RUSSIAN COMMANDER LURING GERMANS ON

GERMANS CAPTURE EMPTY FORTS — RUSSIA TO RAISE A MILLION MORE MEN

GARRISON OF BREST-LITOVSK LEAVES NOTHING FOR GERMANS

PROPERTY REMOVED AND FORTIFICATIONS DESTROYED—ENEMY CAPTURED EMPTY FORTS—RUSSIA TO RAISE ANOTHER MILLION MEN—LURING GERMANS TO DOOM

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, August 28.—100,000 men, comprising the garrison at Brest-Litovsk, have joined Grand Duke Nicholas' field forces, after destroying the fortifications and removing all property. It is deemed that the fort was taken by assault.

Russia Confident.
London, August 28.—Reports show that the Russian retirement was a real retreat and not a rout. The Germans took the fortresses because they were undefended. Polivanoff, the Russian minister, has announced that he is raising another army of a million. There is a feeling of confidence that the

Grand Duke Nicholas is luring the Germans to their doom.

Persian Trouble.
Petrograd, August 28.—A telegram received from Teheran, Persia, reports that the Russian and the British consuls and their military attaches have been attacked at Kenghever by an armed band led by M. O. Schunemann, the German consular agent at Tabriz. They defended themselves with rifles, but suffered some losses.

A cabinet meeting was held and as a result a request was sent to the commander of a Persian brigade of Cossacks, who are encamped four days march from Kenghever to send a detachment there immediately.

BULGARIA READY FOR WAR IF DEMANDS ARE GRANTED

FRENCH AEROPLANES DEFEAT GERMANS IN MID-AIR—AIR ATTACK IN THE ARGONNE—CANADA BUYS WHEAT FOR NEW ZEALAND—BORDEN WANTS NO OFFICIAL RECEPTION

Sofia, August 28.—An inspired statement issued by the government press says that Bulgaria is ready to convene parliament and to enter the war if her territorial demands are acceded to.

French Air Success.
Paris, August 28.—Four German aeroplanes were attacked by a French flotilla, which was defending Paris. One was destroyed in mid-air and the others were driven off.

Aeroplane Attack.
An aeroplane attack has been carried out against the German positions at Chatel in the Argonne.

Wheat for Antipodes.
Winnipeg, August 28.—The Canadian government has purchased one million bushels of wheat for New Zealand. The wheat is now stored at Montreal.

Borden's Request.
Winnipeg, August 28.—A request has been made by Sir Robert Borden that there be no official reception on his return next week with Sir Sam Hughes.

CHARLES LESTOR ON ECONOMIC CONDITIONS

The meeting in the Empress Theatre last night, under the auspices of the Trades and Labor Council, was well attended. After a few introductory remarks, the chairman, S. D. Macdonald, called upon Charles Lestor to deliver an address on "Present Day Economic Conditions."
At the outset, Mr. Lestor defined labor as an abstract thing, and went on to show that the working man does not sell his labor, but so many hours of his life at so many dollars, or, in other words, his power to labor.
In speaking of capital he read Prof. Shortt's definition, which was "capital is what a man has over and above his daily needs, and which he applies to some line of production." After pointing out that wealth is not necessarily capital, Mr. Lestor gave his definition of capital as "Capital is the result of past labor, used to compel present labor to produce profits." He traced the original growth of the capitalist idea by the following illustration: In a village you have a few cobblers, each producing shoes. One cobbler goes to another and says: "How many shoes can you produce in a week?" The second cobbler replies, "One pair." The first says: "I'll give you a pair of shoes, or the value of a pair of shoes, each week if you work for me." The second agrees. The first cobbler makes the same bargain with five others, and the seven of them start in to make shoes. The first cobbler, who is now boss, finds that one man is a good stitcher, another is a good cutter, and so on, therefore he has each man specializing, and at the end of the week the seven of them have produced eight pairs of shoes, when individually they would have produced only seven. Six of them get one pair each, but the boss gets two. Then a machine stitcher is introduced, the boss gets five pairs to the others'

THE DARDANELLES

In the August United Empire magazine there is a most interesting article on "The Fight for the Dardanelles," by J. Ellis Barker. "Never, in the history of the world, have greater sacrifices been made for so small a strip of country. Never has greater heroism been shown. The fight for the Dardanelles will live forever in world's history. It is an epic worthy of a Homer," says Mr. Barker.

In dealing with the alleged rashness of the British in making this attack, the writer shows that France and Britain decided upon the action as being absolutely necessary in order to assist Russia. Of the Allied powers, Russia is by far the strongest in men. The whole of the Russian Empire has a population of nearly 180,000,000. She has more men than Germany, Austria and Turkey combined. Russia has an abundance of men, but she undoubtedly suffers from a scarcity of arms and machinery, her industries being comparatively little developed. Russia is almost exclusively an agricultural country, exchanging her grain, meat, hides, timber and oil for foreign manufactured goods.

Unfortunately, Russia is a land-locked country. Her harbors in the north are mainly in the Baltic, which is closed by Germany, while the approach to her southern ports is dominated by Turkey. Transport of war materials into Russia by way of East Asia is extremely cumbersome, and the Siberian railway is already overcrowded, hence the only means of supplying Russia's demands for munitions is through the Dardanelles.

From an economic standpoint it is just as important that Russia should be enabled to get an outlet for the grain which has accumulated in her Black Sea ports. Russia's

financial condition has been crippled through her inability to export her only means of exchange. The interest on the vast sums borrowed abroad by Russia can only be met by exporting the produce of the country.

From a British standpoint, the Dardanelles is of great importance strategically. It is the bridge between the Austro-German Empire and the East, and would naturally be the starting point of an attack on the Suez Canal, the water-way between Britain and India, New Zealand and Australia. Acting on the policy that attack is the best means of defence, Britain finds that the easiest way to protect the Suez Canal is by striking at the Dardanelles and threatening the capital of the Turkish Empire.

Britain is not only fighting for victory, but for lasting peace, therefore it is indispensable that Turkey should be absolutely defeated, and that Britain should have an important voice in the re-arrangement of Turkish territories. Germany and Austria have long desired to subject Serbia to themselves, because the railroads running from Berlin and Vienna towards Constantinople go through the very centre of Serbia. With this railroad and Constantinople under German control, Germany would hold the key to the dominion of the world, Turkey being the link between the three oldest and most densely populated continents. Turkey as a vassal of Germany is an enormous danger both to Russia and to the British Empire.

The opening of the Dardanelles will not only lead to the strengthening of the Allies by allowing Russia to re-equip her army, but it will lead to a weakening of the German-Austrian group. The fall of Constantinople will be the turning point of the war.

DECLINE SUBSTITUTES

EARL SELBORNE FORESHADOWS CONSCRIPTION

London, Aug. 28.—Something in the nature of conscription, though the term was not employed, was foreshadowed by the Earl of Selborne, president of the board of agriculture, in an address this afternoon to a deputation of agricultural land owners, which visited him in London.

"Many more men have got to join the army, whether voluntarily or not."

"The agricultural laborer has done his part nobly in this war," Earl Selborne continued, "but the response has been very unequal over the country and I forecast that during the next year men will be taken from districts and farms whence, hitherto, they have not gone."

"What I shall aim at—and Earl Kitchener has been very sympathetic—is to leave the farmer his foreman, stockman, carters and shepherds, but the rest of the work will have to be done by the women, or men hitherto not engaged in agriculture."

Earl Selborne emphasizes the fact that Russia's reverses had imposed a greater strain on her allies.

"We have a greater burden on our shoulders at the present time"

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than six months ago," he said. "The financial strain is going to be very great and the situation is going to demand from every class greater sacrifices."

The speaker stated that the navy had the submarine menace well in hand.

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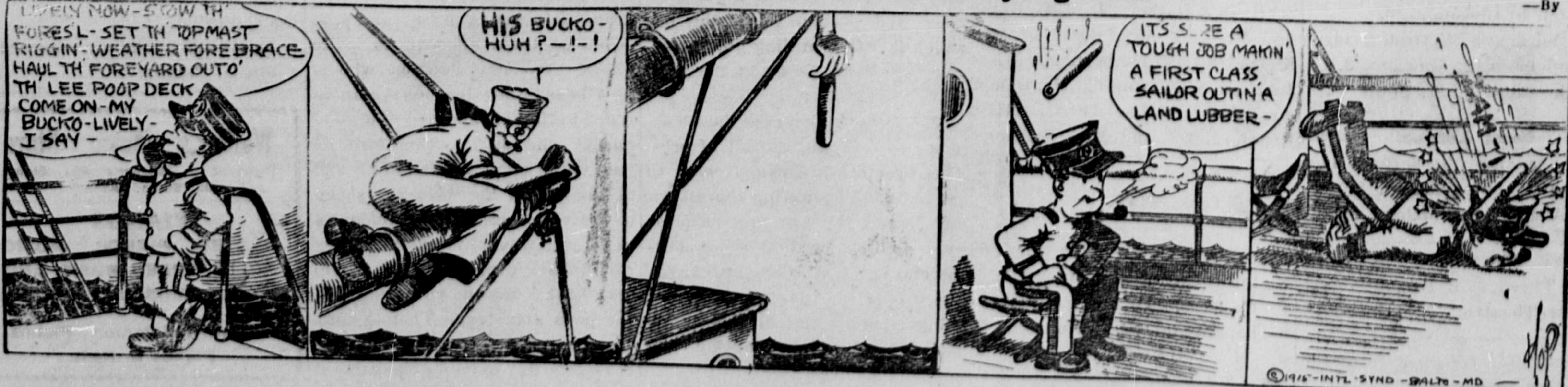

SERIOUS ACCIDENT AT HAGENSBORG

An accident with nearly fatal consequences happened on the 11th inst. to Mr. Frank Hagan, of Hagensborg.

In the early morning of that day he, in company with Hans Knudson, went into the mountains near his home in the Salomst valley to hunt. About four o'clock in the afternoon after an unsuccessful trip Mr. Hagan stopped to drink from a stream. In bending over his revolver fell out of the holster and struck a stone

with the result that a shot went off, the bullet entering his left side just below the ribs. It went through his body and came out in front. Hagan's companion examined the wound and did what he could for the sufferer and then left him to get a relief party to carry him out. Although all speed was used, the party did not reach the wounded man until about seven hours later. He was removed to his home where medical attention awaited. It was found that no vital portion had been struck and it is expected that, if no complications set in, he will recover.—Bella-Coola Courier.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

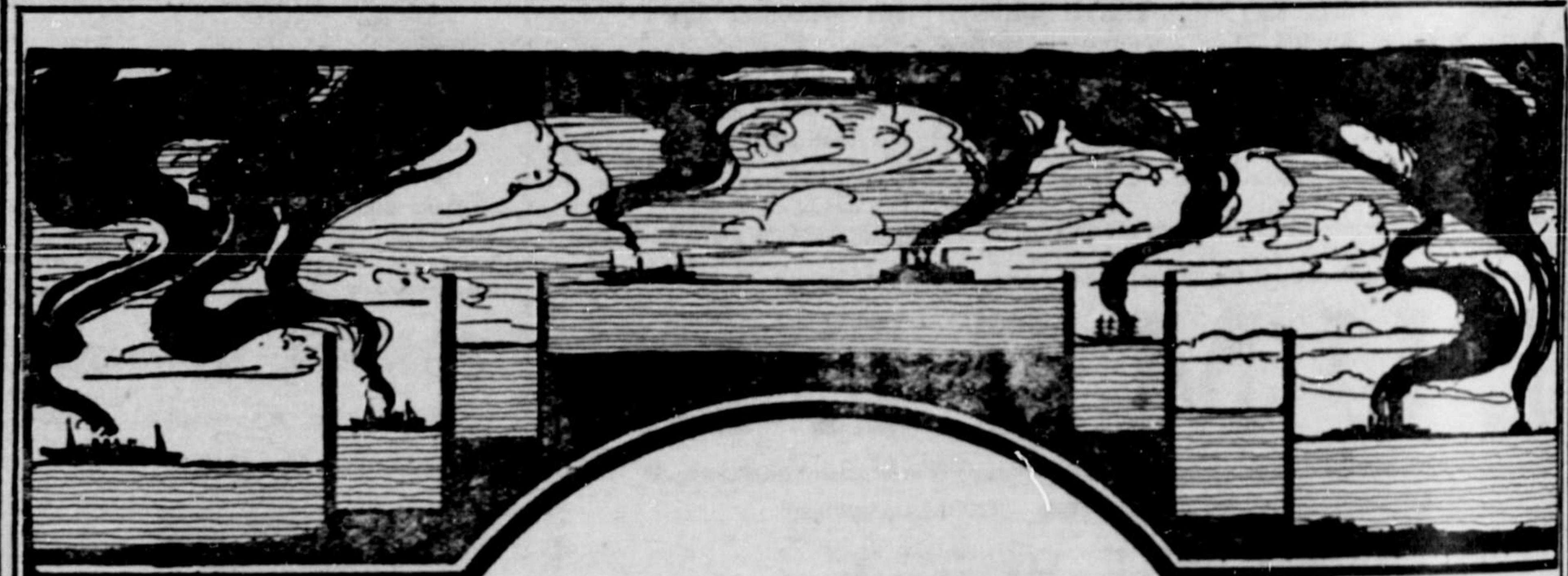
