## BULGARIA SEEMS DETERMINED TO FIGHT

### ALLIES ARE READY FOR BALKAN ATTACK -- RUSSIANS STRAIGHTEN OUT LINE

#### BULGARIANS MOVING TROOPS AGAINST SERBIA AND GREECE

ALLIES PREPARED FOR FIGHTING IN BALKANS—BULGARIANS SHOWING PRO-GERMAN TENDENCIES—FRENCH MAKE PROGRESS—OPTIMISM ON THE RUSSIAN FRONT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Oct. 2.—A report from Athens states that Bulgarian troops from Sofia are moving in the direction of the Serbian frontier. Other troops are making for the Greek border.

The principal point of concentration is the Stouma river, southwest of Sofia.

#### War Seems Certain.

It seems certain that there is to be a renewal of war in the Balkans. Britain, France, Italy and Russia have arranged plans to cope with any attacks which may be made on Serbia and Greece. There are pro-German manifestations in the Bulgarian cities along the Danube and artillery is massing on the frontier of Dobruja in Roumania.

#### French Progress.

There has been a hot German bombardment in the Artois district. The French have made progress on the Heights of La Folie, capturing a number of machine guns.

#### Russians Optimistic.

London, Oct. 2.—There are optimistic reports from Russia, following the withdrawal of pressure by the enemy. The Russian front now extends in a straight line from Dvinsk to the Roumanian border.

The former premier has been somewhat weakened by the operation and subsequent confinement, but his physicians have no fears as to his complete recovery. Sir Wilfrid expects to go to his country home at Athabaskville for a few days and afterwards take a trip to the south.

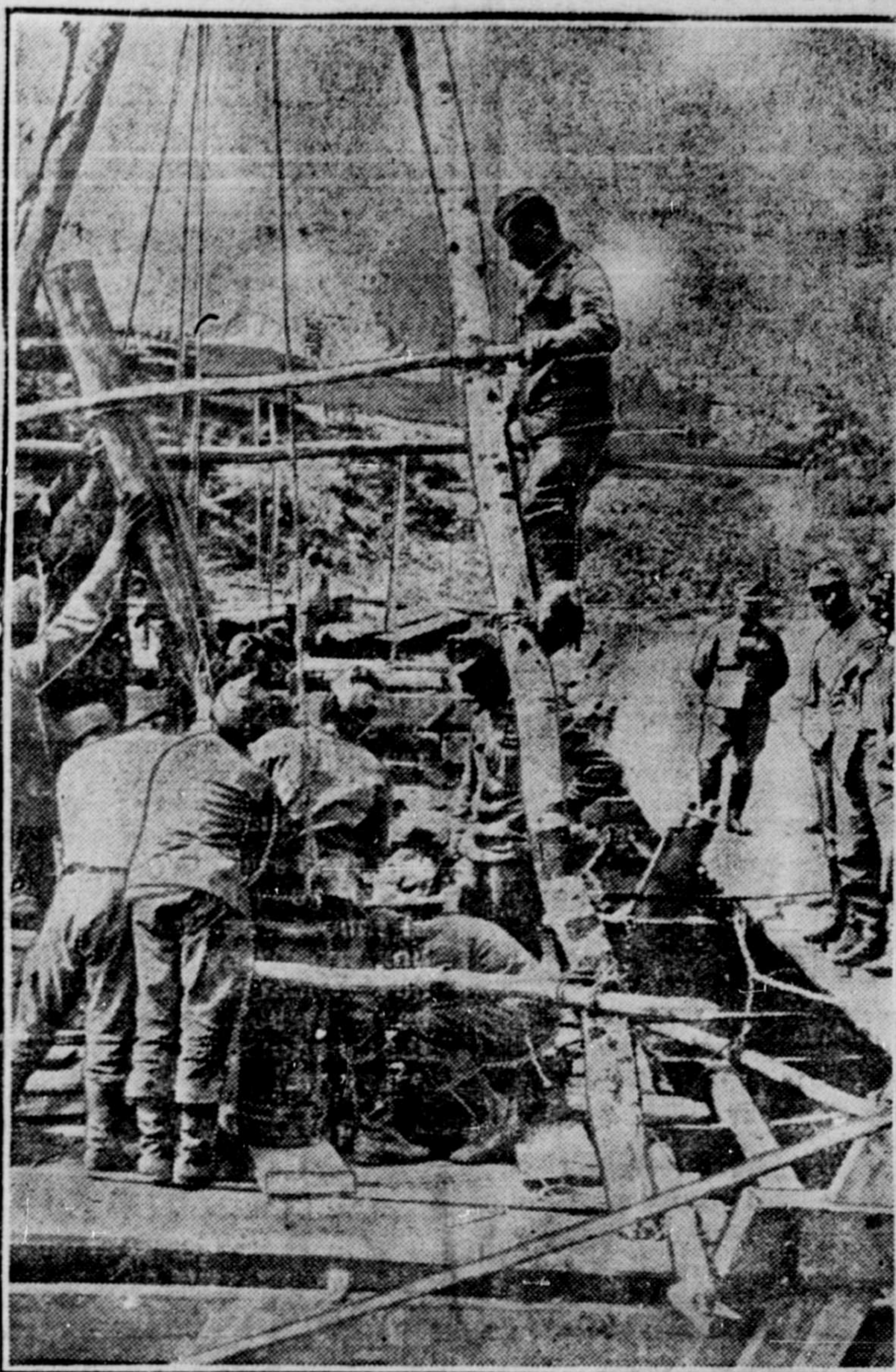

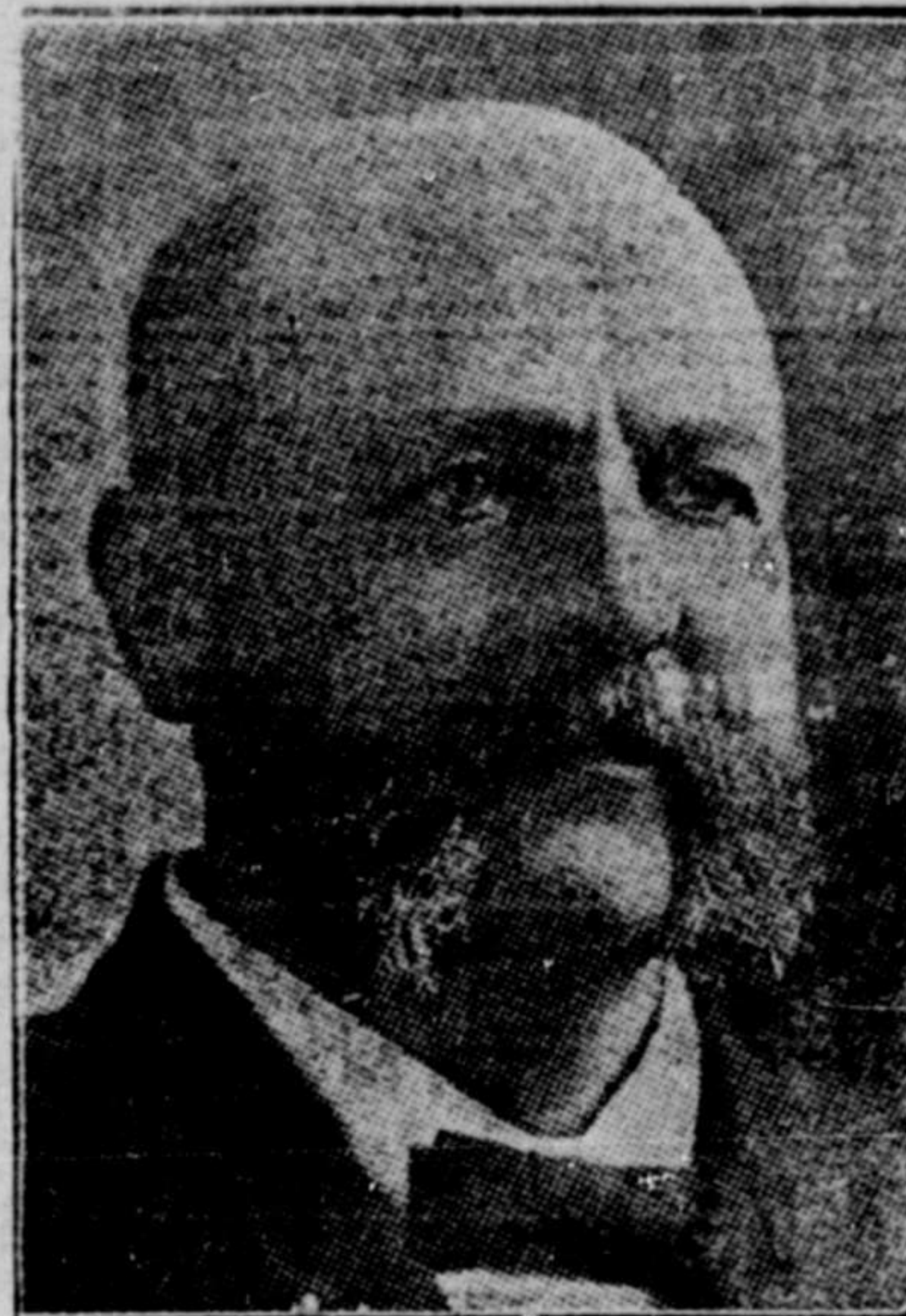

#### POTASH DEPOSITS MAY BE FOUND IN THE NORTH

Edmonton, Oct. 1.—That the world's greatest deposits of potash and other potassium salts will be found in Northern Alberta is the belief of Charles F. Law, personal representative of D. A. Thomas, the Welsh coal king, who, up to the present time, has expended a good deal of money in prospecting for minerals in the north. Mr. Law has written to the Edmonton Board of Trade, pointing out that under the present Canadian Mining Act potassium can only be mined on small claims similar to those allowed in the case of gold, silver and other metals, and owing to the great depth at which it is likely to be found, making prospecting very costly, he suggests that the board memorialize the Dominion government, with a view to the amending of the law, so that claims of 1,920 acres may be acquired, as in the case of petroleum.

The board has decided to recommend the matter to the most careful consideration of the government, and such changes made in the mining regulations as may appear to be necessary to encourage the development of what may prove to be a valuable natural resource of Northern Alberta. Mr. Law says he has been actively engaged in the search for this mineral for the past 22 years, and is so much persuaded of the possibility of finding it in Northern Alberta that the Thomas interests are prepared to expend a large sum of money in drilling for potash next year, conditional on a change being made in the act.

#### Big Revenue to Germany.

Under normal conditions, Mr. Law states, Germany derives its largest revenue from the export tax on potash, and the government of Chili from the export tax on nitrates. At the present time the Thomas interests are drilling for petroleum at Vermilion Chutes, on the Peace River, and the drill could be shifted during the coming winter to the potash grounds, and drilling begin next spring to a depth of 2,000 feet. The German deposits are found at a depth of 1,600 feet, underlying salt. "As both potash salts and ni-

#### ALLEGED ENQUIRY INTO SUBMARINE PURCHASES

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, Oct. 2.—S. S. Taylor, K. C., of Vancouver, representing the Liberal party, was refused status in the submarine enquiry, which opened here today. Sir Charles Davidson ruled that counsel John Thompson is capable of conducting the enquiry.

Richard Ryan, janitor of the Parliament Buildings, said that he handled a cheque for \$1,150,000 for the submarines, as agent for the government, when the vessels were handed over at sea.

J. V. Patterson, of Seattle, admitted that he received \$40,000 commission for himself, and stated that this was all the commission paid in the transaction. He claimed that the submarines were proper vessels and perfect in construction. The commission is still in session.

As the potassium from three per cent. of sea salt, we may reasonably assume that potash will be found in as relatively large quantities."

**DANGEROUS TALK**

All over the country patriotic meetings are being held—especially in districts where recruiting has been slow—at which trained public speakers are appealing to the young men of Canada to enlist and fight for freedom. Much of this work is done by busy men, who assuredly would not engage in it were they convinced that an ample supply of recruits could be secured without effort.

The statements of General Hughes minister of militia, that he can get a million recruits any time he wants them and that men are coming forward twice as rapidly as they are required, have caused amazement and consternation among those engaged in the recruiting campaign. Such a ridiculous "brag" is calculated to stop the stream of recruits at the very time when the need for them is becoming more urgent. There are thousands of young men offering now not because of a desire for adventure or the hope of winning fame, but because they believe there is pressing need for their help to destroy German militarism. If Sir Sam Hughes can get a million recruits any time he wants them, serious young Canadians on the point of sacrificing good positions and imperilling their careers at the call of their country will cease to regard that call as urgent and will be disposed to draw back. They will naturally regard the stirring speeches of the members of the Recruiting League as overdrawn and the statements made about slow recruiting as false.

General Hughes' braggart talk is dangerous also because it leads the Canadian people generally to believe that they have done and are doing their

full share in carrying on the great war. The truth is that the proportion of Canadian troops despatched to the seat of war and actually at the front is lower than that of any other overseas Dominion, and very much below the percentage of men sent out from Great Britain. In Canada up to the present time the total enlistment has been about 1 3-4 per cent. of the population. In Great Britain there are under arms about 600,000 regulars and territorials enlisted prior to the outbreak of hostilities, 250,000 men in the navy, and almost three million men recruited since war began. This vast array represents almost 8 per cent. of the population of the United Kingdom. A similar proportion of Canada's population would involve the raising of over 640,000 men in the Dominion. That could be done only by conscription. Yet General Hughes, with the irresponsibility of a schoolboy, talks loftily about obtaining a million men whenever he wants them.

Sir Robert Borden ought to insist that General Hughes shall cease to talk nonsense and buckle down to work. There are great problems awaiting solution in the Militia Department. Sir Sam should be on the job instead of on the rampage.—Toronto Globe.

A soldier, defending the Empire, draws \$1.10 per day, while an Indian commissioner has to be content with \$20.00 per day and \$10.00 per day to cover expenses.

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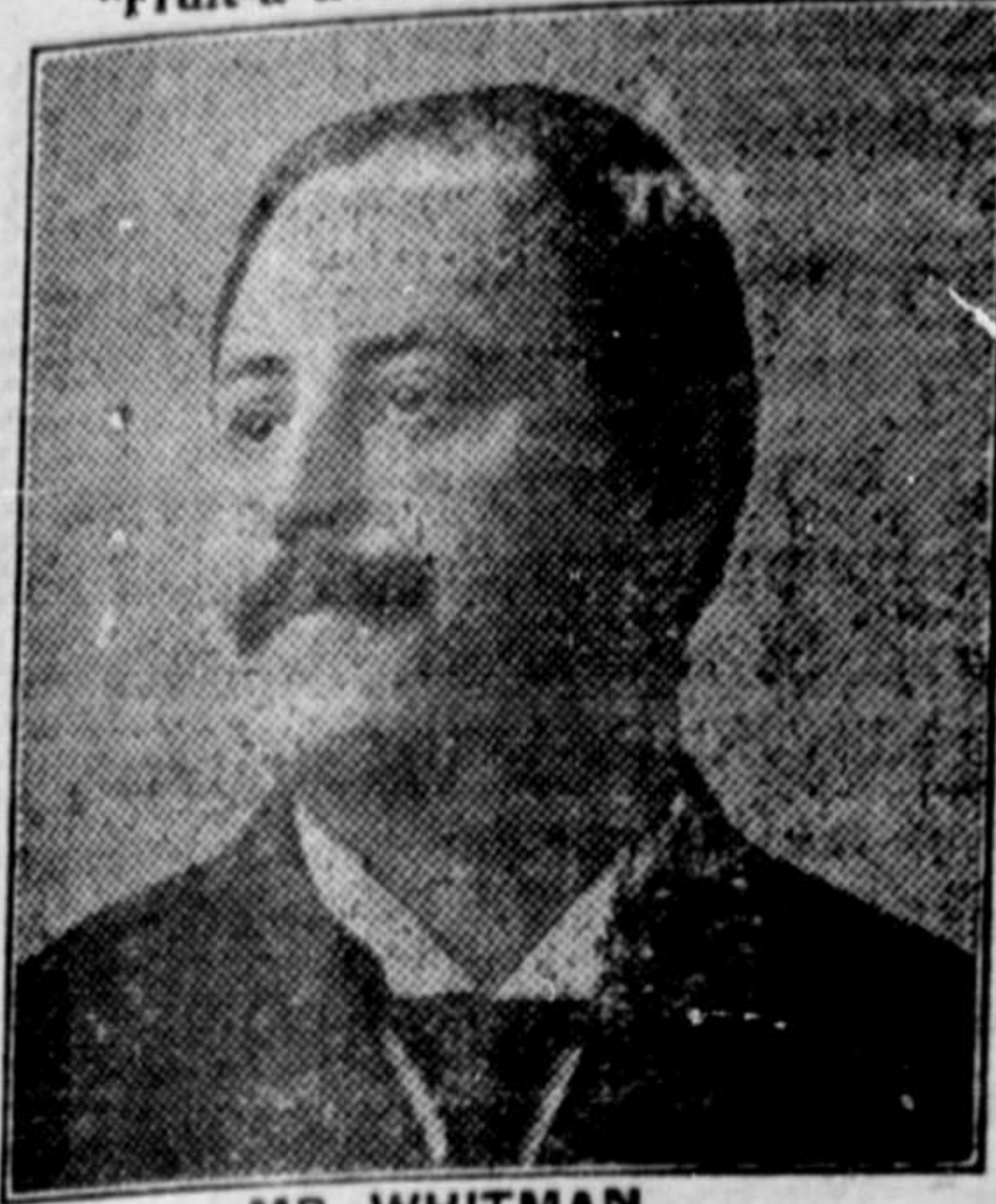

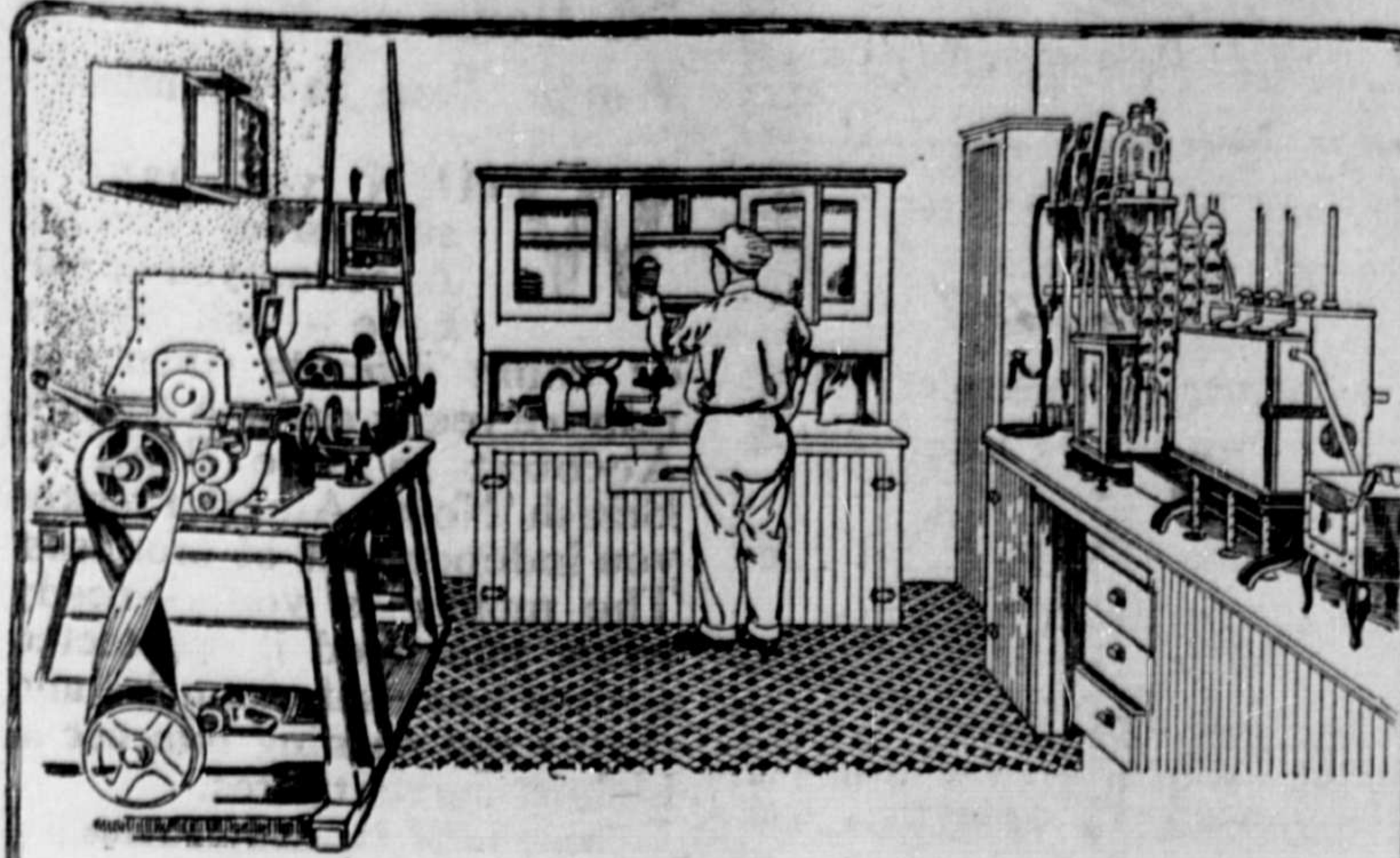

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present

#### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war  
and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will  
be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this  
you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Govern-  
ment.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every  
month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20  
(also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to com-  
fortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund  
will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will  
be cared for by the Government and your pay continued  
until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an  
allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of  
your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die  
while on Active Service? The Government will provide an  
adequate pension, that will enable the family to live com-  
fortably until the children are old enough to look after them-  
selves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be  
her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

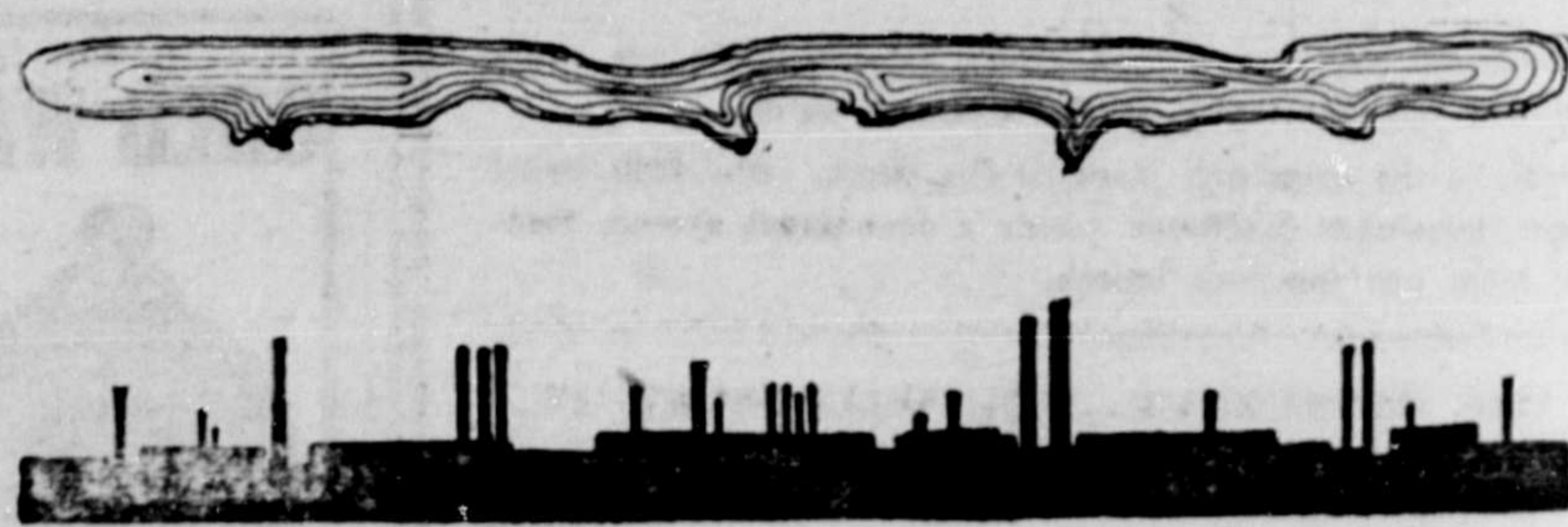
