RUSSIANS COUNTERING VON HINDENBURG'S CAVALRY MOVE

London, Sept. 15.—The Russians are countering Von Hindenburg's cavalry movement astride of the Petrograd railway. The German lines on the Nieman are not united. The Russian rear-guard is retiring eastward.

Zeppelin Damaged.

A German airship which has been badly damaged by gunfire at Riga, has descended at Koenigsberg.

Count Reventlow, answering criticism regarding the recent aerial attacks on London, says that London is a fortress and that the civil population should be ordered to leave.

Germans Alarmed.

New York, Sept. 15.—German agents here are alarmed at the success of the Anglo-French billion dollar loan and are instituting a campaign against the flotation, while other German-American bankers realize that the loan

is necessary to the Allies in order to maintain American prosperity.

The suggestion is made to float a counter loan as an embarrassment. German papers arriving recently advocate the destruction of ammunition factories.

Bottled Explosives.

Two bottles of high explosives have been found on the White Star liner Lapland by a stevedore. The steamer was due to sail tomorrow. An investigation is being made.

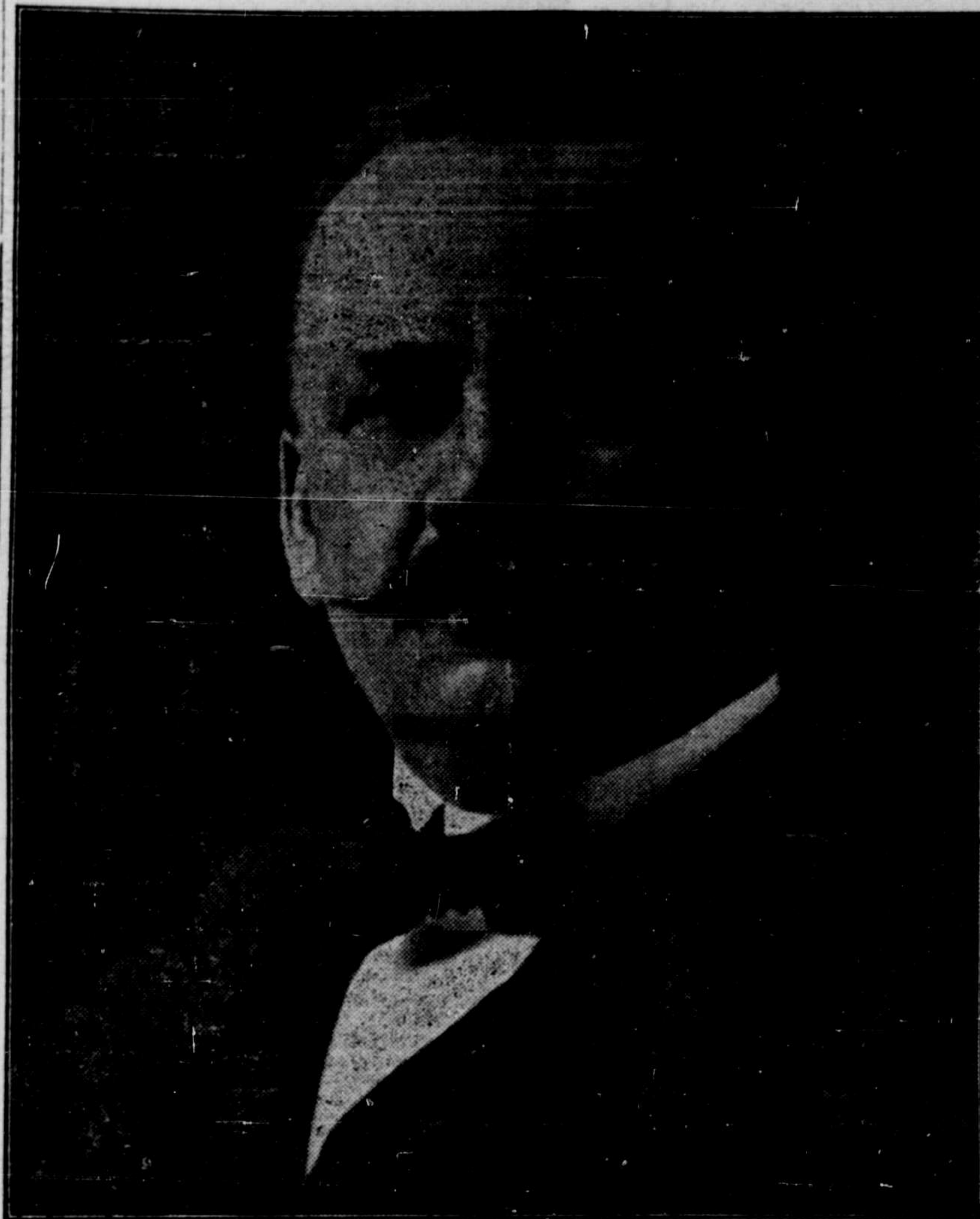
A BEWHISKERED KISS FOR WILLIAM J. BRYAN

G. T. P. PARTY LEFT FOR THE EAST TODAY

Minus Mr. Molson Macpherson, Mr. Dalrymple and Mr. Rosevear, the G. T. P. official party left for the east at noon today. Mr. Rosevear will leave for the south tomorrow morning and the other two gentlemen will go east on tomorrow's train.

Interviewed before leaving, Mr. Chamberlin said he had hoped to be able to stay over until tomorrow, but Hon. Frank Cochrane was anxious to make a connection with the C. N. R. so he was obliged to cut short his stay in the terminal city. He pointed out that the company had proceeded as rapidly with the terminal development as circumstances would allow, and that they were fortunate in getting work on the dry-dock so far advanced before the war came along. He has instructed the engineers to rush the completion of this work, as there is still a lot of necessary work to be done.

With regard to the hotel construction, he pointed out that Prince Rupert is meantime supplied with first-class hotel accommodation, and that it would simply mean taking away business from the existing houses to go ahead with their building, even if financial conditions would permit. He emphasized the fact that it is impossible, in face of imperial legislation, to raise any fresh capital in London during the duration of the war. He pointed out that in giving Prince Rupert a service of three boats and three trains each way per week, the company is losing heavily every day.

Mr. Chamberlin reports that there has been heavy rain every day on the prairies for some time past and grave fears are entertained for the crop. Threshing in most districts is impossible in the meantime, and unless good weather sets in, it will be a costly business for the farmers.

TOUR OF INSPECTION BY G. T. P. OFFICIALS AND HON. F. COCHRANE

OFFICIALS ANNOUNCE THAT PRESENT RAILROAD AND STEAMSHIP SERVICE WILL BE MAINTAINED DURING THE WINTER—IMPROVED SIGHT-SEEING ARRANGEMENTS

The G. T. P. official party arrived last night about six o'clock on a special train of seven cars, having on board Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways; E. J. Chamberlin, president of the G. T. P.; M. F. Molson Macpherson, president of Molson's Bank and a director of the G. T. P.; Morley Donaldson, vice-president and general manager; J. E. Dalrymple, vice-president in charge of traffic; Mr. Pringle of Montreal, solicitor for the company; A. E. Rosevear, general freight agent; W. E. Duperow, assistant general passenger agent; John Pullen, president of Canadian Express Company, and Mr. Norman, superintendent of Canadian Express Company.

The party has made an inspection of the main line of the G. T. P. and the G. T. P. officials will inspect branch lines on the return journey. The trip is one of the periodical official inspections by the president, and Mr. Cochrane, wishing to make an inspection also, they came along together.

The minister of railways is accompanied by Mrs. Cochrane and Miss Cochrane. On the return trip, the government car Nippissing will be transferred from the G. T. P. near Yellowhead to the C. N. R. over which Mr. Cochrane will travel to Vancouver, returning east over the C. P. R.

At Prince George, the party was met by W. C. C. Mehan, general superintendent, while Captain Nicholson, manager of steamships, and F. L. Norman, of Seattle, commercial agent of the company, met them at Prince Rupert.

Mr. Duperow makes an announcement that is of considerable interest to the travelling public, and more particularly the citizens of Prince Rupert, to the effect that it is not the intention to reduce the present steamship or rail service during the coming winter. This is in line with a number of other arrangements that have been made by the Grand Trunk Pacific interests to increase and encourage travel via Prince Rupert, and the decision arrived at may be taken as an indication that the public are showing their appreciation by patronizing the Grand Trunk Pacific route.

In addition to operating parlor observation cars through the mountain section, signs will be placed along the route indicating what the different points of interest are, and at the more important points suitable platforms are being constructed so that the passengers may detrain and see to the best advantage the unsurpassed scenery. Train schedules will be so arranged to permit of a few minutes at each of these points for that purpose.

Residents of Alaska are becoming alive to the advantages to be given by the new short route to eastern Canada and Eastern United States points, and it is confidently expected that there will be a large flow of traffic from Alaska, through Prince Rupert, and over the G. T. P. this fall, and for those coming from Alaska destined for points south of Seattle, the superior accommodation and regular service offered by the steamship company will undoubtedly be taken advantage of, as it will also be by citizens of Prince Rupert and surrounding country.

The traffic returns on the western section for the first week of September show a substantial increase, largely due to the traffic coming through Prince Rupert from Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle, and the company is planning increased facilities for the handling of express business in the near future.

FREE CRITICISM

The Montreal Gazette publishes a report of an interview with Sir Herbert Holt, on his recent return from England, which must come as rather a shock to Canadians. Sir Herbert is president of the Royal Bank of Canada and of the Montreal Heat and Power Co., and is one of Canada's biggest men, therefore his charges of incompetency and worse against the leaders in Britain are bound to be paid attention to, at least in the Dominion.

Among other things, he is reported as saying that "the politics of the mother country are absolutely rotten, and even the men higher up are thinking about politics and position and votes." This is a very sweeping condemnation to come from a casual visitor to the old country, even if that visitor is a knight and fairly well acquainted with conditions over there. It is an admitted fact that the British temperament tends to muddle through instead of pursuing a clear-cut policy, but it is hard to believe that, in such a time of national crisis, politics is playing such an important part. When Premier Asquith formed his coalition government politics was forgotten and it was a case of giving the right man the right job, and the press throughout the Empire endorsed every important appointment.

It is true that the war office is not organized as a business concern would be, and that many miles of red tape make its movements slow, its one great quality being that it keeps on going and ultimately comes out all right. In every war in history, the government has been whole-heartedly blamed throughout. Wellington, in his great campaign, had

as much trouble in fighting the war office for supplies and men, as he had in combating the enemy. There is the time-honored joke about the Crimean requisition for munitions which was finally passed thirty years after the war was over. Doubtless Sir Herbert has picked up many of his impressions from the press, a certain section of which has been very busy "knocking" the men in power. No government is organized along the lines of, say, the Canadian Pacific Railroad, and probably no government ever will be, but it is hard to believe that Britain's leaders today are playing the Nero stunt. Blunders have been made and time has been lost, but the country is gradually becoming organized and there can be no doubt that the men in charge of the conduct of the war have their business well in hand.

Britain's great fault was that she was unprepared, so far as the army is concerned, but that fault is to her credit. To Germany's everlasting disgrace she was prepared, because she had long since made up her mind for war, and a war of extermination of the smaller powers. That Britain has been able to build up such a huge army in such a short time, and from raw material, is greatly to the credit of the men who organized it, as well as to the men who composed it. When the story of the struggle comes to be written it will be found that the reason for the delay in producing vast quantities of high explosives at the start was the lack of any large supply of certain materials which Germany had been purchasing and storing for years. For forty years Germany has been raising men to carry on this war, while Britain's leaders

have had no experience along this line. Men who were essentially men of peace have been suddenly asked to face a situation such as no British statesman has ever been asked to face, and which they never expected to face. If they have taken some time to get used to the great change there can be no cause for wonder, and still less for blame.

PRODUCING TOBACCO WITHOUT NICOTINE

Tobacco smokers who feel that the habit is injuring their health who have tried to quit and could not, may or may not be pleased to learn that the United States government is developing a nicotineless tobacco. There is a theory that boiled dumplings are good only when they are "gummy" and indigestible. So tobacco may be enjoyed only because it is poisonous.

At any rate, it is the nicotine in tobacco that doctors condemn. Nicotine is the poison that causes "tobacco heart" and other ills.

In an experiment station in Landisville, Pa., the government is breeding a tobacco without nicotine. The experiment began three years ago. A number of tobacco plants were analyzed and the seeds of the one having the least nicotine contents were planted the next spring. From that crop the seeds of the stalk with the least nicotine were planted again, and so on, until this year the nicotine in the stalk has been reduced by this process

of selection from 3 1-2 per cent. to 1.31 per cent.

The government hopes to be able to "breed out" all the nicotine, and if it does we may have a kind of tobacco that may be smoked with impunity.

The government is not encouraging the tobacco habit. It is only making nature, like any other adulterator of pure foods and drugs, be good.—Ex.

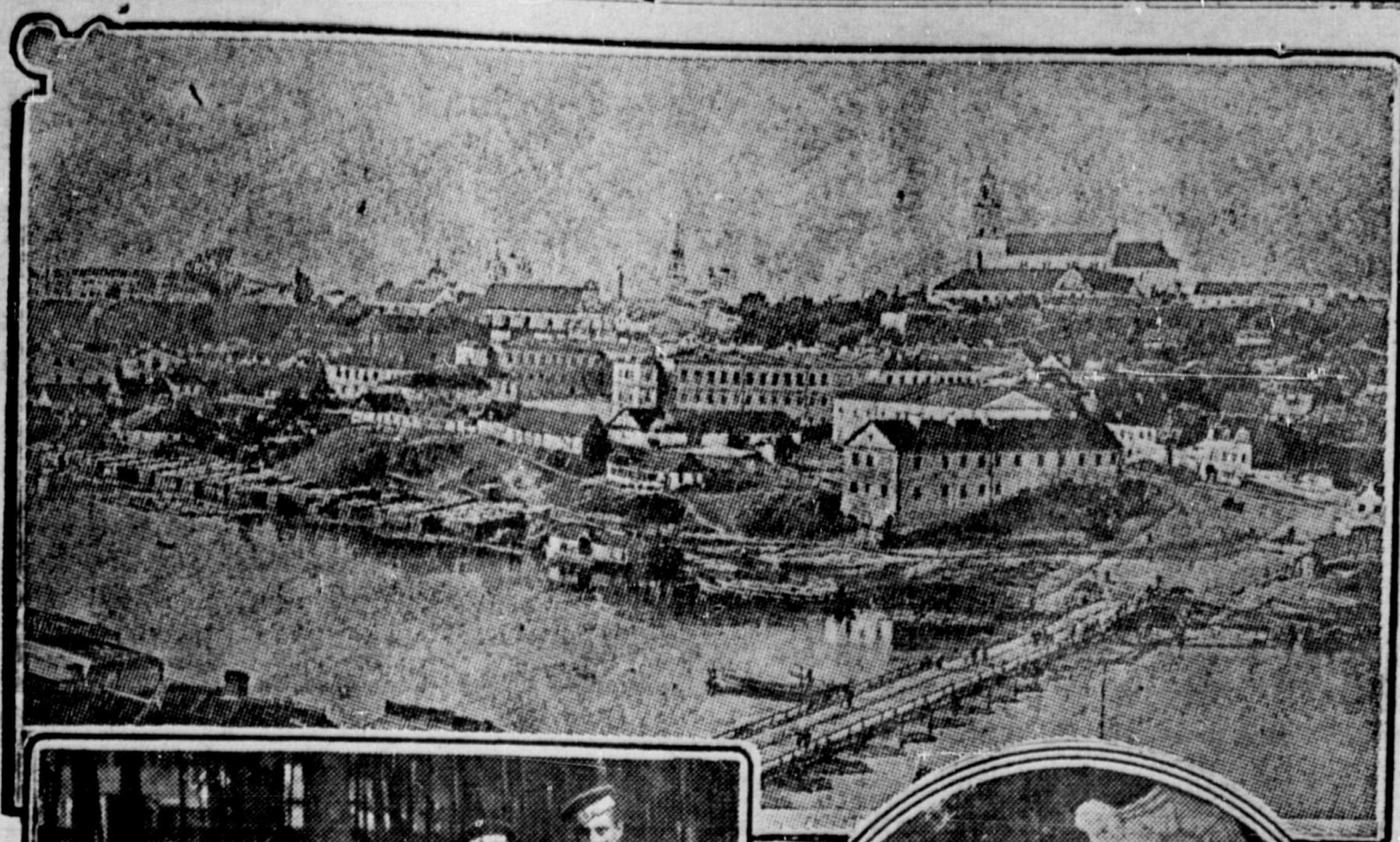

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

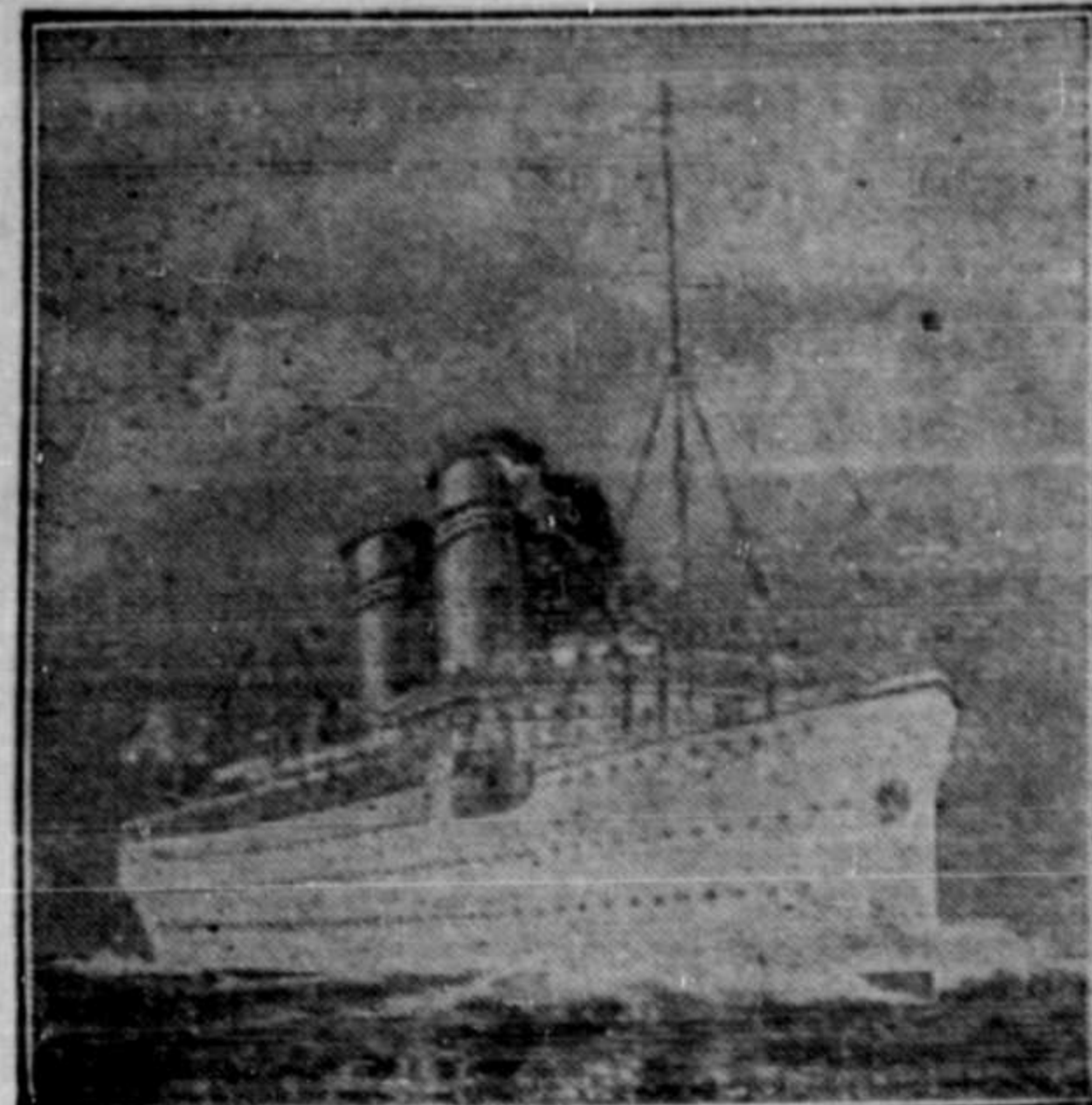
4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

The Case of A.B. Smith, Retailer.

A. B. SMITH has a dry goods store in a certain Canadian city.

He does a good business, but wants to do more. He believes that Advertising in his local newspaper is the way to get more business. So he advertises—every now and then.
