LIBERALS GAIN IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

BULGARIA DIVIDED ON TURKISH SUPPORT--DR. STEFANSSON IS REPORTED SAFE

SERBIAN ARMY HAS BEEN RE-ORGANIZED

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, Sept. 17.—Premier Pachtich, of Serbia, in an interview, says that the Serbian army has now been re-organized and is well armed, and can cope with any German attempt to cross the Danube. It would require a force of 450,000 men to make the attempt.

Bulgarian Appeal.

The leaders of the opposition in Bulgaria are preparing to make an appeal to the country against any agreement with Turkey being made, and favoring an arrangement with the Quadruple Entente. Further Greek troops have been called to the colors.

SKEENA RIVER INDIAN IS REPORTED MISSING

It is feared that Edward Musgrave, a Port Essington Indian, who was well known along the coast, has been drowned in the Skeena. His upturned canoe was found near Balmoral Cannery yesterday afternoon, but there is no trace of the owner.

Pat Phillipson, Dominion government constable, is conducting a search around Port Essington, and has notified the city police here to make enquiries. Up to noon today there was still no trace of Musgrave, and it is almost certain that he lost his life when his canoe upset.

THE SANTA ANNA HAS ARRIVED AT AZORES

MATANUSKA HAD WILD FEATURES

Harry E. Nolan, of Forks, Wn., veteran of two months' service last fall in the French army, has added a little far-northern venture to his experience. Mr. Nolan returned to Seattle after having spent several months in business in the new town of Matanuska, Alaska. He says there was pretty near as much excitement in Matanuska as there was in the war trenches in France. Of Matanuska he said: "I am glad that I lived in Matanuska, as I saw a town that I did not believe could exist in these days. We had a real frontier town—open gambling, blind pigs, with their eyes open—wide open and looking for customers—and I even had the pleasure of attending an old-fashioned miners' meeting, which gave notice to an undesirable individual to get out of town within a few minutes. One other person who was located in the business district was declared a menace to the prosperity and business life of the city. A miners' meeting was held on this case and the offender was ordered to move to the outskirts. The order was not complied with, and the miners picked up the house and moved the whole concern bodily."—Seattle P. I.

GERMANY REQUIRES ALL HER MALES

Amsterdam, Sept. 16.—The Handelsblad learns that all males from 17 to 45 years of age have been prohibited from leaving Germany. Some who attempted to leave have been turned back at the Dutch frontier stations.

ANOTHER SEATTLE FIRM COMING HERE

Mr. O. Bernhoff, representing the National Independent Fishing Company, of Seattle, is in the city sizing up the fishing situation here for his firm. He is being shown around the city by Alderman Dybhavn, and expresses the opinion that Prince Rupert has the best natural location on the coast for the handling of the Pacific fish traffic, and is thoroughly satisfied that, with increased facilities, there should be no limit to the growth of the trade.

Mr. Bernhoff will, in all probability remain in the city to handle the buying end of the business for the National Independent. The regular appearance of representatives of large fish handling concerns in the south is clear proof of the growing importance of this port as a fishing centre.

CONSERVATIVES WIN BY SLIM MAJORITY

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Sept. 17. The Conservative party has been returned to power, under Premier J. A. Matheson, with a majority of 4.

Before the election, there were 28 Conservatives and only 2 Liberals in the house. In the new parliament there will be 17 Conservatives and 13 Liberals.

The Hon. L. L. Jenkins and the Hon. J. A. Macdonald have been defeated. This is the first instance in which a secret ballot has been taken on the island.

COMMUNITY MONEY

In an editorial dealing with relief work for the unemployed, the Victoria Colonist says "The government has no source of income except what it gets from the community, and if it pays out money for any purpose that is paid out. This is a good thing to remember in connection with other things besides the relief of the unemployed."

The Colonist might have enlarged upon this point showing that there is about \$15,000,000 of community money which the government shows no sign of attempting to collect from the speculator; money which the community stands greatly in need of just at present. The people of British Columbia also realize that it was community money, though not in the hands of the government, which was swallowed up by the Dominion Trust Company. The \$45,000 which Joe Matson failed to account for in the Songhees Reserve deal was community money, and so was the \$80,000,000 guaranteed to the Canadian Northern Railway. Some day soon there is going to be a searching enquiry into the community money question, and people will then more fully realize the truth of the Colonist's statement that it is connected with other things than the relief of unemployment.

WINTER SCHEDULE

At a time when every business organization in the country is cutting down expenses to the irreducible minimum, it is gratifying to learn that the Grand Trunk Pacific is prepared to continue its summer schedule of three boats and three trains each way per week

throughout the winter. It will mean a big outlay on the part of the company, and is more than even optimistic citizens looked for.

Mr. Chamberlin made it very plain that financial conditions put any idea of further terminal development entirely out of the question in the meantime. It must be apparent that the officials of the company are just as anxious for the rapid development of traffic as the people of Prince Rupert can be. The company is bound to develop the railroad, and the railroad development is naturally bound to increase the importance of the terminal.

PATRIOTIC FUND

We have now entered upon the second year of the war and the end seems as far off as ever. No one imagined, a year ago, that by September of 1915 Canada would have sent across the Atlantic nearly one hundred thousand men, with as many more to follow if necessary. This magnificent enlistment, while primarily due to the loyalty of our people, has been, in a large measure, made possible by the Canadian Patriotic Fund.

This greatest of all the national benefactions is now assisting twenty thousand families of men who have enlisted for overseas service. These men have gone forward with the full assurance that the people of Canada will see to it that during their absence, their wives, widowed mothers and little children shall be maintained in comfort. We hear that the drain upon the Fund is assuming large proportions, that to meet the needs of July and August \$700,000 was expended, that the reserves are being materially decreased and

that the national executive committee now finds it necessary to make a further appeal to the Canadian public.

There are many funds, many of them worthy, but of them all the Patriotic Fund is the one we cannot allow to fail. It is the duty of the government to arm, equip and maintain the troops. Not a dollar do the Federal authorities give to the Patriotic Fund. This work depends solely on the patriotism and generosity of our own people. Thousands of brave men are fighting our battles, believing that we meant what we said when we told them as they went forward: "Go and we will care for the wife and kiddies." It would be to our everlasting disgrace if our pledge were broken.

The national organization, with headquarters at Ottawa and branches or affiliated associations in every part of the Dominion, is worthy of our generous support in the tremendous and ever-growing task that it has undertaken.

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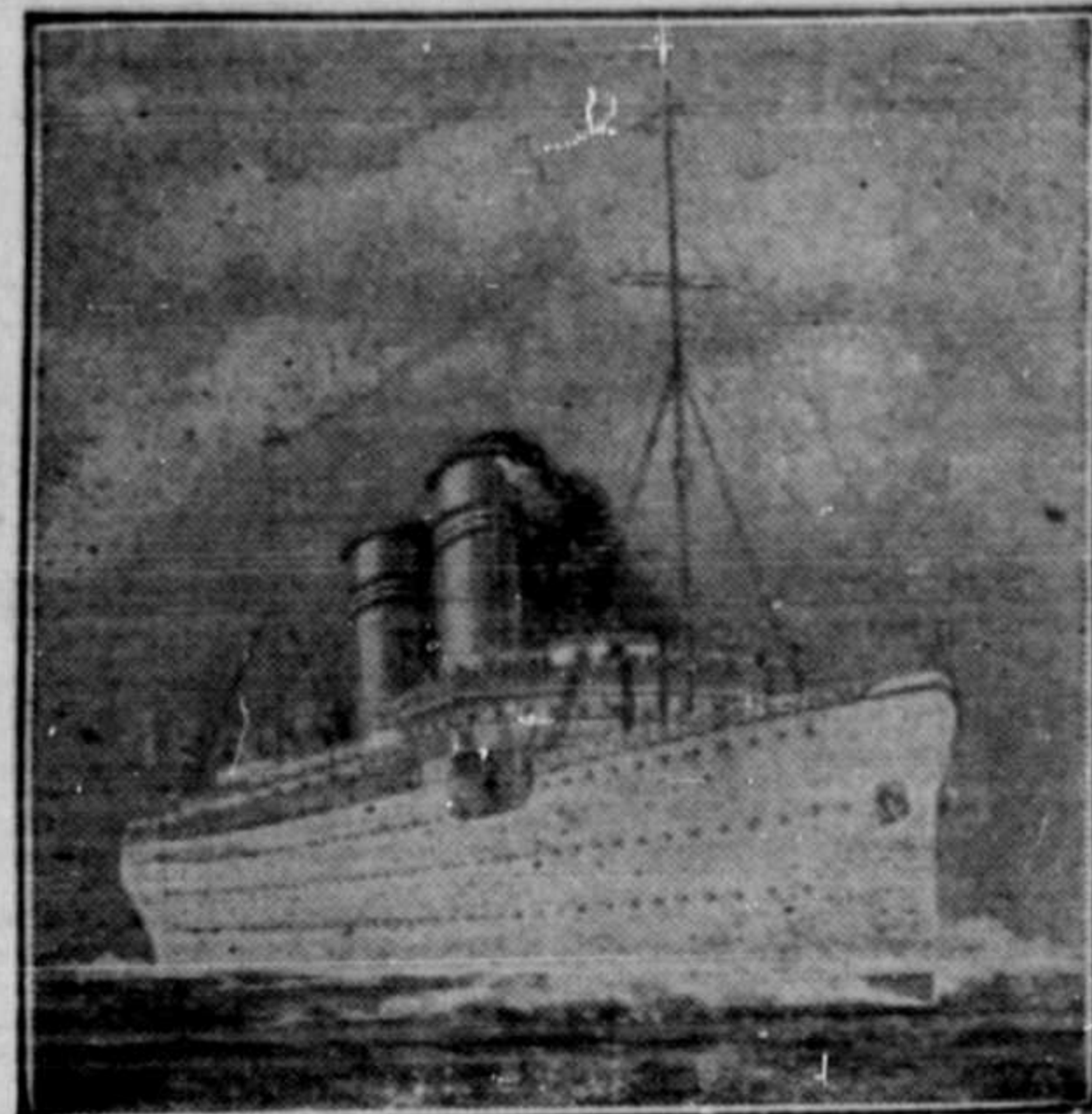

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$4.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
