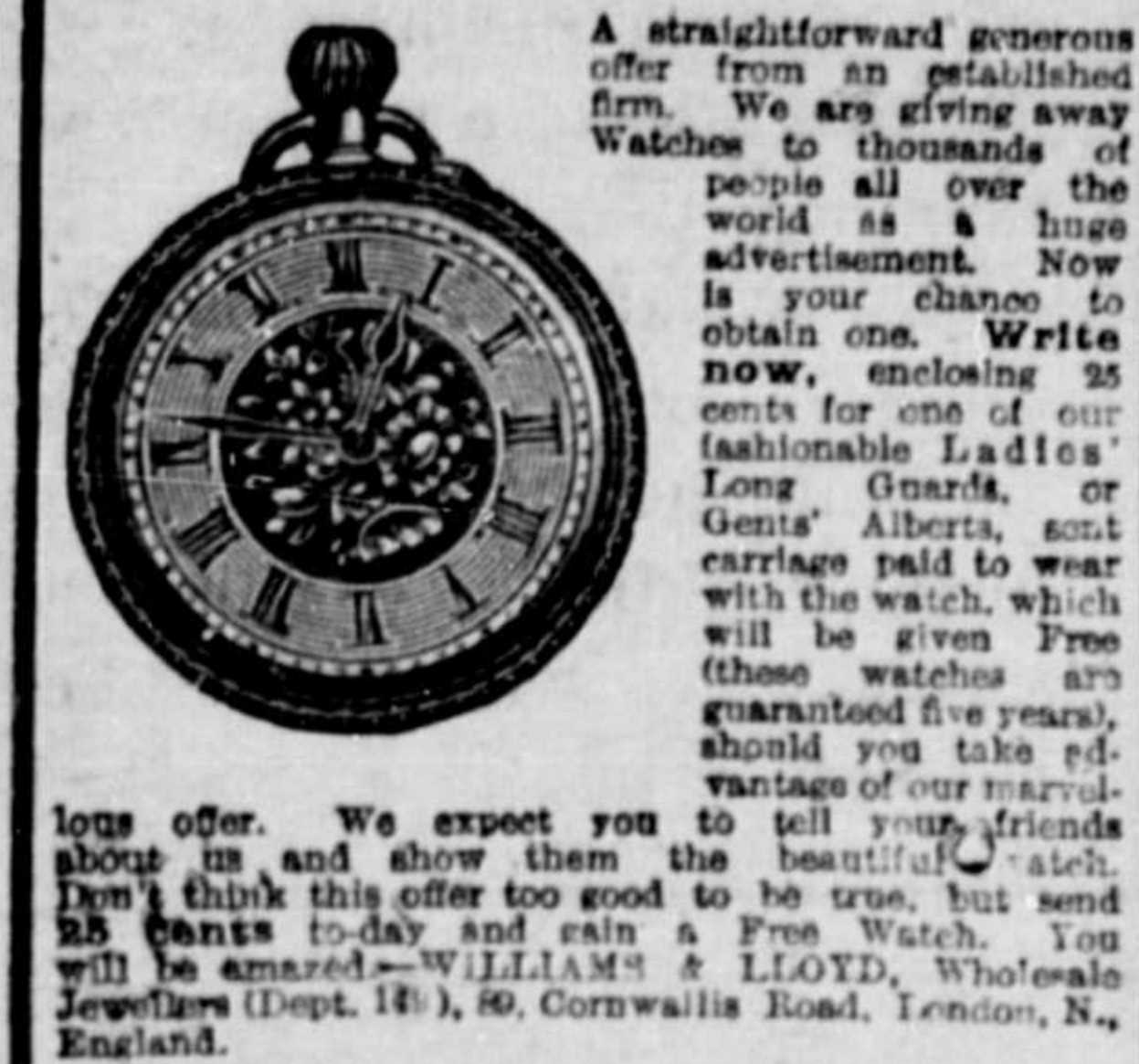

## Your King and Country Need You

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION,  
CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT  
OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present  
throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of  
the questions which are considered by those who contem-  
plate entering the Service. The following is a list of perti-  
nent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war  
and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will  
be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this  
you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Govern-  
ment.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every  
month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20  
(also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to com-  
fortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund  
will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will  
be cared for by the Government and your pay continued  
until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an  
allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of  
your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die  
while on Active Service? The Government will provide an  
adequate pension, that will enable the family to live com-  
fortably until the children are old enough to look after them-  
selves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be  
her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

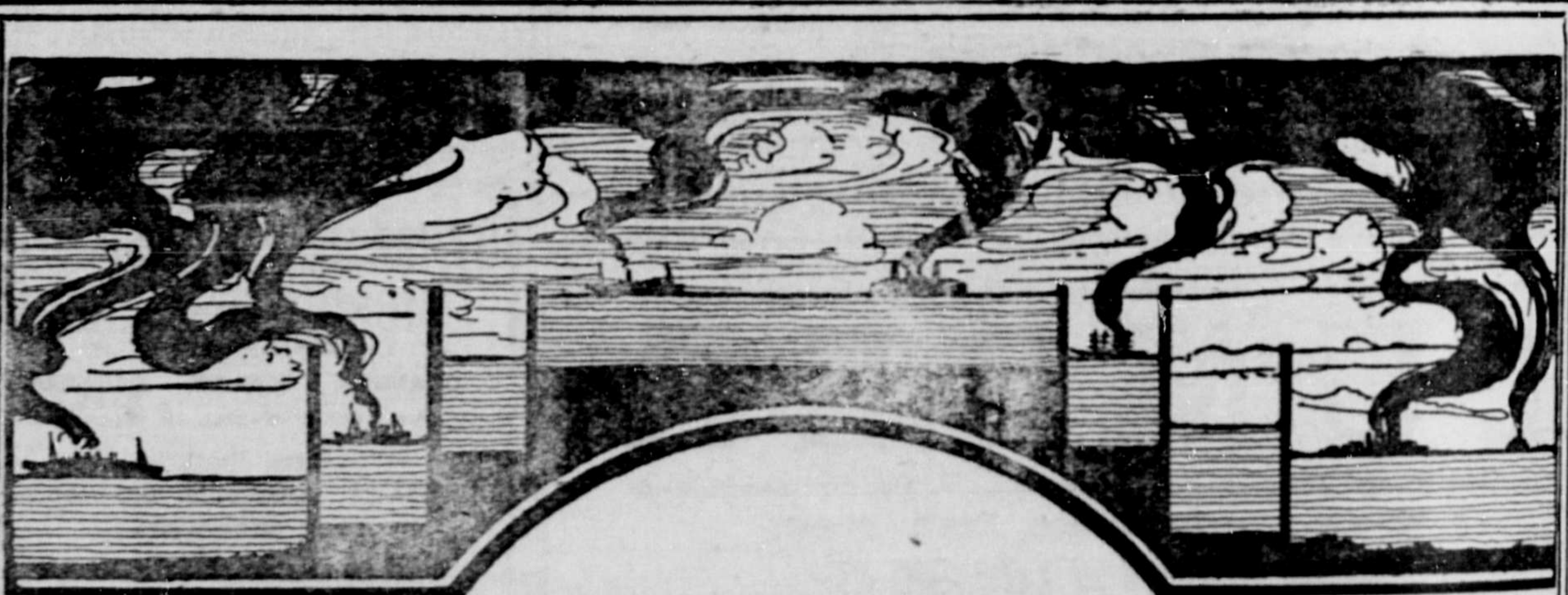
