RUSSIANS CAPTURE 8,000 MEN AND 30 GUNS

ZEPPELIN AGAIN RAID THE ENGLISH COAST — VIOLENT FIGHTING IN ARGONNE

RUSSIANS CAPTURE EIGHT THOUSAND MEN AND 30 GUNS

SEVERE DEFEAT INFLICTED ON GERMANS EAST OF LEMBERG VON HINDENBURG STILL HELD UP ON DVINA—THE ARTILLERY STRUGGLE ON WESTERN FRONT STILL CONTINUES

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 9.—The Russians inflicted a severe defeat on the Germans on Tuesday near Tarnopol, seventy miles east of Lemberg. They captured thirty guns, 200 officers and 8,000 men and much booty. Von Hindenburg is still unable to force a passage of the Dvina.

Artillery Struggle.

Paris, Sept. 9.—An official report says:—"The artillery struggle is still going on around Arras in the region of Hoye, between the Oise and the Aisne, in Cham-

pagne and in the western part of Argonne.

"The Germans after intense bombardment with shells containing suffocating gases, which were extensively employed, delivered against our positions an attack. Led by two divisions they were violently counter attacked. The Germans failed in their attempt to break our front line.

"Following the bombardment of Nancy by German aeroplanes, a French squadron threw shells upon the military establishments at Fresecatiblons station and Wetz-

TRUST SECRETARY ARRESTED FOR THEFT

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 9.—John Heaps, secretary of the Columbia Trust Co., has been arrested on a charge of theft. It is alleged that he received \$10,000 to pay insurance premiums of clients, which is unaccounted for. The Columbia Trust and its subsidiary companies are in liquidation. The charges are laid by American insurance companies.

THE PRINCE ALBERT RETURNS TO VANCOUVER

The Prince Albert, which has been trading between San Francisco and Mexican ports during the summer, returned to Vancouver yesterday. Captain Nicholson refused to extend the vessel's southern charter, as the conditions were unsatisfactory.

PACIFIC MINING NOTES

Mr. Geo. B. Gerau, the mining expert, is at the Nicholl Hotel. He is here to complete arrangements for the development of the "Brantford Group" on Fiddler mountain, and also looking over other properties on behalf of eastern financiers.

Karl Whitmore and Mack Orr are at present in town from Legate Creek. They have been prospecting their steel galena property more fully and find four parallel veins of high grade copper ore running the full length of two claims and then merging into one lead. On sinking, the veins broaden out and everything indicates an extensive body of mineral.

Amongst others at present prospecting on Legate are Bud Corley and Scottie Reid, of Rupert; Frank McKinnon, of Hazelton, and Capt. Young are also up the creek looking over the various properties.

The placer working on both Lorne and Fiddler creeks are suffering through lack of water but otherwise the outlook is good.

Tonkin, manager of the Western Fuel Company and Thomas Graham, chief provincial inspector of mines, on charges of manslaughter. This course has been taken as a result of the report brought down by Mr. Justice Murphy, who inquired into the disaster at South Wellington Mine, which resulted in the loss of nineteen lives.

FIFTY-THREE STALWART RECRUITS LEFT TODAY

A body of 53 stalwart recruits arrived from the interior last night and left for the south on the Prince George to join the 67th Battalion at Victoria. They are under the command of Lieut. W. F. Cook, of Prince George. The latter was commissioned to raise a hundred men for the Western Scottish Battalion of Pioneers, and has, therefore, over half of them with him, the remainder to follow in the course of a week.

The party which left today looked just the stuff to put up a stubborn fight, and in three months should make one of the finest companies in the Canadian army. They brought with them two grizzly cubs, in splendid condition. These were the property of W. Hedges, who captured them in the spring about 400 miles north of Prince George when he shot the mother. He has handed them over to the battalion as mascots.

ZEPPELINS MAKE ANOTHER RAID ON COAST OF ENGLAND

TWENTY KILLED AND EIGHTY-SIX INJURED—VERY VIOLENT FIGHTING IN ARGONNE—FEROCIOUS GERMAN ATTACK REPULSED—AN AMERICAN CORRESPONDENT ARRESTED

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 9.—Twenty were killed and eighty-six injured in a Zeppelin raid on the east coast of England last night. This is the third German air raid on England in three days.

Ferocious Fighting.

Paris, Sept. 9.—There is violent fighting in the Argonne district. A ferocious German attack has been repulsed.

Passports Cancelled.

Washington, Sept. 9.—Secretary Lansing has cancelled the

passports of Jas. F. Archibald, an American correspondent upon whom the British Secret Service men found communications from Dr. Duma, the Austrian ambassador, to the Austrian Foreign Office, regarding a campaign of strikes in munition plants. Archibald is now in Rotterdam.

Paddy is not so young in years as the majority of our recruits, but he is as fit as any, and, with his past experience in the army, should be a very useful man. Many of his old friends were at the wharf to wish him luck.

The Prince George drew away from the wharf to the strains of Tipperary, taken up enthusiastically by the recruits from the interior, amongst whom the stalwart Paddy will be most popular before the boat reaches Vancouver.

"THE SIGN OF THE CROSS" AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

The Westholme was packed last night and every member of the large audience must have been delighted with the four-part Famous Players production of "The Sign of the Cross." Wilson Barrett's world-famous drama is still one of the most popular on the stage, and on the screen it stands out as one of the most marvellous works of the film.

The scenes of ancient Rome and the court of the Emperor Nero are wonderfully realistic, while the contrast between the barbaric splendor of Roman society and the simplicity of the early Christians is strikingly portrayed. The staging of the piece is most elaborate, the Bacchanalian feast scene and the arena on a Roman holiday, with its gladiators, being particularly fine. As Marcus Superbus, the Prefect of Rome, William Farnum is most impressive, and is ably supported by an all-star company.

Two real good comedies complete a program which is offered at 15 cents, but is well worth more. The music at the Westholme is always a special feature, but last night the orchestra excelled itself in "The Pilgrim's Chorus" from Tannhauser, and in "Orpheus."

LATE ROBERT ALLISON CAME WEST IN 1882

The late Robert Allison, whose remains were taken to Victoria on the Prince George this morning, was one of the early pioneers of the west, having left Ontario for Moose Jaw, Sask., in 1882. Coming to the coast in 1909, Mr. Allison arrived in Prince Rupert a year later.

Deceased was a member of the I. O. O. F. and on December 28, 1883, instituted the Valley Lodge No. 1 at Moose Jaw, acting as Grand Sire, and he became the first N. G. of that lodge. As a young man he joined the L. O. L. and was still a member of the order at the time of his death, having affiliated with the local lodge.

He leaves a family of five sons and two daughters. They are Mrs. A. Douglas, Prince Rupert, and Mrs. M. Ross, Binscorth, Man. and Messrs. W. H. Allison and A. L. Allison, Royal Oak, Victoria, B. C., H. J. Allison, Pasqua, Sask., W. G. Allison, Dew Drop; and A. H. Allison, of this city.

THE BALKANS

The massing of German and Austrian armies along the northern bank of the Danube indicates that the Teutonic campaign for the relief and reinforcement of Turkey is about to begin. For some time the Austrians have had a quarter of a million men or more on the Serbian frontier, and now it is reported that 200,000 Germans have been gathered near the point on the river at which the frontiers of Serbia, Hungary, Roumania and Bulgaria almost meet. A march of less than thirty miles across Serbia in this district, and the occupation of a narrow strip of Serbian territory, would give the Germans access to Bulgaria, and if the Bulgars were benevolent neutrals or a little more, the relief of the Turks by the forwarding of large quantities of war munitions would be comparatively easy. In that event the great struggle of the Allies for possession of the Gallipoli Peninsula and the opening of the Dardanelles might prove fruitless, even if successful, for the Germans, with unlimited supplies and all the artillery they could use, would be able to make the Bosphorus impregnable. The fleet of the Allies might pound the public buildings of Constantinople to pieces, but could not force an entrance to the Black Sea in the face of half a million well-equipped men holding both sides of the Bosphorus.

The small Balkan powers, Greece, Serbia and Bulgaria are all desirous of seeing the Turk ejected from Europe. So long as he remains there is danger that he will seek to win back not only what he lost in the Balkan war of 1912, but the overlordship of all the Balkan lands which he exercised for centuries. Roumania naturally

sympathizes with the idea of expelling the Turk, and her people, therefore, must lean toward the Allies, whose avowed object is the destruction of the Turkish power in Europe. The real trouble is that dynastic influences are pulling one way and popular sympathy another. Were Premier Venizelos absolute master in Greece there is no doubt at all that a Greek army would soon be on the march to Constantinople. But the Queen of Greece is the sister of the Emperor of Germany, and has more than once declared that she will leave the kingdom, never to return, if the Greeks weaken Germany by attacking Turkey. In Bulgaria Czar Ferdinand is strongly pro-Austrian, his whole personal fortune being invested in Austrian securities and enterprises. The King of Roumania is a Hohenzollern, and looks to Kaiser William as the head of the family.

These dynastic entanglements are being used to the utmost by the Teutonic diplomats. To the palace intrigues are added threats as to what will happen if the Roumanians and Bulgars refuse passage of war supplies. Russia, they are told, can no longer help them to resist the violation of their neutrality, nor can she punish them for indirectly aiding the Teutonic cause. A final decision cannot long be delayed. The invasion of Serbia may begin within a week, and the Bulgars must make up their minds before the Germanic armies reach their frontiers as to whether they will resist or aid the march of the Teutons to Constantinople. — Toronto Globe.

Most of the Western Scots are pioneers and old timers of the west, but Jack has been an inhabitant of the globe for only a little over sixteen years. He wanted to go earlier, too, but in any careless Teutons get in his way, should the Western Scots get that near them, they will think he went early enough. Jack is a student in his father's law office and, like the genial P. E., a lacrosse player. 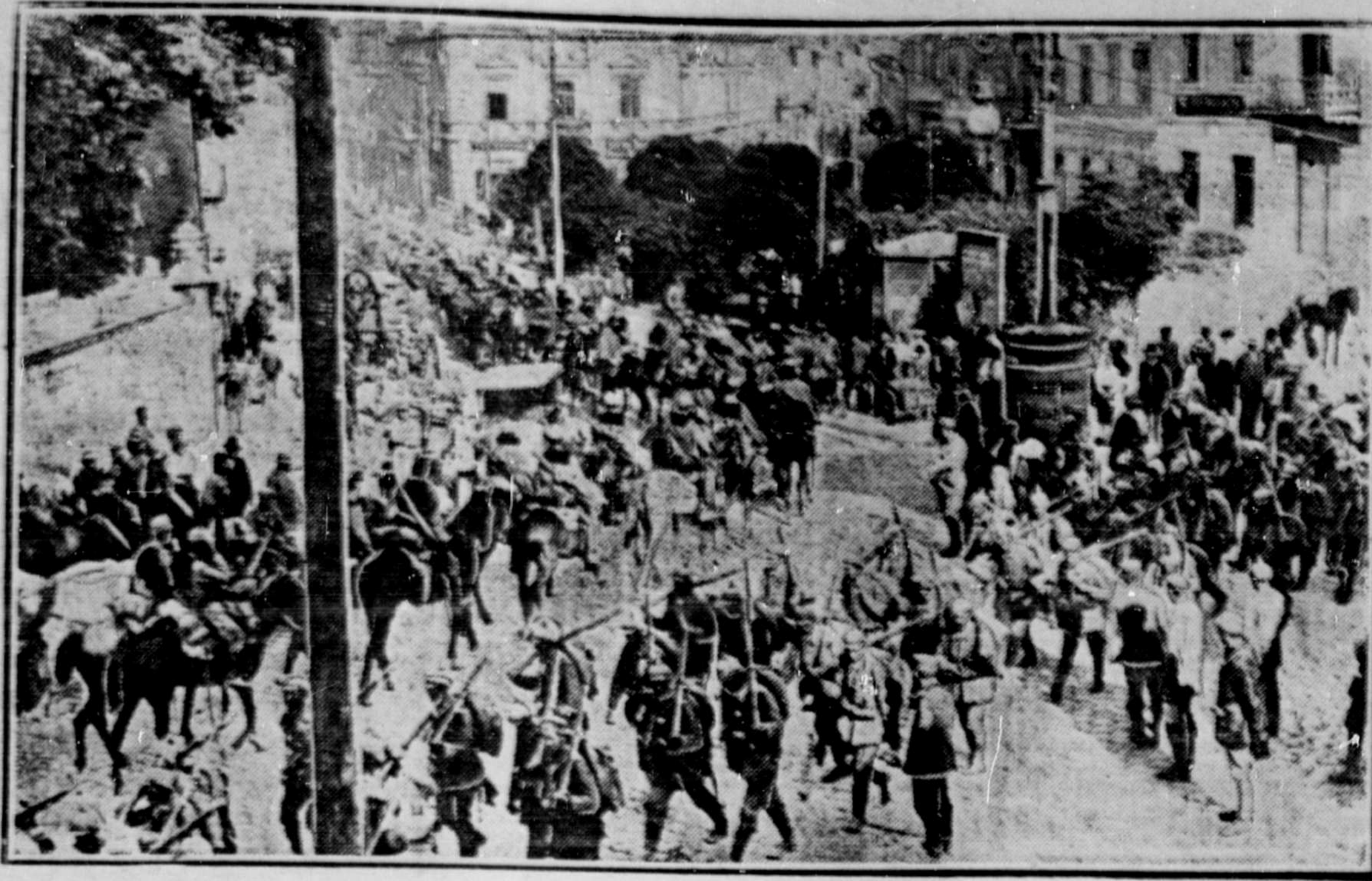

ANOTHER COPPER PROPERTY BONDED

Messrs. Fetter and Carleton, of Prince George, have closed a deal with Dennis Comeau for a year's bond on Comeau's copper property on Rocher de Boule mountain close to the Rocher de Boule mine tramway. J. J. Hibbard acted for the purchasers and he had no sooner signed the papers than he wired to Prince George for an outfit to be sent by the first train which will enable him to start operations.

The new owners will establish a camp near the tram line just back of Carnaby, and a few miles west of New Hazelton, and it will be ready by the time the steel, drills, etc., arrive from the east. Mr. Hibbard will be in charge of the work. At the beginning four or five men will be employed until more room is made.

The Herald has been informed that the first work will be a short cross-cut to tap the vein. This tunnel has already been run some twenty feet, but from thirty to seventy feet more will be required to cut the vein. Then about fifty feet of drift will be run on the vein, making in all in the neighborhood of a hundred feet of work for the first month.

Comeau's property is located on the railway side of the mountain and is exceptionally well situated. He has two claims and the showings on them have long interested mining men, and it is the opinion of those who know the ground best, that it will not be long before another copper mine is shipping from Tramville.—Omineca Herald.

- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
