## HUNDREDS OF ENGLISH MINERS ENTOMBED

### RUSSIANS EVADE GERMAN CAVALRY ATTACKS -- SPIES SENTENCED IN LONDON

#### DISASTROUS COLLIERY FIRE-- SEVERAL HUNDREDS ENTOMBED

**TWENTY BODIES BROUGHT TO SURFACE--GERMAN SPIES ARE SENTENCED IN ENGLAND--ONE MAN SHOT, WOMAN GETS TEN YEARS--GERMAN AVIATOR DROPS TO EARTH**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Nuneaton, Eng., Sept. 21.—The Exhall colliery is afire. Several hundred miners are entombed in the workings. The destruction of the cage renders rescue work difficult. Twenty bodies have been sent up by the crew of rescuers.

**Spies Sentenced.**  
London, Sept. 21.—Several German spies have been sentenced. One man has been ordered shot, and a woman has been sentenced to ten years imprisonment for attempting to communicate the movements of the British fleet. The names are withheld.

#### THE COUNCIL AND THE G. T. P. AGREEMENT

At the city council last night, Ald. Beveridge, seconded by Ald. Montgomery, moved that the city clerk and city solicitor draft a letter to the G. T. P. regarding the agreement between the city and the company, with a view to having some part of the work, still unfinished, undertaken this winter, and that the letter be submitted to the council.

Ald. Beveridge made it clear, in suggesting that such work as the opening up of Seventh St., might be undertaken, that he did not propose that the city should in any way seek to antagonise the company in any way. His sole aim was to provide some employment.

Ald. Montgomery said he realised that a great deal could not be expected under present conditions, but he felt that the matter should be taken up. The motion carried unanimously.

**Aviator Killed.**  
A member of the crew of a Zepelin was blown out of, or fell from, the car of his airship over London. The mangled body is beyond recognition, but it is believed to be that of Dr. Joseph Sticker, famous for his researches in aeronautics, whose death has been announced in Germany.

**Steamer Torpedoed.**  
The British steamer Linkmoor has been torpedoed. She was a vessel of 4,000 tons. The crew was saved.

#### PROTEST AGAINST THE EARLY CLOSING BYLAW

Judge Carss appeared before the city council last night on behalf of certain grocers who stated that their signatures had been obtained to the early closing bylaw by misrepresentation of the facts.

He presented declarations from Alex. Ferguson and S. Mussallem to this effect. Mr. Ferguson stated he at first refused to sign the petition, but ultimately did so on representations being made to him that it would not interfere with his trade in cigars, tobacco, etc.

Mr. Carss also pointed out that one grocer, who had two stores, had signed the petition twice, and as the signature required was purely that of an individual, dual signing was entirely out of order.

He pointed out that great care should be exercised by the council in assuring itself that the signatures to the petition are all in order before finally passing the bylaw.

Ald. Montgomery said he would like to have the opinion of the city solicitor on the matter. Mr. Peters stated that the men who signed the petition did so of their own accord and knew exactly what they were doing. With regard to the dual signature, he held that where two licenses were paid, two signatures were perfectly in order. He said that the council had no option but to proceed with the passing of the bylaw requested in the petition.

The early closing bylaw passed its final reading.

#### LABOR CONGRESS FAVORS GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, Sept. 21.—The Labor Congress yesterday voted in favor of government ownership of railroads and a non-partisan civil service and the enforcement of the fair wage clause. Bowser, in an address of welcome, invited the congress to nominate a British Columbia delegate for a commission, which will start a tour in October to investigate workmen's compensation.

#### CANADIAN EXPRESS CO. AND FISH TRAFFIC

Mr. John Pullen, the president, and Mr. F. Norman, the superintendent, of the Canadian Express Company, who accompanied the party of officials of the G. T. P. to Prince Rupert last week, explained that the Express Company handles all the merchandise and valuables which are carried on passenger trains of the Grand Trunk System, and have been designated as the express agents of the National Transcontinental Railway. In connection with the latter, a new and valuable route has been opened up between eastern and western Canada, reducing considerably the time in transit. Formerly its business was handled through the United States. Now it is carried over its all Canadian route, in charge of trained and experienced messengers on every train.

#### RUSSIANS EVADE BRILLIANT MOVEMENT BY VON HINDENBURG

**ARMY RETREATING FROM VILNA ESCAPES FROM THE GERMAN COILS--VON MACKENZEN'S FORCES ARE STILL SCATTERED--GERMAN SUBMARINES ARE SENT BELOW**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Sept. 21.—The Russian army of 300,000 men, retiring from Vilna, has escaped from the coils of Von Hindenburg, evading brilliant German cavalry raids on both flanks.

Von Meckenzen is unable to link up his scattered forces after the march from Pripet Marshes.

**German Submarine Sunk.**  
Odessa, Sept. 21.—Russian ships have sunk a German submarine which was operating in the Black Sea.

**Hun Sinks Hun.**  
Stavanger, Sept. 21.—A Ger-

man submarine, off Stavanger, has torpedoed and destroyed another German submarine. The crew of the latter went down with their ship.

#### DELHI IN DOCK

The Delhi was floated into the drydock yesterday. When the water was pumped out and the hull exposed to view there was great disappointment for those concerned in her. Her engines are gone, and the hull is in such shape that repairs are practically out of the question.

#### "THE DIAMOND FROM THE SKY" AT THE WESTHOLME

Last night was a red letter night at the Westholme, when the first installment of "The Diamond from the Sky" was screened. This great feature had been looked forward to with interest and it is safe to say that no one was disappointed. There is the usual introduction of the famous actors in the play, as well as a picture of the producer reviewing the 19,864 scenarios presented.

The story opens with a magnificent Indian scene in Virginia in 1632, when the "Diamond" is dropped from the sky in a meteor, the event saving Sir Arthur Stanley from death at the stake. **GERMANY'S SHORTAGE**

The shortage of certain raw materials of industry in Germany is becoming acute. Copper, rubber, cotton, and jute are among the things that are most lacking, and great efforts are being made by inventors and technical experts to find substitutes. The German correspondent of the India Rubber World says the list of rubber goods "no longer obtainable" is increasing constantly, and the discovery, or even the pretended discovery, of some new substitute for a scarce or "no longer obtainable" raw material is heralded throughout the Press. It was announced recently that the Kaiser had motored to the front in a machine equipped with artificial rubber tires. Immediately the Press announced that the great problem had been solved, that artificial rubber was at last practicable, that Germany would no longer have to rely upon foreign countries for her crude rubber supplies. Rubber would now be home-made. It appears, however, that the much-talked-of artificial rubber tires of the Kaiser's automobile were only experimental ones, produced at great cost, or at least at a cost that would prohibit their being produced on a commercial basis, or even on a basis permitting their use for the present military needs.

The scarcity of jute, which is used in making sandbags as well as in the production of general textile fabrics, is so great, that a substitute called textilose, made by spreading paper on a fibre gauze and cutting the product into strips which are then spun into a yarn, is now extensively used, and almost ten million dollars have been subscribed for the promotion of the manufacture of textilose. Cotton is now so

scarce that since August 1st the Government has absolutely prohibited its use save for the manufacture of military supplies. No one in Germany can now legally make cotton yarn, threads, fabrics, wearing apparel, bags, or knitting goods containing cotton. The enormous demand for gun-cotton and the tightening of the blockade by the Allies has produced a real cotton famine. In 1913 Germany imported raw cotton to the value of \$139,777,000. Now her people are saving their old cotton clothes to provide material for the shells that are being used so lavishly on the battlefronts. When the cotton rags are all gone German science will have to tackle the biggest problem raised by the war—the discovery of a substitute for gun-cotton. Tri-nitro-toluene, the new explosive derived from coal tar, is most effective, but it is doubtful if all the coke ovens in Germany could produce in a month as much of the new explosive as will be used in a week when the general advance of the Allies forces Germany to match shell against shell. There seems to be no doubt that Germany is being hampered already and will be much more seriously crippled in the near future by the scarcity of raw materials.—Toronto Globe.

most valuable medium of transportation for the fresh fish shipments from Prince Rupert to eastern Canada and the United States. Where necessary, special express trains are made up and run on passenger train schedule to Winnipeg, where connection is made with the trains of the Government Transcontinental Ry. for furtherance to eastern Canada with other express companies with which close traffic arrangements have been effected, to reach the large consuming markets of the United States.

The fish is carried in specially constructed refrigerator cars, equipped for service on fast passenger trains. The cars are supplied with tanks at each end, which are filled with sufficient ice

at Prince Rupert to keep the contents in perfect condition to destination.

Mr. Pullen states that the fish dealers in the eastern cities had nothing but praise for the express service, which enabled them to place their fish on the markets in as fresh condition as when shipped, notwithstanding a rail journey across the continent. ### BYLAW NUMBER 261.

A BYLAW TO SHORTEN THE HOURS UPON WHICH THE VARIOUS RETAIL BUSINESSES HEREINAFTER MENTIONED MAY BE CARRIED ON.

Whereas a petition has been presented to the Municipal Council of the City of Prince Rupert asking that this bylaw be passed, said petition being delivered to the City Clerk on the 26th August, 1915.

AND WHEREAS it has been proved to the satisfaction of the City Council that the said petition was signed by not less than three-fourths in number of the occupiers of shops in the City of Prince Rupert in which the aforementioned retail businesses are carried on, and also that the petitioners number in each class of business not less than three-fourths of the persons carrying on each such class.

AND WHEREAS the classes of shops referred to in said petition are:—Clothing, Butchers, Electricians, Grocers, Hardware, Furniture, Stationers, Paints Shops, Milliner, Bazaar and Fruit Stores.

NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:—

1. After the coming into force of this bylaw all shops in which any of the classes of business hereinbefore mentioned are carried on, shall be closed at the following time, namely:

On ordinary week days, namely, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday... 6:30 o'clock p.m.  
Saturdays... Remain open as long as desired.

Days prior to Public Holidays, same as Saturdays.  
Ten (10) days prior to Christmas Day, same as Saturdays.

2. Any person breaking this bylaw by keeping his shop open after the hour allowed by this bylaw shall be liable to a fine of not more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) for each day, and in default of payment of such fine to imprisonment not exceeding thirty (30) days.

3. This bylaw shall come into force on the first day of October, A. D. 1915, and before that date the bylaw shall be published by inserting the same in one newspaper published in the City of Prince Rupert, for one day.

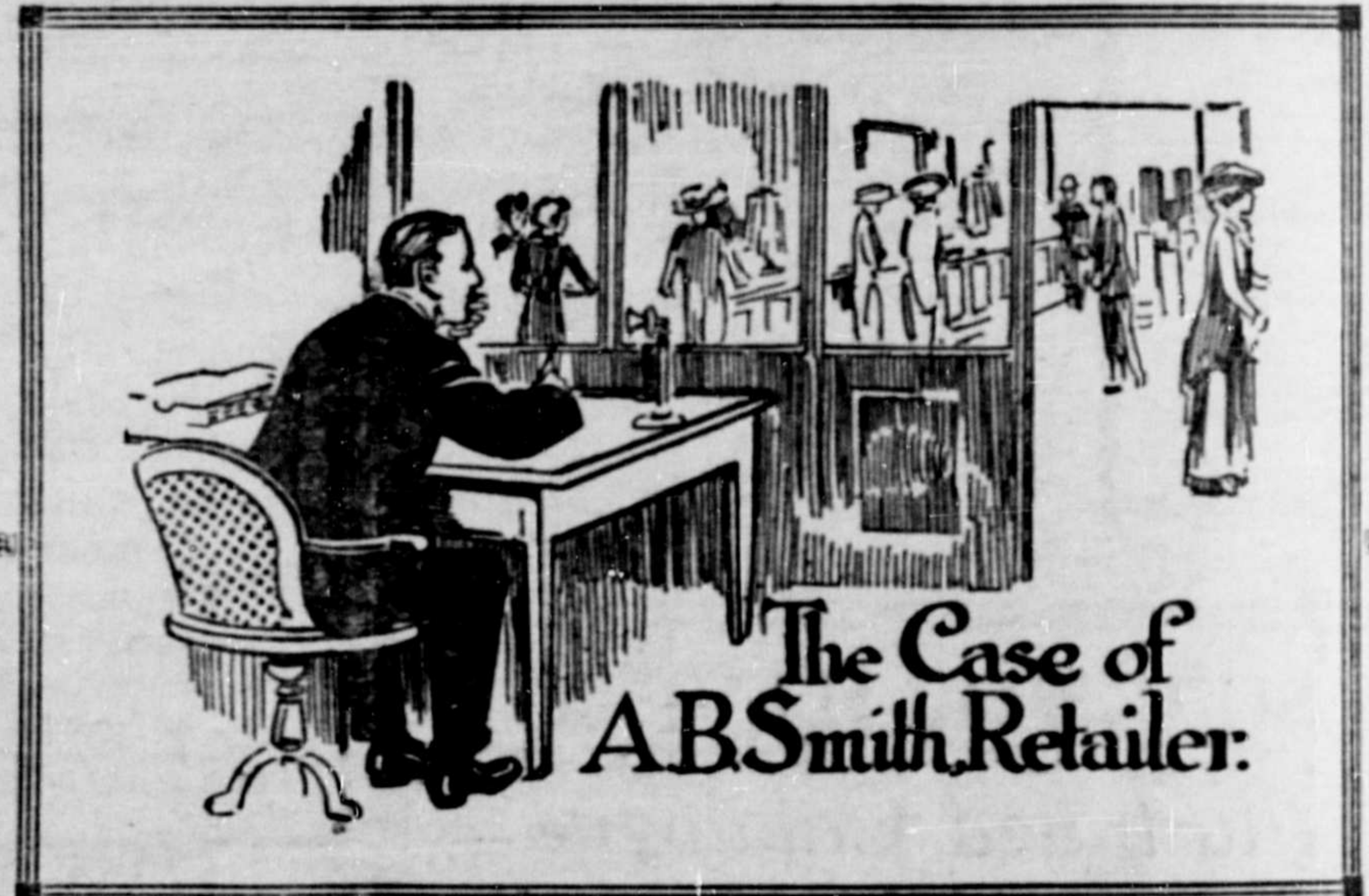

## A. B. SMITH has a dry goods store in a certain Canadian city. He does a good business, but wants to do more.

He believes that Advertising in his local newspaper is the way to get more business. So he advertises—every now and then. This is where our friend Smith is wrong—in advertising every now and then. He should advertise regularly—as frequently as his local newspaper is published.

So Smith can do more business, and more business means a larger income for himself, to say nothing of other gains that go hand in hand with the doing of bigger business.
