## DESPERATE GERMAN ATTACK IS REPULSED

### CROWN PRINCE LOSES 100,000 MEN --- UNINTERRUPTED ARTILLERY FIGHTING

#### NORRIS GOVERNMENT CANCELS CONTRACT

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Winnipeg, Sept. 11.—The Norris government has passed orders in council cancelling Kelly's contract on the parliament buildings, and has filed caveats against the property to satisfy a million dollar claim.  
Principal Black, of the agricultural college, has been dismissed.

#### SIR WILFRID LAURIER UNDERGOES OPERATION

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier was operated upon this morning for an ulceration of the lower jaw. The operation was successful, and it is expected that Sir Wilfrid will leave the hospital as soon as he has thoroughly recovered from the effects of the anæsthetic. The ulceration has caused considerable discomfort to the Liberal chief for some time.  
At his most recent appearance before the public at Napanee he was suffering acutely from its effects, and it required considerable will power upon his part to continue his speech in the face of the severe pain.

#### JACK STEWART MADE HON. LIEUT.-COLONEL

Ottawa, Sept. 11.—Military orders issued today announce that Honorary Lieut.-Col. Sir Max Aitken, eye-witness for the Canadian forces, has been made an honorary colonel.

Col. W. J. Neill has been appointed director of remounts for the Canadian overseas forces beyond Canada, in addition to the duties of his appointment as director of veterinary service.

John W. Stewart has been made honorary lieutenant-colonel of the 72nd Seaforth Highlanders in place of Honorary Lieut.-Colonel J. A. Maedonnell.

The American halibut schooners Tom and Al, and Venus came in this morning with about 80,000 pounds of halibut between them. Neither boat is a stranger to this port, both having brought in their fares on several occasions.

## GERMAN CROWN PRINCE'S ARMY REPULSED WITH HEAVY LOSS

### ARTILLERY FIGHTING CONTINUES STEADILY—A DESPERATE GERMAN ATTEMPT TO BREAK LINE—THE CROWN PRINCE'S ARMY REPULSED WITH 100,000 LOSSES

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, Sept. 11.—There is uninterrupted artillery fighting all along the western line, which is especially severe in the department of the Meuse and on the Lorraine front. The German Crown Prince made a desperate effort yesterday to break through the French line in Argonne with powerful artillery and a large body of troops.

The French were driven from one trench by liquid fire jets, but recaptured it and repulsed the Germans with heavy loss. The German attempt was abandoned. The Crown Prince's army is said to have suffered total losses of 100,000, one corps losing 40,000.

#### German Air Attacks.

Paris, Sept. 11.—An official re-

port says:—"Two German aeroplanes today dropped bombs on Compiegne. They aimed especially at hospitals. There were no victims, however, of the raid, only some unimportant and immaterial damage is reported to have been done.

"A German biplane has been forced to land within our lines. The aviators were made prisoners.

"Six German aeroplanes attempted this morning to fly over St. Mene Hould. They were obliged to turn back owing to the fire from our batteries."

#### Steamer Sunk.

London, Sept. 11.—The British steamer Cornubia, of 1,736 tons, has been sunk. The crew was saved.

#### SIR WILLIAM VAN HORN VERY SERIOUSLY ILL

Montreal, Sept. 11.—Sir Wm. Van Horn, former president of the C. P. R., is seriously ill. Sir William recently underwent an operation and his physicians announce that there is small hope of his recovery.

#### MINING ACTIVITY ON NINE MILE MOUNTAIN

During the past season there has been more development going on in the silver-lead section of the district than at any time since mineral was first discovered on Nine Mile mountain over six years ago.

Before the season is over there will have been some ten car loads sent from Nine Mile mountain to Trail smelter, and it is all ore that will run around the hundred dollar mark, gross value.

The first of the week D. McLeod, L. W. Patmore and the editor of the Herald visited all the properties in the Silver Cup and Sunrise basins, at least all that have been under development this season. These included the Silver Cup, the Silver Bell, the Barber Bill, the Sunrise, and Joe Miller's claims. All these groups are connected by trails, built mostly by the owners, and the going is very easy.

The visitors were accompanied by Geo. Clothier and W. S. Harris. They arrived at the Silver Cup soon after noon and were well fed and refreshed before starting up the hill to the tunnels where the boys are taking out ore and shoving ahead the development.

The Silver Cup has been opened up by a series of tunnels, four of which are now in ore, three on the Cup and one on the Duchess claims. The other two are headed for the Cup vein, but are not completed.

Messrs. Geo. and Roy Clothier have a lease on the property and thus far have devoted themselves to the Nos. 2 and 3 tunnels and to surface work. They will spend the rest of the season in prosecuting development, principally in No. 3 tunnel and getting a good bunch of ore in sight for next season. The boys have come to the conclusion that winter work is out of the question without a long tunnel from the timber or a long snow shed. The expense in either case is not yet justified.

Four carloads have been the output and the class of ore has been profitable to handle. They have had several shoots of ore that were exceptionally rich and on Tuesday they ran into another shoot on the Duchess that will complete the last car and increase the smelter returns materially.—Omineca Herald.

#### PRINCE RUPERT THE PORT OF PROGRESS

The September issue of the Canadian Fisherman devotes four pages to an article by F. S. Wright on "Prince Rupert—The Port of Progress." Mr. Wright has dealt chiefly with the development of fishing and kindred industries, and pictures of the cold storage plant are shown. Such articles must aid materially in bringing the facts regarding Prince Rupert before the world in an interesting way. This is one of the ways in which the Publicity Bureau of the Board of Trade justifies its existence.

#### REV. FATHER BELLE, O. M. I. ARRIVED LAST NIGHT

There arrived in the city last night, Rev. Father Belle, one of the most prominent mission workers of the Roman Catholic Church. He is making a tour direct from the headquarters of the Oblate Order in Rome.

He has just returned from the Mackenzie River country, where he has been making an inspection of the work done by the missionaries of the order there. For years Father Belle was engaged in similar work in Ceylon. While in the city he is the guest of Father Bunoz.

#### WEDDING BELLS

On Thursday, Miss Mary Smith, of Vancouver, was married to Donald Simpson, the well known prospector from the Bulkley valley. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. H. R. Grant in the presence of a few friends of the happy couple.

Mr. Simpson has been prospecting in the Bulkley since the pre-railroad days, and his many friends in the interior will heartily welcome his new partner. They left on the train this morning.

**REVELATIONS**

Roblin's troubles are not yet over, in fact they have only just begun. The Norris government has set out to conduct a thorough enquiry into purchases and building work carried out by the Manitoba bosses and there are liable to be more interesting disclosures. The Roblin-Rogers gang controlled that province for a number of years, and there is no doubt that they did not worry about the price paid for that control. It is reported that over-payments on buildings alone will amount to over \$4,000,000. It is clear that the Roblin government had a long lease of life, not because it held the trust of the people, but because it held the purse of the province.

British Columbia is the one remaining stronghold of boss rule and the chief boast of the heelers of the McBride-Bowser gang is that their bosses have been able to hold office for so many years. In due course a thorough investigation will be made in this province and many interesting facts will be brought to light. The full details of the Canadian Northern Railroad compact will probably take some digging up, but they will be laid bare, as will the history of the \$45,000 which Matson has not yet accounted for in the Songhees Reserve deal, and numerous other little items.

Since Sir Dick is not wanted in Ottawa, and his room is preferred to his company in London Canadian circles, and British Columbia will very soon conduct its affairs without his assistance, he might devote himself to a political literary career. A "Guide to Beginners in Politics" from his pen would be sure to prove useful to real estate sharks and company

promoters, who find their occupation gone since the bubble of alleged prosperity burst. A work showing what can be done in railroad construction without capital and without risk, if the proper premier and province are selected, with an introduction by MacKenzie and Mann, would be almost certain to become a classic, while a volume on "Pockets and Politics," written in collaboration with Sir Rodmond Roblin, would be certain to run to many editions. As a crowning effort in his literary career he might be permitted to write a history of the military career of Sir Sam Hughes, but we are afraid that Sam would much prefer to do this himself.

**NEWSPAPER CHANGES IN LONDON, ENGLAND**

London, Sept. 10.—The Observer announces that Mr. J. L. Garvin has arranged to retire very shortly from the Pall Mall Gazette.

Reynolds' newspaper states that the Pall Mall Gazette has been purchased by a syndicate, of which Davison Dalziel, M. P., is the moving spirit. J. L. Garvin's successor, it is understood, will be D. M. Sutherland, late editor of the Evening Standard. A syndicate, with which Sir Alexander Henderson is connected has purchased the Standard. W. A. Woodward will be the new editor.

**THE DELHI**

The steamer Delhi is gradually being brought into position for docking. She rests now almost on an even keel. The vessel is resting in slings attached to scows on either side of her, fore and aft, and very shortly it is expected she will be in shape to float into the dock.

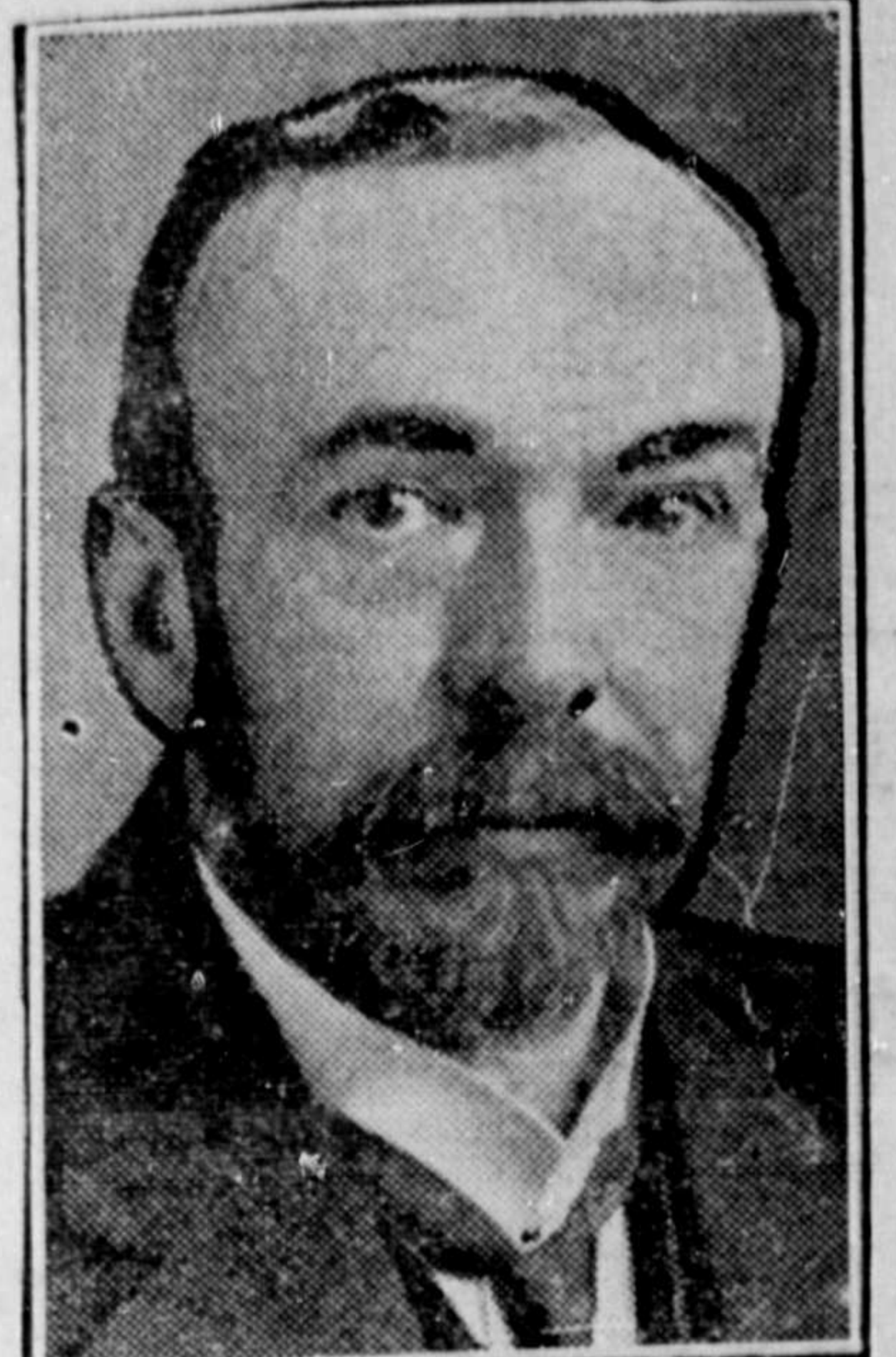

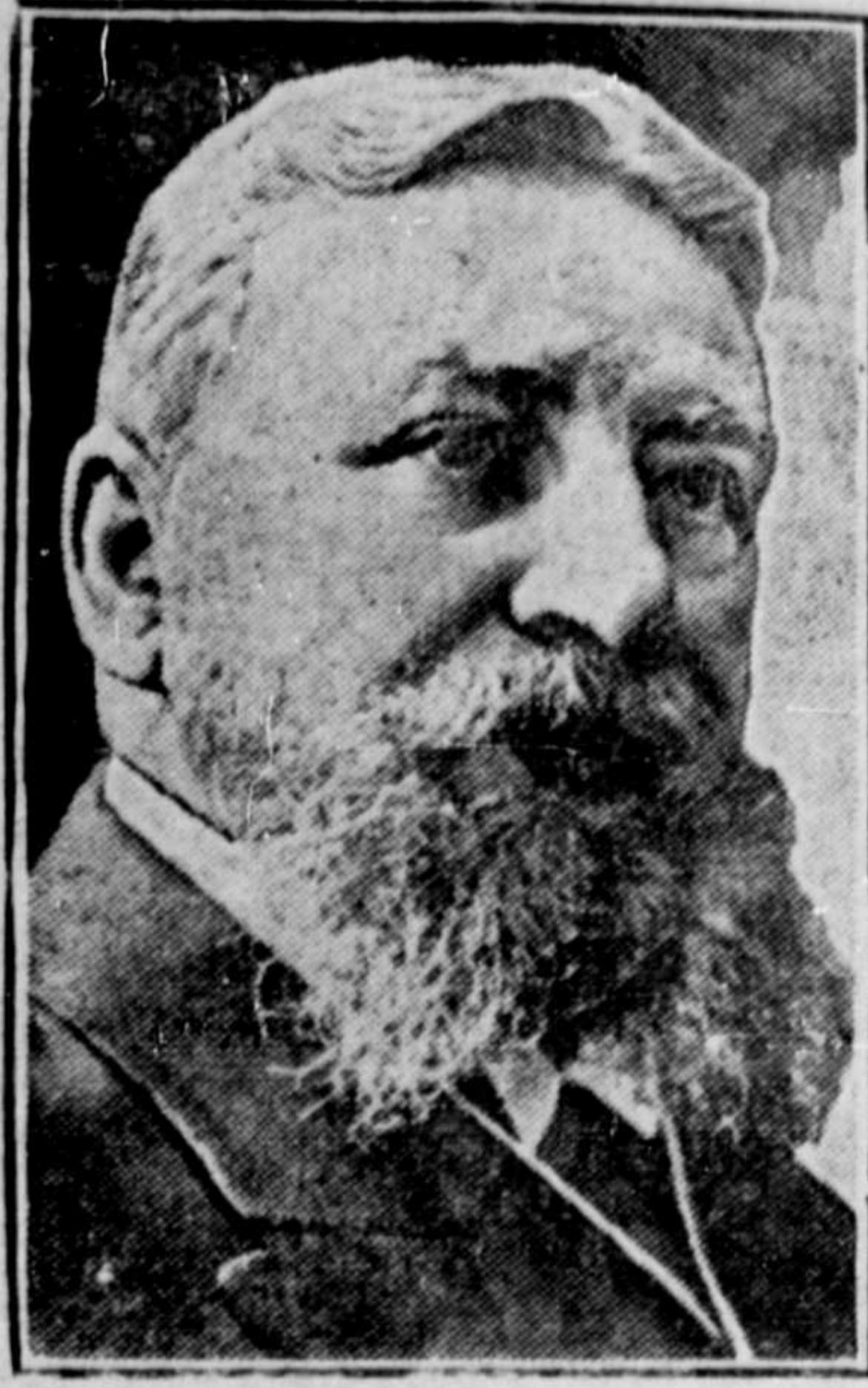

adequate pension, that will enable the family to live com-  
fortably until the children are old enough to look after them-  
selves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be  
her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
