

GIVING THINGS AWAY

The submarine enquiry has one expected it would take. In commenting on the enquiry, our morning contemporary admits that Sir Richard has his faults, but that avarice and greed can never be laid against him. "He has too little regard for riches to be guilty of these crimes." With the statement that Sir Richard has too little regard for riches, the public of British Columbia will agree heartily. Even in buying the submarines, Sir Richard paid \$1,150,000 for \$750,000 worth. Everything Sir Dick has done for years past has been done regardless of cost to the province. It was this magnificent disregard of the riches of the province which prompted him to agree to the province carrying an abnormal load of C. N. R. bonds. It was the same utter disregard of the value of the lands of the province which, caused him to permit the speculator to grab everything he wanted, regardless of results to the province.

Sir Richard's greatest weakness has been giving things away. Incidentally, his weakness has also been his strength as a Conservative leader. Now that there is nothing much more of importance left to give away, Sir Richard's day is over. This is no insinuation that anything was given away at the submarine enquiry. The Mc-Bride government has carried out to the limit the ordeal of dying for its friends, and Sir Richard has exemplified the truth of the old adage about the fool and his money, the only unfortunate difference being that the money in this case belonged to the people.

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



Joseph Bernier, the Canadian Arctic explorer, has reached port on his vessel, the Guide, after a successful trip to the new land he discovered in the north, known as Baffin Island, and which in 1916 will be recognized as a Canadian possession. This newly-discovered land, which is located in the Arctic Archipelago, about 2,500 miles from Quebec, comprises 500,000 square miles of territory, as extensive as France and Italy combined. The only casualty reported by Captain Bernier was the loss of one of his crew, a German, who, while taking photos of the islands, wandered too far away from the Eskimo settlement and was lost. His frozen body was found 30 days later 150 miles from the station, by a search party sent out by Captain Bernier .

4.-What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.


5 .- What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the childhen are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
