## JAPAN WILL ASSIST IN THE DARDANELLES

### RUSSIANS TAKE 3,000 PRISONERS AND MANY GUNS — FAMOUS AVIATOR DEAD

#### JAPAN EXPECTED TO ASSIST IN FORCING THE DARDANELLES

**JAPANESE AMBASSADOR SAYS JAPAN WILL ASTONISH THE WORLD — SERBIA WILLING TO GRANT CONCESSIONS TO BULGARIA—ADOLPHE PEGOUD IS DEAD IN PARIS**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, Sept. 1.—It is believed that Japan will assist in the forcing of the Dardanelles. This belief is the result of a statement by Baron Hayashi, Japanese ambassador to Paris, in the Petit Parisien. He says, "Japan has not ceased to collaborate with her allies. The world will be astonished when it learns what we have done and what we will do. I can say no more, as we must not allow the enemy to profit by

any information as to the movement of our troops."  
**Serbia Willing.**  
The Serbian government has informed Greece that it will comply with the requests of the Allies in regard to the concessions to Bulgaria.  
**Pegoud Dead.**  
Adolphe Pegoud, the famous aviator, is dead at the age of 26. He brought down his sixth German air craft on July 11. Pegoud was the most daring of the younger French aviators, and was the first to fly upside down.

#### RUSSIANS CAPTURE THREE THOUSAND MEN AND MANY GUNS

**SUCCESSFUL RUSSIAN COUNTER ATTACK IN EASTERN GALICIA —GERMANY PROMISES THAT ALL LINERS WILL BE WARNED—THE ARABIC'S DESTROYER SUNK**

Petrograd, Sept. 1.—In a successful Russian counter attack on a wide front on the Stripa river in eastern Galicia, 3,000 Germans were taken prisoners, along with 30 cannon and 34 machine guns.  
**Liners to be Warned.**  
Washington, Sept. 1.—Von Bernstorff today informed Secretary of War Lansing that the German government has accepted the principle that passenger liners should be warned before a submarine attack is made.

**Arabic's Destroyer Sunk.**  
London, Sept. 1.—The German submarine which sank the Arabic was herself sunk with all hands on the same day, by a British patrol boat, while she was attacking the Houlder liner Nicosian. The information was given the same day to Washington that a submarine had been sunk near the Arabic.  
N. B. King, auditor for P. Burns & Co., is in the city on one of his regular visits.

#### BILLY KIRK HAS BECOME BOMB-THROWER

Constable Adams has had another letter from Billy Kirk. Billy reports that things are rather quiet in his vicinity just at present. He is now a member of a hand-grenade company, and ventures the opinion that the Germans will never under any circumstances get through the Allies' lines on the western front. Billy is looking around for souvenirs to send to his friends in Prince Rupert, and purposes sending along some "nose caps" from German shells. He would also like to send a German helmet but is not allowed to pick one up, as the Germans often conceal shells in them. His only chance will be to "stick" a Hun and capture his headgear. Constable Adams has also received a postcard showing a French 75 centimetre gun, sewn in silk by a French girl.

#### FRAUD

Sir Rodmond Roblin, ex-premier of Manitoba, J. H. Howden, Dr. W. H. Montague, and George R. Coldwell, all former members of the Manitoba government, appeared before Police Magistrate Sir Hugh John MacDonald in Winnipeg city police court this morning, charged with conspiracy to defraud the province. The four ex-ministers were released on bail to the amount of \$50,000 each. Of this, \$25,000 consisted of personal bonds, with two securities of \$12,500 each covering the remainder.

#### OF SUBMARINE CREW ONLY ONE RECOGNIZABLE

Honolulu, Sept. 1.—Of the crew of the sunken American submarine F-4, the only body recognizable is that of gunners' mate Geo. Ashcroft. It will require three days to clear the wreck and prepare for an investigation.

Secretary F. S. Wright, of the Northern B. C. Agricultural Association, has received word from Granby that the management of the smelting company is anxious to co-operate in every way in making the Rupert Fair a success. It is expected that a splendid copper display will be sent down.

The smelter football team will do its best to send a team to compete with the local boys for the Exhibition Cup.

#### HALIBUT RETURNS ARE INCREASING STEADILY

Halibut returns keep bounding up each month. In August, 2,106,400 pounds of halibut was landed at this port, making another new record. Seattle returns are not yet to hand, but it is just possible that for the first time, Prince Rupert has come out on top.  
The salmon pack for the month amounted to 12,999,700 pounds of fish, representing something like three-quarters of a million dollars. Adding cod and other smaller fish, the total quantity handled at Prince Rupert in August amounted to 15,124,500 lbs.

**FINANCE AFTER THE WAR**

There is much conflicting opinion as to what will be the course of interest rates after the war. The more popular view is that because of the vast destruction of wealth, huge government borrowings, and the demands for reconstruction after the war, capital will be scarce, and interest rates high.

As a superficial view, this theory seems quite plausible, but Mr. Mark Wells, of A. H. Martens & Company, Toronto, thinks that a close examination of the hard facts of experience seems inevitably to lead to just the opposite conclusion.

"For example," he writes *The Monetary Times*, "after the close of the most destructive series of wars which ended with Waterloo, money became easy. The price of 3 per cent British consols rose from 60 to 90 in the decade from 1815 to 1824, while their investment yield declined from 5 per cent to less than 3 1-3 per cent. During that period, Great Britain refunded large portions of its debt at reduced rates of interest.

"It is estimated that the Franco-Prussian war, though short, destroyed over \$1,000,000,000 of wealth. The Bank of England rate, which stood at 4.10 per cent. in 1872, dropped to 2.61 per cent in 1876. After the American Civil War, in which over \$5,000,000,000 was destroyed, the rate ranged at low figures, being down to 2.10 per cent. in 1868. In fact, war's aftermath presents no paradox so surprising to the popular mind as the inevitable decline in interest rates, and the excess in supply of money over demand.

The reasons for this phenomenon, though deep and underlying, are easily understood. The inexorable law of supply

and demand operates here, as elsewhere. Low money rates prevail, simply because the demand for the use of capital decreases more than does the supply. War impoverishes the people, and so lowers their purchasing power, and per capita consumption. War induces the sharpest of economies, and so further cuts down individual consumption of goods and commodities. Habits of economy engendered by the war tend to keep down the consumption of commodities long after the war closes. This means decreased activities by producers, manufacturers, and merchants, not only in war stricken countries, but in every country in the world which sells to the war impoverished people. This decrease in economic activity sharply reduces the demand for capital, and thus interest rates fall.

"The action of interest rates in after-war periods is similar to its action in after-panic periods. In good times, the manufacturer is a borrower because he finds it profitable to increase his productive capacity on borrowed capital. The merchant borrows in order to carry a larger stock of goods to meet increasing demands. The transportation company borrows to build new lines, and new ships, and for betterments and improvements, in order to accommodate the larger volume of traffic. Increased demands on every hand further aggravate the situation by increasing commodity prices.

"The destruction of war, with its impoverishment of the people, and the inevitable stagnation in trade and commerce afterwards, brings the reverse—easy money, lower interest rates, and falling commodity prices. In the seven years after the Franco-Prussian war,

Dun's index number of commodity prices fell from 113.7 to 78.5.

"It is, therefore, reasonable to suppose that this tendency to low interest rates, seen after every war in recent history, will prevail after the present conflict.

"It must also be borne in mind that the destruction of the present war is on a colossal scale; vastly greater than in any previous war, and the cost appears to be increasing at an accelerating rate. Another six months will probably cost the Allies nearly as much as the entire first year.

According to the best estimate available, the cost of the present conflict, to all belligerents, for one month, is greater by far than the cost of the American Civil War for an entire year. It is now about a year since the war began, and already the destruction has probably exceeded the total destruction caused by all the wars of the eighteenth century combined.

"Bearing these facts in mind, and taking past experiences as a guide, the logical conclusion is that interest rates after the present war will reach a point lower than anything hitherto known in recent history.

"What then is the practical lesson to be learned from this? It is simply this, that with low interest rates and easy money, bond prices will rise rapidly after the war. Therefore, investors and investing institutions would do well to take advantage of the situation, and buy to the limit of their power before the end of the war. Low well-secured high-grade bonds, both for permanent investment, and for substantial appreciation in value.

"This is an opportunity for profitable investment which people now living will probably never see again. For by the time the present conflict is over, the nations will have had enough of war for many generations; perhaps for all time."

For practically the whole of the world's supply of genuine amber comes from a tiny strip of the East Prussian coast line. Here, up till the summer of 1899, it was gathered after storms by the peasants, who made at times a very good thing out of their enterprise and industry. But the right to search for the precious substance is now monopolized by the German government, and every fragment found on the sands or dragged up in a fisherman's net must be at once surrendered.—Ex.



RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$4.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
