FRENCH BATTERING GERMAN SECOND LINE

BULGARIANS CLASHING WITH SERBIANS -- BERLIN'S RIDICULOUS PEACE TERMS

DRYDOCK FINAL TEST THIS AFTERNOON

The Pacific Net and Twine Co., of Seattle, one of the largest dealers in fishermen's supplies on the coast, will open up business in Prince Rupert. The company realizes the importance of this port as a fishing centre, and has decided that it is essential that it should establish a business here. The new concern will operate in conjunction with the firm of Edward Lipsett, which has been represented here for some time. The firm will move into commo-

Bob's chief injury is a broken leg. He is recovering and hopes to go back to the trenches again.

DICE THROWING IN CITY CIGAR STORES

At the police court this morning, before Magistrate Carss, V. A. Cole was charged with "permitting a game of chance to be played with dice for tobacco at his cigar store on Third Avenue, said store being a public place." Accused claimed that, in Vancouver and Victoria, dice throwing for cigars had been held to be within the law, giving the cases of E. A. Morris and Salmon as examples. The magistrate reserved judgment until tomorrow.

FRENCH SWEEPING GERMAN LINES WITH TERRIFIC FIRE

FRENCH BEARING THE BRUNT—FIRM FOOTHOLD GAINED IN ADVANCED TRENCHES—GERMANS BRINGING MEN FROM POLAND—BERLIN'S FARCICAL PEACE TERMS

(Special to The Daily News.) Paris, Oct. 1.—The French are sweeping the second line of German defences in the Champagne district with terrific artillery fire. The French now have established a firm foothold in advanced trenches.

The Germans, who have been re-inforced by troops from Poland, are fighting furiously, shelling the French from both sides at Somme.

Attacks repulsed.

German counter attacks in Argonne, at Artois and Loos, were made to relieve the British pressure, but all were repulsed with heavy loss to the enemy.

Allied Re-inforcements.

London, Oct. 1.—The French are bearing the brunt of the fighting in the west, and are hammering the second line of the Germans in Champagne, in the direction of the Grande Pre railroad. The British forces in France, which number a million, are to be increased by 500,000.

Aviators Busy.

Aviators are dropping bombs on the railroad and on the stations, in order to prevent the Germans from bringing up re-inforcements.

German Peace Terms.

Berlin, Oct. 1.—Germany's peace terms are set forth in an interview with Foreign Secretary Zimmerman.

No. 1. Guarantees the safety of Germany from future attacks.

No. 2. Asks for a settlement of the Belgian question, so as the Belgian army in future cannot be used as a British vanguard.

No. 3. Asks for the creation of Poland as a buffer state between Germany and Russia.

IMPORTANT OPERATIONS ARE EXPECTED WITHIN 48 HOURS

COMPLETE SILENCE TO BE OBSERVED, EXCEPT AS REGARDS OFFICIAL DISPATCHES—THE BULGARIANS ARE CROSSING SERBIAN FRONTIER—121 GUNS WERE TAKEN

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Oct. 1.—Important European operations are heralded by the intimation that silence will be observed during the next 48 hours. No cable will be allowed to pass, except censored official dispatches. These stringent precautions are being taken in order to prevent German spies from getting any information as to developments.

Bulgaria and Serbia.

Turin, Oct. 1.—There have been several clashes on the Serbian-Bulgarian frontier. A Bulgarian patrol at Trichouke attacked Serbian sentinels, and Bulgarian troops have been crossing into Serbia for several hours. The Bulgarian troops are digging trenches and erecting barbed wire defences along the frontier.

121 Guns Taken.

Paris, Oct. 1.—In Champagne we gained ground to the north of Mesnil. We gained some more between Hill 190 and to the point north of Massiges, from the road to Ville sur Tourbe to Cernay Endornois. At the latter point we took additional prisoners.

By a counter attack the enemy succeeded in recovering a footing in Ouvrage dela Deflate. A second counter attack of a very violent character in the same sector was completely repulsed. The enemy suffered important losses.

The clearing of the former German positions permitted a more complete computation of the can-

non captured. Their number is much greater than had been previously announced. The total field guns and heavy pieces captured from the enemy since September 25th on the Champagne front alone reached 121.

A flotilla of aeroplanes dropped seventy-two bombs on the station at Guignicourt. The bombardment appeared very effective. The aeroplanes though violently cannonaded, returned safely to their base.

THE INDIAN COMMISSION

About three years ago a royal commission was appointed to enquire into the values of the various Indian reserves, or some such thing, and, after nearly three years of untold hardship on sea and land these valiant gentlemen are staying right with the job. Their tenacity is wonderful in face of the dangers to be faced in the mountains, on the rivers and on the sea.

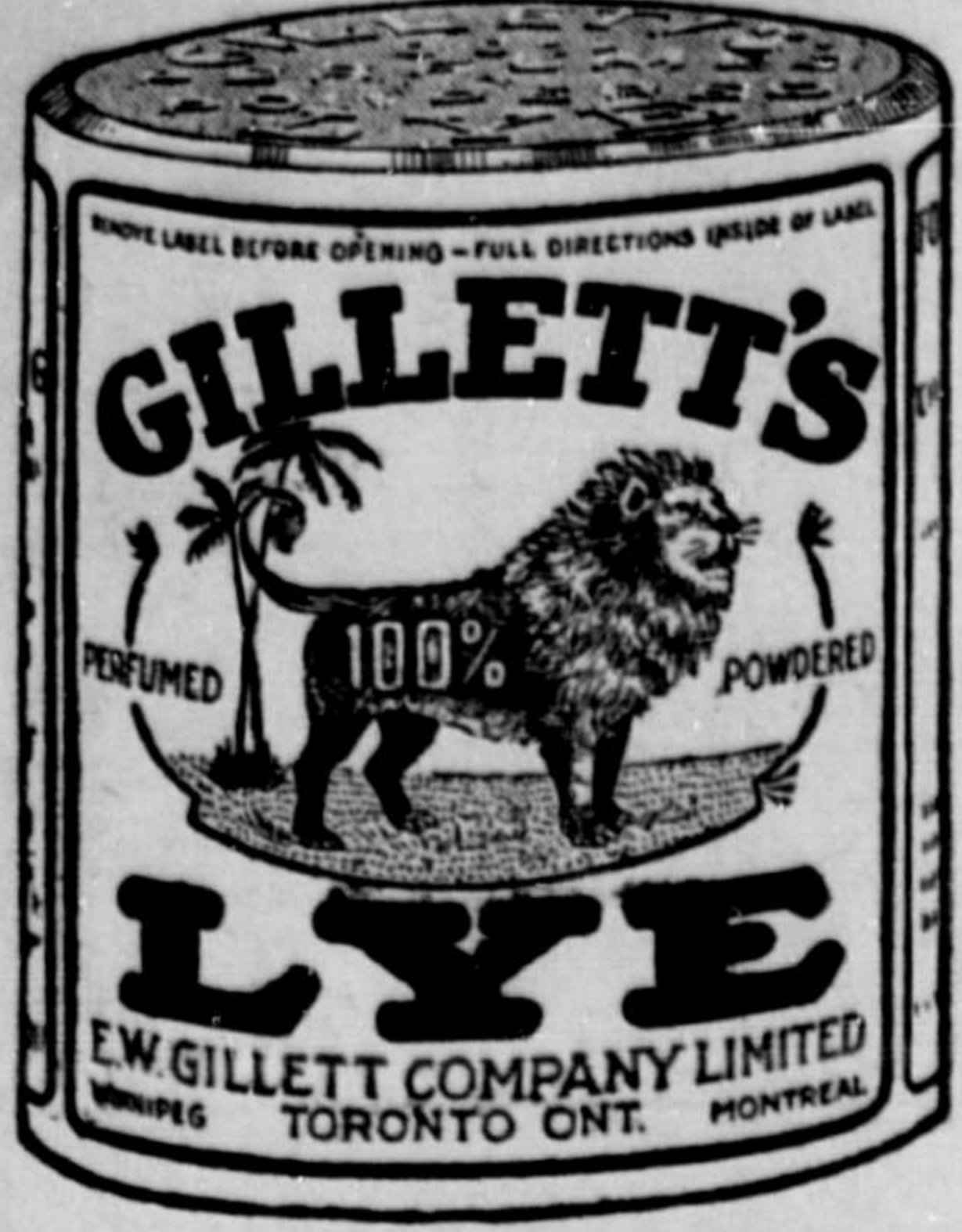
In order to make certain that there can be no possible error in their findings, they make return visits periodically, with commendable zeal. During the last few months they have visited this far northern land several times, and are here again. On this occasion, they have chartered the Chelohsin for the trip, in order that the trials of the journey might be brought down to a minimum. Incidentally the cost of the Chelohsin must run to about \$300 or \$350 per day, but what care they, the good work must be carried on regardless of cost. Two years ago they chartered the Queen at a total cost of something like \$43,000, just to show what they really could do when they felt like it. After making a trying trip to Port Essington, they proceeded to the wilds of Port Simpson. Logically their next stop should have been somewhere up the Naas, but someone of the party must have wanted to see what a train looked like, so they put back to Prince Rupert, just to get another glance at civilization before continuing their hazardous work.

An Indian commission must travel, and the government test of anything is its cost, that is why such prices were paid for binoculars, fundered horses,

etc. The higher the price, the better and more conservative the article. The Ottawa test of the work of a commission is the size of the expense account turned in, and in this connection, the commissioners have had an extremely trying time. That is why they have been obliged to pay a short visit to the interior, return south, and then come back again to do a little more investigating. If the expense bills do not come along with sufficient force and regularity, Ottawa might decide that the work was not being done properly, and another commission might have to be appointed to enquire into the lack of bills. In order to avoid such a calamity, the idea of chartering a steamer occasionally was hit upon, as one way out of the difficulty. However, judging by the leisurely way in which the gentlemen are meandering at present, they must have still a considerable leeway to make up. If they stay right with it, they will soon have the satisfaction of reaching the \$200,000 mark, which is usually considered the highwater mark of commission efficiency. There is an idea abroad that this particular outfit is out to break all records, and their efforts are being watched with growing interest.

The Borden government has made wonderful advances in the way of appointing commissions, showing remarkable ingenuity. Still there are many fields which might be entered upon, with great advantage to the friends of the party. For instance, a minute enquiry into the history of the geological formation of the Rocky Mountains would provide handsome annuities for scores of willing Conservatives, as the work

could be spread over many years, while a perfect army of commissioners could be employed watching the growth of the Douglas fir in British Columbia, though this might be encroaching on the sacred preserves of Sir Richard McBride. Meantime, they are doing pretty well, but there are untold possibilities still before them.

PROMINENT LABOR LEADER PASSED AWAY

On Sunday morning, September 25th, there died of pneumonia in the city of Glasgow, Scotland, James Keir Hardie, one of the pioneers of the labor movement in Britain and the leader of the peace element in the British Socialist party.

James Keir Hardie was born in Scotland on August 15th, 1856, and worked underground as a pit boy and pit man from the age of seven until he was 24, when he became secretary of the Lanarkshire Miners' Union. In 1882, he became editor of the *Cummock News*, which post he relinquished in 1886. He unsuccessfully contested Mid-Lanark in 1888, in the labor interests, and was ultimately elected to parliament from Southwest Ham in 1892. Defeated there in 1895, he was out of the House of Commons for three years, being elected for Merthyr Tydvil in Wales, which seat he held until his death.

He was one of the characters of the house, always dressed in rough tweeds and a cloth cap, he refused to don anything else, even for state occasions. In 1907, he made a tour of India and Australia. In India, he delivered speeches which his opponents characterized as seditious, and the press of both parties was loud in its clamorings for his arrest, but the old warrior was allowed to pursue his way in peace. He was unshakable in his beliefs, and did not hesitate to express them in unmistakable terms on any and every occasion. He was the founder of the Labor Leader and a frequent contributor to magazines and reviews.

GRAVES OF HEROES CAREFULLY REGISTERED

London, Sept. 28.—The war office announces that no crosses or memorials to mark the graves of those who have died overseas can be accepted for transit.

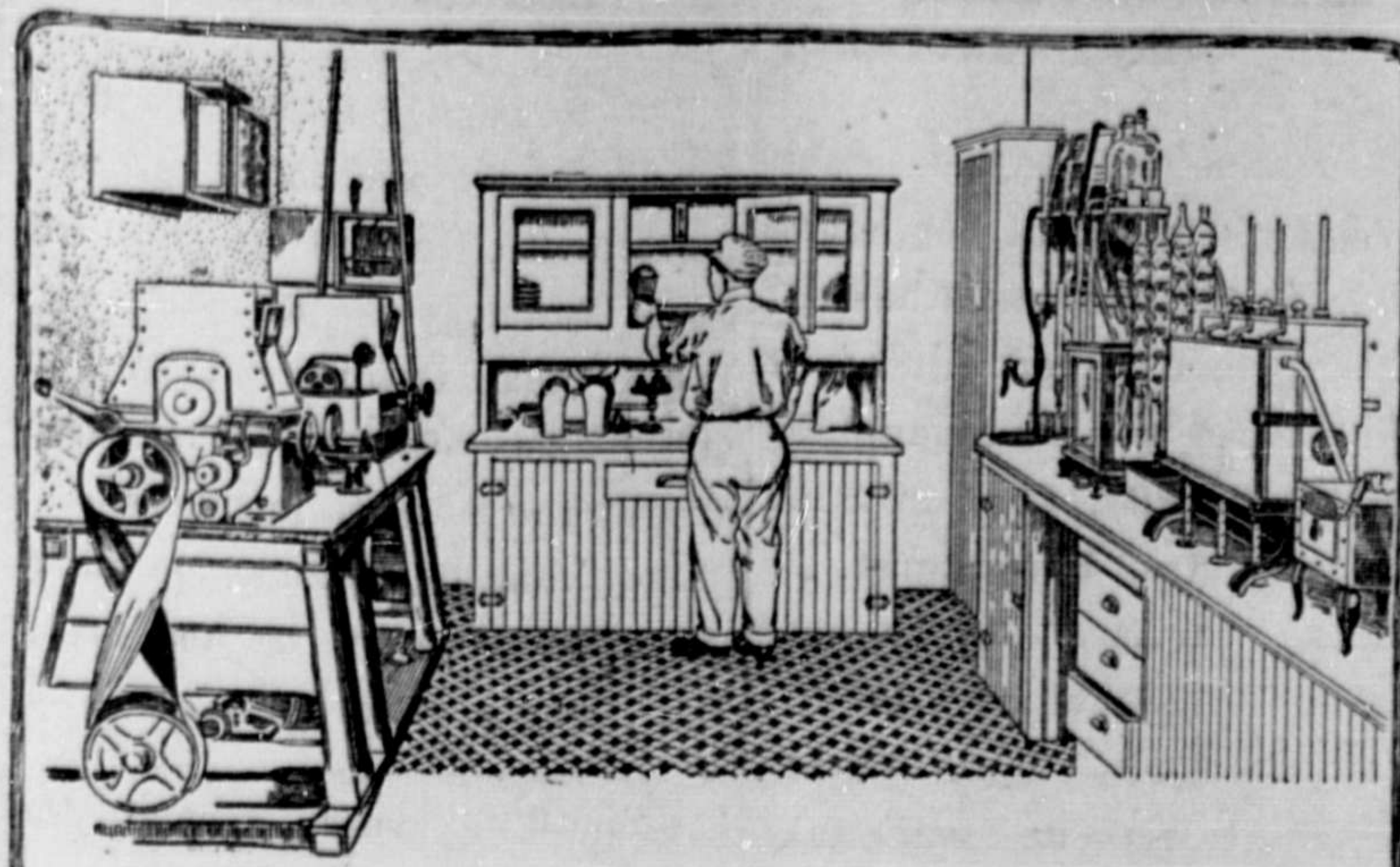
Durable wooden crosses, treated with creosote and legibly inscribed, are already in position on, or in preparation for, all known graves, and in addition all known graves are carefully registered. Numbers of graves are well within range of hostile shell fire, which would as effectively destroy iron as wooden crosses. The former could not rapidly be replaced, whereas the latter could be re-erected immediately an approach were possible.

Further, many graves are in close proximity to the enemy and can only be approached at night; therefore the weight of the cross to be erected is an important factor.

These reasons made it necessary that during the war only the regulation wooden crosses should be erected over graves.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

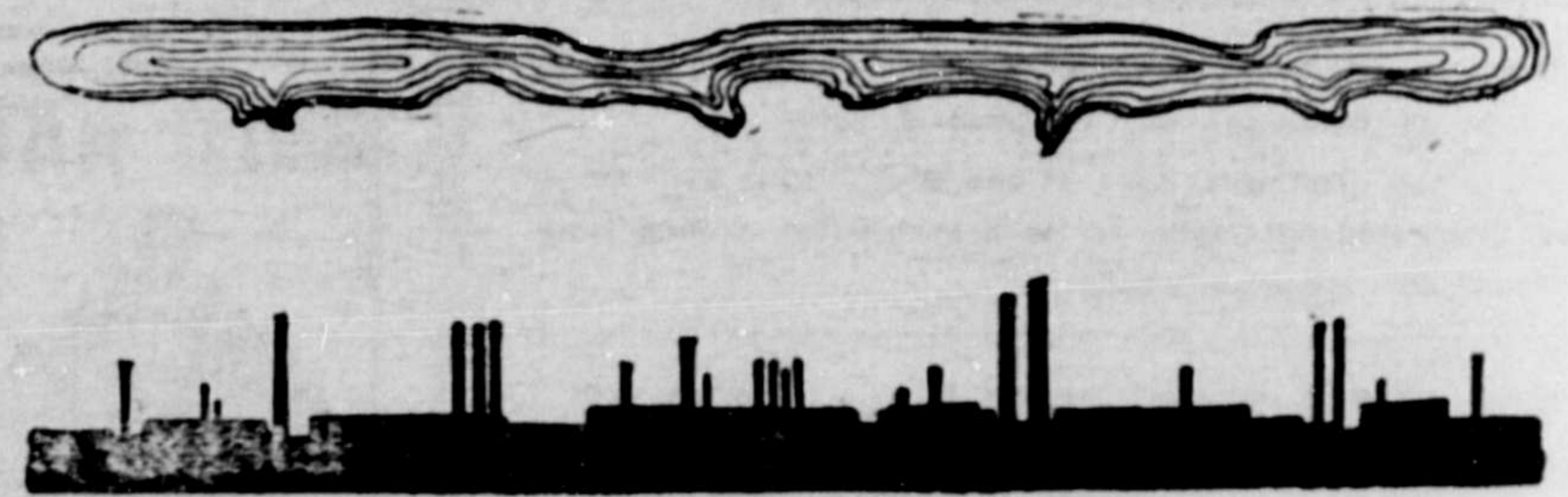
