THE GREATEST SOLDIERS' BATTLE SINCE INKERMAN

IMPORTANT PART OF TURKISH FORCE CUT OFF—SURRENDER IMMINENT—VON TIRPITZ RESIGNS—ANOTHER STEAMER SUNK—A HUGE LUMBER ORDER FOR B. C.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 3.—The struggle for the crest of Sari Bahr is the greatest soldiers' battle since the battle of Inkerman. An important part of the Turkish forces has been cut off and its surrender is imminent.

Von Tirpitz Resigns.
London, Sept. 3.—An Amsterdam despatch reports that Admiral Von Tirpitz, the German Minister of Marine, will resign. He will be succeeded by Admiral Von Pohl, chief of the Admiralty staff, as commander of the German fleet.

The Grand Admiral's resignation is the result of the failure of his submarine campaign.

Steamer Sunk.
The steamer Roumanie, of

1,638 tons, has been submarined. The crew was saved.

Lumber Pool.

Vancouver, Sept. 3.—British Columbia lumber manufacturers have agreed to pool their production in order to accept orders from the Allies for thirty million feet of lumber, at the rate of a million feet per day.

ART NOBLE WILL ARRIVE TONIGHT

Word was received this morning that Art Noble will arrive from the east on tonight's train. An informal citizens' committee was formed this morning and it was arranged that the 68th Earl Grey's, the Irish Fusiliers, and the various bands of the city should be at the depot to help in the welcome to the first of Prince Rupert's warriors to return from the field of battle. Every man, woman and child in the city will be at the depot at 6:15 this evening, and each is requested to bring along a flag or flowers to lend color to the gathering.

The returned warrior will be escorted to the steps of the government building on Second Avenue where the Mayor will deliver a brief address of welcome on behalf of the citizens. VANCOUVER TUG WILL BRING IN THE DELHI

According to Vancouver exchanges to hand yesterday, the big Vancouver tug Sea Lion left that port on Tuesday night, commanded by Captain Charles Stannard, for Alaska waters where she will take in tow the steamer Delhi, which was wrecked on January 18th at Strait Island, Alaska. The Delhi has been raised under the supervision of Captain W. H. Tinn, of Seattle, and the Sea Lion will take her to Prince Rupert drydock, where she will be repaired.

THE CALL OF THE WAR

"The Call of the War," a recruiting sermon delivered by the Rev. W. T. Herridge, of Ottawa, has just been published, at the request of the minister of militia. To some people, it may seem odd that a disciple of the Prince of Peace should preach recruiting sermons, but even the most pacific must agree with him when he says that "Christ's supreme passion, at whatever cost, is to sweep the earth clean of the evils which defile it."

"It will be our own fault," says the preacher, "if we do not make this a holy war, that fires us with moral enthusiasm as well as undaunted courage; a war in which we can humbly, but sincerely, invoke the help of God; a war in defence of justice and freedom; a war which has no meaner purpose than the establishment of Christian principles among the nations of the world. If this gigantic struggle is thus viewed in its true light, the pulpit need not apologise for making some effort to stir up a deeper sense of national duty with regard to it. For in spite of the sorrow that has visited some homes amongst us, I am not sure that the people of Canada, as a whole, are yet awake to the full significance of the situation; and too little has been done to bring it before them in a clear and comprehensive way."

We must recognize that this is our war; and even though we do not hear the actual clash of arms, the issue of it must needs be of far reaching consequence to every one of us. We should have at least a quarter of a million men in

training for such emergencies as the future may unfold, not all of them necessarily in the firing line, but fitted to serve in some useful way wherever duty calls."

Dr. Herridge goes on to show that the German nation is practically a unit in striking the present blow. He calls on all to do something for the cause, describing "safety first" as an excellent motto, but the watchword of a coward in a time of great crisis. He says "the quality of life on this earth ought to mean more than the mere length of it. Many things come before personal safety; honor comes before it; freedom comes before it; righteousness comes before it." The preacher concludes as follows:—"I see in imagination a stalwart host of young Canadians marching as to war. The cause they espouse should nerve their arm and enoble their character. They will be compassed about with a great cloud of witnesses who watch their valorous deeds and anticipate their final victory. The heroes of past days will seem to share their high endeavor, and from myriads on earth the voice of suppliant prayer will mingle in its ascent to God with the shouts of conflict and the shock of arms. If, when peace has come, they return to the land they have left behind, they will be greeted with the welcome which benefits those who have done their duty; and if they are called upon to lay the sacrifice of their lives on the altar of freedom, their names will be enrolled in the ranks of the immortals, and their memory cherished by generations yet unborn."

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THOMAS EDISON AND WARFARE OF THE FUTURE

The possibilities of chemistry and electricity have hardly yet been touched upon in modern warfare. That is the opinion of Mr. Edison, the electrical wizard. "Primitive man," he said, in a recent interview, "fought with clubs and stones. Then it was swords and javelins, and later bullets and bayonets. When this war began, it was shot and shell and high explosives. Now they have only just made a beginning with burning liquids and poisonous gases. The warfare of the future is going to be more and more a matter of chemistry and electricity. There is no knowing where it will end."

In Edison's opinion wars of the future will be far more terrible than the present conflict. Armies will fight with germs and kill off whole populations by disease. An entire country might be infected with bubonic plague, for instance. Electricity will be used for destroying stores and ammunition and setting off high explosives at a distance by wireless. "Neither should I be surprised," says Mr. Edison, "to see a great change come about in ship construction, and you may be sure some way will be found to offset the torpedo. A ship might be so constructed that it would not sink after being hit."

Mr. Edison confesses that he could invent something more deadly than gas bombs. "But," he says, "I can't get myself to work on any such stuff as that. I don't want to destroy life; I want to make the world a better place to live in. But if the United States gets dragged into this war, and is attacked, I will help to make war worse."

Mr. Edison has just been appointed chairman of a war inventions committee, and we may look for some startling ideas soon.—Ex.

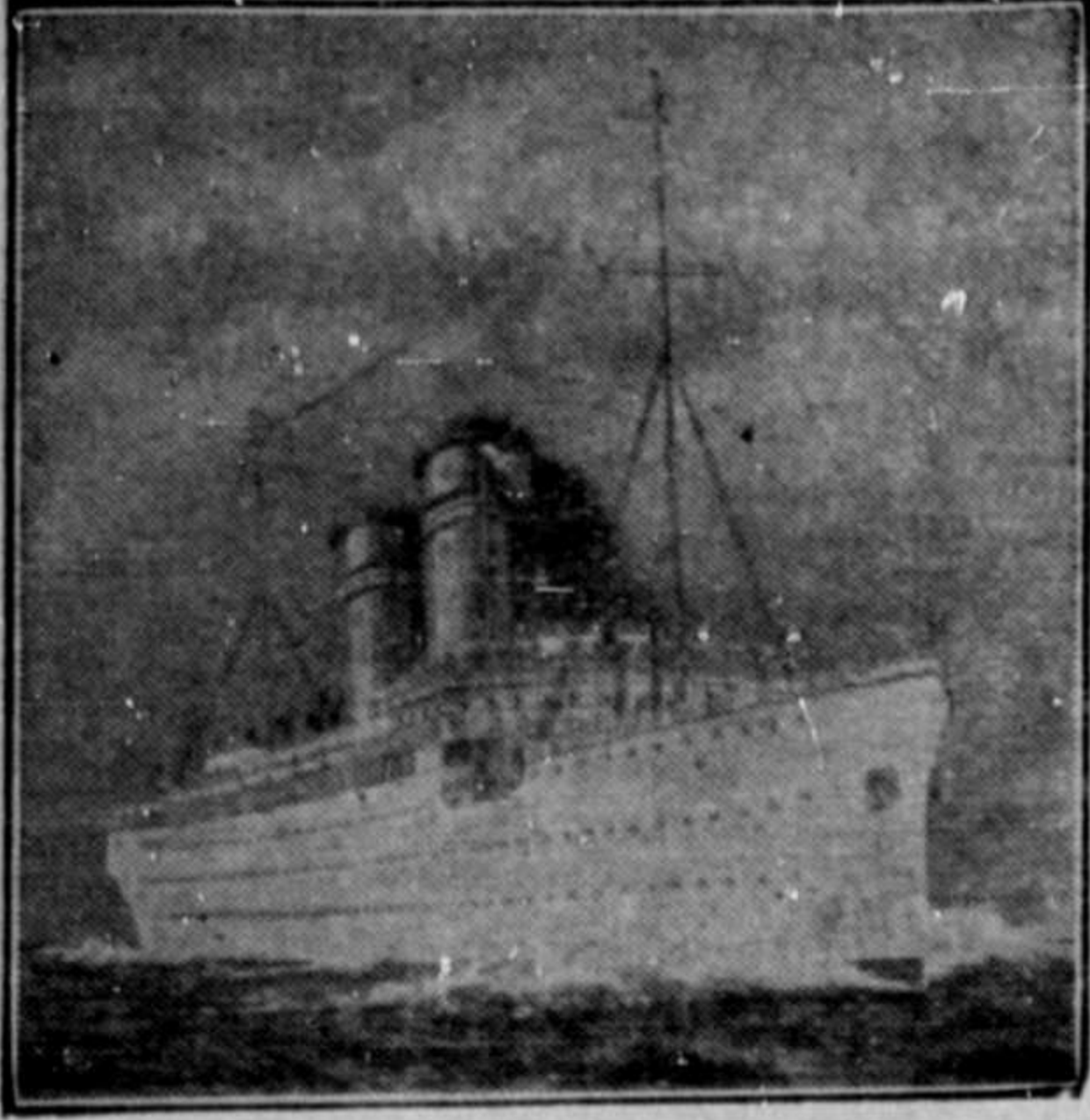

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
